



Born July 2, 1979 in London, Ontario, Joe Thornton's path to the NHL's elite was one of determination and serendipity. One of three brothers born to parents Wayne and Mary, 'Jumbo Joe' grew up having to compete against his big siblings, John and Alex. An injury to a teammate on a youth team in St. Thomas, Ontario led to Joe's position change from defensemen to center as well as a change in sweater number from two to his famed number 19.

> Thornton, who learned to play hockey in the street and family outdoor rink with his siblings, opted to compete for the Sault Ste. Marie Greyhounds after considering Michigan State. In a decorated two-year run with Soo, Thornton was named CHL and OHL Rookie of the Year and earned CHL All-Rookie Team and OHL First All-Rookie Team after posting 76 points with 30 goals in 66 games in his first OHL season. His encore proved even more potent with Thornton finishing second in the OHL with 122 points (41 goals, 81 assists) in 59 games, earning a place on the OHL and CHL Second All-Star teams and being selected for the CHL Top Draft Prospect Award. In international play, Thornton helped Canada win a Gold Medal at the 1997 World Junior Championship, tallying four points in seven games at the tournament.

Selected first overall by Boston in the 1997 NHL Draft, one spot ahead of future teammate Patrick Marleau, Thornton spent his first seven NHL seasons with the Bruins, evolving into one of the game's top stars. In 2002, he was named team captain and garnered a NHL Second All-Star Team nod in 2002-03 in recognition of his first 100-point campaign (36 goals, 65 assists).

On Nov. 30, 2005, the Sharks franchise was forever altered when they acquired Thornton in a blockbuster trade. His tenure in teal saw Thornton become one of the greatest all-time playmakers in franchise and league history.

Thornton owns Sharks franchise records for assists (804), points-pergame (0.96), plus/minus (+161) and power play points (402). He ranks second in points (1,055), third in games played (1,104) and fourth in goals (251) and penalty minutes (631). His 2006-07 effort of 114 points (22 goals, 92 assists) in 82 games remains the Sharks high mark for points and assists in a season. He was named Sharks Player of the Year three times: 2005-06, 2006-07 and 2015-16.

He ranks second in franchise history in playoff scoring with 115 points and leads the Sharks' all-time ranks in postseason assists with 90. His 144 Stanley Cup Playoff games played are second-most for the Sharks.

During his 15-year tenure in San Jose, Thornton won the Hart Trophy for league MVP and Art Ross Trophy as NHL scoring leader in 2005-06, was selected to postseason NHL All-Star teams three times, with one First Team nod (2005-06) and two Second Team selections (2007-08, 2015-16) and participated in six NHL All-Star Games.

Internationally, Thornton represented his native Canada numerous times, winning Gold medals at the 2010 Olympics in Vancouver and the 2004 and 2016 World Cup of Hockey.

In NHL history, Thornton ranks sixth in games played (1,714), seventh in assists (1,109) and 14th in scoring (1,539 points).

After playing his final two seasons as a member of the Toronto Maple Leafs (2020-21) and Florida Panthers (2021-22), Thornton announced his retirement on Oct. 28, 2023.

HASSO PLATTNER Owner

Asso Plattner serves as the owner of Sharks Sports & Entertainment (SSE). A charter member of the local ownership group that purchased the San Jose Sharks from original owner George Gund III in 2002, Plattner became the organization's majority owner in 2010 and is currently the sole owner of the franchise.

A lifelong hockey fan, Plattner intently followed the game at the international level while growing

up in his native Germany. An avid spectator of hockey's World Championships each year, he marveled at the exploits of the Soviet Union's powerhouse hockey teams in the late 1970's and early 1980's.

On a trip to the Bay Area as co-founder of SAP SE, the world's largest business software company, he distinctly recalls the moment his past and future collided while watching the Sharks play in 1993.

"The announcer says (Sergei) Makarov...(Igor) Larionov...(Johan) Garpenlov," Plattner recalled. "Not possible - I see two of the top players I watched for more than 10 years. And here they are."

And so began Plattner's affinity for the San Jose Sharks and hockey in the Bay Area.

His passion for the game of hockey and desire to win have been evident during his tenure as the Sharks majority owner. Under his stewardship, the team earned its first trip to the Stanley Cup Final (2016), made four appearances in the Western Conference Final (2010, 2011, 2016, 2019), and posted four 100+ point seasons.

Plattner affords General Manager Mike Grier the financial autonomy to spend to the NHL's upper limit of the salary cap and ensure the team has the resources it requires to scout, draft, and develop younger players while maintaining the financial stability to ensure the team can build a foundation to returning as a perennial playoff contender.

In addition, Plattner has provided resources for the organization's player development system to take major steps forward in several areas. Over the last several seasons since naming Grier as General Manager, the hockey staff has been significantly built out in several key areas, including analytics, scouting, development, and coaching, providing players the opportunity to learn from alumni who played the game at a high level to hone their craft and development.

Previously in 2014, he committed the financial backing to re-locate the team's American Hockey League (AHL) development affiliate to California in order to enhance the organization's ability to oversee and develop prospects. Along with that relocation came a largescale, facility expansion at Sharks Ice at San Jose to house the AHL's San Jose Barracuda where the franchise opened the 2022-23 season at Tech CU, along with a major cosmetic modernization and renovation to the Sharks existing practice facilities. The expansion created two additional public ice sheets, making it the largest ice facility under one roof in North America. Off the ice, Plattner has paid for many major upgrades to SAP Center, ensuring the venue remains a world-class facility despite being one of the oldest in U.S. sports.

Some of the large-scale projects include the installation of a permanent dehumidification system to ensure SAP Center is capable of maintaining the best ice conditions possible in the Bay Area's temperate climate, a brand-new center hung scoreboard which improves the venue's game presentation production prior to and during Sharks games, and a premium seating experience known as the Penthouse Lounge, which provides an exclusive, elevated viewing experience for all SAP Center events. These, and many other SAP Center improvements, were made without public subsidy.

Plattner's passions in life are sports, business and science. After cofounding SAP in 1972, he served as CEO until 2003. Until he stepped down in May 2024, he served as Chairman of the Supervisory Board and as Chief Software Advisor, where he concentrated on defining the medium and long-term technology strategy of SAP. Plattner also was the head of the Technology Committee of the SAP Supervisory Board for over two decades.

Plattner has received a number of honors recognizing not only his accomplishments in the business world but his significant track record in giving back to the community. In 2016, he was awarded the Prize for Understanding and Tolerance presented by the Jewish Museum Berlin, awarded to "individuals to honor their exceptional contribution to understanding and tolerance, the promotion of human dignity, the integration of minorities and the coexistence of different religions and cultures." In 2015, he was awarded the GABA Lifetime Achievement Award and in 2014 received the Leonardo European Corporate Learning Award in the Thought Leadership category.

In 2002, the University of Potsdam appointed him an Honorary Doctor, and in 2004, an Honorary Professor. In 1998, he was inducted into the German Hall of Fame, which honors those who promote economic and social development in Germany. In 1997, he received the Information Technology Leadership Award for Global Integration as part of the Computerworld Smithsonian Awards Program.

Plattner received his master's degree in communications engineering from the University of Karlsruhe. In 1990, the University of Saarbruecken awarded him an honorary doctorate and in 1994 he was granted an honorary full professorship.

Well known for his philanthropic efforts, Plattner is a leading private patron of education and research in science and technology. Following his retirement from day-to-day involvement in SAP, Plattner has devoted his time to the promotion of science, innovation and entrepreneurship, as well as to social and cultural projects.

In 2016, Plattner joined forces with art dealer Guy Wildenstein to form the Wildenstein Plattner Institute, a foundation dedicated to advancing art historical scholarship by fostering the accessibility, cataloguing, and digitization of primary sources. Plattner also helped in the establishment of the Museum Barberini, devoted to his holdings of modern and Impressionist art, as well as artists active in the former German Democratic Republic (GDR). In 2022, he opened Das Minsk, another private museum in Potsdam, which focuses on East German artists who were active after the fall of the Berlin wall. Under the umbrella of the Hasso Plattner Foundation, he founded the Hasso Plattner Institute for Software Systems Engineering (HPI) in 1998 at the University of Potsdam in Germany, and expanded the HPI with a School of Design Thinking in 2007. He not only fully finances the HPI, but is also actively involved as a director, professor and lecturer in Enterprise Platforms and Integration Concepts.


In 2005, Plattner established the Hasso Plattner Institute of Design at Stanford University, informally called the Stanford d.School, which champions methods from the field of design to help people in every function across every industry become more innovative. The Stanford School has helped champion the world-wide adoption of Design Thinking, a formal methodology for tackling complex problems that goes beyond traditional brainstorming by re-framing the problem in human-centric ways.

In addition, Plattner has long been active in the fight against AIDS in South Africa.

Along with being a life-long hockey enthusiast, Plattner is an avid competitive sailor who has participated in numerous 505 World Championships, a race for high-performance two-person sailboats, as well as many offshore races. His top sports hero is Jesse Owens, the track and field star who captured four gold medals at the 1936 Berlin Olympics, and his top personal hero as Nelson Mandela for his ability to guide South Africa out of apartheid.

JONATHAN BECHER President, Sharks Sports & Entertainment

Jonathan Becher is president of Sharks Sports & Entertainment, the parent organization for the NHL's San Jose Sharks, the AHL's San Jose Barracuda, three Sharks Ice recreational facilities, and the non-profit Sharks Foundation. A long-time Sharks fan and season ticket holder, Becher is responsible for the organization's overall strategy with a particular focus on the end-to-end experience. He serves as the organization's Alternative Governor for the NHL Board of Governors.

Prior to joining Sharks Sports & Entertainment, Becher spent a decade at SAP in a variety of senior roles, including Chief Marketing Officer and Chief Digital Officer. While at SAP, he oversaw many large-scale sports and entertainment partnerships, including the National Hockey League (NHL), the National Basketball Association

(NBA), the Women's Tennis Association (WTA), and the naming rights agreement for the SAP Center at San José.

Becher has long been an advocate for diversity, inclusion, and belonging (DI&B) and was recognized by the Sports Business Journal as a leader in this space. Currently, he is the co-chair of NHL Fan Inclusion Council and a member of the Knight San Jose Community Advisory Council.

A three-time technology company CEO, Becher is an advisor to several early-stage companies and is on the Board of Directors of multiple organizations, including Catch & Release, Trintech, and the Bay Area Host Committee. He is a frequent speaker at events and a published author on a variety of topics – including his own popular blog, Manage By Walking Around (http://jonathanbecher.com).

Becher holds a master's degree in computer science from Duke University in North Carolina, and a bachelor's degree in computer engineering from the University of Virginia.

General Manager

Entering just his third season as general manager of the San Jose Sharks, Mike Grier continues to reshape the franchise from a struggling, once-perennial Stanley Cup Playoff contender into one of the most enviable upand-coming teams in the National Hockey League.

Grier, 49, has overall authority regarding all aspects of the Sharks hockey-related operations, including overseeing all player personnel decisions, leading the

club's player evaluation process at all professional, minor, and junior levels, negotiating player contracts, directing the club's on-ice coaching and off-ice support staffs, and managing the efforts of the team's scouting department.

Since being named the fifth general manager in Sharks franchise history on July 5, 2022 – and becoming the first Black general manager in the history of the National Hockey League – Grier has strategically reshaped the Sharks organization in nearly every conceivable area: administration, coaching, player development, and the team's NHL roster and prospect pool.

Shortly after taking over the role, Grier began the difficult but necessary process of re-stocking the organization's pipeline of talent, acquiring young player assets and draft picks in exchange for many of the team's existing veteran players, many of whom were playing on long-term and high dollar contracts. In his first two seasons, Grier made a series of high-profile trades to shed contract term and salary, parting ways with players such as Brent Burns, Timo Meier, Erik Karlsson and Tomas Hertl.

Those transactions, while difficult, allowed the team to bring in young players and prospects such as Fabian Zetterlund, Shakir Mukhamadullin, and the team's eventual 2023-24 leading scorer Mikael Granlund.

Perhaps most importantly through these transactions, Grier also acquired multiple first-round draft selections and used those picks to reinvigorate the team's pipeline into one of the top rated prospect pools in the NHL. In the 2022 and 2023 NHL Drafts, Grier and his staff selected Filip Bystedt, Will Smith and Quentin Musty in the first round. In 2024, the Sharks won the NHL Draft Lottery and were awarded the first-overall pick, selecting 2024 Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner Macklin Celebrini, and also selected defenseman Sam Dickinson at 11th overall.

While overseeing the team's three drafts, the Sharks have selected a total of 10 players in the first two rounds. The Sharks 10 selections, five players in the first round and five players in the second round, is behind only Chicago (13), Seattle (12), Utah and Anaheim (11) for most players selected in the opening two rounds since 2022. Currently, San Jose owns a pair of draft choices in the first two rounds of the 2025 NHL Draft (one first, one second), and four total picks in the opening three rounds.

Just prior to the start of the 2024-25 season, Grier packaged the return from the Hertl trade – forward prospect David Edstrom and Vegas' first round 2025 selection (top-10 protected) – to the Nashville Predators in exchange for hockey's top-rated goaltending prospect, Yaroslav Askarov, further enhancing the team's pipeline of players. Prior to joining the San Jose organization in his current role, he was hand-picked by New York Rangers President and General Manager and former teammate Chris Drury to serve as a hockey operations advisor. In that role, Grier assisted Drury in hockey-related decisions and off-ice player development, and assisted prospects in the Rangers organization, including players with the Rangers' American Hockey League (AHL) affiliate, the Hartford Wolf Pack.

During the 2021-22 season, a rebuilding Rangers team experienced a 50-point improvement over their 2020-21 campaign, finishing with a 52-24-6 record and 110 points, a second-place finish in the Metropolitan Division (seventh overall in the NHL) and advanced to the Eastern Conference Final, before succumbing to the Tampa Bay Lightning in six games.

Grier also served on USA Hockey's selection committee for the 2022 World Championships, where he assisted in scouting, evaluating and selecting players for the U.S. team.

Grier served as an assistant coach with the New Jersey Devils for two seasons (2018-20). As a member of Head Coach John Hynes' staff, Grier worked directly with the forwards and assisted with the Devils special teams. During his two seasons with the Devils, New Jersey's penalty killing ranked third in the NHL (83.4%) and their net penalty killing percentage was second overall (87.4%). He was also responsible for pre-scouting the Devils opponents.

From 2014-18, Grier served as a scout with the Chicago Blackhawks, including their 2015 Stanley Cup Championship season. Grier focused on scouting amateur and professional players, including the team's prospects and prospective player acquisitions both at the NHL level and via the NHL Draft.

From 2013-17, Grier served as an assistant coach at St. Sebastian's Prep School in Needham, Mass. He has also been active in working on skill development with collegiate and high school hockey players in the Boston area (2011-2017).

As a player, Grier spent 14 seasons in the National Hockey League as one of the game's top defensive forwards and leaders. He amassed 1,060 NHL games with the Edmonton Oilers, Washington Capitals, Buffalo Sabres, and the Sharks, collecting 383 points (162 goals, 221 assists) along with 510 penalty minutes. He served as an alternate captain and as a member of the leadership group with each of his NHL teams. As a physical, penalty-killing forward annually in the conversation for the Frank J. Selke award, Grier helped establish a top unit on multiple teams, including a League-best penalty kill efficiency on San Jose in 2007-08 (85.8%), fifth-best in 2008-09 and he helped Buffalo achieve the second-best efficiency in 2009-10 (86.6%).

During his NHL tenure between 1996-2011, Grier tied for 11th amongst all NHL players with 20 short-handed goals. Despite the NHL not tracking advanced statistics until the 2005-06 season, Grier ranks 10th amongst all NHL forwards in blocked shots (315) and 33rd in hits (705) over the course of his career.

He initially joined the Sharks organization as a free agent on July 3, 2006 and over the next three seasons, appeared in 221 NHL games, recording 78 points (35 goals, 43 assists). As an alternate captain, Grier helped the Sharks reach the Stanley Cup Conference Semifinals in 2006-07 and 2007-08. He was also a member of the Sharks 2008-09 Presidents' Trophy-winning club that won 53 games and earned 117 points.

His best season with the franchise was in 2006-07 where he registered 33 points (16 goals, 17 assists) in 81 games and led the club in shorthanded goals (three). He then added four points (two goals, two assists) in the 2007 postseason in 11 games, which included a two-point game where he scored a goal and assisted on the game-winning goal by Patrick Rissmiller in the second overtime of Game One of the Western Conference Quarter Final against the Nashville Predators, en route to a 4-1 series victory for the Sharks.

Originally selected by the St. Louis Blues in the 1993 NHL Draft (ninth round, 219th overall), Grier's rights were later traded to the Edmonton Oilers, along with goaltender Curtis Joseph, for St. Louis' first-round selections in the 1996 and 1997 NHL Drafts. Grier earned a spot on the Oilers roster directly after his collegiate career and never played a game in the minor leagues. Upon his NHL debut on Oct. 4, 1996, Grier became the first African American born and trained in the U.S. to play in the NHL.

Grier's teams appeared in the Stanley Cup Playoffs in 11 of his 14 NHL seasons, including advancing to the 2006 Eastern Conference Final, where Buffalo narrowly lost a seven-game series to Carolina. In 101 Stanley Cup Playoff games, Grier tallied 28 points (14 goals, 14 assists) and 72 penalty minutes.

Grier has also had a long-standing relationship as a player and a coach with USA Hockey, beginning with being selected to the 1995 World Junior Championship team. He was a member of the 1996 U-21 National team and captured a bronze medal at the 2003 World Championships, where he was named an assistant captain. Off the ice, Grier served as coach at the USA Hockey 17s Festival and the CCM All-American Prospects Game in 2014, was an assistant coach for the U.S. women's national team for the Winter Series vs. Canada (2016) and was a coach and a member of

the selection committee for the U.S. women's national team Olympic evaluation camps (2015-2017) ahead of the 2018 Winter Games.

Prior to his NHL career, Grier played for Boston University over three seasons, compiling 120 points (59 goals, 61 assists) in 114 games. He helped lead the team to an NCAA Championship in 1995 and captured a Hockey East Championship in two consecutive seasons (1993-95). Following the 1994-95 season, he was named to the All-Hockey East First Team, selected to the Division I AHCA All-American Team, won the Walter Brown Award as the best U.S.-born collegiate player in New England, and was a finalist for the Hobey Baker Award, awarded to the top collegiate hockey player. Grier was selected as the BU's captain for the 1995-96 season but withdrew from the university to begin his NHL career.

Grier comes from a family embedded in the fabric of leadership, scouting and development in professional sports. His father, Bobby, is a long-time executive in the National Football League, with stints in scouting, player personnel and as an advisor with the New England Patriots and Houston Texans. He currently serves as a consultant with the Miami Dolphins. His brother, Chris, has served as general manager of the Miami Dolphins since 2016. Chris worked as a scout for Miami dating back to 2000, and previously worked in scouting with the Patriots beginning in 1995.

In 2022, Grier was named to the EBONY Power 100 List in the Business Disruptors category, recognizing the groundbreaking achievements and societal contributions of industry leaders championing for change across industries.

Grier, a native of Detroit, MI, and his wife, Anne, have three children: sons Jayden and Tristan, and daughter Brooklyn.

Assistant General Manager, San Jose Sharks General Manager, San Jose Barracuda

Joe Will begins his 14th season as assistant general manager for the San Jose Sharks and his 12th as general manager of the Sharks' American Hockey League affiliate (Worcester Sharks and San Jose Barracuda).

On Apr. 7, 2022, Will was named interim general manager for the Sharks, and handled the day-today duties as general manager in addition to his role as the assistant general manager until the hire of Mike Grier on July 5, 2022.

In San Jose, Will works closely with general manager Mike Grier

on all daily departmental functions and his primary responsibilities include contract research and negotiations, scouting operations, fiscal planning, salary cap analysis and hockey administration. He's the lead coordinator and planner for the Sharks training camp, scouting meetings and scouting conference calls each season.

In addition, as general manager of the San Jose Barracuda, he oversees all of the hockey operations for the Sharks AHL affiliate, including player evaluation, player contracts, and player recall and reassignments.

In an effort to strengthen the organization's player development system and program, the Sharks relocated their American Hockey League affiliate to San Jose. Beginning in the 2015-16 season, the Barracuda became a part of the AHL's new Pacific Division and now play at Tech CU Arena, established in 2022. The move west eliminated the need to fly players across the United States in the event of recalls and reassignments, adding valuable rest and practice time. It also allowed for greater interaction and observation from San Jose's development coaches.

The relocation has paid immediate dividends. The Barracuda finished the 2016-17 season with the second-best winning percentage in the AHL (0.699%), winning the Bud Poile Trophy as the Western Conference regular season champions and the John Chick Trophy as Pacific Division champions, and earning an appearance in the Western Conference Final. In addition, the Barracuda held an AHL season-long winning streak of 14 games, paced the AHL in goals per game (3.44), ranked second on the power play (23.8%), eighth ranked penalty kill (83.3%) and had nine different players spend time on the Sharks roster, all while having the fifth youngest team in the league. The season marked

one of the most successful campaigns in San Jose Sharks minor league affiliate history.

Moreover, individual feats highlighted the 2016-17 season; Troy Grosenick became just the fifth goaltender in AHL history to reach double-digit shutouts (10) earning him the Aldege "Baz" Bastien Award (goaltender of the year) and a First Team AHL All-Star nod; Danny O'Regan received the Dudley "Red" Garrett Memorial Award as the AHL's rookie of the year; and Tim Heed merited Second Team AHL All-Star honors.

All of these accomplishments occurred following a concerted effort by the front office to reinvigorate the organization's prospect pool, largely spearheaded, at the AHL level, by Joe Will. On top of the Barracuda players who were recognized with major awards, Roy Sommer was named as the AHL's Coach of the Year (Louis A.R. Pieri Award).

One of Will's most important duties involves the tracking, analyzing and projecting of the team's player payroll relative to the current and future National Hockey League salary cap to give the team the financial flexibility to ice a championship-caliber team each season.

Will, 58, also works with the organization's professional scouts and management team in player research for expansion, waivers, free agency and trades. His expert analysis of economic trends in the NHL has led to the Sharks acquisition and retention of several key veteran players over his time with the club.

Prior to his current roles, Will served as the team's director of hockey operations from 2004-2011. A member of the Sharks organization since the franchise's inception in July 1990, he has also previously served as assistant to the general manager and scouting coordinator.

The Bloomington, Minn. native also works with director of scouting Tim Burke in the development and implementation of draft prospect testing, draft table operations and computer scouting analysis. Will is an integral part of the team's draft-day strategy. Without his coordinating efforts, the team would not have drafted 2001 Calder Memorial Trophy winner Evgeni Nabokov in 1994. In addition, he developed the Sharks computer scouting program that pioneered the advent of scouting programs now used throughout the NHL.

Prior to joining San Jose, Will spent six years in the Minnesota North Stars organization in various capacities.

Assistant General Manager

Tom Holy enters his third year as Assistant General Manager, and will oversee the analytics department, staff budgeting and contracts. He will be the liaison between the Sharks Hockey Operations and Business departments, along with the NHL scheduling for the team.

He primarily has served in various roles in Media Relations and Public Relations with the Dallas Stars, Sharks and Cleveland Barons. He served as the Stars Vice President, Communications and Broadcasting from 2013-2022, and was the Sharks Media Relations Manager from 2005-2013. In his role as VP with the Stars, he led the organization's efforts in hockey communications, corporate communications and player relations, and served as the organization's spokesman for all news.

Holy also helped earn six separate Dick Dillman Awards, including four straight seasons with San Jose from 2007-10, presented annually by the Professional Hockey Writer's Association to honor the work of the NHL's top public relations team.

In addition, Holy Served as a Development Coach for Seiler FEC working with the 2020 and 2021 rookie classes of the Cleveland Browns and Indianapolis Colts centering around financial education and budgeting.



Ryane Clowe returns to the Sharks franchise in his first season as Assistant General Manager. Clowe will work closely with Grier and assistant general managers Tom Holy and Joe Will overseeing all aspects of the Sharks hockey operations department.

Clowe spent the last three seasons with the New York Rangers as senior advisor and hockey operations advisor to General Manager Chris Drury. In that role, Clowe assisted

Drury in all areas of hockey operations, including scouting. The Rangers successfully made the post season the past two seasons, including reaching the Eastern Conference Final last year, before being eliminated by the eventual Stanley Cup Champion Florida Panthers.

Previously, Clowe spent the 2018-19 season as head coach for the Newfoundland Growlers but stepped down from the role due to health

concerns. Between 2016-2018, he served as an assistant coach with the New Jersey Devils, working under John Hynes.

Clowe played in ten NHL seasons between 2005-2015, primarily with the Sharks. Drafted by San Jose in the sixth round (175th overall) of the 2001 NHL Draft, Clowe played in 423 games with the Sharks, posting 271 points (101 goals, 170 assists) and 567 penalty minutes. His 271 points place him 14th on the Sharks all-time scoring list and he ranks fifth all time in penalty minutes.

Clowe was also a prominent contributor on the Sharks Stanley Cup Playoff runs, adding 45 points (18 goals, 27 assists) and 97 penalty minutes in 68 postseason games. His 97 postseason penalty minutes are tops in franchise history and he ranks seventh in playoff points and 10th in postseason games played.

The rugged power forward finished his stellar career with the New York Rangers and New Jersey Devils between 2013-2015. In total, he appeared in 491 regular season NHL games, collecting 309 points (112 goals, 197 assists) and 618 penalty minutes.

RYAN WARSOFSKY Head Coach

Warsofsky, 36, was named the 11th Head Coach in franchise history on June 13, 2024, and becomes the youngest head coach currently in the NHL. This is his third season with the Sharks, previously serving as Assistant Coach. In that role, his primary responsibilities were overseeing the team's defense and penalty kill. Working with one of the younger rosters in the NHL, the Sharks penalty kill ranked 18th in the NHL between 2022-2024 at 78.8%.

While with the Sharks the last two seasons, Warsofsky helped develop several of the team's young rookie defensemen. Last year, Thrun finished 10th among rookie blueliners in points, and was third among rookie defensemen in penalty kill time on-ice (86:07).

In Warsofsky's first year as Assistant Coach with the Sharks in 2022-23, Erik Karlsson collected a franchise-record 101 points by a defenseman, helping the blueliner win his second Norris Trophy, and becoming the Sharks second player to win the award. Karlsson became the sixth NHL defenseman at the time to ever

eclipse the 100-point threshold, and his 1.23 points-per-game was the third-best in the past three decades among defenseman who appeared in at least five or more games in any given season.

In the same season, the Sharks defensive unit scored the eighth-most points (tied) by defensemen, collecting 191 points, and held the third-most (tied) assists among team blueliners in the league. San Jose's defensive core accounted for 30.0% of the team's points, the highest rating among all NHL teams. The Sharks also held the eight-best penalty kill unit, earning an 82.4% efficiency while the team was a man down.

Warsofsky joined the Sharks following two seasons (2020-22) as head coach of the Chicago Wolves (AHL). He led the Wolves to the AHL's best regular-season record with a 50-16-5-5 record (.724%) in 2021-22 and captured the 2022 Calder Cup, his second Calder Cup Championship, earning a 14-4 record over four different series during the playoffs. The year prior in his first stint with Chicago, Warsofsky guided the team to the third-best record in the league (21-9-1-2), but the AHL did not hold a formal playoffs due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In his two seasons, the Wolves amassed a 71-25-6-7 record and the team's penalty kill ranked in the Top-10 twice (2021-22, fifth; 2020-21, ninth) and the power-play ranked fourth in 2020-21.

Prior to his time with Chicago, Warsofsky worked with the Charlotte Checkers (AHL) for two seasons. He started as an assistant coach in 2017-18 and helped the team capture the Calder Cup 2017-18, overseeing the top penalty killing unit in the League (86.6%). The following year in the abbreviated season, he was named as the League's youngest head coach (31) on July 10, 2019 and guided the team to a 34-22-5-0 and ranked third in both power-play and penalty kill percentage.

As head coach in the AHL with Chicago and Charlotte, Warsofsky earned a 105-47-11-7 record (.671%).

Warsofsky also worked with the ECHL's South Carolina Stingrays for five seasons, including two seasons as head coach/director of hockey operations (2016-2018) after starting as an assistant coach. In his two seasons at the helm, South Carolina posted an 88-44-10-2 record and the team advanced to the Kelly Cup Final in 2017. Warsofsky has also worked as an assistant coach in the NCAA with Curry College for one season (2012-13).

Internationally, Warsofsky served as an assistant coach to Team USA's 2023 World Championship staff, helping guide the team to a fourth-place finish at the tournament.

Ryan resides in Massachusetts in the offseason with his wife Caroline, son Cal and daughter Lucy.

On June 28, 2024, the race for the first overall selection came down to two organizations, San Jose and Chicago, with the latter having made the first overall selection in the previous year. NHL Deputy Commissioner Bill Daly revealed that day the historic news on live TV that San Jose was awarded the first overall pick during the 2024 NHL Draft Lottery, and set the organization on a path to have a chance to select the franchise's additional cornerstone piece.

The 2024 NHL Draft signified several firsts. It was the first time the draft was held in Sphere Las Vegas and the first time in franchise history that San Jose would select first overall. As hours turned to minutes and minutes into seconds, the time came for San Jose to make their historic selection as Sharks General Manager Mike Grier and Director of Scouting Chris Morehouse made their way to the podium. The honor of announcing the selection was given to former first-overall selection, Sharks legend Joe Thornton. With a smile on his face that he always has, Thornton said the words "The San Jose Sharks proudly select, from Boston University, Macklin Celebrini".

The Sharks have been turning the page ever since Mike Grier took over the helm as General Manager on July 5, 2022. In addition to having been able to make the selection at first overall for the first time in franchise history, Grier and the Sharks selected 11th overall in the same draft, selecting Sam Dickinson, and have added three other first-round draft selections since 2022: Filip Bystedt, Will Smith, and Quentin Musty.

Additionally, through trades, the Sharks added other young firstround selections in goaltender Yaroslav Askarov and defenseman Shakir Mukhamadullin.

And the dividends are starting to come to fruition from the moves that Grier has strategically made to set the Sharks on a timeline for future success.

Celebrini and Smith made their respective NHL debuts on October 10 in the Sharks 2024-25 season opener against the St. Louis Blues. The pair were the first duo of top-four NHL Draft picks to make their NHL debut for the same club in the same game since Auston Matthews and Mitchell Marner (Toronto) on Oct. 12, 2016. In that game, Celebrini collected two points including his first NHL goal, to become the second-youngest player in Sharks history to score a goal, older than only Marleau at the time of his first.

Smith logged his first NHL goal in the victory against Chicago on October 31, becoming the youngest American-born player in Sharks history to light the lamp (19 years, 228 days), a full year younger than the previous youngest Matt Nieto (20 years, 337 days; October 8, 2013). His second goal came as the gamewinner, becoming the youngest Shark since Patrick Marleau (19 years, 183 days; Mar. 17, 1999) to score twice in one game.

Askarov, who quickly signed a two-year contract extension after joining the Sharks, has been producing effectively at the American Hockey League level for the San Jose Barracuda. Askarov became the third Russian-born netminder in the history of the league to be chosen first at the position (Nashville, 11th overall, 2020 NHL Draft), joining Ilya Samsonov (Washington, 22nd overall, 2015 NHL Draft) and Andrei Vasilevskiy (Tampa Bay, 19th overall, 2012 NHL Draft).

In his first month in the AHL. Collin Graf was awarded AHL Rookie of the Month (Oct.) after logging 10 points (three goals, seven assists) across his first seven games played with the San Jose Barracuda. Graf has been able to showcase his production with the Barracuda this season. A native of Lincoln, Massachusetts, he signed as a free agent with San Jose on Apr. 4, 2024, after tallving 49 points (22 goals, 27 assists) in 34 games with the Bobcats at Quinnipiac University (NCAA). He made his NHL debut on Apr. 6. 2024, against St. Louis Blues and logged his first NHL point, an assist, in the following game (Apr. 7) against the Arizona Coyotes.

Luca Cagnoni has carried over to the Barracuda his productive two-way play that he showcased in the Western Hockey League with the Portland Winterhawks. In his 2023-24 campaign, he led WHL defensemen with 90 points and 72 assists. He was the first WHL blueliner since 1993-94 to reach the 90-point threshold. After finishing his fourth season with the Winterhawks, Cagnoni signed his standard entry-level contract with the Sharks on May 22, 2024.

But the young players aren't going to be the only recipe for success. There has to be quality leadership and mentorship from the veteran players who have been through it all in the league both the highs and the lows - and have a wealth of experience to pass along to the next generation.

In the offseason, Grier added two seasoned veterans to the group in Tyler Toffoli and Barclay Goodrow who were eventually named to the alternate captain group with Mario Ferraro, Mikael Granlund, and Luke Kunin.

Toffoli registered back-to-back 30-goal campaigns in his previous two seasons before joining the Sharks. Before becoming a Shark, he skated in 812 NHL games with six teams (Los Angeles, Calgary, Montreal, New Jersey, Winnipeg, Vancouver, and San Jose) with 260 goals and 261 assists. Toffoli understands the pedigree of becoming a Stanley Cup Champion as he hoisted the cup in 2014 as a member of the Los Angeles Kings.

Barclay Goodrow's goal in the 2019 playoffs forever is etched in Sharks history. He returns to San Jose after spending three seasons with the New York Rangers as an alternate captain. He posted 30-point seasons back-to-back, logging 13 goals and 20 assists in his 2021-22 season and 11 goals and 20 assists in 2022-23. He also is a two-time Stanley Cup Champion, hoisting the cup in consecutive seasons (2020 & 2021) as a member of the Tampa Bay Lightning.

A new chapter may just be starting for San Jose, and the story is long from over.

Sharks Foundation Mission and Background

The Sharks Foundation is dedicated to enhancing the lives of underserved youth and families in our community with an emphasis in the areas of education, health and safety and character development. The Sharks Foundation supplies emergency aid when appropriate, executes unique and relevant programming, supports the advancement of youth hockey and provides financial support and resources to organizations that enrich the lives of those in need.

The Sharks Foundation was established in 1994 as the official charitable arm of the San Jose Sharks. Each year the Foundation partners with individuals, corporations, and funding partners in the community, who support its efforts to improve the lives of youth and families in the Bay Area. Each year the Sharks Foundation hosts its annual Giving Campaign which focuses on different causes each month and features key activations with Sharks players, coaches, alumni, executives, broadcasters, team partners and mascot S.J. Sharkie. Funds raised by the Sharks Foundation is provided to public, 501(c)(3) organizations through the Sharks Foundation's Community Assist Grant Cycle. During the 2023-24 season, the Sharks Foundation provided nearly \$900,000 in financial support to local non-profits. Since its inception, the Foundation has given more than \$20 million to hundreds of high-performing non-profit organizations.



Programs GOALS FOR KIDS

The Goals for Kids program was established in 2014 in partnership with the Koret Foundation and Taube Philanthropies to support local non-profit organizations and celebrate each on-ice accomplishment. For every San Jose Sharks goal scored, \$1,000 is contributed to a running sum of funds which is then evenly distributed amongst the Goals for Kids beneficiaries at the end of the season. 


