TRAINING CAMP NOTES

Player Information Note: The players listed in this guide are those who were expected or invited to attend camp as of September 18.

Roster Cutdown: As part of the current collective bargaining agreement, NHL clubs cannot carry more than 23 players on their active roster. There are no mandatory cutdown dates, but teams must be at their limit by their first regular season game. Additional players attending camp, but not making the Sharks, will be assigned to the Sharks' top development affiliate, the San Jose Barracuda of the American Hockey League, other minor league teams or returned to their respective Junior or European clubs.

Media Availabilities: All training camp practice sessions, including day-of-game skates at Sharks Ice at San Jose, are open to the media. Please note that due to various factors including team breakdowns, schedule post-practice workouts, testing or meetings, not all players may be available to the media at the same given time. If you are looking to speak with specific players, it is best to check with the Sharks Media Relations staff to coordinate timing. Most availability sessions will take place at the conclusion of the day's respective on-ice sessions.

Public Viewing of Practice: Most practice sessions at Sharks Ice at San Jose may be open to the public. Please check the Sharks website at sjsharks.com for further details. Spectators must sit in designated seats at all times, with no exceptions. Please note that Sharks Ice at San Jose contains six ice rinks and all may be utilized on a daily basis. Members of the media should check with Sharks Media Relations staff for daily schedules.

Practices - Sharks Ice at San Jose or SAP Center at San Jose: All interview requests should be directed to the Sharks media relations staff. The recommended time for media to interview Sharks players is immediately following all practice sessions, unless a team meeting or workout is planned. Requests for interviews at a location other than the practice site (i.e. team hotel, road exhibition buildings, etc.) must be cleared through the Sharks media relations staff. Games: The Sharks will designate a postgame interview area for select, requested players and head coach David Quinn following the conclusion of each game. Please check with Sharks media relations staff on the location of interviews at SAP Center or while on the road.

MIKE GRIER GENERAL MANAGER

Mike Grier begins his second season as General Manager of the Sharks. In his role as general manager, Grier will have overall authority regarding all aspects of the Sharks hockey-related operations, including overseeing all player personnel decisions, leading the club's player evaluation process at all professional, minor, and junior levels, negotiating player contracts, directing the club's on-ice coaching and off-ice support staffs, and managing the efforts of the team's scouting department.

Grier, 48, has spent a lifetime in the game of hockey as a player, scout, coach, and executive. On July 5, 2022, Mike Grier had the distinguished honor of becoming the fifth general manager in the Sharks franchise history and the first Black general manager in the history of the National Hockey League.

In his first full season with the team in 2022-23, Grier reshaped the prospect pool and the altered the franchise's future significantly by acquiring several draft selections and players. In a blockbuster trade with New Jersey that included 13 different players and picks, Grier acquired Fabian Zetterlund, Shakir Mukhamadullin, and Nikita Okhotiuk, and utilized the 26th-overall selection from New Jersey to pick Quentin Musty in the first round, after selecting Will Smith with the team's own fourth-overall selection in the 2023 NHL Draft. Grier also strategically utilized San Jose's own draft capital and acquired defenseman Henry Thrun for a third-round selection in 2024, and signed Thrun to a two-year contract at the conclusion of his collegiate season.

In his first draft with the team just days after being named General Manager in 2022, Grier traded down from the club's 11th overall selection to acquire three selections which yielded Filip Bystedt, Cam Lund, and Mattias Havelid in the first and second rounds.

Prior to joining the San Jose organization in his current role, he was hand-picked by New York Rangers President and General Manager and former teammate Chris Drury to serve as a hockey operations advisor. In that role, Grier assisted Drury in hockey-related decisions and off-ice player development, and assisted prospects in the Rangers organization, including players with the Rangers' American Hockey League (AHL) affiliate, the Hartford Wolf Pack.

During the 2021-22 season, a rebuilding Rangers team experienced a 50-point improvement over their 2020-21 campaign, finishing with a 52-24-6 record and 110 points, a second-place finish in the Metropolitan Division (seventh overall in the NHL) and advanced to the Eastern Conference Final, before succumbing to the Tampa Bay Lightning in six games.

Grier also served on USA Hockey's selection committee for the 2022 World Championships, where he assisted in scouting, evaluating and selecting players for the U.S. team.

Grier served an assistant coach with the New Jersey Devils for two seasons (2018-20). As a member of Head Coach John Hynes' staff, Grier worked directly with the forwards and assisted with the Devils special teams. During his two seasons with the Devils, New Jersey's penalty killing ranked third in the NHL (83.4%) and their net penalty killing percentage was second overall (87.4%). He was also responsible for pre-scouting the Devils opponents.

From 2014-18, Grier served as a scout with the Chicago Blackhawks, including their 2015 Stanley Cup Championship season. Grier focused on scouting amateur and professional players, including the team's prospects and prospective player acquisitions both at the NHL level and via the NHL Draft.

From 2013-17, Grier served as an assistant coach at St. Sebastian's Prep School in Needham, Mass. He has also been active in working on skill development with collegiate and high school hockey players in the Boston area (2011-2017).

As a player, Grier spent 14 seasons in the National Hockey League as one of the game's top defensive forwards and leaders. He amassed 1,060 NHL games with the Edmonton Oilers, Washington Capitals, Buffalo Sabres, and the Sharks, collecting 383 points (162 goals, 221 assists) along with 510 penalty minutes. He served as an alternate captain and as a member of the leadership group with each of his NHL teams. As a physical, penalty-killing forward annually in the conversation for the Frank J. Selke award, Grier helped establish a top unit on multiple teams, including a League-best penalty kill efficiency on San Jose in 2007-08 (85.8%), fifth-best in 2008-09 and he helped Buffalo achieve the second-best efficiency in 2009-10 (86.6%).

During his NHL tenure between 1996-2011, Grier tied for 11th amongst all NHL players with 20 short-handed goals. Despite the NHL not tracking advanced statistics until the 2005-06 season, Grier ranks 10th amongst all NHL forwards in blocked shots (315) and 33rd in hits (705) over the course of his career.





He initially joined the Sharks organization as a free agent on July 3, 2006 and over the next three seasons, appeared in 221 NHL games, recording 78 points (35 goals, 43 assists). As an alternate captain, Grier helped the Sharks reach the Stanley Cup Conference Semifinals in 2006-07 and 2007-08. He was also a member of the Sharks 2008-09 Presidents' Trophy-winning club that won 53 games and earned 117 points.

His best season with the franchise was in 2006-07 where he registered 33 points (16 goals, 17 assists) in 81 games and led the club in short-handed goals (three). He then added four points (two goals, two assists) in the 2007 postseason in 11 games, which included a two-point game where he scored a goal and assisted on the game-winning goal by Patrick Rissmiller in the second overtime of Game One of the Western Conference Quarter Final against the Nashville Predators, en route to a 4-1 series victory for the Sharks.

Originally selected by the St. Louis Blues in the 1993 NHL Draft (ninth round, 219th overall), Grier's rights were later traded to the Edmonton Oilers, along with goaltender Curtis Joseph, for St. Louis' first-round selections in the 1996 and 1997 NHL Drafts. Grier earned a spot on the Oilers roster directly after his collegiate career and never played a game in the minor leagues. Upon his NHL debut on Oct. 4, 1996, Grier became the first African American born and trained in the U.S. to play in the NHL.

Grier's teams appeared in the Stanley Cup Playoffs in 11 of his 14 NHL seasons, including advancing to the 2006 Eastern Conference Final, where Buffalo narrowly lost a seven-game series to Carolina. In 101 Stanley Cup Playoff games, Grier tallied 28 points (14 goals, 14 assists) and 72 penalty minutes.

Grier has also had a long-standing relationship as a player and a coach with USA Hockey, beginning with being selected to the 1995 World Junior Championship team. He was a member of the 1996 U-21 National team and captured a bronze medal at the 2003 World Championships, where he was named an assistant captain. Off the ice, Grier served as coach at the USA Hockey 17s Festival and the CCM All-American Prospects Game in 2014, was an assistant coach for the U.S. women's national team for the Winter Series vs. Canada (2016) and was a coach and a member of the selection committee for the U.S. women's national team Olympic evaluation camps (2015-2017) ahead of the 2018 Winter Games.

Prior to his NHL career, Grier played for Boston University over three seasons, compiling 120 points (59 goals, 61 assists) in 114 games. He helped lead the team to an NCAA Championship in 1995 and captured a Hockey East Championship in two consecutive seasons (1993-95). Following the 1994-95 season, he was named to the All-Hockey East First Team, selected to the Division I AHCA All-American Team, won the Walter Brown Award as the best U.S.-born collegiate player in New England, and was a finalist for the Hobey Baker Award, awarded to the top collegiate hockey player. Grier was selected as the BU's captain for the 1995-96 season but withdrew from the university to begin his NHL career.

Grier comes from a family embedded in the fabric of leadership, scouting and development in professional sports. His father, Bobby, is a long-time executive in the National Football League, with stints in scouting, player personnel and as an advisor with the New England Patriots and Houston Texans. He currently serves as a consultant with the Miami Dolphins. His brother, Chris, has served as general manager of the Miami Dolphins since 2016. Chris worked as a scout for Miami dating back to 2000, and previously worked in scouting with the Patriots beginning in 1995.

In 2022, Grier was named to the EBONY Power 100 List in the Business Disruptors category, recognizing the groundbreaking achievements and societal contributions of industry leaders championing for change across industries.

Grier, a native of Detroit, MI, and his wife, Anne, have three children: sons Jayden and Tristan, and daughter Brooklyn.

JOE WILL

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER, SAN JOSE SHARKS | GENERAL MANAGER, SAN JOSE BARRACUDA

Joe Will begins his 13th season as assistant general manager for the San Jose Sharks and his 11th as general manager of the Sharks' American Hockey League affiliate (Worcester Sharks and San Jose Barracuda).

On Apr. 7, 2022, Will was named interim general manager for the Sharks, and handled the day-to-day duties as general manager in addition to his role as the assistant general manager until the hire of Mike Grier on July 5, 2022.

In San Jose, Will works closely with general manager Mike Grier on all daily departmental functions and his primary responsibilities include contract research and negotiations, scouting operations, fiscal planning, salary cap analysis and hockey administration. He's the lead coordinator and planner for the Sharks training camp, scouting meetings and scouting conference calls each season.

In addition, as general manager of the San Jose Barracuda, he oversees all of the hockey operations for the Sharks AHL affiliate, including player evaluation, player contracts, and player recall and reassignments.

In an effort to strengthen the organization's player development system and program, the Sharks relocated their American Hockey League affiliate to San Jose. Beginning in the 2015-16 season, the Barracuda became a part of the AHL's new Pacific Division and now play their home games at SAP Center. The move west eliminated the need to fly players across the United States in the event of recalls and reassignments, adding valuable rest and practice time. It also allowed for greater interaction and observation from San Jose's development coaches.

The relocation has paid immediate dividends. The Barracuda finished the 2016-17 season with the second-best winning percentage in the AHL (0.699%), winning the Bud Poile Trophy as the Western Conference regular season champions and the John Chick Trophy as Pacific Division champions, and earning an appearance in the Western Conference Final. In addition, the Barracuda held an AHL season-long winning streak of 14 games, paced the AHL in goals per game (3.44), ranked second on the power play (23.8%), eighth ranked penalty kill (83.3%) and had nine different players spend time on the Sharks roster, all while having the fifth youngest team in the league. The season marked one of the most successful campaigns in San Jose Sharks minor league affiliate history.

Moreover, individual feats highlighted the 2016-17 season; Troy Grosenick became just the fifth goaltender in AHL history to reach double-digit shutouts (10) earning him the Aldege "Baz" Bastien Award (goaltender of the year) and a First Team AHL All-Star nod; Danny O'Regan received the Dudley "Red" Garrett Memorial Award as the AHL's rookie of the year; and Tim Heed merited Second Team AHL All-Star honors.

All of these accomplishments occurred following a concerted effort by the front office to reinvigorate the organization's prospect pool, largely spearheaded, at the AHL level, by Joe Will. On top of the Barracuda players who were recognized with major awards, Roy Sommer was named as the AHL's Coach of the Year (Louis A.R. Pieri Award).

One of Will's most important duties involves the tracking, analyzing and projecting of the team's player payroll relative to the current and future National Hockey League salary cap to give the team the financial flexibility to ice a championship-caliber team each season.

Will, 58, also works with the organization's professional scouts and management team in player research for expansion, waivers, free agency and trades. His expert analysis of economic trends in the NHL has led to the Sharks acquisition and retention of several key veteran players over his time with the club.

Prior to his current roles, Will served as the team's director of hockey operations from 2004-2011. A member of the Sharks organization since the franchise's inception in July 1990, he has also previously served as assistant to the general manager and scouting coordinator.

The Bloomington, Minn. native also works with director of scouting Tim Burke in the development and implementation of draft prospect testing, draft table operations and computer scouting analysis. Will is an integral part of the team's draft-day strategy. Without his coordinating efforts, the team would not have drafted 2001 Calder Memorial Trophy winner Evgeni Nabokov in 1994. In addition, he developed the Sharks computer scouting program that pioneered the advent of scouting programs now used throughout the NHL.

Prior to joining San Jose, Will spent six years in the Minnesota North Stars organization in various capacities.

TOM HOLY

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Tom Holy enters his second year as Assistant General Manager, and will oversee the analytics department, staff budgeting and contracts. He will be the liaison between the Sharks Hockey Operations and Business departments, along with the NHL scheduling for the team.

He primarily has served in various roles in Media Relations and Public Relations with the Dallas Stars, Sharks and Cleveland Barons. He served as the Stars Vice President, Communications and Broadcasting from 2013-2022, and was the Sharks Media Relations Manager from 2005-2013. In his role as VP with the Stars, he led the organization's efforts in hockey communications, corporate communications and player relations, and served as the organization's spokesman for all news.

Holy also helped earn six separate Dick Dillman Awards, including four straight seasons with San Jose from 2007-10, presented annually by the Professional Hockey Writer's Association to honor the work of the NHL's top public relations team.

In addition, Holy Served as a Development Coach for Seiler FEC working with the 2020 and 2021 rookie classes of the Cleveland Browns and Indianapolis Colts centering around financial education and budgeting.



TIM BURKE

SENIOR ADVISOR/PRO SCOUT

Tim Burke enters his second season as senior advisor/pro scout and his 31st season overall with the Sharks, after four seasons as assistant general manager alongside Joe Will. Burke previously worked as the director of scouting with San Jose for 21 years.

Burke, 66, assists the Sharks efforts in the National Hockey League's annual draft while working closely with General Manager Mike Grier and his staff, and the development of the Sharks prospects.

Burke's hard work and keen decision making, coupled with the talents of his competent staff at evaluating players, has produced admired results. Burke's selection process has helped the Sharks create a solid foundation of talented players from which to build the franchise around – including Joe Pavelski (2003), Marc-Edouard Vlasic (2005), Justin Braun (2007), Logan Couture (2007), Dylan DeMelo (2011), Tomas Hertl and Chris Tierney (2012), and Timo Meier (2015).

Beginning with the 2003 NHL Draft, and through the 2017 draft, Sharks draft selections played the fifth-most games of any NHL team's draft picks (10,411) and posted the fifth-most goals (1,693) in that span, despite the organization having the lowest average draft position of any NHL team during that span (129.75).

A member of the Sharks scouting department since the 1992-93 campaign, Burke was promoted to director of scouting on June 4, 1996. Before his promotion, Burke served as director of professional scouting from 1992-96 and evaluated talent throughout all North American professional leagues and assisted with amateur scouting.

From 1987-92, he spent five seasons in the New Jersey Devils organization, serving in several capacities, including as a Devils assistant coach, head coach for the American Hockey League's Utica Devils and as a pro scout. Burke was also an assistant coach at Princeton University from 1984-86.

A former defenseman, Burke was selected by the Montreal Canadiens in the seventh round (124th overall) of the 1975 NHL Entry Draft and by the Chicago Cougars in the second round (25th overall) of the 1974 World Hockey Association Entry Draft. He was a four-year letterman in both hockey and baseball at the University of New Hampshire, where he was named to the NCAA's All-America hockey team after his senior campaign.

He played seven years of professional hockey following his outstanding collegiate career, including three seasons (1977-80) with the Nova Scotia Voyageurs, the Canadiens AHL affiliate, and one season with Jokerit Helsinki in the Finnish Elite League.

SCOTT FITZGERALD

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Entering his second season as Director of Player Personnel, Fitzgerald will focus on pro and amateur scouting, including potential top-two round selections at the NHL Draft and college free agents.

In his first draft with the team in 2023, the Sharks elected Will Smith, Quentin Musty, and Kasper Halttunen in the first two rounds. Haltunnen was later signed by the club to a three-year entry level contract on July 12, 2023.

He previously was with the Boston Bruins for 16 seasons, joining the franchise in 2006. He worked in various roles, including Chief College Scout, Director of Amateur Scouting, Scouting Coordinator and Scout. He also worked with the Columbus Blue Jackets as a scout from 1999-2006. His brother Tom is the current general manager for the New Jersey Devils.

TODD MARCHANT

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT, SENIOR ADVISOR

Todd Marchant begins his second season as the team's director of player development, senior advisor. Marchant will oversee the player development department.

Previously, he worked with the Anaheim Ducks organization for 11 seasons as Director of Player Personnel (2021-22), and Director of Player Development (2011-21), overseeing the Anaheim prospects and their development in professional hockey. As a player, he amassed 1,195 career NHL games with the New York Rangers, Edmonton Oilers, Columbus Blue Jackets, and Ducks, scoring 498 points (186 goals, 312 assists). He won his first Stanley Cup with the Ducks in 2007, appearing in 11 playoff games and collecting three assists. Originally selected by the Rangers in the 1993 NHL draft (seventh round, 164th overall), Marchant retired from the NHL on June 29, 2011.

RYAN STEWART

PRO PERSONNEL, SENIOR ADVISOR

Ryan Stewart, in his second season as pro personnel, senior advisor, will oversee the Sharks professional staff in North American and Europe.

Before joining the Sharks, Stewart worked in the Chicago Blackhawks organization in various roles, most recently as the Assistant General Manager, Pro Evaluation for two seasons. He earned the roles of Vice President, Pro Scouting (2014-20), Director, Pro Scouting (2012-14), and served as both a professional scout (2010-12) and amateur scout (2008-10). While with the Chicago organization, the team won the Stanley Cup three times (2010, 2013, and 2015).

Prior to his scouting assignments, Stewart oversaw power play systems as an assistant coach in the 2007-08 season and was tasked with video coach duties in 2006-07. Before joining the Blackhawks, he served as the ECHL's Greenville Grrrowl General Manager in 2005-06 and was the assistant coach and assistant general manager in 2004-05.

As a professional hockey player, Stewart primarily played with Greenville in the ECHL, appearing in 325 career games recording 157 points (69 goals, 88 assists) and helped Greenville capture the ECHL Championship in 2002, scoring six points in 17 games. In his final season in 2003-04, Stewart served as the team's captain. He also appeared in one AHL game with the Providence Bruins and had a stint with the British Ice Hockey Super League.

DOUG WEIGHT

HOCKEY OPERATIONS ADVISOR

Weight begins his second season as Hockey Operations Advisor for the Sharks. In this role, Weight will report directly to General Manager Mike Grier, collaborating with Grier on player personnel, player acquisitions, drafting and development.

Prior to joining the Sharks, Weight served in a variety of hockey operations roles with the New York Islanders. At the conclusion of his playing career in 2011, Weight was named senior advisor to the general manager and assistant coach. In 2014, he was promoted to assistant general manager while retaining his role behind the bench.

On Jan. 17, 2017, the Islanders promoted Weight to interim head coach, and he was officially named head coach on April 12, 2017 after he leading the team to a 24-12-4 record after taking over the coaching duties. He served as the team's head coach for the entire 2017-18 season, until Barry Trotz was named as his replacement.

In 122 games as a head coach with the Islanders, the team posted a 59-49-14 record.

Weight played in 1,238 NHL games with the New York Rangers, Edmonton Oilers (where he was a teammate of Grier's from 1996-2001), St. Louis Blues, Carolina Hurricanes, Anaheim Ducks, and New York Islanders. His 1,033 points (278 goals, 755 assists) ranks T-79th all-time and his assist total ranks 43rd all-time in NHL history. Amongst U.S.-born players, he ranks 5th in assists, 6th in power play points (438), 13th in games played, and T-28th in goals.

In 97 Stanley Cup Playoff games, Weight posted 72 points (23 goals, 49 assists) and was a member of the 2006 Stanley Cup-winning Carolina Hurricanes.

A four-time NHL All-Star, Weight was selected to the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame on July 25, 2013. He was also named the recipient of the 2011 King Clancy Memorial Trophy.

Internationally, Weight has represented the United States on multiple occasions. He was named to the 1998, 2002 and 2006 Winter Olympics men's hockey teams, capturing a silver medal in 2002. He was also selected to the 1996 and 2004 World Cup of Hockey teams, helping Team USA win the championship in 1996. A member of the 1991 World Junior Championship squad, he led the tournament in scoring with 14 points. He also represented the U.S. in the 1993, 1994 and 2005 World Championships.

CHRIS MOREHOUSE

DIRECTOR OF AMATEUR SCOUTING

Chris Morehouse will begin his second season in the Sharks organization as director of amateur scouting. In his role, Morehouse will oversee the Sharks amateur staff and run the draft.

In his first draft with the team at the 2023 NHL Draft, the team leveraged 12 selections that yielded nine 2023 draft prospects, including fourth-overall selection Will Smith, 26th overall Quentin Musty and 34th overall Kasper Halttunen.

Prior to joining the Sharks, he worked with the New York Rangers as Director of North American Scouting for three seasons. Morehouse also worked with the Columbus Blue Jackets for seven seasons, serving as the Assistant Director of Amateur Scouting for three years and joined the club initially as an amateur scout.

As a player, Morehouse played two seasons at St. Thomas University after two years in professional hockey with the Alaska Aces, Cincinnati Cyclones, Greenville Road Warriors (ECHL), and Tulsa Oilers (Central Hockey League). He also appeared with Saint Mary's University in 2008-09 and played junior hockey in the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League with the Moncton Wildcats, where he served as captain in his final season with the team.

STEPHANE LEBLANC

DIRECTOR OF CHL SCOUTING

Stephane begins his second season with the Sharks organization as director of CHL scouting. Leblanc spent the previous eight years as an amateur scout with the Columbus Blue Jackets. In Columbus, Leblanc was part of a scouting staff that selected 21 players who have gone on to reach the NHL since the 2015 draft, including current Sharks defenseman Markus Nutivaara (seventh round, 189th overall in 2015). Prior to his stint with the Blue Jackets, LeBlanc began his scouting career with the QMJHL Saint John Sea Dogs', drawing responsibility as a New Brunswick regional scout for six seasons.

Originally from Memramcook, New Brunswick, Stephane now resides in Dieppe, New Brunswick with his wife, Megan, and three children; Janelle, Jasmine and Felix



DAVID QUINN HEAD COACH

Quinn, 56, enters his second season as head coach for the Sharks. Under his first season as head coach for the Sharks in 2022-23, he helped guide Erik Karlsson to achieve his third Norris Trophy and the first 100-point season by a defenseman in over 30 years. It is the second such occurrence in which a defenseman under Quinn has captured the Norris Trophy.

After the conclusion of the 2022-23 season, he was named as Head Coach for Team USA's 2023 World Championship for the second consecutive tournament, and worked with Sharks assistant coaches Scott Gordon, Ryan Warsofsky, NHL Goaltending Coach Thomas Speer, and Video Coach Nick Gialdini. Quinn and his staff helped lead Team USA to a fourth-place finish in the tournament and an 8-0-2 overall record.

He also has served as head coach for Team USA at the 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing and 2022 World Championship. Quinn guided Team USA to a fourth-place finish at the 2022 World Championship and helped lead the youngest team in the Olympics to a perfect preliminary round record before suffering a shootout loss in the quarterfinals.


Quinn was named the head coach of the New York Rangers on May 23, 2018, and under his direction for three seasons, the team compiled a 97-87-25 record, along with one appearance in the qualification round in the 2019-20 campaign. In his three years, the Rangers held the league's eighth-best power-play percentage (22.1%), ranked seventh in team blocked shots (4,195) and takeaways (2,244), and was tied for tenth in wins when trailing first (52). In each campaign, the team continued to improve under his direction, developing one of the league's youngest rosters. The Rangers finished the 2018-19 campaign with an average age of 25.5 and followed the next season with eight players who were 21-or-younger. Despite only playing 70 games before the 2019-20 season was shortened, Quinn guided the Rangers to a 37-28-5 record (.564), which over an 82-game span is a 92-point pace. Adam Fox, who made his NHL debut under Quinn in 2019-20, was awarded the Norris Trophy in 2020-21, given to the defenseman who demonstrates throughout the season the greatest all-round ability in the position. Fox led league defensemen in assists and finished second in points.

Quinn served as head coach at Boston University from 2013-18 and went 105-69-21 under his direction. The program made the NCAA tournament in four consecutive seasons (2015-18), including three regional final appearances, won two Hockey East tournament titles and two Hockey East Regular Season titles. In the 2014-15 season, Quinn helped Boston to the National Championship game, becoming the fourth head coach in NCAA history to win each of his first three tournament games to reach the final. He was selected as the Hockey East and New England Coach of the Year, and was runner-up for the Spencer Penrose Award, given to the top Division I coach in the nation. Quinn was a part of the hockey program prior to his head coaching tenure, serving as the associate head coach from 2004-09 and helped Boston win the NCAA National Championship in 2009.

In his first professional stint as head coach in the American Hockey League, Quinn compiled a 115-94-7-20 record. Under his guidance in the 2010-11 season, Lake Erie finished second in the North Division and secured their first ever playoff berth after earning a franchise-best 44-28-3-5 record.

Quinn also served as an assistant coach for Northeastern University and the University of Nebraska-Omaha in the NCAA, Team USA, and with the Colorado Avalanche (2012-13). Colorado finished the shortened season third in takeaways and fourth in blocked shots among all NHL teams. As an assistant with Team USA, he helped the women's team to two World Championship Silver Medals in 1999 and 2000.

Initially selected by the Minnesota North Stars in the first round of the 1984 NHL Draft, Quinn played three collegiate seasons for the Boston Terriers from 1984 to 1987. He signed a contract with the New York Rangers in 1991 and appeared in 19 games in 1991-92 with the AHL's Binghamton Rangers. The next year, he joined the Cleveland Lumberjacks in the International Hockey League, recording 21 points (eight goals, 13 assists) in 60 games. The defenseman also represented Team USA at the 1986 IIHF World Junior Championship, winning a bronze medal.



SCOTT GORDON ASSISTANT COACH

Gordon enters his second season as assistant coach with the Sharks. His primary duties will be overseeing the teams forwards and power-play units.

Gordon was named as an assistant coach to the 2023 USA World Championship, where he helped guide Team USA under David Quinn to a fourth-place finish in the tournament.

Prior to joining San Jose, Gordon served as the head coach of the Lehigh Valley Phantoms (AHL) from 2015-16 through the 2021-22 season. Under his guidance, the Phantoms have posted a 239-174-35-25 record, including a 2017-18 Atlantic Division title when the team advanced to the 2018 AHL Eastern Conference Final, and three top-two finishes within their division. During his time with the Flyers organization, he was named interim head coach for Philadelphia on Dec. 17, 2018 and served in that capacity for the remainder of the 2018-19 season. During that time, Philadelphia went 25-22-4 in 51 games, and held the ninth-best penalty kill percentage in the NHL.

Gordon also worked as an assistant coach with the Toronto Maple Leafs for three seasons (2011-14), head coach of the New York Islanders from 2008-11, and spent eight seasons (2000-2008) as a head and assistant coach with the Providence Bruins (AHL). During that span, the Bruins posted a 332-222-40-46 (W-L-T-OTL) record, qualified for the playoffs six times, including two Eastern Conference Final appearances.

Gordon spent two seasons (1999-2000) as head coach of the Roanoke Express (ECHL) and started his professional coaching career in the International Hockey League as an assistant coach with the Atlanta Knights (1994-96) and Quebec Rafales (1996-97).

Internationally, he has worked with USA Hockey on several occasions. He served as an assistant coach on the men's 2010 Olympic hockey team, where he helped Team USA earn a silver medal, and on the 2016 World Cup of Hockey team. He also was head coach for the United States at the World Championships on three occasions (2010-12) and as an assistant coach in 2009.

BRIAN WISEMAN ASSISTANT COACH

Wiseman, 52, enters his second season as assistant coach. His primary responsibilities will be coaching the power play and working with the team's forwards.

He previously served as assistant coach for the Edmonton Oilers from 2019-22, focusing on the team's offensive strategies, working with the team's forwards with an additional focus on face-offs, and collaborating with the coaching staff on general game preparation and pre-scouting their opponents.

Prior to working in Edmonton, Wiseman spent eight seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Michigan, including an appearance in the 2018 Frozen Four. Wiseman also served as an assistant coach with the Houston Aeros of the American Hockey League in 2010-11, Princeton University in 2003-04, and served as the video coach in 2002-03 with the Dallas Stars.

As a professional player, Wiseman appeared in three games for the Toronto Maple Leafs in 1996-97, and primarily played in the International Hockey League with the Chicago Wolves and Houston Aeros, appearing in 375 games. He won the Turner Cup in the IHL in the 1998-99 season with Houston where he led the league in points and was named the IHL's Most Valuable Player in the regular season. He also played one season for the St. John's Maple Leafs (AHL), scoring 95 points (33 goals, 62 assists) in 71 games.

He spent his collegiate career with the University of Michigan over four years, named as captain for his senior season and collected 249 points (84 goals, 165 assists) in 166 NCAA games. He was named the NCAA Rookie of the Year in 1990-91, and was a Hobey Baker Finalist in 1993-94.

Wiseman was inducted into the Chatham Sports Hall of Fame in 2007.

Brian and his wife, Brandee, have two daughters; Chloe and Cameron.

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SHARKS HOCKEY OPERATIONS BIOS

RYAN WARSOFSKY ASSISTANT COACH

Warsofsky, 35, enters his second season with the Sharks as assistant coach. His primary responsibilities will oversee the team's defense and penalty kill.

Warsofsky was named as an assistant coach to Team USA's 2023 World Championship staff, helping guide the team under David Quinn to a fourth-place finish at the tournament.

He joined the Sharks after two seasons as head coach of the Chicago Wolves (AHL) where in 2021-22, Warsofsky led the Wolves to the AHL's best regular-season record with a 50-16-5-5 record (.724%) and captured the 2022 Calder Cup, earning a 14-4 record over four different series during the playoffs. The year prior in his first stint with Chicago, Warsofsky guided the team to the third-best record in the league (21-9-1-2), but the AHL did not hold a formal playoffs due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In his two seasons, the Wolves amassed a 71-25-6-7 record and the team's penalty kill ranked in the Top-10 twice (2021-22, fifth; 2020-21, ninth) and the power-play ranked fourth in 2020-21.

Prior to his time with Chicago, Warsofsky worked with the Charlotte Checkers (AHL) for two seasons. He started as an assistant coach in 2017-18 and helped the team capture the Calder Cup 2017-18, overseeing the top penalty killing unit in the League (86.6%). The following year in the abbreviated season, he was named as the League's youngest head coach (31) on July 10, 2019 and guided the team to a 34-22-5-0 and ranked third in both power-play and penalty kill percentage.

As head coach in the AHL with Chicago and Charlotte, Warsofsky has earned a 105-47-11-7 record (.671%).

Warsofsky also worked with the ECHL's South Carolina Stingrays for five seasons, including two seasons as head coach/director of hockey operations (2016-2018) after starting as an assistant coach. In his two seasons at the helm, South Carolina posted an 88-44-10-2 record and the team advanced to the Kelly Cup Final in 2017. Warsofsky has also worked as an assistant coach in the NCAA with Curry College for one season (2012-13).

Ryan resides in Massachusetts in the offseason with his wife Caroline, son Cal and daughter Lucy.

EVGENI NABOKOV

DIRECTOR, GOALTENDING

Evgeni Nabokov enters his second season as Director, Goaltending and ninth year in the Sharks Hockey Operations. He previously served as the goaltending coach for seven seasons (2015-2022). In his role with San Jose, Nabokov oversees the organization's efforts to assist goaltenders in the development of their skills and technique.

After an illustrious career, Nabokov retired as a member of the San Jose Sharks on Feb. 11, 2015. Nabokov, 43, holds nearly every major San Jose Sharks franchise goaltending record, including: games played (563), wins (293) and shutouts (50).

Nabokov finished his remarkable career ranked 18th on the NHL's all-time wins list (353), 17th in shutouts (59) and 25th in games played by a goaltender (697). He appeared in 86 career Stanley Cup Playoff games (23rd all-time), and ranks 26th all-time in postseason wins (42) and T-21st in postseason shutouts (7). He helped lead the Sharks to two of their three franchise Western Conference Final appearances (2004, 2010). In 697 career NHL games with San Jose, the New York Islanders and Tampa Bay Lightning, Nabokov posted a 353-227-29-71 record, with a 2.44 goals-against average, a .911 save percentage and 59 shutouts.

Originally drafted by San Jose in the ninth round (219th overall) of the 1994 NHL Draft - the 22nd goaltender taken that year - Nabokov leads all goalies selected in that draft in NHL career wins and shutouts, and ranks second in games played. He made his NHL debut on Jan. 1, 2000 at Nashville, and in his first NHL start on Jan. 19, 2000, he dueled future Hall-of-Famer Patrick Roy to a 0-0 tie in Colorado, making 39 saves.

In 2001, his first full NHL season, Nabokov was the recipient of the Calder Memorial Trophy as the League's Rookie of the Year, was named as the goaltender for the 2000-01 NHL All-Rookie Team and selected to play in the NHL All-Star Game.

Nabokov finished as the runner-up for the Vezina Trophy as the NHL's top goaltender during the 2007-08 season, was named to the 2007-08 NHL First All-Star Team and was selected to play in the NHL All-Star Game. His 46 wins that season were the fourth-most in a single-season in NHL history and his 77 appearances was the third-most in NHL history.

On March 10, 2002 in Vancouver, he became just the seventh goaltender (first of European descent) to score a goal. He was the first NHL goalie to score while his team was on a power play.

Internationally, the native of Ust-kamenogorsk, Kazakhstan, represented Russia on the international stage several times in his career. He served as Russia's starting goaltender in the 2006 (1.34 goals-against average) and 2010 Winter Olympics and also played for Russia in two World Championships (2008, 2011). In the 2008 World Championships, he led Russia to a gold medal, posting a 1.78 goals-against average while being voted to the Media All-Star Team, named Russia's top player and voted "Best Goalkeeper" in the tournament. He also was named to Russia's roster for the 2004 World Cup of Hockey.

Nabokov also played in his native Russia in 2004-05 with Metallurg and with SKA St. Petersburg of the KHL in 2010-11.

THOMAS SPEER

NHL GOALTENDING COACH

Speer, 36, enters his second season as NHL Goaltending Coach for the Sharks. He will work with Evgeni Nabokov and the Sharks goaltenders.

Speer was named to Team USA's 2023 World Championship coaching staff under David Quinn as goaltending coach, helping USA to a fourth-place finish at the tournament. The team's goaltenders combined to post a 1.57 goals-against average and a .926 save percentage along with three shutouts.

Speer previously served as the Stockton Heat's goaltending coach for three seasons. Under his watch in the prior two seasons, Dustin Wolf finished eighth in goals against average among AHL qualified goalies, and in 2020-21, Garret Sparks ranked ninth in the category. He has also worked with the Allen American in the ECHL over four years as goaltending coach and with the Wichita Falls Wildcats of the North American Hockey League (NAHL) as a goaltending coach and scout.

Internationally, he has served as the goaltending coach for Team USA, including the USA World Junior Championship U-18 team in 2017-18.

As a player, he played over four seasons in the NCAA Division III program with the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point and UMass-Boston. He also appeared in three ECHL games with the Idaho Steelheads and Las Vegas Wranglers.

NICK GIALDINI

VIDEO COACH

Gialdini, 33, is a San Jose, CA native entering his second season as Sharks Video Coach. Gialdini has been with the Sharks organization for 17 years, initially working for Sharks Ice at San Jose in a variety of capacities including coaching for the Jr. Sharks program and as the High School Hockey Coordinator. Most recently, he had been serving as the Barracuda's Video Coach and Hockey Operations Manager for six seasons.

Gialdini was named to Team USA's coaching staff for the 2023 World Championship, serving under Sharks Head Coach David Quinn. USA finished fourth in the tournament with an 8-2 record.

Gialdini graduated from San Jose State University in 2016 where he played for their club team and attending the 2014 ACHA National Championship. He resides full-time in San Jose over the summers with his wife, Melissa, and their young son Joshua.

CODY WARD

ASSISTANT VIDEO COACH

Ward enters his second season as Assistant Video Coach. Wards primary responsibilities are assisting Head Coach David Quinn and Video Coach Nick Gialdini in statistical analysis and operating the replay system for reviews and challenges during the game.

Previously, Ward served as the video coach for the Chicago Wolves in the American Hockey League, where he helped the team win the 2022 Calder Cup. He also worked for the Canisius College Men's Hockey Team from 2017-2021 as the video coordinator and student manager.

Ward has also spent time internationally as the video coordinator for Die Adler Mannheim in the DEL German league during the 2014-15 season where the team won the DEL championship.

Ward graduated from Canisius College in 2021, where he studied sports management. In the offseason, he resides in San Jose.

SHIN LARSSON

SUPERVISOR, EUROPEAN SCOUTING

Enters his 17th season as a Sharks European scout, with the title and responsibility as Supervisor of European Scouting...his scouting area is all of Europe searching for both amateur and pro players...previously worked as a European pro scout for the Atlanta Thrashers from 2006-08...As a player, represented Japan at several international tournaments including the 1998 Olympic Games, where he posted five points (two goals, three assists) in four games...scored the game-winning shootout goal for Japan's victory over Austria in Olympic play...played hockey professionally in Sweden, Japan, France and England... played for the Japanese national team from 1995-02...won five league championships in the Japan Ice Hockey League with Kokudo...led the JIHL in scoring in 1997-98...played one season with Verdun in the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League in 1993-94 and one season with Leksand in the Swedish Elite League in 1992-93...he and his wife, Linda, have two sons; Nils and Erik.

CHARLIE TOWNSEND

DIRECTOR OF HOCKEY PROJECTS AND ANALYTICS

Charlie Townsend enters his first season as Director of Hockey Projects and Analytics and 11th season with Sharks Sports & Entertainment. Prior to his current role, Charlie has worked in numerous capacities throughout the Sharks hockey operations department including roles within scouting, coaching and player development at both the NHL and AHL level.

His primary responsibility is to acquire, develop and integrate multiple information streams into the hockey operations decision making process. Within this model, the hockey projects and analytics department is able to chart, document and learn from the thought processes behind coaching, scouting, player development, player evaluation and player acquisition.

Townsend, born in Watertown, Connecticut, joined the Sharks after a brief professional playing career in both North America and Europe. He is a 2006 graduate of The Taft School and 2010 graduate of Middlebury College where he was an assistant captain for the 2010 NESCAC championship team and was a member of the NESCAC All-Sportsmanship Team.

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Charlie resides in Campbell with his wife Carly, daughter Kit and dog Bronco.



A.J. BERNSTEIN

ANALYST, HOCKEY PROJECTS AND ANALYTICS

Bernstein enters his second season with the Sharks, holding the title of Analyst, Hockey Projects and Analytics. He will be primarily tasked with acquiring, analyzing and refining the team's analytics data.

Previously, he worked with Middlebury College as an assistant coach and director of hockey operations until his graduation in 2021. He has also consulted with the Chicago Steel (USHL) and Metropolitan Riveters (NWHL), leading both teams' analytic efforts. Prior to joining the Sharks, he worked as a strategy consultant for Accenture Federal Services.

DYLAN FINAN

SCOUTING COORDINATOR

Finan enters his third season with the Sharks and first within the hockey operations staff, joining as Scouting Coordinator. Before joining the hockey staff, Finan served two seasons as a Sharks media relations coordinator. He spent four seasons with the Dubuque Fighting Saints of the USHL, serving as a scout from 2019-20 through 2022-23 and also working in research and analytics for the club from 2020-21 through 2022-23. Ahead of his time in San Jose, Finan graduated from Bowling Green State University. Finan currently resides in Cupertino.

PAT FUNK

AMATEUR SCOUT (MINNESOTA)

Responsible for scouting all of U.S. juniors, U.S. colleges and high schools...scouting experience with Sharks since inception in 1991-92...also scouted for the New York Rangers and Minnesota North Stars from 1982-91...served as a coach at the high school and college level in Minnesota for 21 years, where he also taught physical education and health in the St. Paul Public School system...received his bachelor's degree from University of St. Thomas, in addition to performing graduate work at University of St. Thomas and Minnesota State University-Mankato...resides in Minnesota with wife Candace...their son, Matt, coaches at the high school level; daughter, Liz, coaches youth level hockey while their son, John, is a scout for the Colorado Avalanche.

JON HULL

AMATEUR SCOUT (U.S.)

Enters his fifth season with the San Jose Sharks...served as the President of Hockey Operations/General Manager for the Lincoln Stars of the United States Hockey League from 2014-2019... selected as the 15-16 USHL General Manager of the Year... acted as Asst. General Manager/ Director of Player Personnel for the Muskegon Lumberjacks of the USHL for the 2013-2014 season... Resides in Illinois with his wife, Stefanie, their three children, Carter, Kendall, and Kamryn, and their dog, Kane.

THOMAS VANEK

AMATEUR SCOUT (MINNESOTA)

Vanek enters his first season as a scout for the San Jose Sharks. In a decorated 14-year playing career, the forward totaled 789 points (373 goals, 416 points) over 1,029 NHL games, splitting 14 seasons between the Buffalo Sabres, New York Islanders, Montreal Canadiens, Detroit Red Wings, Florida Panthers, Vancouver Canucks and Columbus Blue Jackets. A two-time 40-goal scorer with the Sabres, Vanek led the NHL in power play goals in 2008-09 and was named to the NHL's Second All-Star Team in 2006-07 in addition to playing in the 2009 NHL All-Star Game. He ranks fifth all-time in Sabres history with 254 goals, was a member of the AHL's All-Rookie Team in 2004-05 and won a NCAA national championship with Minnesota in 2003, earning a spot on the NCAA All-Tournament Team. Vanek, who has served as an assistant for Stillwater High (USHS) following his retirement after the 2018-19 season, resides in Stillwater, Minnesota with his wife, Ashley, and their three sons Blake (16), Luka (12) and Kade (12).

JAREN BURKE

AMATEUR SCOUT (ONTARIO)

Burke enters his first season with the Sharks after spending one year with the Toronto Maple Leafs as a management development associate. In his playing career, Burke appeared in two seasons for Queen's University, playing in 39 games and tallying 15 points (five goals, 10 assists). Burke also spent two seasons with Rensselaer Polytchnical Institude (RPI), appearing in 29 games. Burke resides in Belleville, Ontario with his fiance, Kira Bombay.

RYAN RUSSELL

AMATEUR SCOUT (NORTH AMERICA)

Begins his eighth season as an amateur scout for the Sharks... Russell carved out a nine-year professional hockey career, playing in the NHL, AHL, ECHL, SHL (Sweden's top league) and EIHL (England's professional league)...he played 41 games in the NHL for the Columbus Blue Jackets during the 2011-12 season, scoring two goals and two penalty minutes...he finished his AHL career with 131 points (70 g, 61a) in 336 games...born in Caroline, Alberta, Canada, he now resides in Penhold, Alberta and is the twin brother NHL defenseman, Kris Russell.

NEIL McKENNEY

AMATEUR SCOUT (OHL)

Enters his second season with the Sharks... primarily scorings Czechia, Slovakia, Germany, and Switzerland areas...has served four seasons in the role of general manager for Philosophers Nitra of the European University Hockey League...As a player, Uhnak skated in 12 seasons at various levels of professional Slovakian hockey and spent three seasons in the Federal Hockey League in North America...Played at the U-18 and U-20 World Junior Championships and captained his team at two World University Games... Uhnak holds a Doctorate in Sport Science and a Master of Business.

NIKLAS SUNDSTROM

EUROPE SCOUT (SWEDEN)

Played 140 NHL games from 2000 to 2003, registering 24 goals and 31 assists, with the Atlanta Thrashers, Columbus Blue Jackets, and Philadelphia Flyers... From 1995-2018, played with several European leagues... The 1991 Selke Trophy winner enters his 16th season as a professional scout with San Jose...served as professional scout for the Tampa Bay Lightning from 2006-08...was the head coach of the American Hockey League's Springfield Falcons in 2004-06...spent several years in the hockey department of the Chicago Blackhawks, including being head coach (1998-99), a scout (1997-98) and an assistant coach (1995-96)...played 12 National Hockey League seasons and 772 games, primarily with Chicago, but began his career with the Minnesota North Stars in 1983-84...scored at least 20 goals six times, helped Chicago reach the 1992 Stanley Cup Final and served as the team's captain from 1989-95...posted a career-high 78 points (33 goals, 45 assists) in 80 games in 1988-89...played in 90 Stanley Cup Playoff games, posting 44 points (17 goals, 27 assists)...an inspirational leader on-and-off the ice and was an exemplary worker on both specialty teams...Regina, Saskatchewan native originally selected by Vancouver in the fifth round (89th overall) of the 1979 NHL Entry Draft.

JIMMY BONNEAU

PRO SCOUT

Enters his fourth season overall as pro scout for the Sharks and his eighth year in the organization... Previously served as an assistant coach and co-coach for the Barracuda for four seasons...The 38-year-old initially joined the Sharks as a scout for two seasons, covering the National Hockey League and American Hockey League Eastern Conferences before joining the Barracuda.

Bonneau, along with Chiasson, guided the Barracuda through the final 33 games of the season in 2019-20, going 12-16-5, including a season-long, eight-game point streak (6-0-2) before the year was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Bonneau played 11 seasons with various clubs in the AHL and ECHL. For four seasons, he played with the Worcester Sharks, serving as an alternate captain for the duration. Bonneau scored five goals, added nine assists and tallied 435 penalty minutes in 155 games. He finished his AHL career with 30 points (11g, 19a) and 988 penalty minutes in 350 career games.

Enters his sixth season with the San Jose Sharks...served as an AHL captain for over six years, most recently with the Bakersfield Condors for three straight seasons from 2015-2018...played for the Edmonton Oilers and Toronto Maple Leafs, compiling five points in 30 games...the 35-year-old veteran appeared in 644 AHL contests for various teams, registering 376 points (197 goals, 179 assists)...helped lead the Toronto Marlies to the 2012 Calder Cup Finals, earning five points in 17 contests...was named to the AHL All-Star team twice and earned AHL All-Star MVP in 2013...Resides in Arizona with his wife, Alexa, two children, Owen and Madeline, and their dog, Allie.

NED COLLETTI

PRO SCOUT

Long-time sports executive and former Los Angeles Dodgers General Manager Ned Colletti is entering his fifth season as a professional scout with the Sharks with his primary focus scouting at the National Hockey League and the American Hockey League level...A native of Chicago, Colletti worked in Major League Baseball for 40 years and became one of the winningest executives during the last 20+ years...He led the Dodgers as General Manager for nine seasons, leading the team to five post-season appearances including three appearances in the League Championship Series...The five post-season appearances during his tenure equaled the best nine-year period in the history of the franchise...Teams he built or helped build went to 4 World Series. Players drafted or signed during his tenure won 3 Cy Young Awards (plus 3 runners-up), 2 league MVP Awards, two NLCS MVPs and one World Series MVP award. Prior to working in Los Angeles, he began his career with the Chicago Cubs, where he worked for 13 seasons. He left Chicago in 1994 and spent 11 years with the San Francisco Giants, where he helped change and build a winning culture, serving primarily as their assistant general manager. A four-time Emmy Award winner for his work on Dodgers SportsNetLA, Colletti was presented with an Honorary Doctorate Degree from Pepperdine University in April, 2023.

MIKE RICCI

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH

One of the most beloved players to ever don a Sharks sweater, Mike Ricci enters his fourth season as NHL Development Coach and 16th overall in in the organization. Previously Ricci served as an Assistant Coach for the final 37 games in 2019-20 under Bob Boughner and 12 seasons as Scout and Development Coach working closely with the forwards on the Sharks and the Barracuda rosters, following one season as an advisor to San Jose's hockey operations department.

In this role, Ricci, 51, has areas of focus including face-off techniques, individual skill development and team systems integration.

Ricci finished his stellar, 16-year National Hockey League career in 2007 after notching 605 points (243 goals, 362 assists) and 979 penalty minutes in 1,099 games with Philadelphia, Quebec/Colorado, San Jose and Phoenix. He also added 66 points (23 goals, 43 assists) in 110 Stanley Cup Playoff games. Ricci won a Stanley Cup with Colorado in 1996.

His 263 points (101 goals, 162 assists) with San Jose ranks 14th on the Sharks all-time list and his 529 games place him 10th all-time. In 59 Stanley Cup Playoff games with San Jose, Ricci ranks 10th on the franchise's all-time list with 33 points (14 goals, 19 assists).

Ricci was originally selected by the Philadelphia Flyers in the first round (fourth overall) of the 1990 NHL Entry Draft. In June 1992, he was part of the blockbuster trade between Philadelphia and the Quebec Nordiques that saw the Flyers trade Ricci, Ron Hextall, Peter Forsberg, Steve Duchesne, Kerry Huffman, Chris Simon, first round selections in the 1993 and 1994 NHL Entry Drafts and \$15 million to the Nordiques in exchange for Eric Lindros.

Ricci was acquired by the Sharks on Nov. 21, 1997, along with a second-round selection in the 1998 NHL Entry Draft, in exchange for Shean Donovan and a first round selection in the 1998 NHL Entry Draft.

TOMMY WINGELS

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH

Wingels begins his second season as a player development coach with San Jose. As a player, he appeared in 448 NHL games during his playing career from 2010-11 through the 2017-18 season with San Jose, Ottawa Senators, Chicago Blackhawks and Boston Bruins. A sixth-round selection by the Sharks (177th overall) in the 2008 NHL Draft, Wingels appeared in 337 games with San Jose and totaled 122 points (51 goals, 71 assists), finishing seventh among Sharks skaters in goals scored, eighth in games played and ninth in scoring total during his seven-season run with the club. The Sharks qualified for postseason play in five of his six seasons before being traded to the Ottawa Senators in 2016-17, including a Western Conference championship and Stanley Cup Final berth in 2016. He also played in 98 AHL contests with the Worcester Sharks and spent three seasons at Miami Ohio in NCAA play. Internationally, Wingels represented the United States at the 2014 IIHF World Championship, where he appeared in seven games.

LUCA SBISA

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH

Sbisa enters his second season with the Sharks, joining the organization ahead of the 2022-23 season, following a year in the same role within the Anaheim Ducks organization. In his 13-season playing career, Sbisa skated in 549 NHL games, totaling 113 points (20 goals, 93 assists) and 385 penalty minutes. A first-round pick (19th overall) of the Philadelphia Flyers in the 2008 NHL Draft, Sbisa split his tenure between the Flyers, Ducks, Vancouver Canucks, Vegas Golden Knights, New York Islanders, Winnipeg Jets and Nashville Predators. He was part of six playoff teams in his career, including a trip to the Stanley Cup Final in 2018. Internationally, Sbisa represented Switzerland in numerous tournaments, including the 2008 and 2009 World Junior Championships, 2010 Olympics and the 2011 and 2012 IIHF World Championships.

PATRICK MARLEAU

DEVELOPMENT COACH & HOCKEY OPERATIONS ADVISOR

Marleau enters his first season with the Sharks Hockey Operations department. Based in San Jose, Marleau will collaborate with the Sharks development staff to work with Sharks and San Jose Barracuda prospects with on-ice skill development. In addition, he will serve as an advisor to Grier and the Sharks hockey operations staff.

As a player, Marleau achieved a remarkable 23-season NHL career, culminating on April 19, 2021 when he became the NHL's all-time regular season games played leader, eclipsing hockey icon Gordie Howe's longstanding record of 1,767 games. He finished his career with 1,779 regular season games and sits amongst the game's top offensive players with 566 goals (23rd all-time), 631 assists (83rd), 1,197 points (52nd), 172 power-play goals (34th) and 109 gamewinning goals (tied-seventh). His 195 Stanley Cup Playoff games are the 24th most in NHL history, and his appearance in the playoffs in 20 different seasons is tied for the third most. In the postseason, Marleau has recorded 127 points (72 goals, 55 assists) and ranks tied for 15th all-time in playoff goals and tied for 53rd in playoff points.

He ranks first in nearly in nearly every offensive category in Sharks franchise history, including games played (1,607), goals (522), points (1,111), power-play goals (163), shorthanded goals (17), game-winning goals (101), multi-goal games (67) and shots (3,953). He also ranks second in assists (589), eighth in penalty minutes (481), and eighth in points-per-game (0.69 - min. 200 games).

Internationally, Marleau captured gold medals with Team Canada in the 2010 and 2014 Winter Olympics, 2004 World Cup and 2003 World Championships.

Originally selected by the Sharks with the second overall selection in the 1997 NHL Draft, Marleau announced his retirement as a player on May 10, 2022, and on Feb. 25, 2023, became the first person in franchise history to have his number permanently retired. Marleau is set to be inducted into the San Jose Sports Hall of Fame in 2023.

RYAN MILLER

GOALIE SCOUT & GOALTENDING DEVELOPMENT

Miller enters his first season with the Sharks, serving as a draft-eligible goaltender scout and assisting Director, Goaltending Evgeni Nabokov in the organization's development of goaltending prospects and players. In Miller's distinguished, 18-season playing career, the netminder logged a 391-289-88 record with a .914 save percentage and 2.64 goals against average over 796 games, split between the Buffalo Sabres, St. Louis Blues, Vancouver Canucks and Anaheim Ducks. He remains the all-time wins leader among U.S.-born players and is second among the group in both shutouts (44) and games played. Originally drafted in the fifth round by the Buffalo Sabres in the 1999 NHL Draft, Miller remains the franchise's all-time leader in games played and wins and is second in shutouts. A 2022 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame inductee, Miller represented Team USA in both the 2010 and 2014 Olympics, earning MVP honors and a Silver Medal in 2010. He also represented the United States in the 2001, 2002 and 2003 World Championships.

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SHARKS HOCKEY OPERATIONS BIOS

RAY TUFTS, ATC

HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Ray Tufts enters his 27th season with the San Jose Sharks as head athletic trainer, who provides Sharks players with both long-term medical care for serious injuries needing rehabilitation as well as maintaining the Sharks day-to-day medical needs both on the road and at home. In addition, he serves as the liaison between the hockey department and the organization's team of highly-respected medical specialists. Before joining the Sharks, Tufts, 56, was an athletic trainer for ten years with the NFL's San Francisco 49ers. During his tenure with the 49ers, he was a part of three Super Bowl Championships in 1988, 1989 and 1994, serving as assistant trainer from 1991-96 and as a training staff assistant from 1987-90.

With San Francisco, Tufts was heavily involved with both the day-to-day preventive care for the team and post-injury rehabilitation. He was instrumental in the quick recoveries of several 49ers players from very severe injuries, including tight end Brent Jones, offensive tackle Harris Barton and the extensive rehabilitation of Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback Joe Montana between 1988-91.

A native of the San Jose area, Tufts graduated from Cal State-Sacramento in 1987 as a physical education major with an emphasis in athletic training. His formative high school training was under the direction of long time mentor Jack Rouse, currently of Chilliwack, British Columbia, Canada. He received his National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certification in 1987 and is an active member of the NATA District VIII Association, California Athletic Trainers Association (CATA) and is a past president of the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers' Society (PHATS).

Tufts worked his 2,000th National Hockey League game on December 4, 2022 at Buffalo and served as head athletic trainer for the U.S. Olympic Team that won the silver medal at the 2010 Winter Games in Vancouver. He also headed the training staff for the 1997 and 2019 National Hockey All-Star Games, both of which were hosted by San Jose.

Tufts and his wife Michelle have a son, Henry, and reside in Los Gatos, Calif.

WILL LEONARD, ATC

ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER

Will Leonard enters his second season with the San Jose Sharks, as the Assistant Athletic Trainer. Prior to joining the Sharks, he served as the Head Athletic Trainer for the San Jose Barracuda (2018-2021). This is Leonard's second stint with the Sharks organization, after serving as an intern athletic trainer during the 2009-10 season.

Prior to being hired full time by San Jose, Leonard spent four years working with San Jose State's Men's Ice Hockey team. He also worked with Bay Area high schools by providing athletic training coverage and coordinating rehabilitation programs.

Leonard began his career in athletic training, as a student athletic trainer at San Diego State University. He earned his Bachelor's degree in Kinesiology, with an emphasis in Athletic Training, in 2010. He then went on to earn his Master's degree from California University of Pennsylvania in Exercise Science.

Leonard is a member of the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers Society (PHATS) and BOC Certified Athletic Trainer. He also holds certifications as a Performance Exercise Specialist (PES) and Corrective Exercise Specialist (CES)

Leonard and family currently reside in San Jose, CA.

STEPHEN DILUSTRO

DIRECTOR, STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Stephen DiLustro begins his second season as Director, Strength & Conditioning for the Sharks, previously serving five years as the Sharks assistant strength and conditioning coach for the organization. He oversees the team's strength and conditioning programs -- including the physical testing and evaluation at training camp, creation of individualized postseason workout programs and assistance in the rehabilitation efforts for all injured players.

Before joining the Sharks, DiLustro served as the director of strength and conditioning at Saint Mary's College of California, overseeing all aspects of athletic development for the entire athletic department.

Prior to Saint Mary's College, DiLustro was an assistant sports performance coach at Stanford University. DiLustro oversaw all aspects of performance training for the baseball, men's water polo, and women's crew teams. He also worked with the men's crew, women's water polo and softball programs. While at Stanford, he worked with a handful of Olympians who participated in both the 2012 and 2016 Summer Games.

From 2007-09, DiLustro was an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Brown University. DiLustro designed and supervised in-season, off-season, and summer strength and conditioning programs for the baseball, men's and women's basketball, gymnastics, women's ice hockey, women's lacrosse, women's soccer, men's tennis, volleyball, and men's water polo teams. He also assisted with the rest of the 37 varsity athletic teams at Brown.

Stephen earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Exercise Physiology from the University of Massachusetts Lowell in 2000. He went on to earn a Master's Degree in Education from the University of Arizona in December of 2003. While studying at Arizona from 2002-2003, DiLustro worked as a graduate assistant strength coach, staying on until June 2006 as an assistant strength and conditioning coach after receiving his degree.

DiLustro holds a variety of certifications, including by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS), Postural Restoration Trained by the Postural Restoration Institute, Corrective Exercise Specialist by National Academy of Sports Medicine, and Level One Nutrition coach by Precision Nutrition.

DiLustro, his wife, Krissy, and their two children, Luca and Luci, reside in Campbell.

JACK ANDERSON

ASSISTANT STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH

Anderson enters his first season with the Sharks as Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach after working at P3 Applied Sports Science as a performance coach for the past three years, where he worked with a variety of professional athletes. He has also spent time with the Washington Capitals as a seasonal strength and conditioning coach, was the Director of Strength and Conditioning for the University of Mary Washington and spent a season interning in the NFL with the Buffalo Bills.

ARNULFO AGUIRRE, ART, CMT

MASSAGE THERAPIST

Arnulfo Aguirre enters his 17th season as the Sharks full-time massage therapist, surpassing 1,000 games worked in teal. He had worked with Head Trainer Ray Tufts' staff on a part-time basis since the 2000-01 season.

In his role, Aguirre works with the team's players to facilitate and improve injuries and increase their range of motion.

Previously, Aguirre worked with the San Jose Earthquakes, providing sports massage therapy, from 2000 to 2002, including during their 2001 Major League Soccer Championship season.

In addition, he served in a similar position with the University of California-Berkeley men's swim team in 1999.

Aguirre received his certification from the National Holistic Institute in Emeryville, Calif., where he also assisted in managing the massage clinic.

MIKE ALDRICH

EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Mike Aldrich enters his 28th season as Head Equipment Manager for the San Jose Sharks. Aldrich previously served in the same capacity for the International Hockey League's Kansas City Blades for the three seasons (1993-95) when the Blades were the Sharks top development affiliate. Before joining Kansas City, he worked at Michigan Tech University as the school's equipment manager and athletic purchasing agent from 1989-93.

In January 2023, Aldrich worked his 2,000th NHL game, all as Equipment Manager of the Sharks.

Aldrich served as equipment manager for the U.S. Olympic Team that won the silver medal at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver. He also worked for Team USA at the 2003 and 2005 World Championships, and the 2004 World Cup of Hockey.

Aldrich, was the Equipment Manager for the 1997 and 2019 National Hockey League All-Star Games, which were both hosted by San Jose. During the 1995-96 season, he was selected as the Western Conference's equipment manager for the IHL All-Star Game.

Besides overseeing the entire operation of the equipment staff, Aldrich handles the intricate requests of all Sharks players with regards to equipment, skate sharpening needs as well as all the purchasing, inventory control and distribution for all equipment throughout the season.

MARK DAVIES, MD

HEAD TEAM PHYSICIAN
