- With the win, Head Coach **Pete DeBoer** is now 9-0 all time in his career in Game 7s. His nine Game 7 wins are the most of any head coach in NHL history.
- Mikko Rantanen factored on all four of Dallas' goals (3-1—4) to secure the Stars' Game 7 win over the Colorado Avalanche.
 - All three of Rantanen's goals were scored in the third period, making him the first player in NHL history to score a hat trick in the third period of a Game 7.
- Wyatt Johnston scored the game-winning goal at 56:04 of regulation, the 11th-lastest go-ahead goal in a Game 7 in NHL history. Johnston has now scored a goal in each of the three Game 7s he has played in over the course of his career.

GAME NOTES

THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

- Tonight marks the Stars' 419th postseason game in franchise history. Dallas has a 212-206 all-time postseason record.
- The Stars have a 32-33 all-time record in Game 1s including a 19-17 record on the road, while Winnipeg is 7-4 in Game 1s with a 4-3 record on home ice.
- Thomas Harley and Ilya Lyubushkin have played 107:03 together at 5-on-5, which was the fifth-highest total of any defensive pair this postseason entering play Tuesday according to Natural Stat Trick.
- Roope Hintz has 14 points (5-9—14) in his last 14 Stanley Cup Playoff games dating back to May 9, 2024 against the Colorado Avalanche. This includes tying the NHL record for points in a period with four (2-2—4) in the second period against Colorado in Game 6.
- Tyler Seguin enters tonight's game two assists shy of totaling 50 career playoff assists. When he reaches the milestone, he will become the 28th active NHL player to have at least 50 career assists in the Stanley Cup Playoffs.
- Lian Bichsel has recorded 23 hits through the first seven games of the postseason, which led all rookies entering play Tuesday.

- 2025 marks the first trip to the Stanley Cup Playoffs for rookies Oskar Bäck and Lian Bichsel. Mavrik Bourque appeared
 in one game for the Stars during the 2024 postseason.
- The Stars' American Hockey League (AHL) affiliate the Texas Stars also qualified for the postseason after finishing the 2024-25 regular season with a 42-25-3 record. Dallas is one of nine organizations this season to have both its NHL and AHL clubs qualify for their respective postseasons, with the others being Carolina, Colorado, Florida, Los Angeles, Montreal, St. Louis, Tampa Bay and Washington.
- The Stars rank tied for eighth all-time in playoff wins with 212 (also: Pittsburgh Penguins).

GROUNDING THE JETS

- This will be the first ever postseason matchup between the two teams.
 - o In the regular season, Dallas is 33-22-5 all-time vs. Winnipeg, including a 14-13-3 mark on the road.
- Tyler Seguin has registered 54 points (29-25—54) in 51 career regular-season games against Winnipeg, averaging more than a point per game against them (1.06).
 - o Seguin's 54 regular-season points rank fifth among active NHL skaters.
- Mikko Rantanen has registered nine points (2-7—9) in five playoff games against the Jets (with COL), averaging better than a point per game against them (1.80). His nine postseason points against Winnipeg are tied for fifth among active NHL skaters.
 - Rantanen has recorded a point in each of his five playoff games against the Jets, riding a five-game playoff point streak against them.
 - o In the regular season, Rantanen has 28 points (10-18–28) in 31 career games played vs. Winnipeg.
 - o Rantanen's 28 regular-season points against the Jets since the 2016-17 season are tied for the 10th most in the NHI
- Mikael Granlund has three points (1-2-3) in five postseason games played against Winnipeg (with MIN).
 - o In the regular season, Granlund has 25 points (8-17–25) in 40 career games against the Jets.
- Jamie Benn has recorded 43 points (19-24—43) in 49 career regular-season games vs. Winnipeg. His 43 regular-season points rank second among active Stars skaters while tying for 10th in the league.
- Matt Dumba has put up two points (1-1—2) in five career playoff games against Winnipeg. His two points came from a multi-point performance against them on April 15, 2018 (with MIN).
- Mason Marchment has nine points (5-4-9) in 14 career regular-season games against the Jets.
- Matt Duchene has tallied 36 points (17-19—36) in 47 career regular-season games vs. Winnipeg. His 36 regular season points vs. Winnipeg rank third among active Stars skaters.
- Jake Oettinger has a 6-4-1 record in 11 career regular-season games against the Jets, posting a 2.57 goals-against average and a .905 save percentage in those contests.

LUCKY NO. 7

- The Stars defeated the Avalanche 4-2 in Game 7 to advance to the Second Round with goals coming from **Mikko** Rantanen (3) and **Wyatt Johnston**. With the win, the Stars became the first team in NHL history to trail by multiple goals in the third period of a Game 7 and win in regulation according to Opta Stats.
- The Stars also become the fourth team to rally from a multi-goal deficit in the third period to win a Game 7 in NHL history according to Sportsnet Stats. They were joined by the Winnipeg Jets the following day.
- The Stars final tilt with the Avalanche marked the fourth time in franchise history that Dallas has faced Colorado in a Game 7, going a perfect 4-0 in those games.
- The team's victory over the Avalanche marked the fourth time in franchise history that the Stars have overcome a deficit to win a Game 7 according to NHL Stats, also doing so in 2020, 1984 and 1980.
- The Stars trailed entering the third period in three of their eventual four wins in the series, down 3-2 in Game 2 (a 4-3 overtime win), 1-0 in Game 3 (a 2-1 overtime win) and 1-0 in Game 7 (a 4-2 regulation win). According to NHL Stats, the Stars are the first team to win three games in a series after trailing to begin the third period since the Anaheim Ducks did so in the First Round of the 2015 Stanley Cup Playoffs against the Winnipeg Jets.
 - o The Ducks won the first three games of the series after trailing each contest entering the third period.
- With the win, Head Coach **Pete DeBoer** is now a perfect 9-0 in Game 7s in his career. His nine Game 7 wins are the most by any skater or coach in NHL history.
- The Stars have now won at least one series in each of the last three seasons and have improved to a 5-2 record in seven playoff rounds over that span.
- Dallas' streak of three consecutive postseasons with a series win is tied for its second-longest in franchise history
 according to NHL Stats behind a stretch of four straight from 1998 to 2001 (also 3 from 1983 to 1985).
- The Stars improved to 3-0 in their last three series against the Avalanche and 5-2 in seven all-time postseason rounds versus Colorado dating to the 1999 Conference Finals according to NHL Stats. The Stars' five series wins against the Avalanche are tied for their most versus one opponent since relocating to Texas in 1993-94 (also 5 vs. EDM).

THE MOOSE IS LOOSE

• Mikko Rantanen finished the first round tied with Winnipeg's Kyle Connor for the league lead in scoring, totaling 12 points (5-7—12) in seven games. Rantanen's five goals were tied for the second-most in the league through the First Round and his seven assists were tied for fourth.

- Rantanen tied the league record for points in a period in a playoff game twice, totaling four points in the second period of Game 6 (1-3—4) and again in the third period of Game 7 (3-1—4).
 - He is the first player in NHL history to have multiple four-point periods in a single postseason according to NHL Stats.
 - o Rantanen is the first player in NHL history (regular season or playoffs) to record a four-point period in consecutive games according to NHL Stats.
 - He also became just the second player in NHL history to have a four-point period in a Game 7, joining Kevin Labanc who did so in 2019 according to NHL Stats.
- Rantanen recorded the first-ever hat trick in the third period of a Game 7 and the second Game 7 hat trick in franchise history (last: Joel Kiviranta in the Second Round in 2020 against Colorado).
 - According to Opta Stats, Rantanen is the second player in NHL history to score a playoff hat trick in one period
 when facing his former team, joining Reggie Leach who did so against the Boston Bruins on May 6, 1976.
- Eleven (5-6—11) of Rantanen's 12 points were scored in Games 5, 6 and 7, making him the first player in NHL history to have 10 or more points in Games 5 through 7 of a series according to Sportsnet Stats.
- Rantanen's 12 points against Colorado were the most by a Stars skater in a single series since Roope Hintz also had 12 points (5-7—12) in the Stars First Round matchup against the Minnesota Wild in 2022-23.
 - o His 12 points are his most-ever in a single series, surpassing the 11 points (4-7—11) he had against Dallas in 2020.
- Rantanen has tallied at least three points in each of the last three postseason games that he has played in, marking the
 first time in his career that he has had three or more points in three straight Stanley Cup Playoff Games. It also marked
 the 12th time in NHL history that a player had at least three points in three consecutive playoff games according to NHL
 Stats.
- If Rantanen were to have at least three points again tonight, he would become the second player in NHL history to have
 at least three points in four consecutive playoff games according to NHL Stats, joining Leon Draisaitl who had five
 consecutive three-point games from May 18 to 26, 2022.
- Rantanen is over a point-per-game player in the postseason in his career, totaling 113 points (39-74—113) in 88 Stanley
 Cup Playoff games.
 - His 113 career playoff points rank 13th among all active skaters and rank third in NHL history among Finnish players.

JOHNNY B. GOODE

- Wyatt Johnston scored the game-winning goal in Game 7 to secure Dallas' series victory over the Avalanche. His goal
 came on the power-play with 3:56 remaining in regulation, which is the 11th-latest go-ahead goal in Game 7 history
 according to NHL Stats.
- With the goal, **Johnston** has now scored in each of the three Game 7s that he has played in in his career, which includes also notching the game-winner in 2023 against Seattle.
- Johnston is the first player in franchise history to score multiple series-clinching goals in a Game 7 according to NHL Stats.
- Johnston has now scored three series-clinching goals in his career, making him the second player in NHL history (Jeremy Roenick, 4) to have at least three series-clinching goals at age 22 or younger according to NHL Stats. He also became the first player in NHL history to score multiple series-clinching goals in Game 7s at age 22 or younger according to NHL Stats.
- Johnston has now totaled seven points (3-4—7) in seven games this postseason, which is already the second-highest scoring postseason of his career, trailing only the 16 points (10-6—16) he had in 19 games during the 2024 Stanley Cup Playoffs.
- Johnston has 12 points (6-6—12) in his last 12 playoff games played dating back to May 25, 2024 against Edmonton. A goal or an assist tonight would give him points in four consecutive playoff games for the second time in his career after previously doing so from May 25 to 31, 2024.
- His 29 career playoff points (17-12—29) are the most of any player selected in the 2021 NHL Draft and are tied for third
 on Dallas' roster since he made his postseason debut in 2023. Johnston trails only Brian Bellows (34) and Miro
 Heiskanen (30) for the most playoff points by a skater in Stars franchise history before turning 22 according to NHL
 Stats.
- Johnston's 17 career playoff goals are the fourth-most in NHL history by a player age 21 or younger according to NHL Stats, trailing only Sidney Crosby (24), Patrick Kane (19) and Jaromir Jagr (19).
- Johnston tallied an assist in Game 6 to pass Mike Modano (27) for the third-most career playoff points by a Stars/North Stars player before age 22 according to NHL Stats.
- **Johnston** scored two goals and added an assist in Game 5 against the Avalanche, marking the third three-point game of his postseason career.
- Jonston's first goal of the night came just nine seconds into regulation, which set the franchise record for fastest goal to begin a playoff game and was tied for the fifth-fastest goal to begin a game in Stanley Cup Playoff history according to NHL Stats.
 - His goal was the fastest to begin a playoff game since Derek Roy also scored nine seconds into regulation in Game 4 of the 2007 Conference Finals.
- **Johnston's** second goal of the night marked the third time in his playoff career that he has scored two goals in a game. According to NHL Stats, **Johnston** is tied for the third-most multi-goal playoff games by a player age 21 or younger in

- Stanley Cup Playoff history according to NHL Stats. The only players with more were Sidney Crosby (4) and Pierre Turgeon (4).
- **Johnston** also went 9-for-13 at the faceoff dot in Game 5, setting a single-game career high for faceoffs won in a Stanley Cup Playoff game.
- In Game 2 against the Avalanche, **Johnston** earned his 10th playoff assist in his career on **Evgenii Dadonov's** goal, making him the sixth player in Stars/North Stars history with at least 10 playoff helpers before age 22 according to NHL Stats. The others: **Miro Heiskanen** (22), Brian Bellows (20), Mike Modano (15), Craig Hartsburg (13) and Tom McCarthy (11).

JAKE AND BAKE

- Jake Oettinger logged a .911 save percentage against Colorado, which was tied for the fifth-best mark in the NHL
 among netminders that played in at least two games during the First Round.
- With the Stars win over the Avalanche, **Oettinger** now has a 3-1 record in Game 7s, posting a .950 save percentage and a 1.75 goals-against average in those games.
- Oettinger made 204 saves against Colorado, which was the most of any goaltender during the First Round.
- Oettinger's 204 saves are the second-most of his career in a series, trailing only the 272 saves he made in Dallas' 2022 First Round series against the Flames.
 - The 2025 postseason marks the first time in Oettinger's career that he has played a playoff series without defenseman Miro Heiskanen.

- According to MoneyPuck.com, **Oettinger** saved 2.9 goals above expected against Colorado, which was the fourth-best mark in the NHL during the First Round, trailing only New Jersey's Jacob Markstrom (5.7), Washington's Logan Thompson (5.6) and Carolina's Frederik Andersen (4.8).
 - Oettinger made 26 saves on 28 shots in Game 5, saving 1.58 goals above expected according to MoneyPuck.com.
- Since the start of the 2022 Stanley Cup Playoffs, **Oettinger** has posted a 27-25 postseason record with a .915 save percentage, 2.55 goals-against average and two shutouts. His 27 wins rank second to only Florida's Sergei Bobrovsky (36) during that span.
 - o Among netminders to play in at least 10 postseason games since the 2012-22 season, **Oettinger's** save percentage ranked eighth in the NHL and his goals-against average ranked 10th.

KILLING IT

- The Stars finished the first round with the third-best penalty kill during the 2025 Stanley Cup Playoffs with an 86.4 percent success rate, going 19-for-22 on the penalty kill.
 - o The Stars performance against the Avalanche was their best on the penalty kill in a series since 2022 when the team went 22-for-24 for a 91.7 percent success rate against the Calgary Flames.
- In Games 3 through 7 of the First Round, the Stars went 14-for-15 on the penalty kill, not allowing a power-play goal against in Games 3, 5, 6 or 7.
- Colorado's 13.6 percent success rate on the power play ranked 14th out of 16 playoff teams in the First Round. They
 finished the regular season having converted on 24.8 percent of their power-play opportunities, which was tied for the
 eighth-best mark in the NHL.
 - Since the Four Nations break (Feb. 22) through the end of the regular season, Colorado's power-play topped the NHL with a 33.9 percent conversion rate.
- Dallas went a perfect 6-for-6 on the penalty kill in Game 3 (10:17 of shorthanded ice time in total), which includes killing off 3:20 of a penalty kill to begin overtime.
- Since the NHL began tracking penalty kills in 1977-78, Dallas' Game 3 performance marked the 13th time that the Stars have been shorthanded for at least 10 minutes without allowing a power-play goal against in a Stanley Cup Playoff game.
 - o The Stars last accomplished this feat on Sept. 2, 2020 against the Avalanche, going 5-for-5 on the penalty kill.
- Game 3 also marked the 17th time since 1977-78 that the Avalanche have not scored a power play goal in a postseason game while having at least 10 minutes of power-play time.
- Esa Lindell played 8:09 of Dallas' 10:17 of shorthanded time in Game 3, the highest single-game total by a Stars skater in a Stanley Cup Playoff game since the NHL began tracking penalty killing in 1977-78.
 - o He also played all four minutes of Dallas' penalty kill in Game 6.

- Lindell's 29:23 of total shorthanded ice time led all NHL skaters through the First Round and his 4:12 of average shorthanded ice time per game ranked fourth.
 - Lindell also led the NHL in total shorthanded ice time (287:02) and shorthanded ice time per game (3:35) during the regular season. His 287:02 of shorthanded ice time was nearly 10 more minutes than the second ranked played (Mike Matheson; 277:22).
- Sam Steel totaled 18:35 of shorthanded ice time during Dallas' series against Colorado, which was the most of any NHL
 forward in the First Round. His 2:39 of shorthanded ice time per game was tied for the ninth-most among NHL forwards
 during the First Round.
- Oskar Bäck led all NHL rookies in the First Round in total shorthanded ice time (14:58) and shorthanded ice time per game (2:30). No other rookie played more than 1:35 of total shorthanded ice time.
 - o Bäck's 14:58 of shorthanded ice time ranked ninth among all NHL forwards during the First Round.
 - o Since the NHL began tracking penalty killing in 1997-98, Bāck's 14:48 of shorthanded ice time is already the second-most by a Stars rookie in postseason franchise history, trailing only the 17:43 of shorthanded ice time Radek Faksa had in 13 Stanley Cup Playoff games his rookie season in 2015-16.

BIKER GANG

- Thomas Harley had five points (2-3—5) in seven games against Colorado, which ranked fourth on the Stars and were tied for fourth among all NHL defensemen through the First Round.
- Harley's five points this postseason are already the second-most in his playoff career, trailing only the nine points (1-8-9) he had in 2023 with Dallas.
- Between the regular season and postseason, **Harley** has scored 18 goals, which is the third most in a single season by a Stars defenseman in franchise history according to TSN Stats. He trails only Brad Maxwell (21 in 1983-84) and Phillipp Boucher (19 in 2006-07).
- Harley has totaled 197:06 of ice time this postseason, which led all NHL skaters this postseason during the First Round
 and was nearly 10 more minutes than the second-ranked player (Cale Makar, 187.34). His 28:09 of average ice time per
 game ranked second to only New Jersey's Brian Dumoulin (29:21).
 - o Harley set a playoff single-game career high with 35:54 in Game 2 against Colorado, which was also the highest time on ice by an NHL skater in a single game this postseason.
 - He also had 27:34 of ice time in Game 1 against the Avalanche, which was the most he's ever played in a Stanley
 Cup Playoff game that ended in regulation and topped all skaters from either team.
- Harley's five points against Colorado this series brings his playoff career total to 18 (3-15—18). He currently leads all players drafted in 2019 in playoff career goals, assists, points and games played (46).
- Harley also had 21 blocked shots against Colorado, which was the most of any NHL skater in the First Round. Teammate Esa Lindell was tied for fifth with 17.
- Harley had a career year in 2024-25, finishing the regular season with 50 points (15-34—50), setting career highs in goals, assists, points, even-strength goals (15), power-play points (15), plus/minus (plus-32) and time on ice per game played (23:23).
 - o His 50 points ranked 15th among all NHL defensemen this season.
- Harley became the third Stars defenseman in the last 10 years to reach the 50-poing plateau (Miro Heiskanen, John Klingberg), and his 16 goals were tied for the sixth-most by a Stars defenseman in a single season in franchise history.
- The Stars outscored their opponents 93-59 when **Harley** was on the ice during even-strength play during the regular-season season, which topped the Stars and was tied for the sixth-best mark in the NHL.

POWER UP

- The Stars finished their series against Colorado going 7-for 23 on the power play for a 30.4 percent success rate, which was the sixth-best mark in the NHL during the First Round.
 - o The Stars scored at least one power-play goal in six of the seven games they played against Colorado.
- Dallas' seven power-play goals were scored by five different skaters: Roope Hintz (2), Wyatt Johnston (2), Jamie Benn,
 Tyler Seguin and Mikko Rantanen. During the First Round, Dallas, Los Angeles and St. Louis were the only teams to have five different skaters score a power-play goal.
- The Stars performance against the Avalanche was their best on the power play in a series since 2023 when the team when 9-for-24 for a 37.5 percent success rate against the Minnesota Wild.

FOR PETE'S SAKE

- Head Coach Pete DeBoer has a 92-74 all-time playoff record. His 92 wins are the eighth-most in NHL history and top all active coaches.
 - He is two postseason wins shy of tying Derryl Sutter and Patt Quinn for sixth.
- Those 92 wins have amounted to 18 series wins, which is tied for sixth in NHL history and is also tied with Tampa Bay's
 Jon Cooper for the most among active head coaches.
- No coach in NHL history has a better record in Game 7s than DeBoer, who is a perfect 9-0 in his career. His nine Game
 7 victories are the most of any head coach or skater in NHL history.
- The 2025 postseason marks the 10th consecutive year in which a DeBoer-coached team has reached the playoffs, which
 trails only Paul Maurice (12) and Cooper (11) for the longest active run among head coaches.

- **DeBoer** is looking to reach the Conference Finals for the seventh time in his career after previously doing so with New Jersey (2011-12), San Jose (2015-16, 2018-19), Vegas (2019-20) and Dallas (2022-23, 2023-24).
- Entering this postseason, DeBoer and Cooper are the only active coaches to reach the Conference Finals six separate times, with DeBoer being the only coach to achieve that feat with multiple teams.

PARTY LIKE IT'S 1999

- The Stars enter the 2025 Stanley Cup Playoffs looking to win their second Stanley Cup in franchise history after defeating the Buffalo Sabres in six games to bring the team's first championship to Dallas in 1999.
- At the time of the Stars' first Stanley Cup win, eight players on the team's current roster had yet to be born: Oskar Bāck, Mavrik Bourque, Lian Bichsel, Thomas Harley, Miro Heiskanen, Wyatt Johnston, Nils Lundkvist and Jason Robertson had not been born yet.
 - Heiskanen (July 18, 1999) and Robertson (July 22, 1999) were both born about a month after the Stars hoisted the Stanley Cup.

 - o The 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup began. The United States would ultimately go on to win the tournament, led by superstars Mia Hamm and Brandi Chastain.

CUP RUNNETH OVER

- Tyler Seguin and Mikko Rantanen are the two players on Dallas' roster who have previously won the Stanley Cup.
- Seguin was a part of Boston's 2011 championship run, winning the Stanley Cup in his rookie season. He recorded seven points (3-4—7) in 13 postseason games.
- Seguin has reached the Finals on two additional occasions: in 2013 with Boston (vs. Chicago) and in 2020 with Dallas (vs. Tampa Bay).
- Rantanen hoisted the Cup in 2022 with the Avalanche, finishing the postseason with 25 points (5-20—25) in 20 games, which was good for fifth in the NHL in scoring that year.

- The Stars finished the 2024-25 regular season with a 50-26-6 record, ranking in the top five in the NHL this year in wins (tied fourth), points (fifth), goals for (275, tied third), goals for per game (3.35, tied third) and penalty kill (82.0 percent, tied fourth)
- The 2024-25 campaign marks the second straight year that Dallas has finished the regular season with at least 50 wins and the third consecutive year that the team concluded the regular season with a points percentage above .640.
