FLAMES LAST GAME RECAP

January 14, 2025 - CALGARY FLAMES [1] vs. ST. LOUIS BLUES [2]

Game Summary | Event Summary

The Calgary Flames continued a four-game road trip on Tuesday night at the Enterprise Center for one of two meetings with the St. Louis Blues on their four-game swing. St. Louis would score the only goal of the opening frame with Colton Parayko giving the Blues a 1-0 lead just 49 seconds into the contest. In the second, the teams would combine for 19 shots but both goalies stood tall, and the scoreboard read 1-0 Blues through 40. Calgary would find an equalizer just over six minutes into the third with a Kevin Bahl shot beating Jordan Binnington to knot things at one. Later in the frame, St. Louis reclaimed their lead after Radek Faksa deflected a shot in, and the home side held on from there to knock off the Flames 2-1.

TONIGHTS STORYLINES & STATS

This is the third and final meeting this season between the Flames and Blues. Calgary fell 2-1 on Tuesday night in their second meeting with St. Louis.

This is a Pacific Division versus Central Division matchup; the Flames have a record of 7-5-1 against Central Division teams and a record of 13-10-2 against Western Conference opponents.

LOOK BACKS AT IT:

Mikael Backlund enters play tonight with 209 goals in his NHL career, and with one more can tie Johnny Gaudreau (210) for the ninth-most in Flames franchise history. Earlier this season, Backlund passed Eric Vail (206) to take sole-possession of the 10th most in Flames history and join Kent Nilsson as one of two Swedish-born skaters inside the top 10 in goals for the Flames.

Backlund has also registered the fifth-most game-winning goals on the road in Flames franchise history (21), and with one more can tie Theoren Fleury for the fourth-most. Only Jarome Iginla (34), Sean Monahan (23), and Johhny Gaudreau (23) have more.

JUST DUEH IT:

Walker Duehr scored his first NHL goal in St. Louis on January 12th, 2023. The Flames were in the midst of a road trip very similar to their current four game swing, with a pair of games in St. Louis with Duehr making his season debut in their first matchup and then scoring in their second meeting. At the time of his goal, Duehr became the first player born in South Dakota to score an NHL goal.

HOWLIN' FOR YOU:

With his 23 save effort on Monday in Chicago, Dustin Wolf (15-6-2 in 23 GP) has become the fourth different Flames goaltender to record 15 wins in a season in 23 games or fewer. He has joined Dan Bouchard (21 GP in 1978-79), Miika Kiprusoff (22 GP in 2003-04 & 23 GP in 2009-10) and Mike Vernon (23 GP in 1988-89).

BIG BAHLER BRAND:

Kevin Bahl scored his second of the season on Tuesday in these clubs' second meeting to increase his point total to 14 through 43 games in 2024-25. Bahl was coming off a career-best 11 points in 2023-24 and sits just six points away from his first 20-point campaign in the NHL.

SHARK ATTACK:

Yegor Sharangovich registered a shorthanded marker on Monday night in Chicago to score his 91st career goal. With nine more tallies, Sharangovich can become just the third skater of Belarussian descent in NHL history to reach the 100-goal plateau and join: Mikhail Grabovski (125) and Andrei Kostitsyn (103).

FROM CALEDON, WITH KER(INS):

Rory Kerins made his NHL debut on Monday night in Chicago to become the second skater to play their first NHL game for the Flames this season (Sam Honzek: 10/09/24 at VAN). In just his first NHL shift, Kerins would record an assist for his first NHL point just 74 seconds into his debut. Kerins would record another assist later in the frame to become just the fifth player in Flames franchise history to record multiple assists in their first NHL game, joining: Kevin LaVallee (0-3—3 on Oct. 9, 1980), Sergei Makarov (1-2—3 on Oct. 5, 1989), Yves Courteau (0-2—2 on Oct. 13, 1984) and Kent Nilsson (1-2—3 on Oct. 10, 1979). He also became just the 10th player in NHL history to collect multiple assists in his first-ever NHL period and first since Eric Belanger (0-2—2 on Oct. 6, 2000 w/ LAK).

The Caledon, ON native is also just the second Flames player since 2009-10 to record a point on their first NHL shift with the other being Sam Bennett on April 11, 2015.

Flames General Manager Craig Conroy spent parts of five seasons with the St. Louis Blues, from 1996-97 to midway through the 2000-01 season. Conroy skated in 359 games for the Blues, scoring 57 goals and 94 assists for 151 points.



The Calgary Flames sadly announce the passing of long-time Flames executive and former head coach Al MacNeil.

Al, a Stanley Cup winning Head Coach, National Hockey League player and Calgary Flames executive and consultant whose name is engraved on the Stanley Cup four times, including the Flames 1989 championship, passed away at the age of 89 years, on January 5, 2025, surrounded by his family in Calgary.

An Original Six player, Al was a rugged defenceman and open-ice hitter who played 524 NHL games for the Toronto Maple Leafs, Montreal Canadiens, Chicago Blackhawks, New York Rangers, later concluding his NHL playing career as a Pittsburgh Penguin following his selection in the 1967 expansion draft.

Recognizing Al's potential as a Head Coach, legendary Montreal Canadiens General Manger Sam Pollock acquired his rights from the Penguins and Al subsequently spent the last two seasons of his professional hockey career mentoring young players as a Player Coach, first for the Houston Apollos of the CHL in 1968-69 and in his final year for the Canadiens then top farm team, the Montreal Voyageurs of the AHL in 1969-70.

Al won his first Stanley Cup as the rookie Head Coach of the Montreal Canadiens in 1971, his second and third Cups as the Director of Player Personnel for the Canadiens' in their 1978 and 1979 Stanley Cup victories, and his fourth as the Assistant General Manager of the Calgary Flames' 1989 Stanley Cup winning team.

As a long-time NHL player, coach and executive, AI took tremendous pride in developing and coaching hundreds of NHL hockey players over many decades.

As the General Manager and Head Coach of the Montreal Canadiens' farm team, the Nova Scotia Voyageurs, he guided the team to three Calder Cup Championships in 1972, 1976 and 1977. He was named American Hockey League Coach of the Year two times, in 1972 and 1977 and was inducted into the American Hockey League Hall of Fame in 2014.

Al was an Assistant Coach of Team Canada winning the 1976 Canada Cup, and was also an Assistant Coach of the 1981 Canada Cup team.

As a junior player with the Toronto Marlboros, he won two Memorial Cups in 1955 and as team captain in 1956. Al was the last Head Coach of the NHL's Atlanta Flames and the first Head Coach of the Calgary Flames for their first two seasons in our city.

Committed to the team and the City of Calgary, Al was a part of the Flames' hockey operations for many years. He returned to the NHL bench as an Interim Head Coach for the Flames for 13 games in the 2002-2003 season.

Al is survived by his wife of 58 years, Norma, son Allister, a scout for the Flames, and his daughter Allison and son-in-law Paul Sparkes. He has two grandsons Jack Sparkes, a 2022 draft pick of the Los Angeles Kings, and Ben Sparkes, a university student in Nova Scotia who plays Junior B hockey. Al has a large extended family based in Nova Scotia, and across Canada and the United States.
