

Long-time Kings broadcaster, Nick Nickson, concluded his 44th, and final, season as the 'Voice of the Kings' across radio and television in 2024-25.

A fixture across Southern California's airwaves for nearly half a century, Nickson has received several accolades over his storied career. Among these honors is the Foster Hewitt Award, presented to Nickson in 2015 by the NHL Professional Broadcasters Association and awarded by the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto.

Prior to that, Nickson was inducted to the Southern California Sports Broadcasters Hall of Fame in 2009 and named to the Frontier Field Walk of Fame in his hometown of Rochester, New York in 2011.



PHILIP F. ANSCHUTZ**Owner**

Philip F. Anschutz assumed ownership of the Los Angeles Kings in October of 1995. Mr. Anschutz is the owner of The Anschutz Corporation, Denver, Colorado. The company's major business interests are in the fields of renewable and natural resources, transportation, real estate development, lodging, entertainment, and communications.

**EDWARD P. ROSKI, JR.****Owner**

As President and Chairman of the Board of one of the oldest and largest privately held real estate companies in the United States, Edward P. Roski, Jr., took over ownership of the Los Angeles Kings with Philip F. Anschutz in October of 1995. Mr. Roski's expertise in real estate development played a key role as he helped lead the L.A. Arena Company's efforts to create STAPLES Center in Los Angeles.

His company, Southern California-based Majestic Reality Co., was built upon the entrepreneurial vision of his father, Edward P. Roski, Sr., who founded the company in 1948. Majestic, whose corporate offices are in Los Angeles, has long been a top developer in the area, owning 83 million square feet of commercial real estate across the United States.

A graduate of the University of Southern California in 1962 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Finance and Real Estate, Mr. Roski served as an officer in the United States Marines from 1962 to 1966. Ed was raised in Southern California and is a graduate of Loyola High School.

Mr. Roski's other involvements include serving on the Board of Trustees of National Geographic Society and Chairman Emeritus of the Board of Trustees at the University of Southern California.

An avid cyclist and mountain climber, Mr. Roski lives in Los Angeles.



DAN BECKERMAN

President and CEO, AEG and Alternate Governor, Kings

Dan Beckerman is President and Chief Executive Officer of AEG, the world's leading sports and entertainment company, with operations in facilities, music, sports, global partnerships, entertainment districts, ticketing and real estate. On an annual basis, AEG entertains more than 160 million guests, promotes more than 10,000 shows, produces more than 22,000 events and sells more than 50% of all tickets in the top 10 arenas worldwide.

In addition to his role as President and CEO of AEG, Beckerman represents the LA Kings on the National Hockey League's Board of Governors and the LA Galaxy on Major League Soccer's Board of Governors.

Prior to being named President and CEO in 2013, Beckerman was the Chief Operating Officer and Chief Financial Officer for AEG for more than 15 years. In this capacity, he led the company's day-to-day global operations and oversaw financial planning, budgeting, analysis and reporting for all its divisions. He also was responsible for the financial oversight, long-range planning and financing for AEG's multi-billion-dollar real estate projects such as Crypto.com Arena (Los Angeles, CA), Dignity Health Sports Park (Carson, CA), T-Mobile Center (Kansas City, MO) and Uber Arena (Berlin), as well as its renowned entertainment districts including L.A. LIVE (Los Angeles), The O2 (London) and Uber Platz (Berlin). Because of the success of its pioneering integrated sports and entertainment districts, AEG is credited with revitalizing neighborhoods and communities in some of the world's largest cities.

Beckerman joined AEG in August 1997 as the Chief Financial Officer of the LA Kings, where he oversaw all financial activities for the franchise. Prior to joining AEG, he served as Vice President, Finance for the Los Angeles Clippers. Beckerman began his career as a senior accountant at Arthur Andersen in Los Angeles where he specialized in corporate taxation.

Beckerman received his MBA in Finance from the Anderson School at UCLA, as well as a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics from UCLA. He serves as the co-chairman of the Board of the GRAMMY Museum Foundation and serves on the Board of Advisors of the UCLA Anderson School of Management.

Beckerman lives in Los Angeles with his wife and two daughters.



LUC ROBITAILLE

President, Alternate Governor

Luc Robitaille – a member of the Hockey Hall of Fame, the all-time Kings leader in goals and the second-highest goal scoring left wing in NHL history – is in his ninth season as Kings President. He directs and oversees all hockey and business operations.

In April 2017, Robitaille was promoted to President. Robitaille also is an Alternate Governor with the Kings. He is his 19th season overall in the Kings front office after working the previous 10 years as President, Business Operations. He played 19 seasons in the NHL, including 14 with the Kings.

Since his playing career ended, Robitaille has had a tremendous impact on the Kings as an executive. For the Kings Business Operations department, revenue has more than doubled as the Kings won their first two Stanley Cups. Additionally, the team enjoyed a record sellout streak of 297 consecutive home games, including 262 straight regular-season contests. The Kings were named the Sports Team of the Year by the Sports Business Journal in 2015.

Robitaille has been a driving force for the growth of hockey in Southern California, launching the Little Kings Learn-to-Play program and the LA Kings High School Hockey League. Robitaille has also helped develop the Kings Care Foundation's principles, values, and strategic direction. He is on the Board of Children's Hospital Los Angeles and Ronald McDonald House, and he and his wife, Stacia, are the co-founders of a non-profit organization, Echoes of Hope.

He has also played a significant role behind organizing such unique events as the 2010 NHL Entry Draft and the 2017 NHL All-Star Game at Crypto.com Arena. In 2014, the Kings hosted the Anaheim Ducks in a regular-season outdoor NHL game at Dodger Stadium in front of 54,099 fans. The Kings played outdoor hockey again in 2015 at Levi's Stadium and in 2020 at the U.S. Air Force Academy and have played overseas on multiple occasions.

Robitaille ranks 13th in overall NHL goal-scoring and 24th in points while playing for the Kings, Penguins, Rangers, and Red Wings, where he won a Stanley Cup in 2002. Among NHL left wingers, Robitaille is second in points (1,394), goals (668), and assists (726). In 1,077 regular season games as a King, Robitaille tallied 557 goals and 597 assists for 1,154 points. With the Kings, he ranks fifth in games played, second in points, first in power-play goals, and fifth in assists.

A ninth-round selection (171st overall) in the 1984 NHL Entry Draft, the Montreal native became the first Kings player to win the Calder Memorial Trophy in 1987 and was named to the NHL's All-Rookie Team. Later, Robitaille helped lead the Kings to the club's first trip to the Stanley Cup Final in 1993 as he set NHL records for the most goals (63) by a left wing. Robitaille would go on to reach other milestones in a Kings uniform, including his 500th career goal, and saw his No. 20 jersey retired by the Kings. Robitaille was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in 2009, and he has since been named one the NHL's 100 greatest players of all-time.

Luc, 59 (2/17/66), and Stacia have two sons, Steven and Jesse. They reside in Santa Monica.



KEN HOLLAND

Vice President and General Manager

Holland joins the Kings as the fifth-winningest general manager in NHL history, accumulating an all-time record of 1,145-644-272 (.622 PTS %) over 26 seasons between the Detroit Red Wings (1997-2019) and Edmonton Oilers (2019-24) at the time of his hiring. Holland joins the Kings following his most recent five-year stint with Edmonton where he managed the team to five consecutive postseason berths, including three 100-point seasons and a trip to the 2024 Stanley Cup Finals.

This past season, Holland worked as a Consultant for the NHL's Hockey Operations Department.

Prior to joining Edmonton, Holland spent 34 years with the Detroit Red Wings organization, including 22 seasons as the team's general manager where he led the Red Wings to three Stanley Cup Championships (1998, 2002, 2008; won in 1997 as AGM), four Presidents' Trophies (2002, 2004, 2006, 2008), 10 division championships (1991, 2001-04, 2006-09, 2011), five regular season conference titles (2002, 2004, 2006-08) and eclipsed 100-point plateau in the regular-season 14 of his 22 seasons at the helm.

During his time as general manager with Detroit, Holland guided the team to more combined regular season and postseason wins (1,044) than any other NHL franchise. His 1,044 combined regular season and playoff win total is the third-most by a general manager for a single franchise in league history behind Harry Sinden (1,297 with BOS) and Lou Lamoriello (1,229 with NJD). Individually, his 925 regular season and 119 playoff victories each rank fourth-most for a single franchise all-time.

The Red Wings reached the playoffs for each of his first 18 seasons as general manager as part of Detroit's 25 consecutive seasons of making the Stanley Cup Playoffs (1990-2016). Detroit's 18 straight campaigns of playoff appearances under Holland stands as the third-longest streak by a general manager in NHL history after Harry Sinden (24; 1972-96 with BOS) and Jack Adams (20; 1938-58 with DET).

A 2020 Hockey Hall of Fame inductee, Holland served in several different roles within the organization prior to being named general manager, including assistant general manager (1994-97), general manager of the Adirondack Red Wings of the American Hockey League (AHL; 1994-97), amateur scouting director (1987-94) and western conference scout (1985-87).

Internationally, the Vernon, BC native has served on several management staffs for Hockey Canada, winning gold medals at the 2010 and 2014 Olympic Winter Games and at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey.

As a goaltender, Holland was drafted by Toronto in the 12th round (188th overall) of the 1975 NHL Entry Draft, playing in four NHL games with Detroit and Hartford Whalers. Holland retired as a player after the 1984-85 season and transitioned into a scouting role. Holland and his wife Cindi have four children: Brad, Julie, Rachel and Greg.



NELSON EMERSON

Assistant General Manager

Nelson Emerson begins his fourth season as Assistant General Manager and 22nd as an executive on the Kings Hockey Operations Staff.

Most recently, Emerson served as Director of Player Personnel, a role he held since 2018. Prior to that, Emerson spent 10 years in the Player Department, during which time the Kings twice captured the Stanley Cup (2012, 2014) while also reaching the Western Conference Final in 2013. Emerson

was originally named to the coaching staff on July 10, 2006, and spent two seasons as an Assistant Coach (2006-08) after serving as a Coaches Aide in 2003-04.

A native of Hamilton, Ontario, Emerson appeared in 771 career games, including 124 with the Kings from 2000-02, and recorded 488 points (195-293) overall. Originally selected by the St. Louis Blues in the third round (44th overall) of the 1985 NHL Entry Draft, the forward also had 22 points (7-15) in 40 playoff games.

Emerson, 58 (8/17/67), was a two-time All-American, a three-time CCHA All-Star, a finalist for the Hobey Baker Award three times (1988-90), and a teammate of Rob Blake while at Bowling Green State University of the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA). He remains the school's all-time leading scorer with 294 points. He also finished as the CCHA's all-time leading scorer and is seventh on the NCAA's all-time points list.

Nelson and his wife, June, reside in Manhattan Beach with their four children: daughters Mackenzie and Madelyn, and sons, Quinn and Blake.



MARC BERGEVIN

Senior Advisor to the General Manager

Marc Bergevin enters his fourth full season as Senior Advisor to the General Manager with the LA Kings after being named to the position on Jan. 9, 2022.

Bergevin joined the Kings after nine years (2012-21) as General Manager of the Montreal Canadiens, where he built the team that advanced to the 2021 Stanley Cup Final against the Tampa Bay Lightning. Prior to Montreal, he spent seven seasons (2005-12) in various positions with the Chicago Blackhawks, winning a Stanley Cup in 2010 as Director of Player Personnel.

Originally selected by Chicago 59th overall in the second round of the 1983 NHL Draft, Bergevin enjoyed a 20-year NHL career as a defenseman with Chicago (1984-88), New York Islanders (1988-90), Hartford Whalers (1990-92), Tampa Bay (1992-95; 2003), Detroit Red Wings (1995-96), St. Louis Blues (1996-2000; 2001-02), Pittsburgh Penguins (2000-01, 2002-03 and 2003-04) and Vancouver Canucks (2004). He earned 181 points (36-145=181) and 1,090 PIM in 1,191 career regular-season games and added nine points (3-6=9) and 52 PIM in 80 Stanley Cup playoff contests.

A native of Montreal, Quebec, Bergevin is a two-time Calder Cup (AHL) winner with the Springfield Indians (1990, 1991) and earned a gold medal with Canada at the 1994 IIHF Men's World Championship. He played his junior hockey with the Chicoutimi Saguenéens, recording 76 points (13-68=76) in 136 QMJHL games.



GLEN MURRAY

Senior Director of Player Development

Glen Murray enters his 10th season with the Kings Player Development Department and fourth in his role as Senior Director of Player Personnel.

Murray, who played for the Kings for parts of six seasons (1996-2002), first joined the organization's front office in 2011-12 as a part-time consultant before formally joining the Player Development department in 2016-17.

A native of Halifax, Nova Scotia, Murray played 16 seasons in the NHL. In 1,009 regular-season NHL games, he registered 651 points (337-314=651) with Los Angeles, the Boston Bruins (1992-95; 2001-08) and Pittsburgh Penguins (1995-97). He also played in 94 postseason games where he recorded 42 points.

A two-time All-Star, Murray recorded a career-best campaign in 2002-03 with 44 goals, 48 assists and 92 points in 82 games. He scored as many as 28 goals in a season five different times, including a team-high 29 goals with the Kings during the 1997-98 season. His 41 goals in 2001-02 were second-most in the NHL.

Glen and his wife Katie have three children: Parker, Hunter and Payton.



TYLER WRIGHT

Director of Player Development

Wright, 52, joins the Kings front office with 16 years of hockey executive experience between the Edmonton Oilers (2019-23), Detroit Red Wings (2013-19) and Columbus Blue Jackets (2010-13). Most recently with Edmonton, Wright served as the team's Director of Player Personnel following a six-year stint as the Detroit Red Wings' Director of Amateur Scouting. Prior to joining Detroit, Wright spent six years with the Columbus Blue Jackets, serving as Director of Player

Development (2007-10) before assuming the Director of Amateur Scouting role for three seasons (2010-13).

A former first-round draft selection of the Edmonton Oilers, 12th overall in 1991, Wright was selected by Columbus in the 2000 expansion draft and played 309 games as a Blue Jacket, registering 57 goals and 51 assists for 108 points with 436 penalty minutes. He also served as an alternate captain during the 2000-01, 2001-02 and 2003-04 seasons. His best campaign was the Jackets' inaugural 2000-01 season, when he posted a career-high 16 goals and 16 assists with a team-leading 140 penalty minutes. He was traded to Anaheim for former Red Wings' star Sergei Fedorov in Nov. 2005.

The Kamsack, Saskatchewan native appeared in 613 games over 13 NHL seasons, accumulating 149 points (79G, 70A) and 854 penalty minutes with the Blue Jackets, Anaheim Ducks, Pittsburgh Penguins and Edmonton Oilers. Wright also represented Team Canada at the 1992 and 1993 (gold medal) World Junior Hockey Championship and 2002 World Hockey Championship.



JAKE GOLDBERG

Senior Director, Hockey Operations

Jake Goldberg enters his fifth season with the organization after spending four years (2017-20) with the Arizona Coyotes. Among his responsibilities as Senior Director, Hockey Operations, Goldberg is involved with negotiating player contracts, overseeing the salary cap, preparation for arbitration and other matters pertaining to the NHL's Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA). Jake also works with the Research & Development and Goaltending Department to align their strategy with the team's goals.

Prior to his time in Arizona, Goldberg was with the London Knights (OHL) for four seasons in multiple capacities, including Assistant Director of Scouting and then Assistant General Manager and Director of Analytics, winning the Memorial Cup and OHL Championship in 2016.

The Toronto native was previously a corporate lawyer at Cassels Brock & Blackwell LLP and served as an Advanced Statistics Consultant with the Tampa Bay Lightning during the 2012-13 season. Goldberg received his business degree from the Ivey School of Business and his law degree from Western University, where he finished #1 in his graduating class.

Jake and his wife, Carly, reside in Westwood, California, with their two daughters: Shay and Summer.



MARK YANNETTI

Director of Amateur Scouting

Mark Yannetti is in his 19th season with the Kings and 17th as Director of Amateur Scouting. He served as a Pro Scout for the Kings during the 2006-07 season before being named to his current position on June 5, 2007.

Since joining the organization, Yannetti and Kings scouting have drafted one Norris Trophy winner (Drew Doughty), two players who have played over 1,000 games (Doughty, Wayne Simmonds), one 40-goal scorer (Adrian Kempe), two 30-goal scorers (Kempe, Tyler Toffoli), and 10 Stanley Cup champions, eight of which did so as an LA King (2012, 2014). Of the 22 players on the Kings 2025-26 roster, nine were drafted since Yannetti joined the Kings, including Mikey Anderson, Quinton Byfield, Brandt Clarke, Doughty, Samuel Helenius, Adriana Kempe, Alex Laferriere, Jacob Moverare and Alex Turcotte.

Prior to the Kings, the native of Boxford, Massachusetts served as an Amateur Scout with the Toronto Maple Leafs beginning in 2004. Prior to that assignment, he was the Advance Scout of potential opponents for the Stanley Cup Playoffs from 1999-04.

Yannetti became a scout after six seasons of professional hockey. He turned pro after earning Second Team All-American honors from the American Hockey Coaches Association following his senior season at Williams College in 1993-94. The defenseman played three seasons with the Ephs after beginning his collegiate career at Brown University in 1990-91.



JIM HILLER

Head Coach

Jim Hiller, 56, enters his second full season as Head Coach of the LA Kings. Hiller was originally elevated to Kings interim head coach on Feb. 2, 2024, after serving as an assistant coach the previous two seasons. Hiller made his head coaching debut on Feb. 10, 2024 against Edmonton to become the 18th different head coach in league history to make their coaching debut with the team that originally drafted them.

In the remaining 34 games regular-season games in 2023-24, Hiller guided the Kings to a 21-12-1 record for 43 points and a .632 points percentage (PTS%), the 10th-best PTS% in the league during that time. Under Hiller's guidance, the Kings were statistically the best home team from the 2024 All-Star Break through the end of the regular-season, accumulating a league-leading 14 wins (14-3-1), 29 points and .806 PTS% in 18 games at Crypto.com Arena. The club finished the season winning nine of their last 10 home contests, including eight consecutive victories from March 11 – April 13 to mark the team's longest home winning streak since their eight-game run (8-0-0; Oct. 12 – Nov. 13) in 2010-11.

In 2024-25, Hiller led the Kings to a 48-25-9 record with 105 points and a .640 PTS% in his first full season as head coach to tie the franchise record for the most wins and points in a single season. Of the team's 48 wins, a record-breaking 31 came at Crypto.com Arena, surpassing the previous franchise mark of 26 set three times. On Feb. 7, 2025, the Kings improved to 50-29-7 under Hiller's watch to make him the fastest head coach in franchise history to reach the 50-win mark, doing so in 86 games (50-29-7). As a result, the Kings qualified for their fourth consecutive Stanley Cup Playoffs.

Hiller joined the Kings as an assistant coach on July 19, 2022, with 20 years of coaching experience, including the last eight spent in the NHL with the New York Islanders (2019-22), Toronto Maple Leafs (2015-19) and Detroit Red Wings (2014-15). Prior to his NHL coaching debut with Detroit, Hiller spent 12 seasons coaching junior hockey in Canada between the Western Hockey League (WHL) and British Columbia Hockey League (BCHL).

Hiller began coaching in 2002 with the Tri-City Americans (WHL), where he spent two seasons before taking the helm behind the bench of the Alberni Valley Bulldogs (BCHL) during the 2005-06 campaign. Hiller returned to the WHL the following year as head coach of the then-expansion Chilliwack Bruins, leading the Bruins to the playoffs in their first season.

Following three seasons with Chilliwack (2006-09), Hiller returned to Tri-City from 2009-14. During the first season of his second stint with Tri-City, Hiller led the Americans to a division title, conference title and WHL Championship Series appearance. In total, he coached Tri-City to two division titles (2009-10, 2011-12) and five consecutive playoff berths over his five seasons. He was awarded the CHL's Brian Kilrea Award and WHL's Dunc McCallum Award for Coach of the Year for 2011-12, leading Tri-City to a 50-18-2-2 record with 104 points.

A native of Port Alberni, British Columbia, Hiller served as an assistant coach for Team Canada at the 2010 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament in Slovakia, helping guide his home country to its third consecutive championship. Hiller was originally selected by the Kings in the 10th round (207th overall) of the 1989 NHL Entry Draft. In total, Hiller appeared in 40 games for the Kings, recording six goals and 12 points. Hiller suited up for 63 career NHL games, registering eight goals, 12 assists and 20 points.



D.J. SMITH

Associate Coach

D.J. Smith, 48, enters his second full season as Associate Coach of the LA Kings. Smith joined the organization on Feb. 5, 2024, after serving as the Head Coach of the Ottawa Senators for parts of the last five seasons (2019-24). Smith also served as an assistant coach for the Toronto Maple Leafs (2015-19), spending four seasons behind the bench alongside current Kings Head Coach Jim Hiller before being hired by Ottawa.

Prior to his NHL coaching career, the Windsor, Ontario native spent a decade coaching in the Ontario Hockey League (OHL) between his hometown Windsor Spitfires (2005-12) and Oshawa Generals (2012-15). During his time in Windsor as assistant and associate coach, Smith helped guide the Spitfires to back-to-back J. Ross Robertson Cups (OHL championship) and Memorial Cups in 2009 and 2010 as the best team in the Canadian Hockey League (CHL).

Following his time in Windsor, Smith was named Head Coach of the Oshawa Generals for three seasons. In that time, Smith accumulated a 135-53-16 record, including a 42-20-6 record in the 2013-14 campaign to earn OHL's Coach of the Year honors. In his third and final season with Oshawa, Smith's squad captured both the J. Ross Robertson Cup and the Memorial Cup.

Smith was drafted in the second round (41st overall) by the New York Islanders in the 1995 NHL Entry Draft. Smith skated in 45 NHL games as a defenseman for the Toronto Maple Leafs (1996-97; 99-00) and Colorado Avalanche (2002-03).



NEWELL BROWN

Assistant Coach

Newell Brown, 63, is set for his second season with the LA Kings after serving as an assistant coach for the Anaheim Ducks for the previous three seasons (2021-24) before joining the organization. Brown has been an assistant coach in the NHL since the 1996-97 campaign, beginning with a two-year stint behind the bench for the Chicago Blackhawks.

In total, Brown brings 28 seasons of coaching experience at the NHL level to the Kings, including time with Chicago (1996-98), the Columbus Blue Jackets (2000-04), Vancouver Canucks (2010-13; 2017-21), Arizona Coyotes (2013-17) and Anaheim Ducks (1998-00; 2005-10; 2021-24) where he helped the club to a Stanley Cup championship in 2007. Under Brown's assistance in Vancouver, the Canucks claimed consecutive President's Trophies in 2010-11 and 2011-12 and a Stanley Cup Finals appearance in 2011.

Prior to coaching in the NHL, the Cornwall, Ontario native coached the Adirondack Red Wings in the American Hockey League (AHL) for four seasons from 1992-96. Brown began his coaching career at his alma mater, Michigan State University, where he helped guide the Spartans to back-to-back regular-season and CCHA tournament titles in 1988-89 and 1989-90 before taking the helm as head coach of the Michigan Tech Huskies.

Brown was selected by the Vancouver Canucks in the eighth round (158th overall) of the 1982 NHL Draft. From 1978-80, he skated two seasons for his hometown Cornwall Royals in the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League (QMJHL) where his four points over five tournament games (4-0=4) helped the Royals capture the 1980 Memorial Cup. Brown went on to register 202 points (73-129=202) in 156 collegiate games for the Spartans. He played one season of professional hockey in 1984-85, splitting times between the Fredericton Express of the AHL and the International Hockey League's (IHL) Muskegon Lumberjacks.



DERIK JOHNSON

Assistant Coach

Derik Johnson enters his third season as an assistant coach and eighth with the Kings organization, having previously served as a skills coach and assistant video coach after joining the team in 2018. Prior to his time with the Kings, Johnson served as a video coach for the Bakersfield Condors of the American Hockey League (AHL) during the 2017-18 season where he helped the Condors achieve a 31-27-10 record.

Johnson played collegiate hockey as a defenseman at the University of Minnesota-Duluth (NCAA), tallying 17 points (2-15=17) in 108 games over four seasons. In 2011-12, despite playing only 11 games, Johnson tallied five points (1-4=5), good for 0.45 points-per-game, the second-highest PPG among all freshman skaters behind only forward Caleb Herbert (41 GP, 14-19=33). Johnson helped Minnesota-Duluth to two NCAA tournament appearances in 2011 and 2015.

He went on to play professionally in the ECHL from 2014-17, tallying 29 points (8-21=29) in 129 appearances between the Missouri Mavericks and Reading Royals. In 2015-16, he made his AHL debut, skating in four games with the Springfield Falcons, before returning to Reading for one more season in 2016-17, where he was one of only four skaters on the team to play in at least 70 games and established career-highs in goals (7), assists (12) and points (19).

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Derik is the son of former NHL defenseman Jim Johnson, who also served as an NHL assistant coach and played hockey at The University of Minnesota-Duluth for four seasons as well.



MIKE BUCKLEY

Goaltending Coach

Mike Buckley is set to begin his third season with the Kings after being named goaltending coach on June 9, 2023.

Buckley joined the Kings coaching staff after spending eight seasons (2013-21) with the Pittsburgh Penguins as goaltending development coach (2013-17) and head goaltending coach (2017-21). During his time in Pittsburgh, the organization's goaltenders received accolades at both the NHL and AHL level, including two Stanley Cups (2016, 2017), two NHL All-Star Games (2020, 2022), three All-Rookie Teams (NHL - 2017, AHL - 2015, 2017), three Harry "Hap" Holmes Memorial Awards as the AHL team with the lowest regular-season goals-against-average (2014, 2015, 2017), one Aldedge "Baz" Bastien Memorial Award as AHL Goaltender of the Year (2015), and one Dudley "Red" Garrett Memorial Award as AHL Rookie of the Year (2015).

In his first season with the Kings, the team's goaltending tandem ranked third and fifth, respectively, in goals-against average (GAA) and save percentage (SV%) while Cam Talbot earned his second career NHL All-Star nod. The following season, Buckley was named to goaltending coach of the U.S. Men's National Team at the 2025 4 Nations Face-Off Tournament.

The first U.S.-born goaltending coach to win multiple Stanley Cups, Buckley also brings nearly eight seasons of collegiate coaching experience to his role, having spent three seasons (2012-13, 2015-17) as goaltending coach for the University of New Hampshire (H-East) and five seasons (2007-12) with his alma mater, the University of Massachusetts-Amherst (H-East).

In addition to his work with teams, Buckley currently sits as President and Head Instructor at Goaltending Development Services, Inc. in North Andover, Mass., where he trains NHL, AHL, collegiate, junior, high school, prep and youth hockey goaltenders throughout the season and summer months.

A native of Haverhill, Massachusetts, Buckley skated four years (1995-2000) of collegiate hockey at UMass-Amherst before playing five seasons (2000-05) of professional hockey, including three campaigns with the Mississippi Sea Wolves and Gwinnett Gladiators of the ECHL.



DR. JOHN MEYER

Director, Player Health and Performance

Dr. John Meyer is in his ninth season as the Director of Player Health and Performance for the Kings. As a clinician, Dr. Meyer has practiced in the Los Angeles community for more than 20 years, specializing in biomechanical movement analysis and its relationship with orthopedic and sports injuries.

Dr. Meyer is the President and CEO of the Meyer Institute of Sport, which is based at the Toyota Sports Performance Center in El Segundo.

He and his team provide physical therapy, biomechanical movement analysis and preventative sports performance programs to the Kings and a variety of elite professional athletes from the NHL, NFL, NBA, MLB, UFC, USA Volleyball and Track and Field.

Dr. Meyer previously served as the Associate Athletic Director of Sports Science and Performance for the Department of Athletic Medicine at the University of Southern California. His interests in spinal disorders, and upper and lower extremity injuries, have led him to serve as an Adjunct Assistant Professor of Clinical Physical Therapy at the University of Southern California in the Departments of Biokinesiology and Physical Therapy. He frequently lectures throughout the country to physical therapists, doctors and other healthcare practitioners on various topics related to movement disorders and sports performance.

He attained his Doctor of Physical Therapy degree and Orthopedic Residency Certificate from the University of Southern California. Dr. Meyer is a Board-Certified Specialist in Orthopedics. A native of Hutchinson, Kansas, Dr. Meyer resides in Manhattan Beach with his wife, Dr. Lisa Meyer, and their two daughters.



CHRIS KINGSLEY

Head Athletic Trainer

Chris Kingsley begins his 20th season as Head Athletic Trainer with the Kings after being named to his position on August 1, 2006.

With the Kings, Kingsley has been a part of a Western Conference Finals berth (2013), the 2017 NHL All-Star Game and two Stanley Cup championships (2012, 2014) on home ice. On March 6, 2024, Kingsley reached the milestone of his 2,000th game in professional hockey.

Before joining the Kings, he held the same role with the Kings' then-primary American Hockey League (AHL) affiliate, the Manchester Monarchs, where he had worked since the franchise began play in 2001. Prior to the Monarchs, he spent his first three AHL seasons with the Lowell Lock Monsters.

Internationally, Kingsley also served as an athletic trainer for the United States at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey.

Kingsley graduated from North Adams State College in 1990, earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in Biology with a concentration in Sports Medicine. He also attended Indiana State University, where he earned a Master of Science degree in Athletic Training in 1995.

Chris and his wife, Susan, reside in the South Bay. They have two children, Jonathan and Jaclyn. .



DARREN GRANGER

Head Equipment Manager

Darren Granger is in his 20th season as Head Equipment Manager with the Kings. He was named to his position on June 1, 2006.

Over nearly two decades with the Kings, Granger has been a part of two Stanley Cup Championships (2012, 2014), a Western Conference Final appearance (2013), as well as two NHL All-Star Games (2015, 2017), with the 2017 contest taking place on home ice. In March 2019, Granger was recognized by the Kings for working his 2,000th NHL game.

Granger arrived in Los Angeles with a great deal of experience. Prior to the Kings, he spent 13 seasons as the assistant equipment manager with the Vancouver Canucks, where he worked the 1998 NHL All-Star Game and in 2004 received the Larry Ashley Award from the British Columbia Hockey Hall of Fame for dedication and spirit toward the game of hockey.

Internationally, the Brandon, Manitoba native has represented Team Canada at several international tournaments, including the 2014 Olympic Winter Games (gold medal), 2016 World Cup of Hockey (gold medal), 2025 4 Nations Face-Off Tournament (gold medal), four IIHF Men's World Championships (1999, 2006, 2008 – silver medal, 2010) and one IIHF World Junior Championship (1992). RADIO – On June 20, 2024, the LA Kings and ESPN Radio (KSPN) 710 announced a new, innovative multi-year broadcast partnership. All Kings games - preseason, regular season and postseason contests - are now streamed live on ESPN LA app. In addition, select Kings games can be heard over-the-air on ESPN Radio 710 (AM). Approximately 25 Kings games for

the 2025-26 campaign will be broadcast on ESPN Radio 710, which is the flagship home of the Lakers, Rams, and LAFC. LA's MEGA Sports Station also features a robust line-up of popular local and nationally syndicated radio shows, including Mason and Ireland, Travis and Sliwa, and Sedano and Kap, plus national ESPN personalities.

The ESPN LA app will also feature Kings podcasts and additional unique club audio content.

Last June's announcement represented a Radio Homecoming for the Kings, whose games previously aired on ESPN Radio 710 from 2002-06. Since 2018 Kings games have been streamed on the LA Kings iHeartRadio Audio Network, a custom station on iHeartRadio.



SPANISH RADIO – For the sixth consecutive year KWKW 1330 AM Tu Liga Radio, the popular all-sports Spanish radio station, will air select Kings games. In 2018-19 the Kings/KWKW 1330 AM relationship began and the broadcasts marked the club's first game on Spanish radio since 1997-98. Francisco X. Rivera calls the action.

BOB MILLER

Team Ambassador

Hockey Hall of Famer Bob Miller retired in March 2017 after 44 years as "Voice of the Kings." He worked the first 17 years simulcast on TV and radio and the last 27 years as the exclusive television voice of the team joined by former Kings right wing Jim Fox for Kings games on FOX Sports West (now Bally Sports West). Overall Miller called 3,353 Kings games including his final two telecasts on April 8 at STAPLES Center and April 9 in Anaheim.

On November 13, 2000, Miller received the Foster Hewitt Award, as selected by the NHL Professional Broadcasters' Association. This award, which recognizes those members of the radio and television industry who have made outstanding contributions to their profession and the game during their hockey broadcasting careers, is recognized by a plaque in the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto. In 2018

he was honored with a statue outside the arena and a banner that hangs in the rafters at Crypto.com Arena along with the club's six retired player jerseys (Dustin Brown's jersey is being retired in February of 2023).

On October 2, 2006, Miller received a star on the famous Hollywood Boulevard Walk of Fame. On February 4, 2002, Miller was inducted into the Southern California Sports Broadcasters Hall of Fame, where he served as that organization's President for five years. Miller has also been named the top Television Play-by-Play Announcer in Southern California 10 times (including 2015), and in 2014 he earned that club's Special Achievement Award. In 2011, Miller was inducted into the California Sports Hall of Fame and in 2017 the Television Academy selected Miller as the recipient of the Governor's Award.

In 1998, to commemorate his 25 years of loyal service to the organization, Miller was honored by having the STAPLES Center press box named after him and was presented with a "lifetime contract" by the club, and in 1997, Miller was named as one of the six inaugural members of the Kings Hall of Fame during the organization's 30th Anniversary celebration. The National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association also named him the California Sportscaster of the Year in 1997 and 2002.

In 2013, Miller's second book – Tales from the Los Angeles Kings Locker Room – was released. In 2006 he authored the book, Bob Miller's Tales from the Los Angeles Kings.

A native of Chicago, Miller received his degree at the University of Iowa where he started his broadcasting career doing Hawkeye football and basketball games. Before joining the Kings, he worked professionally in radio and TV in Milwaukee and Madison, Wisconsin, and was the voice of University of Wisconsin hockey, football and basketball. In 1992, Miller received the honor of being inducted into Wisconsin's Hockey Hall of Fame.

Along with his duties for the Kings, Miller's voice has accented numerous TV and film projects, including "Cheers," "Rollerball," "Miracle on Ice," "The Mighty Ducks" and "The Mighty Ducks 2."

Upon retirement, Miller was officially named a Kings Team Ambassador. Within a year of his retirement, Miller received the statue and banner from the Kings, and he was also honored with: the L.A. Area Emmy's Governor Award from the Television Academy; the Jim Murray Memorial Foundation Lifetime Achievement Award; the Radio-TV News Association Lifetime Achievement Award; the Bill Sharman Humanitarian Award; the So. California Star of the Valley Award; the National Sports Media Association Lifetime Achievement Award; an L.A. City Council Commendation; the State of California 18th Senate District Certificate of Recognition; the California Legislative Assembly Certificate of Recognition; a County of Los Angeles Commendation; the California Legislative Assembly Certificate of Recognition; the So. California Sports Broadcasters Vin Scully Lifetime Achievement Award; and the L.A. Sports Council Lifetime Achievement Award, just the third recipient of that honor following Vin Scully and Peter Ueberroth.

A resident of Simi Valley, Bob and his wife Judy have a married daughter, Kristin, a son Kevin, and they have two grandsons, Kaden and Brennon.

He was named Senior Vice President, Communications and Broadcasting prior to the start of the 2003-04 season and, while continuing to oversee the Kings Communications and Broadcasting departments, he led the Kings' efforts in the creation of an internal video and content production department which not only supported the Kings' popular on-line video platform – then-called Kings Vision – but also developed content for all Kings business entities. In addition, Altieri was actively involved in the concept and launch of LAKingsinsider.com.

Altieri was also part of the Kings leadership team that helped execute two successful Stanley Cup Finals (2012 and 2014), three Kings outdoor hockey games in 2014, 2015 and 2020, and the 2017 NHL All-Star Weekend in Los Angeles.

Prior to the Kings, Altieri, a graduate of California State University, Long Beach, served as Director of Public Relations for Forum Sports, Inc. (1993-95), where he promoted special events including professional roller hockey, indoor soccer, professional tennis, and volleyball exhibitions. He also served as a Public Relations Assistant for the Los Angeles Lakers from 1992-95. He resides in Torrance with his wife Milli.

Shawn May is in his 14th season working in the NHL and third year with the Kings as the Director of Hockey Communications.

Prior to joining the Kings in 2024, May previously served as Manager of Hockey Communications for the Edmonton Oilers for 12 seasons. His main responsibilities include overseeing the hockey communications staff on all player media requests and he works closely with the Kings' hockey operations department to manage all key hockey announcements, as well as media requests for coaches and management.

May has worked in the professional sports communications field for 14 years. Since beginning to work for NHL member clubs, he has worked numerous NHL Drafts and All-Star games, as well as worked closely with players and team staff on daily media requests and overseeing player community appearances.

Following the 2021 and 2023 NHL seasons, May and the Oilers communications team were named recipients of the Dick Dillman Award for the NHL's North division (2021) and Western Conference (2023), presented annually by the PWHA to honor the work of outstanding NHL public relations staffs.

HISTORY OF AEG AND ITS HOCKEY SPORTS PROPERTIES

ONTARIO REIGN

AEG History – Officially became a property of AEG in 2008 and elevated to the American Hockey League prior to the 2015-16 season. This year the team celebrates its 16th season.

Team History – The Ontario Reign proudly served as the ECHL affiliate of the Kings for several seasons before becoming the organization's primary minor league affiliate prior to the 2015-16 season. In their first AHL season, the Reign captured Pacific Division and Western Conference regular-season titles and advanced to the Western Conference Finals in the Calder Cup Playoffs. The Reign went on to qualify for the playoffs in each of the following two seasons, reaching the Pacific Division Semifinals. The Reign hosted the 2020 AHL All-Star Classic, the first time the event was ever held in California, and celebrated the 15th anniversary of professional hockey in the Inland Empire during the 2022-23 season. The Reign have ranked in the AHL's top 10 in attendance in all eight of their seasons as the Kings top developmental affiliate, in addition to holding the league's largest season-ticket holder base.

Located 40 miles east of Los Angeles, the Reign play at Toyota Arena and practice at the Toyota Sports Performance Center in El Segundo, where the team held games during the 2020-21 season. The proximity to the Kings benefits both organizations, and in addition to on-ice success, the Reign have set numerous attendance records and have earned several league-wide awards.



EISBAREN BERLIN

AEG History – Acquired by AEG on September 3, 1999, and a 15-time East German Hockey Champion as Dynamo Berlin.

Team History – A record 10-time DEL Champion (2005, 2006, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2021, 2022, 2024), Eisbaren (Polar Bears) Berlin continues to set the standard for excellence as they have also been the top team in the regular season nine times (1998, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2009, 2010, 2012, 2013, 2021). In 2008 they captured the German Cup and in 2010 they were the European Trophy winner.

GARNET "ACE" BAILEY AND MARK BAVIS TRIBUTE



Garnet "Ace" Bailey, who was 53, was set to begin his 33rd season in the NHL as a player or scout. Bailey had enjoyed a tremendous amount of success in both capacities, with seven Stanley Cup rings as proof. Having spent seven years as the Kings' director of pro scouting, Bailey spent the previous 13 years as a scout with the Edmonton Oilers.

Bailey's ability to evaluate NHL talent helped the Oilers to five Stanley Cups in the 1980s. During Edmonton's many great playoff runs, Bailey played the key role of advance scout, supplying detailed information on upcoming opponents.

A veteran of 11 NHL seasons as a player, Bailey broke in with the Boston Bruins during the 1968-69 season and spent five years with the club. While with the Bruins, he was a member of Stanley Cup championship teams in 1969-70 and 1971-72. Bailey also spent parts of two seasons each with the Detroit Red Wings and St. Louis Blues, and three-plus years with the Washington Capitals.

Bailey, who was originally from Lloydminster, Saskatchewan, jumped to the World Hockey Association for the 1978-79 season and joined the Edmonton Oilers, where he was a linemate of teenage phenom Wayne Gretzky.

Ace lived in the Boston suburb of Lynnfield with wife Katherine and son Todd.

The Los Angeles Kings family was deeply shaken and saddened over the loss of Garnet "Ace" Bailey and Mark Bavis, two club scouts who were aboard United Airlines Flight 175 from Boston's Logan Airport on September 11, 2001. Both men sported fantastic personalities and their love for the sport of hockey was evident in their work, and their passion for the Kings helped foster a fun and winning attitude. Both Mark and Ace are incredibly missed indeed.



Mark Bavis, who was 31, was entering his second season as an amateur scout for the Kings. A native of the Boston-area, Bavis played college hockey at Boston University. Prior to joining the Kings he worked as a coach with Chicago of the North American League and as an assistant coach with Harvard of the Eastern College Athletic Conference.

Bavis, who was drafted by the New York Rangers in the ninth round (181st overall) of the 1989 NHL Entry Draft, made his home in West Newton, Massachusetts. He was survived by his mother, Mary; his twin brother, Mike; two brothers, Pat and Johnny; and three sisters, Kelly, Mary Ellen and Kathy.
