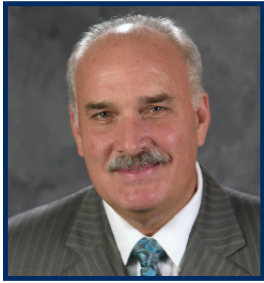

JOHN DAVIDSON PRESIDENT OF HOCKEY OPERATIONS, ALTERNATE GOVERNOR

John Davidson was named president of hockey operations and alternate governor of the Columbus Blue Jackets in October 2012 and in his role oversees all hockey operations activities for the club. In his six seasons with the team, Columbus has posted a 193-148-35 record (.560), including a franchise record 50-24-8 (108 pts) in 2016-17, back-to-back 40-win campaigns in 2013-14 and 2014-15 and three consecutive winning seasons for the first time in franchise history from 2012-15 and a pair of Stanley Cup Playoff berths.

The Blue Jackets went 42-35-5 (89 pts.) in 2014-15, earning the third-most wins and fourth-most points in club history. That came a season after the Jackets went 43-32-7 (93 pts.) in 2013-14 to set then-franchise records for wins and points.

He joined the Blue Jackets after serving as the president of hockey operations of the St. Louis Blues from 2006-12. During his tenure, the Blues averaged 39 wins and 90 points, including a 49-22-11 record, 109 points and a Central Division title in 2011-12.

One of hockey's most respected figures and the current chairman of the Hockey Hall of Fame selection committee, Davidson has enjoyed a long and distinguished career that spans four decades. Prior to his successful stint with the Blues, he was the longtime analyst for New York Rangers games on Madison Square Garden Network (MSG), as well as various NHL national broadcast partners in the United States and Canada. His outstanding work during a 20-plus year broadcasting career earned him numerous honors.

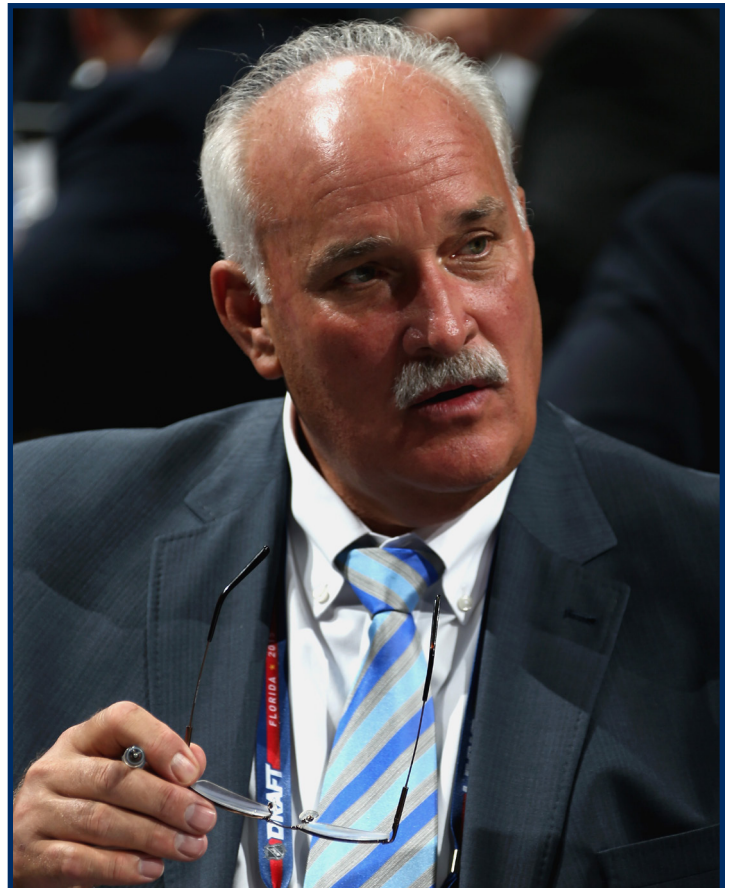
In 2009, he received the prestigious Foster Hewitt Memorial Award for outstanding contributions as a hockey broadcaster by The Hockey Hall of Fame and was inducted on Nov. 9, 2009. The NHL and USA Hockey honored Davidson with the Lester Patrick Award for his contributions to ice hockey in the United States in March 2004. He also won two New York Emmy Awards for "Outstanding On-Camera Achievement" in 2001 and 1995 and was part of MSG's Rangers broadcast team that won the CableACE Award for "Outstanding Live Event Coverage" in 1994.

Davidson began his broadcast career with MSG in 1983 and then spent two years on the popular "Hockey Night in Canada" from 1984-86. He rejoined MSG prior to the 1986-87 season, beginning a partnership with Rangers play-by-play announcer Sam Rosen that concluded following the 2005-06 season. During that time, Davidson also served as NBC's analyst for the NHL All-Star Game from 1990-93 and was lead analyst for the network's hockey coverage at the 1992 (Albertville, France), 1994 (Lillehammer, Norway), 1998 (Nagano, Japan), 2002 (Salt Lake City) and 2006 (Torino, Italy) Winter Olympic Games. He worked for TBS at the 1990 Goodwill Games, contributed to ABC's coverage of the NHL in 1994 and served on the number-one broadcast team with Mike Emrick for FOX's coverage of the NHL regular season, All-Star Games and Stanley Cup Playoffs and Finals from 1995-1999.

In addition, his work included several All-Star Games and Stanley Cup Finals for OLN, ESPN and SportsChannel, the 1991 Canada Cup for "Hockey Night in Canada" and the 1996 World Cup of Hockey for FX. He served as ESPN's studio analyst for the 1993 Stanley Cup Playoffs. The 2005-06 season marked his final season in the broadcast booth on OLN (now NBC Sports Network) and NBC.

Davidson enjoyed a successful junior career as a goaltender with the Calgary Centennials prior to being selected by the Blues with their first pick, fifth overall, in the 1973 Entry Draft. That year, he became the first goaltender to go directly from junior hockey to the NHL as he appeared in 39 games with St. Louis during the 1973-74 season. After two years with the Blues, he joined the Rangers in June 1975 and went on to play eight seasons in New York. In 1978-79, he went 20-15-4 with a 3.52 goals-against average in 39 games and then went 11-7 with a 2.28 goals-against average in 18 playoff games to lead the Rangers to the Stanley Cup Finals. He was forced to retire due to injuries during the 1982-83 season.

Davidson was born on Feb. 27, 1953 in Ottawa, Ontario and raised in Calgary, Alberta. He and his wife, Diana, are the parents of two daughters, Lindsay and Ashley, and welcomed two grandsons in the last year.





JARMO KEKALAINEN GENERAL MANAGER

Jarmo Kekalainen was named the third general manager in Columbus Blue Jackets history on February 13, 2013. Since his arrival, the Blue Jackets have enjoyed their best stretch in club history, posting the best record in franchise history in 2016-17 (50-24-8; 108 pts), back-to-back 40-win campaigns in 2013-14 and 2014-15, three-straight winning seasons for the first time in franchise history from 2012-15 and a pair of Stanley Cup Playoff berths. The Jackets finished 42-35-5 (89 pts.) in 2014-15, following a franchise record-breaking 2013-14 season in which they set then-club records for wins and points with a 43-32-7 mark (93 pts.).

Kekalainen served as assistant general manager for Finland's World Cup of Hockey 2016 team and at the 2014 Olympic Games in Sochi, Russia, where the squad won a bronze medal. He arrived in Columbus after serving as the president and general manager of Jokerit in the Finnish Elite League from 2010-13.

Prior to his stint with Jokerit, Kekalainen spent eight seasons with the St. Louis Blues from 2002-10. He joined the Blues as director of amateur scouting and was named assistant general manager and director of amateur scouting in 2005. In that role, he was involved in all facets of hockey operations, including professional scouting efforts and overseeing the club's amateur scouting and draft preparations. During his eight years in St. Louis, the Blues drafted players such as David Backes, Roman Polak, David Perron, T.J. Oshie, Patrik Berglund and Alex Pietrangelo.

Kekalainen was a member of the Ottawa Senators organization from 1995 to 2002, serving as director of player personnel for three years and also overseeing the amateur draft and the club's scouting efforts in Europe. While working with the Senators, he also served as general manager of HIFK Helsinki in the Finnish Elite League from 1995 to 1999 and led the club to the league championship in 1998.

As a player, Kekalainen appeared in 55 career NHL games with the Senators and Boston Bruins during a six-year career. A left wing, he scored five goals and added eight assists for 13 points with 28 penalty minutes, including a career-high 1-5-6 and 14 penalty minutes in 28 games with the Senators during the 1993-94 season. He also played in the American Hockey League and his native Finland before wrapping up his playing career with Vasteras IK in the Swedish Elite League in 1994-95.

Before signing with the Bruins, Kekalainen played two seasons at Clarkson University from 1987-89. He was named to the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference First All-Star Team after tallying 19-25-44 and 47 penalty minutes in 31 games during the 1988-89 season. He also represented Finland at the 1986 World Junior Championships and the 1991 Canada Cup Tournament.

Kekalainen was born on July 3, 1966 in Tampere, Finland. He has a bachelor's degree in management from Clarkson University and a master's in business marketing from the University of Tampere.

He and his wife, Tiina, are the parents of daughters, Emilia and Sofia.





BILL ZITO

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Bill Zito was named assistant general manager of the Columbus Blue Jackets on Aug. 12, 2013 and brings nearly three decades of experience encompassing a variety of aspects of the game of hockey to the organization. Since joining the Blue Jackets, he has been an integral part of the club's management team in the areas of contract negotiations, scouting and player evaluation, salary cap management and budgeting. He also is the general manager of the 2016 Calder Cup champion Lake Erie Monsters, Columbus' American

Hockey League affiliate, and was a member of the management team for the USA Hockey National Team that won a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF World Hockey Championships.

Zito joined the Blue Jackets after using scouting as a platform to build Acme World Sports into one of the top hockey agencies in the business. In 2013, Forbes ranked Acme as the eighth-most valuable hockey agency in the world with almost \$200 million in contracts under management. In 2007, The Hockey News lauded Zito in their "genius" issue for his scouting prowess, noting his ability to uncover late-round or undrafted, lesser-known players as well as the top picks. As the agency's founder and president, he represented players such as Vezina Trophy and Conn Smythe Trophy winner Tim Thomas, Vezina Trophy winner Tuukka Rask, Vezina Trophy finalist Antti Niemi and All-Stars Kimmo Timonen and Brian Rafalski.

He is a graduate of Yale University, where he played varsity hockey from 1984-87. After a one-year stint playing hockey in Europe, Zito attended law school at the University of Wisconsin and during that time served as an assistant coach for the Badgers hockey team. Upon earning his law degree, he practiced appellate litigation and sports law in Chicago before founding Acme in 1995.

Zito was born on September 16, 1964 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He and his wife, Julie, are the parents of twin daughters, Gigi and Frankie, and son, Billy.



BASIL McRAE

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Basil McRae was named the Blue Jackets' director of player personnel on July 6, 2016, rejoining the club after originally serving as a scout in 2013-14.

McRae, who has been a part owner of the Ontario Hockey League's London Knights since 2000, also spent the past two years as alternate governor and general manager of the club. Last season, London captured OHL and Memorial Cup championships. Prior to his original stint in Columbus, McRae served as a scout for the St. Louis Blues for five seasons.

In addition to nearly two decades of scouting experience, McRae played 16 seasons in the NHL between 1981-96, registering 53 goals and 83 assists for 136 points with 2,457 penalty minutes in 576 games with the Quebec Nordiques, Toronto Maple Leafs, Detroit Red Wings, Minnesota North Stars, Tampa Bay Lightning, St. Louis Blues and Chicago Blackhawks. The Beaverton, Ontario native was a fifth-round pick of Quebec in the 1980 NHL Draft.

He and his wife, Jill, are the parents of son, Philip, and daughters, Alexandra and Abigail.



JOSH FLYNN

DIRECTOR OF HOCKEY ADMINISTRATION

Josh Flynn is the director of hockey administration for the Columbus Blue Jackets. He is responsible for assisting in all facets of the hockey operations department, including salary cap management, contract negotiations and research, salary arbitration, statistical research and strategic planning, and he is the club's liaison to the National Hockey League regarding matters pertaining to the NHL-NHLPA collective bargaining agreement.

Flynn joined the Blue Jackets hockey operations department in June 2008 after spending the previous two seasons with KO Sports Agency in Denver, Colorado, where he worked on contract negotiations for several NHL players represented by the agency.

Flynn was born on December 8, 1982 in Toronto, Ontario. He received a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Toronto in 2004 and earned his Juris Doctorate from the Sturm College of Law at the University of Denver in 2007.



FREDRIK MODIN HOCKEY OPERATIONS ADVISOR

Former Columbus Blue Jackets forward Fredrik Modin joined the organization as a hockey operations advisor prior to the 2015-16 season.

Modin notched 232-230-462 and 453 penalty minutes in 898 career NHL games with the Blue Jackets, Toronto Maple Leafs, Tampa Bay Lightning, Los Angeles Kings, Atlanta Thrashers and Calgary Flames. He appeared in 176 games with Columbus between 2006-10 and tallied 39-46-85 and 110 penalty minutes while also serving as an alternate captain from 2008-10. He spent six seasons with the Lightning, collecting 145-141-286 and 224 penalty minutes in 445 games from

1999-2006, helping the club capture the franchise's first Stanley Cup in 2004.

Toronto's third pick, 64th overall, in the 1994 Draft, Modin played in two seasons with Brynass IF Gavle in the Swedish Hockey League before beginning his NHL career with the Maple Leafs in 1996-97. He also represented Sweden at various world tournaments, becoming a member of the Triple Gold Club after capturing gold at the 1998 IIHF World Championships and 2006 Olympic Games to go with the Stanley Cup in 2004. Modin also participated at the 2010 Olympics and 1996, 2000 and 2001 IIHF World Championships.

He and his wife, Linda are the parents of son, Jesper, and daughter, Ida. The family resides in Dublin, Ohio.



VILLE SIREN DIRECTOR OF AMATEUR SCOUTING

Ville Siren was named director of amateur scouting of the Columbus Blue Jackets on July 6, 2016 after serving as the club's head amateur scout since joining the club on July 8, 2013.

Siren spent nine seasons as a member of the St. Louis Blues scouting staff from 2003-13. During that time, he was instrumental in the club's selection of current NHL players such as Vladimir Tarasenko (1st Rd., 2010), Lars Eller (1st Rd., 2007), Patrik Berglund (1st Rd., 2006), Nikita Nikitin (5th Rd., 2004) and Roman Polak (6th Rd., 2004).

Prior to joining the Blues, he spent the 2002-03 season working with Tampere of the Finnish Elite League and scouted for the Washington Capitals from 1999-2002. A defenseman, Siren was selected by the Hartford Whalers in the second round, 23rd overall, of the 1983 NHL Draft and made his NHL debut with the Pittsburgh Penguins during the 1985-86 season. He went on to register 14 goals and 68 assists for 82 points with 276 penalty minutes in 290 career NHL games with the Penguins and Minnesota North Stars from 1985-90.

He also played nine seasons in Finland, Sweden and Switzerland before retiring in 1999, and represented Finland in numerous international competitions including the 1984 and 1992 Olympic Games, 1987 and 1991 Canada Cup tournaments, 1983 and 1984 World Junior Championships and 1985, 1991 and 1993 World Championships. Siren was born on Feb. 11, 1964 in Tampere, Finland. He is the father of a son, Viktor.



JOSEF BOUMEDIENNE DIRECTOR OF EUROPEAN SCOUTING

Josef Boumedienne was promoted to director of European scouting on July 6, 2016 after originally joining the Blue Jackets as its European scout on July 8, 2013.

season, but that simply makes him human. "I don't see a better player in this draft," said a scout. "He's not a generational player, he's not a superstar, but he's a really, really good player."

He's also a player who has been plagued by a host of injuries in his draft year, which might scare some teams off, but it could also be a case of bad fortune that is befalling him all at once. Prior to getting injured this season (sports hernia surgery last summer and later an unrelated abdominal injury), he was a 100-point player, and had been born four days earlier, he probably would have been a top-three selection in last year's draft.

And aside from an inability to stay healthy this season, there are no flaws in his game. "Try to find a deficiency," said another scout. "Every important box you want checked is checked."

WJC with a virtuoso performance that saw him nearly take out the eventual champs from Team USA by himself. "It's hard not to give Hischier his due," said one scout. "The way he played at the world juniors with a less-than-ideal supporting cast was impressive."

It's also tempting to compare him with previous Mooseheads imports, as the franchise has been adept at finding European talent. Nikolaj Ehlers had a similar impact, though what Hischier accomplished might be more impressive. "The difference is Ehlers had a strong team," said another scout. "Halifax was so young, particularly the D-corps. Usually your defensemen get the puck up to you. Sometimes Nico just had to go back and retrieve it himself."

"He doesn't have the speed of Ehlers, but Nico is quick and finds the holes. His hockey IQ is great."

"His hockey sense and awareness of the players around him is outstanding, with or without the puck. There may be some concern about his skating, but he's too smart not to get over that."

Ah yes, the skating. It's the skill Vilardi must improve upon, but talent hawks have seen Mark Stone succeed in the NHL with Ottawa, and they believe Vilardi's skating is already better than Stone's was at the same age. In the meantime, there's a lot to like. "Everyone's on the same page - it's his feet," said another scout. "But his stick is lethal, and the skating will come. The way he scores goals in traffic reminds me of Corey Perry."

Playing in the Memorial Cup will also be a good experience.

He makes plays in tight areas."

"He's going to excel at every level, because he wants it so bad," said one scout. "He's a good kid,

and I'd be shocked if he didn't go top 10. He has a bit of a mean streak. He's 5-foot-10 but doesn't play that way." Makar made a statement while playing for Canada West at the World Jr. A Challenge in December, setting a tournament record for D-men with five points in a win over the Swiss. "The funny thing is that in the first game he was outstanding, and after that he was just good, so you probably have to average it out," said another scout. "The way he thinks the game and moves the puck, I don't think size is that much of an issue."

A great skater and dynamic passer, Makar scorched the Alberta Jr. League and dominated at the Jr. A Top Prospects Game. He's committed to Massachusetts. Makar will be the highest player drafted from the AJHL since Joe Colborne went 16th to Boston in 2008.

NO DOUBT, Finland's entry at the world juniors was disappointing, nearly getting relegated one season after winning gold on home ice. But evaluators were high on Heiskanen's



performance, some considering it better than that of Canucks first-rounder Olli Juolevi. "So smooth," said one scout. "He has ability as a two-way defender and to play under duress. The game is only getting faster, and he's smart enough to keep the flow going."

Heiskanen was just as impressive playing against men in Finland's top league, registering solid minutes and stats. A viral infection/fever caused him to miss time late in the season, but he came back during the playoffs and didn't miss a beat. While Makar and Timothy Liljegren are also options, Heiskanen could be the first blueliner off the board. "I wouldn't be surprised," said another scout. "He's so smooth and skilled. He's not physical, but he goes to the tough areas. He has everything."

Heiskanen will attract attention from major junior teams at the import draft but is likely to continue developing in Finland, where he's in a good situation with HIFK.

goal scorer in this draft, but red flags abound. "Is he Patrick Kane or is he Robbie Schremp?" said a scout. "He is 100 percent accountable 15 feet from the net, but the further he gets and the further outside the middle of the ice he gets, it gets lower."

Tippett has an abundance of NHL attributes - size, skating and shooting are chief among them - and he has a scorer's mentality. But there are questions about his work ethic and hockey sense, and the general feeling is he's going to have to play with a center who will be able to get him the puck. "Right now he scores four of nine from just outside home plate, but in the NHL that will only be two of nine," said another scout. "To get back those two, you're going to have to show a different level of bearing down, a different level of positioning, a different level of execution."

A broken wrist killed the latter part of Rasmussen's season, and Vancouver fans are paranoid, but it's important to remember perspective, especially since there isn't a lot of high-end talent in this draft. "He's easy to like," said another scout. "He's strong and has nice hands around the net. He's an unbelievable net-front presence and finishes checks. Some teams think he's a first-liner. Others see him as a third-liner. He's probably a very good second-liner."

"The way he plays now, he stays out of some of the high-traffic situations," said a scout. "So you have to ask yourself whether it's smart to not put yourself in those situations or is it because he's scared? Only one person can answer that. You have to determine whether it's intelligent self-preservation or it's a lack of accountability."

The feeling is he'll get more physical and involved as he puts on weight and gains strength.

He can play with anyone with intelligence."

By no means is Glass a finished product, but he hung with the best at the CHL Top Prospects Game and continued to produce as Portland upset Prince George in the first round of the WHL playoffs. The ceiling is high, but Glass must keep working. "He's skilled, very smart," said another scout. "He needs to raise his compete level. His work ethic is good, but when it comes to digging in, he has to raise his game."

It's heavy and accurate. It's pretty unreal. And he can get it off from different points. He is slight and a little soft, though."

Tolvanen's challenge? Play bigger but continue to wield that powerful stick.

ability, it's interesting to note Suzuki scored one more goal than Tippett did this season. "I would say he's more of a hard-working, two-way guy with talent than a talented guy who works hard," said one scout.

The sense among scouts is Suzuki gets the short shrift when it comes to his accomplishments and his standing as a prospect. They talk about him being undersized, how he's not flashy and how he's not the greatest skater on the ice, but then you look and see he finished four shy of a 100-point season. He has to think his way through situations rather than rely on his skating, which is usually a lot more difficult. "He doesn't toe-drag anybody, but all he does is be a factor in the game in every way," another scout said. "I think it's ridiculous he's not rated ahead of Owen Tippett."

Still, Kostin's stock could surge or drop depending on the whims of the teams making the picks in the middle third of the first round. There are still certain feelings about Russian players that help or hinder a player's rank. "Every year they seem to have one big, powerful forward that's - not inconsistent, but in and out a bit," said another scout. "He's got size, can skate, has a heavy shot and plays in the tough areas."

"He's a bit of a mess defensively, but he's dynamic and great offensively. His hockey sense may not be where it needs to be."

Eyebrows were raised when Liljegen was passed over for a world junior spot by the younger Rasmus Dahlin (2018), though Liljegen's early season bout with mononucleosis was a factor. While he will slide down from his lofty pre-season perch, talent evaluators are not blind to his charms. "His skill set is right up there," said another scout. "There's a premium on power play defensemen in the game, and he can be that guy."

Just to muddy the waters further, Liljegen was also both good and bad at the world under-18s.

must improve. "There are skating issues because he is still growing, but his motor is really good," said one scout. "I still see him as a two-way defender."

Foote, a dual citizen, played for Canada at the summer world junior camp tourney in Michigan but wasn't allowed to compete for them internationally at the WJC because he had been living in the U.S. for too long. That will change next season.

In the meantime, he'll continue to carve out his own niche with the Rockets. "He's a big, solid defender who can really shoot the puck," said another scout. "He has great poise, reads the game well, uses his stick and can push guys out of the crease. I don't think he's a top power play guy, but he's getting a lot of responsibility there, and I could see him as a second-unit guy in the NHL."

A positive showing at the world under-18s gave scouts a better indication of where he stacked up against his elite peers. They saw a two-way center who showed smarts and a competitive streak. "I don't think he's going to be a high-end scorer," another scout said, "but I think he's going to be a 55- or 60-point guy."

Coming over meant smaller rinks and a culture shift from Finland to Washington state, but it has served his purpose so far. "He has adapted well," said another scout. "He has really improved his skating, and he likes to jump up in to the rush - maybe too much sometimes for me."

Valimaki will return to a growing Tri-City Americans squad next season in what is always a challenging U.S. Division.

"I didn't like the move from Sweden to Finland," said another scout. "The size of ice is different, and he got more confused. You can see he has everything to be a top-six forward. Once he gets drafted, he can relax."
