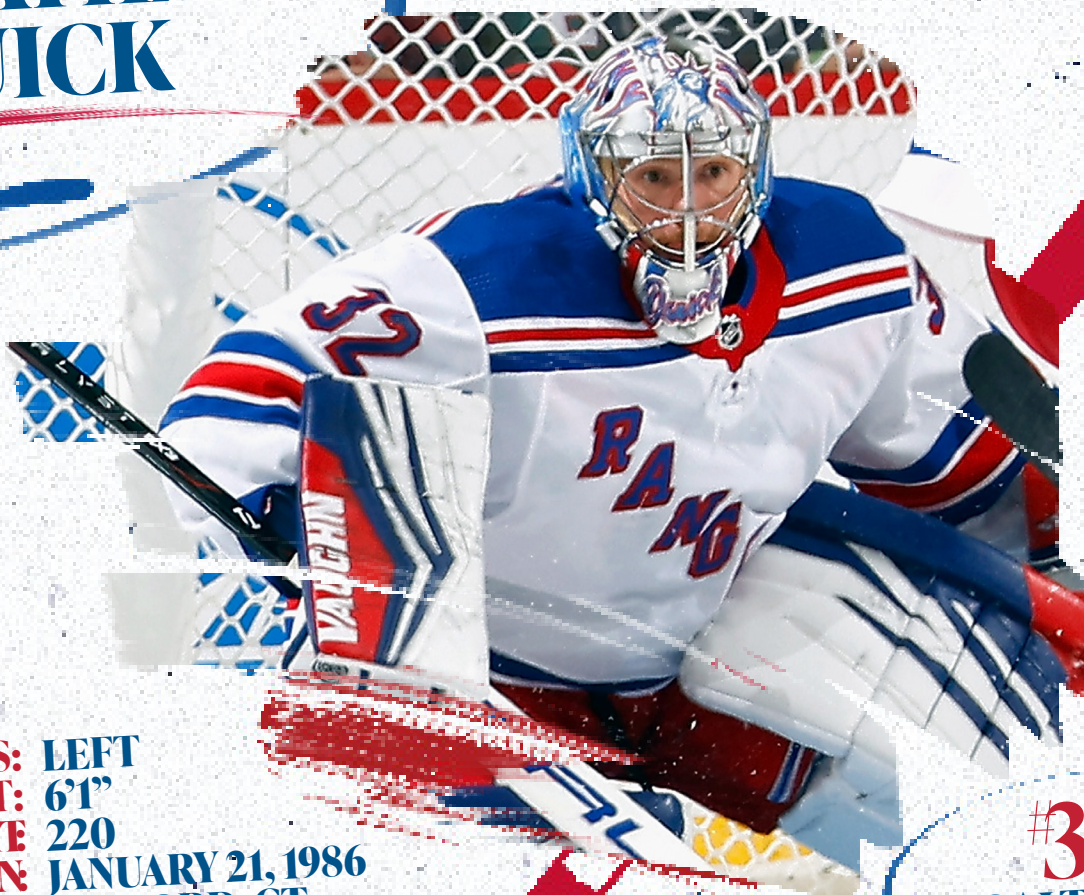


# JONATHAN QUICK

Signed by the Rangers as a free agent on July 1, 2023, Quick posted a 16-15-6 record with a 3.41 goals-against average, .882 save percentage and two shut-outs in 41 regular-season games (36 starts) for the Vegas Golden Knights and Los Angeles Kings last season. He went 5-2 with a .901 save percentage after being acquired by Vegas on March 2 and won the Stanley Cup with the Golden Knights. The Milford, Connecticut, native won the Stanley Cup with the Kings in 2012 and 2014. He is a two-time Vezina Trophy finalist and a three-time NHL All-Star selection. He won the Conn Smythe Trophy and was an NHL Second All-Star Team selection in 2012 and has won the William M. Jennings Trophy, which is awarded to the goalies who played for the team that allowed the fewest goals, twice (2013-14, 2017-18).
