

**FLAMES LAST GAME RECAP****December 10, 2025 – CALGARY FLAMES [3] vs. DETROIT RED WINGS [4]**[Game Summary](#) | [Event Summary](#)

The Calgary Flames staged a late third-period comeback bid that landed just short on Wednesday night, falling 4–3 to the Detroit Red Wings. Detroit struck twice in the opening four minutes—with Alex DeBrincat scoring just 62 seconds in and Axel Sandin-Pellikka adding another shortly after. The visitors extended their lead in the second when DeBrincat registered his second of the night before Dylan Larkin made it 4–0 at the 9:09 mark. Calgary mounted a spirited push in the third, sparked by a Joel Farabee shorthanded penalty-shot goal at 8:02. Just 65 seconds later, Matt Coronato rifled a one-timer home off a feed from Nazem Kadri, before MacKenzie Weegar blasted home a point shot to cut the deficit to one with 5:20 remaining. The Flames pressed late and outshot Detroit 37–29 overall, but couldn't find the equalizer, finishing their four-game homestand 3-1-0.

TONIGHTS STORYLINES & STATS

This is the first of four meetings this season between the Flames and Kings. Calgary swept their three-game season series with Los Angeles in 2024-25.

This is a Pacific Division matchup; the Flames have a record of 3-3-0 against Pacific Division teams and a record of 5-11-2 against Western Conference opponents.

LAST SEASON AGAINST THE KINGS:

The Flames and Kings met three times in 2024-25, with Calgary besting their Pacific Division opponent on all three occasions.

GAME ONE (November 11, 2024 – vs. LAK):

The Calgary Flames began their season-series with the Los Angeles Kings at the Scotiabank Saddledome on November 11. The Flames would outshoot the Kings 10-7 in the opening 20, but both goalies stood tall to keep the contest scoreless through 20. Midway through the second, Mikael Backlund would give the Flames a 1-0 lead and 40 seconds later, Jonathan Huberdeau was sprung on a partial break, and the Saint-Jerome, QC native would slide home his sixth of the season to double the Flames advantage through 40. In the third, the Kings would draw within one late, but an empty netter would seal it as the Flames knocked off the Kings 3-1, with the win coming in Ryan Huska's 100th game as an NHL bench boss.

GAME TWO (January 11, 2025 – vs. LAK):

The Calgary Flames welcomed the Los Angeles Kings to the Scotiabank Saddledome for the second time in January. The Kings would score the only goal of the first with Jacob Moverare giving the visitors a 1-0 edge. In the second, the Flames would find an equalizer with Matt Coronato placing a perfect shot over the shoulder of David Rittich to level this contest through 40. In the third, the Flames would strike on the man advantage with Jonathan Huberdeau making it goals in back-to-back games against Los Angeles and Calgary had their first lead of the night. The home side would shut the door from there and knock off the Kings 2-1.

GAME THREE (April 17, 2025 – at LAK):

The Calgary Flames closed out their 2024-25 regular season in Los Angeles, with Aydar Suniev, Sam Morton, Zayne Parekh, and Hunter Brzustewicz all skating in their first NHL games. After a scoreless first period, Nazem Kadri opened the scoring early in the second before Calgary exploded in the third with four goals in just over nine minutes: Sam Morton netted his first NHL goal, Kadri added his second of the night, rookie Zayne Parekh scored his first NHL marker, and Mikael Backlund capped the surge to make it 5-0. The Kings would add one late, but the Flames closed out their campaign on a high with a 5-1 victory at Crypto.com Arena.

RAZZLE DAZZLE:

Rasmus Andersson set up MacKenzie Weegar's third period marker on Wednesday night to register the 199th assist of his career. With one more helper, Andersson would become the 24th defenceman of Swedish-decent in NHL history to reach the 200-assist plateau, and the ninth-active Swedish rearguard to reach the milestone. Andersson has recorded 22 points (7G, 15A) so far this season, ranking second among blueliners from Sweden in 2025-26 with his seven goals setting the pace.

NAZ-HIM:

Nazem Kadri recorded a pair of assists on Wednesday against Detroit to record his second-consecutive multi-assist game and now has helpers in three-consecutive outings, and in four of his last five contests. Against Buffalo on Monday, Kadri reached the 20-assist plateau in his 31st game of the season. Only one Flames player in the past five years has needed fewer games than Kadri to hit the 20-assist mark: Johnny Gaudreau, who did so in 28 games in 2021-22.

MAGIC NUMBER:

With their seven-goal outburst against Buffalo on Monday night, the Calgary Flames have now won 44 straight games when scoring four or more goals, dating back to Dec. 16, 2023. Last season, the Flames went a perfect 18-0-0 in such contests and closed the 2024-25 campaign with four consecutive four-plus goal performances: Apr. 11 vs. MIN (4-2 W), Apr. 13 vs. SJS (5-2 W), Apr. 15 vs. VGK (5-4 SOW), and Apr. 17 at LAK (5-1 W). Calgary is 6-0-0 so far this season when reaching or surpassing the four-goal mark in a game.



WEEGSY BABY:

Mackenzie Weegar collected an assist on Yegor Sharangovich’s game-opening goal on Monday against Buffalo to tie Phil Russel (103) for 16th on the franchise’s all-time assist by a blueliner list. With his goal on Wednesday against Detroit, Weegar passed Dennis Wideman (136) for 15th place on the Flames all-time points list among defencemen.

Weegar enters tonight’s game with 197 assists in his NHL career and is three away from reaching the 200-assist mark. With three more helpers, Weegar would become just the sixth defenceman in NHL history drafted in the seventh round (FLA – 206th overall in 2013) to register 200 NHL assists, and the only active seventh-round–selected rearguard to achieve the milestone. Only one other active seventh-round selection has more career helpers than Weegar — Devils winger Ondrej Palat (TBL – 208th overall in 2011).

LOOK BACKS AT IT:

Mikael Backlund is closing in on 1,100 NHL games, needing just two more to reach the milestone. Backlund was the Flames’ first-round pick (24th overall) in the 2007 NHL draft and made his NHL debut on January 8, 2009, against the New York Islanders.


As Backlund developed in Calgary, he became known for his hockey IQ, defensive reliability, penalty-killing strength and ability to drive play at both ends of the ice. He represented Sweden at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey, following that tournament with a breakout season in 2016-17 in which he posted a then-career-high 53 points and earned Selke Trophy consideration. In 2022-23, he set a new career high with 56 points (19G, 37A) and a team-best plus-minus rating of +24, while appearing in all 82 games for the Flames. That summer, the Vasteras, SWE, product won the King Clancy Memorial Trophy for his leadership and humanitarian contributions, and on September 21, 2023, was named the 21st captain in franchise history.

Backlund became the 19th player of Swedish descent — and the 397th skater in NHL history — to reach 1,000 NHL games, hitting the mark Oct. 30 in Utah. He was also just the second player to skate his first 1,000 games with the Flames, joining Jarome Iginla. He now looks to join Iginla once again as the second skater in franchise history to reach 1,100 games played with Calgary.

HEY DID YOU KNOW?

WORLD JUNIOR WATCH:

On Monday morning, Flames defenceman Zayne Parekh and Calgary's 2025 first-round pick Cole Reschny were named to Team Canada's World Junior camp roster.

Parekh has skated in 11 games for the Flames in his first professional season and has been sidelined since Nov. 7 with an injury. The Markham, ON, product was a member of the gold-medal-winning Canadian squad at the 2023 Hlinka Gretzky Cup, recording three assists in five games. He also represented Canada at the 2022 World U17 Hockey Challenge, finishing tied for second in scoring on Canada Black with five points in seven games.

Reschny has suited up in 16 games for the University of North Dakota this season, scoring two goals and adding a team-leading 16 assists for 18 points, also a team high. The 18-year-old freshman is currently riding a four-game assist streak and has picked up at least one point in eight of his last nine outings. Reschny was part of Team Canada's gold-medal-winning U18 World Championship squad last spring, finishing that tournament with five goals and three assists for eight points in five games.

On Friday morning, Zayne Parekh was loaned to Canada's U20 National Junior Team by Calgary.
