BEHIND THE BENCH: The San Jose Sharks made a change behind the bench following the conclusion of the 2023-24 season, naming **Ryan Warsofsky** the 11th head coach in franchise history on June 13. Warsofsky, 36, served as an assistant with San Jose for each of the previous two seasons, overseeing the team's defense and penalty kill. Under his tutelage, Erik Karlsson won the Norris Trophy in 2022-23 while posting the first 100-point season by a NHL defenseman since 1991-92. Most recently, Henry Thrun finished 2023-24 ranked third among rookie defensemen in PK time on ice and 10th among the group in scoring.

Prior to joining the Sharks, Warsofsky won the AHL's Calder Cup as head coach of the Chicago Wolves in 2021-22. It was his second league championship, following a 2018 title while serving as an assistant coach with the Charlotte Checkers.

HERE'S GRANNY: Center Mikael Granlund capped the 2023-24 season on a high note, setting a career long and Sharks franchise record for longest point streak by a forward as he found the score sheet in each of the final 13 games of the year (two goals, 13 assists). His run finished one shy of the team's longest-ever point streak, set by Erik Karlsson in his Norris Trophy-winning season, 2022-23. Granlund, named Sharks Player of the Year by Bay Area media, scored 31 points (seven goals, 24 assists) over his final 30 games played and led the team in points (60) and assists (48). He logged a team-best 14 multi-point contests and appeared his milestone 800th career NHL game, March 9 against Ottawa. Granlund, who leads all active Finnish skaters in games played, hit the 60-point and 40-assist threshold for the fourth time in his career last season. He logged his 500th career point on Dec. 7 at Detroit and a day later was named NHLPA Player of the Week after tallying nine points (two goals, seven assists) in four games to start the month of December.

FREE WILLY: Sharks forward **William Eklund** had a strong first full season of NHL action, the Swedish forward posting a breakout campaign with 45 points (16 goals, 29 assists) in 80 contests, finishing the season ranked second on the club in points and tied for second in goals. Eklund, who completed the schedule with points in eight of the final 10 games, recorded his first professional hat trick with three goals, including overtime, game-winner, in a 3-2 victory over St. Louis on April 6. The hat trick punctuated a 10-game home point streak for the forward, finishing two shy of matching San Jose's team record of 12 set by Brent Burns in 2017-18. He was the youngest Shark to ever tally points in at least nine consecutive games and was the first Shark age 21 or younger to hit eight games since Pat Falloon the year, paced the team in power-play goals (8) and game-winning goals (5). He was second on San Jose with 16 power-play points.

YOU ZETTER BELIEVE IT: Forward Fabian Zetterlund, acquired at the 2023 NHL Trade Deadline, set career highs in all scoring categories with a team-high 24 goals to go with 20 assists for 44 points. He was the lone Sharks iron man, appearing in all 82 games, and was the third Sharks skater to reach the 40-point mark on the year, coming on an assist on April 7 against Arizona. The Swedish forward finished the year with 12 points (six goals, six assists) in the final

SJS 2, VGK 4... Macklin Celebrini (1g, 1a) and **Luca Cagnoni** (0g, 2a) each recorded multi-point games while Sharks newcome **Tyler Toffoli** (1g, 0a) also lit the lamp in the contest. **Sam Dickinson**, selected in the first round of the 2024 draft, led San Jose skaters with 20:22 TOI.

GAME 2 RECAP

SJS 3, ANA 4... Jake Walman (0g, 2a) and Danil Gushchin (1g, 1a) each posted two points in their respective 2023-24 preseason debuts. Alexander Wennberg (1g, 0a) lit the lamp in his first game in teal and Jack Thompson (1g, 0a) found the back of the net in the contest. Goaltender Vitek Vanecek saw his first game action since February and turned away 11 of 12 shots faced.

GAME 3 RECAP

SJS 3, ANA 2 (OT)... Luca Cagnoni (1g, 0a) registered his first goal of the preseason, an overtime gamewinner. **Danil Gushchin** (0g, 2a) and **Ethan Cardwell** (0g, 2a) each registered a pair of assists and **Klim Kostin** notched two points of his own (1g, 1a). **Georgi Romanov** made 32 saves on 34 shots faced in the win.

GAME 4 RECAP

SJS 1, UTA 3 ... Matt Benning (1g, 0a) scored his first goal of the preseason, opening the scoring in the second period. William Eklund (0g, 1a) and Andrew Poturalski (0g, 1a) each tallied their first respective points of the preseason with assists on the score. Mackenzie Blackwood made 22 saves in the contest.

14 games, a stretch that started with a three-point effort against Chicago to match his career high for single-game points. He was one of only 18 NHL skaters age 24 or younger to score 24 or more goals on the season.

NEW SHARKS IN THE BAY: San Jose made one of the splash signings on July 1, inking forward **Tyler Toffoli** to a four-year deal. bringing in the 2014 Stanley Cup champion and three-time 30-goal scorer into the fold as another veteran presence and proven scorer to help on the front end. Additionally, center **Alexander Wennberg** signed a two-year deal at the opening of free agency, adding to the team's depth down the middle. Forwards **Ty Dellandrea** and **Carl Grundstrom** were acquired via trade from Dallas and Los Angeles, respectively, and **Barclay Goodrow** was claimed off waivers from the New York Rangers in June.

Along the blue line, San Jose added veteran presence **Cody Ceci** from Edmonton, joining the team alone with a third-round pick in the 2025 NHL Draft in exchange for Ty Emberson in an August 18 swap with Edmonton as well as acquiring **Jake Walman**, who has appeared in 202 NHL contests, along with a 2025 second-round pick from Detroit in a future considerations deal on June 25.

In goal, Vitek Vanecek and Yaroslav Askarov will both look to factor into the action this season, Vanecek being acquired at the 2024 NHL Trade Deadline but unable to play due to injury and Askarov joining the organization via trade after two stellar seasons with Milwaukee (AHL).

THE FUTURE IS TEAL: Following two seasons that saw San Jose continue to add to its young franchise core through free agency, the NHL Draft and a blockbuster trade, the Sharks' future is looking arguably as bright as any in the NHL. Lauded as one of the top prospect pipelines in the league, San Jose inked 2023 first-round pick **Will Smith** (fourth overall) and 2024 first-overall selection **Macklin Celebrini** (first overall), acquired top goaltending prospect **Yaroslav Askarov** from Nashville in August and return 2023-24 NHL contributors **William Eklund** (21 years old), **Collin Graf** (21 years old), **Thomas Bordeleau** (22 years old), **Henry Thrun** (23 years old) and **Fabian Zetterlund** (25 years old).

Additional depth comes from several prospects who made significant leaps last year with their junior clubs, including forward **Quentin Musty** (19 years old), who led the OHL with 1.92 points per game adn was one of five OHL skaters to hit the century mark in scoring last year (102 points), **Kasper Halttunen** (19 years old), who enjoyed a strong first season in North America, punctuated by back-to-back hat tricks and eight total goals in a four-game championship series sweep with London (OHL), and **Luca Cagnoni** (19 years old), whose 90 points with Portland were the most by a WHL defenseman since 1993-94.

With the Barracuda, forward **Danil Gushchin** (22 years old) posted another strong season on the offensive end with 54 points (20 goals, 34 assists) in 56 games. He was selected to participate in the AHL All-Star Classic but could not participate due to injury. Defenseman **Shakir Mukhamadullin** (22 years old), who made his NHL debut and played in three games with the Sharks last season, tallied 34 points in his first full AHL campaign and played in the AHL All-Star Classic at Tech CU Arena. Forward **Ethan Cardwell** (22 years old) finished the year 13th among league rookies in scoring, tallying 43 points (23 goals, 20 assists), and defenseman **Jack Thompson** (22 years old) tied for 11th among league defensemen in scoring with 41 points (six goals, 35 assists) in 62 games. **Filip Bystedt** (20 years old) join the AHL club during the home stretch of the campaign and finished his brief first taste of North American hockey with seven points (four goals, three assists) in eight games, including three points with two goals in his debut on April 3.

RETURN OF THE MACK: San Jose made history with their first-ever, first-overall selection on June 28, 2024, selecting Boston University center Macklin Celebrini with the top pick in the NHL Draft. The consensus top player in the draft became the youngest-ever winner of the Hobey Baker Memorial Award, given to the top player in college hockey, last season after posting 64 points (32 goals, 32 assists) in 38 games and helping the Terriers reach the Frozen Four. Celebrini earned nearly every possible honor available for a collegiate freshman, including the Hobey Baker, Tim Taylor Award (given annually to the best rookie in college hockey), AHCA NCAA East First Team All-America, Hockey East Player of the Year, Hockey East Rookie of the Year, Hockey East First All-Star Team, Hockey East All-Rookie Team and Hockey East All-Tournament Team. Prior to attending BU, Celebrini tore up the USHL with the Chicago Steel, winning league Player of the Year and Rookie fo the Year honors after leading the circuit in points (86) and goals (46) in 2022-23. Celebrini skated with the San Jose Jr. Sharks in 2019-20, totaling 101 points (54 goals, 47 assists) in 61 games.

GETTIN' JIGGY WITH IT: Sharks forward **Will Smith** logged one of the best freshman seasons in NCAA history last season at Boston College, leading the Golden Eagles to Hockey East regular season and tournament championships and an appearance in the National Championship Game. He led the nation in scoring with 71 points (25 goals, 46 assists) with a long list of honors including AHCA First-Team All-America, NCAA Frozen Four All-Tournament Team, Hockey East Tournament MVP, Hockey East All-Tournament Team, Hockey East Tournament MVP, Hockey East All-Tournament Team, Hockey East First All-Star Team and Hockey East All-Rookie Team. His scoring total tied Jack Eichel (2014-15, Boston Univ.) as most by a NCAA U-19 skater since 1993-94. In international competition, Smith helped Team USA win a Gold Medal at the World Junior Championship, tallying two assists in the Gold Medal Game and finishing the tournament with points in each of the final six contests. The 2023-24 Sharks Prospect of the Year, presented by Kaiser Permanente, also represented the national team at the IIHF World Championship, appearing in five games. Smith, selected fourth overall in the 2023 NHL Draft, signed his entry-level deal on May 28, 2024.

GOING IN THE RAFTERS: Two years after retiring Patrick Marleau's No. 12 jersey, the San Jose Sharks will be adding No. 19 to the rafters in honor of **Joe Thornton**'s legendary career. One of the greatest playmakers in NHL history, Thornton remains San Jose's all-time leader in assists (804) and power play points (402), ranks second in club history in scoring (1,055 points) and even-strength points (645), is third with 1,104 games played and is fourth in all-time goals (251) and game-winning goals (40).

Thornton registered the only 100-point season by a forward in club history, finishing 2006-07 with 114, including a team-record 92 assists). He won the Art Ross and Hart Memorial trophies in 2005-06, the season he was acquired from Boston, after leading the NHL with 125 points (29 goals, 96 assists). The forward was selected to the NHL First All-Star Team that season, was a member of the Second All-Star Team three times and was selected to participate in the league's All-Star Game four times. He won two Olympic gold medals (2006, 2010) and two World Cup golds (2004, 2016).

In the NHL's all-time ranks, Thornton's 1,714 career games is the sixth-most in the league's history and he ranks seventh all-time in assists (1,109), 11th in even strength points (979), 14th in career points (1,539) and 22nd in power play points (548).

The No. 19 will be retired to the SAP Center rafters on Saturday, Nov. 23 as the Sharks host the Buffalo Sabres.

LAST ANAHEIM DUCKS PRESEASON GAME: Oct. 2, 2024 – ANAHEIM 5 vs. UTAH 2

The Ducks won their second preseason contest of 2024 with a 5-2 win over Utah Hockey Club Wednesday night at Honda Center. Alex Killorn opened the scoring with his goal at 9:13 of the first period and earned an assist for 1-1=2 points on the night. Brock McGinn tallied the Ducks second goal of the night at 2:50 of the second period, with Nathan Gaucher and Radko Gudas earning their first assists of the preseason in the respective debuts. Cutter Gauthier (0:48) and Robby Fabbri (1:38) recorded the Duck's third and fourth goals of the night 50 second apart to open the third period. Leo Carlsson recorded 1-2=3 points for his first multi-point outing, tallying Anaheim's fifth goal along with assists on Killorn and Gauthier's goals. Cam Fowler, Jackson LaCombe, Tristan Luneau and Nikita Nesterenko also registered assists. Lukas Dostal stopped 35-of-37 shots to earn his first win of the preseason.

TONIGHT'S GAME

The Anaheim Ducks conclude their 2024 preseason schedule tonight when the club visits the San Jose Sharks for the second time at SAP Center, the third meeting between the clubs this preseason (7 p.m. PT). Anaheim has posted a 94-93-25 record in all-time exhibitions, including a 57-45-8 record on home ice and 37-48-17 mark on the road. Facing San Jose in exhibition contests, the Ducks have posted a 27-18-4 record, including an 18-6-2 at home (9-12-2 mark in San Jose).

GUDAS NAMED DUCKS CAPTAIN

The Ducks named defenseman **Radko Gudas** team captain Sept. 19, the ninth captain in Ducks history and first since Ryan Getzlaf (2010-22). Gudas also becomes the sixth NHL captain from Czechia, joining Peter Stastny (Quebec, 1985-90), Jaromir Jagr (Pittsburgh, 1998-01, and NY Rangers, 2006-08), Patrik Elias (New Jersey, 2006-07), Bobby Holik (Atlanta, 2007-08), Milan Hejduk (Colorado, 2011-12). Gudas, 34, is entering his 13th NHL season and second with Anaheim. In his first season with the club in 2023-24, he recorded 6-12=18 points in 66 games, leading Ducks skaters in plus/minus (+14), hits (232) and blocked shots (154), while also leading Anaheim defensemen in goals (6). The defenseman has collected 39-143=182 points with a +87 rating and 971 PIM in 748 career games with Anaheim (2023-present), Florida (2021-23), Washington (2019-20), Philadelphia (2015-19) and Tampa Bay (2012-15). The Kladno, Czechia native helped his country to a gold medal at the 2024 World Championship on home ice in Prague while serving as an alternate captain.

DUCKS RANKED NO. 1 IN ANNUAL FUTURE WATCH

The Hockey News released its annual Future Watch issue March 8, ranking the Ducks No. 1 in the NHL in a poll of top 21and-under NHLers plus prospects (ranked by a panel of NHL scouts). Anaheim received an 'A' letter grade for 2024, with the Ducks the only team to achieve a grade this high in this issue of Future Watch. Anaheim is the only franchise to achieve an 'A' grade each of the past two editions (A+ in 2023 Future Watch). The Ducks have been ranked first in two of the last three Future Watch issues (also 2022) and were second despite an A+ rating in 2023. Among al NHL clubs ranked in Future Watch, Anaheim is first in five-year average position and also 20-year average position. No NHL team has had more top-10 finishes (13), top-five finishes (10) and top-three finishes (eight) than the Ducks over the past 20 years.

WHERE TO WATCH

The Ducks recently announced new media partnerships with Victory+ and FOX 11 Plus (KCOP Channel 13) to stream/televise all regional games at no cost to fans beginning this season. All local games will be available to stream on a newly formed network, Victory+, a free direct-to-consumer streaming service created for Ducks fans by APMC. The agreement with FOX 11 Plus will include 65 Ducks games on over-the-air television. As a result, locally broadcast Ducks games will be available to 100% of the Los Angeles regional market, entirely free to all fans. Tonight's contest marks the first game on both networks.

ROSTER REPORT

The Ducks opened their 2024 Training Camp presented by OC Navigator on Thursday, Sept. 19 with 66 players (39 forwards, 20 defensemen and seven goaltenders). Anaheim has made x cuts to the roster, including four Oct. 1, trimming the roster to 33 players (18 forwards, 10 defensemen and five goaltenders). The roster currently features eight Anaheim first-round selections (seven the past six drafts) and 15 Anaheim draft selections overall.

NEW FACES

Over the offseason, Anaheim added four players through trades and free agency, including defenseman **Brian Dumoulin**, centers **Robby Fabbri** and **Jansen Harkins**, and right wing **Carson Meyer**.

- Brian Dumoulin (acquired from Seattle for a 2026 4th round pick, July 2
 - Won back-to-back Stanley Cups with Pittsburgh in 2016 and 2017. In his 11th NHL season with Seattle in 2023-24, set a single-season career high of six goals and had 6-10=16 points with a +3 rating in 80 games.
- Robby Fabbri (acquired from Detroit with a 2025 4th round pick for G Gage Alexander, July 5)
 - Won a Stanley Cup St. Louis in 2018. In his ninth NHL season and fifth with Detroit in 2023-24, tied a career high with 18 goals, totaling 18-14=32 points in 68 games.
- Jansen Harkins (signed to a two-year contract, July 2)
 - Split 2023-24 between Pittsburgh and Wilkes-Barre/Scranton (AHL). Had four points (0-4=4) in 45 NHL games with the Penguins and 5-7=12 points in 14 AHL games with the Penguins.
- Carson Meyer (signed to a one-year, two-way contract, July 3)
 - Split last season between Columbus and Cleveland (AHL). Had 1-1=2 points in 14 NHL games and set AHL career highs in points (22-15=37) and goals in 55 AHL contests.

NEW-LOOK COACHING STAFF

Anaheim's 2024 Training Camp will feature three new members of Greg Cronin's coaching staff. **Richard Clune** joined as Assistant Coach June 21, while **Tim Army** (Assistant Coach) and **Peter Budaj** (Goaltending Coach) were named to their roles July 10. **Sudarshan Maharaj** was promoted to Director of Goaltending July 10 (formerly Goaltending Coach), overseeing all aspects of the club's goaltending (coaching, development and scouting). The Ducks' 2024-25 coaching staff includes Head Coach **Greg Cronin**, Assistant Coaches **Tim Army**, **Richard Clune** and **Brent Thompson**, Goaltending Coach **Peter Budaj** and Video Coordinator **Austin Violette**.

2024-25 REGULAR-SEASON SCHEDULE

The Ducks will begin the regular season with consecutive road games Saturday, Oct. 12 vs. San Jose (7 p.m.) and at Vegas Sunday, Oct. 13 (7 p.m.). The season opening back-to-back is the second straight campaign Anaheim opens with consecutive games. The club's home opener is Wednesday, Oct. 16 in the first-ever matchup vs. Utah Hockey Club (7 p.m.) and the regular-season Honda Center debut of the club's new primary uniforms. Anaheim will host 23 home weekend dates, including nine Friday, three Saturday and 11 Sunday contests.



DUCKS-SHARKS

Anaheim and San Jose conclude their preseason schedule with the third of three preseason matchups in 2024, the second contest at SAP Center. The three games mark the most times Anaheim will face an opponent this preseason. Last season, Anaheim posted a 3-1-0 record in the four regular-season matchups in 2023-24, outscoring the Sharks by a 16-12 margin. In the regular season, the club will meet three times, with the Ducks opening their 2024-25 regular season schedule against the Sharks at SAP Center Saturday, Oct. 12 (7 p.m.). The teams will meet twice in an 11-day span, with Anaheim featuring a matchup vs. San Jose on Tuesday, Oct. 22 at Honda Center.
