# HOCKEY OPERATIONS



### **JOHN DAVIDSON** PRESIDENT OF HOCKEY OPERATIONS, ALTERNATE GOVERNOR

John Davidson was named president of hockey operations and alternate governor of the Columbus Blue Jackets in October 2012 and in his role oversees all hockey operations activities for the club.

In his seven seasons, Columbus has gone 238-178-42 (.566), including a franchise-best 50-24-8 record (108 pts) in 2016-17 and 45-30-7 (97 pts.), the second-best mark in club history, in 2017-18. The Jackets have registered 42-plus wins in four of the past five campaigns, had three consecutive winning seasons for the first time from 2012-15 and earned three Stanley Cup Playoff berths.

He joined the Blue Jackets after serving as the president of hockey operations of the St. Louis Blues from 2006-12. During his tenure, the Blues averaged 39 wins and 90 points, including a 49-22-11 record, 109 points and a Central Division title in 2011-12.

One of hockey's most respected figures and the current chairman of the Hockey Hall of Fame selection committee, Davidson has enjoyed a long and distinguished career that spans four decades. Prior to his successful stint with the Blues, he was the longtime analyst for New York Rangers games on Madison Square Garden Network (MSG), as well as various NHL national broadcast partners in the United States and Canada. His outstanding work during a 20-plus year broadcasting career earned him numerous honors.


In 2009, he received the prestigious Foster Hewitt Memorial Award for outstanding contributions as a hockey broadcaster by The Hockey Hall of Fame and was inducted on Nov. 9, 2009. The NHL and USA Hockey honored Davidson with the Lester Patrick Award for his contributions to ice hockey in the United States in March 2004. He also won two New York Emmy Awards for "Outstanding On-Camera Achievement" in 2001 and 1995 and was part of MSG's Rangers broadcast team that won the CableACE Award for "Outstanding Live Event Coverage" in 1994.

Davidson began his broadcast career with MSG in 1983 and then spent two years on the popular "Hockey Night in Canada" from 1984-86. He rejoined MSG prior to the 1986-87 season, beginning a partnership with Rangers play-by-play announcer Sam Rosen that concluded following the 2005-06 season. During that time, Davidson also served as NBC's analyst for the NHL All-Star Game from 1990-93 and was lead analyst for the network's hockey coverage at the 1992 (Albertville, France), 1994 (Lillehammer, Norway), 1998 (Nagano, Japan), 2002 (Salt Lake City) and 2006 (Torino, Italy) Winter Olympic Games. He worked for TBS at the 1990 Goodwill Games, contributed to ABC's coverage of the NHL in 1994 and served on the numberone broadcast team with Mike Emrick for FOX's coverage of the NHL regular season, All-Star Games and Stanley Cup Playoffs and Finals from 1995-1999.

In addition, his work included several All-Star Games and Stanley Cup Finals for OLN, ESPN and SportsChannel, the 1991 Canada Cup for "Hockey Night in Canada" and the 1996 World Cup of Hockey for FX. He served as ESPN's studio analyst for the 1993 Stanley Cup Playoffs. The 2005-06 season marked his final season in the broadcast booth on OLN (now NBC Sports Network) and NBC.

Davidson enjoyed a successful junior career as a goaltender with the Calgary Centennials prior to being selected by the Blues with their first pick, fifth overall, in the 1973 Entry Draft. That year, he became the first goaltender to go directly from junior hockey to the NHL as he appeared in 39 games with St. Louis during the 1973-74 season. After two years with the Blues, he joined the Rangers in June 1975 and went on to play eight seasons in New York. In 1978-79, he went 20-15-4 with a 3.52 goals-against average in 39 games and then went 11-7 with a 2.28 goals-against average in 18 playoff games to lead the Rangers to the Stanley Cup Finals. He was forced to retire due to injuries during the 1982-83 season.

Davidson was born on Feb. 27, 1953 in Ottawa, Ontario and raised in Calgary, Alberta. He and his wife, Diana, are the parents of two daughters, Lindsay and Ashley, and have two grandsons.

### JARMO KEKALAINEN GENERAL MANAGER

Jarmo Kekalainen was named the third general manager in Columbus Blue Jackets history on February 13, 2013. Since his arrival, the Blue Jackets have enjoyed their best stretch in club history,

posting the best record in franchise history in 2016-17 (50-24-8, 108 pts) and the second-best mark in 2017-18 (45-30-7, 97 pts.). Columbus also has registered 42-plus wins in four of the past five campaigns, had three consecutive winning seasons for the first time from 2012-15 and earned three Stanley Cup Playoff berths during his tenure.

Kekalainen has also served as assistant general manager for Finland's World Cup of Hockey 2016 team and at the 2014 Olympic Games in Sochi, Russia, where the squad won a bronze medal. He arrived in Columbus after a stint as the president and general manager of Jokerit in the Finnish Elite League from 2010-13.

Kekalainen spent eight seasons with the St. Louis Blues from 2002-10. He joined the club as director of amateur scouting and was named assistant general manager and director of amateur scouting in 2005. In that role, he was involved in all facets of hockey operations, including professional scouting efforts and overseeing the club's amateur scouting and draft preparations. During his eight years in St. Louis, the Blues drafted players such as David Backes, Roman Polak, David Perron, T.J. Oshie, Patrik Berglund and Alex Pietrangelo.

Kekalainen was a member of the Ottawa Senators organization from 1995-2002, serving as director of player personnel for three years

and also overseeing the amateur draft and the club's scouting efforts in Europe. While working with the Senators, he also served as general manager of IFK Helsinki in the Finnish Elite League from 1995 to 1999 and led the club to the league championship in 1998.

As a player, Kekalainen appeared in 55 career NHL games with the Senators and Boston Bruins during a six-year career. A left wing, he scored five goals and added eight assists for 13 points with 28 penalty minutes, including a career-high 1-5-6 and 14 penalty minutes in 28 games with the Senators during the 1993-94 season. He also played in the American Hockey League and his native Finland before wrapping up his playing career with Vasteras IK in the Swedish Elite League in 1994-95.

Before signing with the Bruins, Kekalainen played two seasons at Clarkson University from 1987-89. He was named to the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference First All-Star Team after tallying 19-25-44 and 47 penalty minutes in 31 games during the 1988-89 season. He also represented Finland at the 1986 World Junior Championships and the 1991 Canada Cup Tournament.

Kekalainen was born on July 3, 1966 in Tampere, Finland. He has a bachelor's degree in management from Clarkson University and a master's in business marketing from the University of Tampere.

He and his wife, Tiina, are the parents of daughters, Emilia and Sofia.

### **BILL ZITO** ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Bill Zito was named assistant general manager of the Columbus Blue Jackets on Aug. 12, 2013 and brings nearly three decades of experience encompassing a variety of aspects of the game of hockey to

the organization.

Since joining the Blue Jackets, he has been an integral part of the club's management team in the areas of contract negotiations, scouting and player evaluation, salary cap management and budgeting. He also is the general manager of the Cleveland Monsters, Columbus' American Hockey League affiliate, that captured the first Calder Cup championship in franchise history in 2016 (then as Lake Erie).

Zito was the general manager for the bronze medal United States Men's National Team for the 2018 IIHF World Championships in Denmark and was a member of the management team for the Team USA squad that won a bronze at the 2015 IIHF World Championships.

Zito joined the Blue Jackets after using scouting as a platform to build Acme World Sports into one of the top hockey agencies in the business. In 2013, *Forbes* ranked Acme as the eighth-most valuable hockey agency in the world with almost \$200 million in contracts under management. In 2007, *The Hockey News* lauded Zito in their "genius" issue for his scouting prowess, noting his ability to uncover late-round or undrafted, lesserknown players as well as the top picks.

As the agency's founder and president, he represented players such as Vezina Trophy and Conn Smythe Trophy winner Tim Thomas, Vezina Trophy winner Tuukka Rask, Vezina Trophy finalist Antti Niemi and All-Stars Kimmo Timonen and Brian Rafalski.

He is a graduate of Yale University, where he played varsity hockey from 1984-87. After a one-year stint playing hockey in Europe, Zito attended law school at the University of Wisconsin and during that time served as an assistant coach for the Badgers hockey team. Upon earning his law degree, he practiced appellate litigation and sports law in Chicago before founding Acme in 1995.

Zito was born on September 16, 1964 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He and his wife, Julie, are the parents of twin daughters, Gigi and Frankie, and son, Billy.



### **BASIL MCRAE** DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Basil McRae was named the Blue Jackets' director of player personnel on July 6, 2016, rejoining the club after originally serving as a scout in 2013-14.

McRae, who has been a part owner of the Ontario Hockey League's London Knights

since 2000, also spent the past two years as alternate governor and general manager of the club. Last season, London captured OHL and Memorial Cup championships. Prior to his original stint in Columbus, McRae served as a scout for the St. Louis Blues for five seasons.

In addition to nearly two decades of scouting experience, McRae played 16 seasons in the NHL between 1981-96, registering 53 goals and 83 assists for 136 points with 2,453 penalty minutes in 576 games with the Quebec Nordiques, Toronto Maple Leafs, Detroit Red Wings, Minnesota North Stars, Tampa Bay Lightning, St. Louis Blues and Chicago Blackhawks. The Beaverton, Ontario native was a fifth round pick of Quebec in the 1980 NHL Draft.

He and his wife, Jill, are the parents of son, Philip, and daughters, Alexandra and Abigail.



### **JOSH FLYNN** DIRECTOR OF HOCKEY ADMINISTRATION

Josh Flynn is the director of hockey administration for the Columbus Blue Jackets. He is responsible for assisting in all facets of the hockey operations department, including salary cap management, contract

negotiations and research, salary arbitration, statistical research and strategic planning, and he is the club's liaison to the National Hockey League regarding matters pertaining to the NHL-NHLPA collective bargaining agreement.

Flynn joined the Blue Jackets hockey operations department in June 2008 after spending the previous two seasons with KO Sports Agency in Denver, Colorado, where he worked on contract negotiations for several NHL players represented by the agency.

Flynn was born on December 8, 1982 in Toronto, Ontario. He received a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Toronto in 2004 and earned his Juris Doctorate from the Sturm College of Law at the University of Denver in 2007.



### FREDRIK MODIN HOCKEY OPERATIONS ADVISOR

Former Columbus Blue Jackets foward Fredrik Modin joined the organization as a hockey operations advisor prior to the 2015-16 season. He notched 232-230-462 and 453 penalty minutes in 898 career NHL

games with the Blue Jackets, Toronto Maple Leafs, Tampa Bay Lightning, Los Angeles Kings, Atlanta Thrashers and Calgary Flames. He appeared in 176 games with Columbus between 2006-10 and tallied 39-46-85 and 110 penalty minutes while also serving as an alternate captain from 2008-10. He spent six seasons with the Lightning, collecting 145-141-286 and 224 penalty minutes in 445 games from 1999-2006, helping the club capture the franchise's first Stanley Cup in 2004. Toronto's third pick, 64th overall, in the 1994 Draft, he began his NHL career with the Maple Leafs in 1996-97.

Modin also represented Sweden at various world tournaments and is member of the Triple Gold Club, winning gold at the 1998 IIHF World Championships and 2006 Olympic Games to go with the Stanley Cup in 2004. Modin also participated at the 2010 Olympics and 1996, 2000 and 2001 IIHF World Championships. He and his wife, Linda are the parents of son, Jesper, and daughter, Ida. The family resides in Dublin, Ohio.



### VILLE SIREN DIRECTOR OF AMATEUR SCOUTING

Ville Siren was named director of amateur scouting of the Columbus Blue Jackets on July 6, 2016 after serving as the club's head amateur scout since joining the club on July 8, 2013.

Siren spent nine seasons as a member of

the St. Louis Blues scouting staff from 2003-13. During that time, he was instrumental in the club's selection of current NHL players such as Vladimir Tarasenko (1st Rd., 2010), Lars Eller (1st Rd., 2007), Patrik Berglund (1st Rd., 2006), Nikita Nikitin (5th Rd., 2004) and Roman Polak (6th Rd., 2004).

Prior to joining the Blues, he spent the 2002-03 season working with Tampere of the Finnish Elite League and scouted for the Washington Capitals from 1999-2002. A defenseman, Siren was selected by the Hartford Whalers in the second round, 23rd overall, of the 1983 NHL Draft and made his NHL debut with the Pittsburgh Penguins during the 1985-86 season. He went on to register 14 goals and 68 assists for 82 points with 276 penalty minutes in 290 career NHL games with the Penguins and Minnesota North Stars from 1985-90.

He also played nine seasons in Finland, Sweden and Switzerland before retiring in 1999, and represented Finland in numerous international competitions including the 1984 and 1992 Olympic Games, 1987 and 1991 Canada Cup tournaments, 1983 and 1984 World Junior Championships and 1985, 1991 and 1993 World Championships. Siren was born on Feb. 11, 1964 in Tampere, Finland. He is the father of a son, Viktor.

wear him down at higher levels and, if that happens, it will make him less effective. "He's not the biggest guy in the world," said one scout, "but he plays like he's the biggest player in the world. He's built like a fire hydrant."

Even though hitting is a big part of his game, it's not the only dimension he has. In terms of his ability to move the puck, he's seen as a safe and steady option. And while he won't dazzle anyone with his offensive ability, it's not a detriment to his game. "A lot of times with smaller guys you want their physical game to complement his defensive game," said another scout. "With him, it's the reverse."

There is a comfort level that he can play in most game situations. "You can put him on in the last minute of the game whether you're winning or losing," said a scout. "He's very versatile."

line center at the NHL level. For all the opportunities Lauko creates with his speed, he fails to

cash in on a fair number of them Even though he had three goals and six points at the world under-18s. scouts came away a little disappointed by what they saw.

The one wild card with Lauko is he's fearless about going to the dirty areas of the ice. He has no hesitation going hard to the net. and that may serve him well if he hopes to increase his offensive impact, but he's going to have to improve his touch around the net and his puck skills.

He's already an NHL-caliber skater without the puck. It's when he has the puck on his stick that scouts have concerns. "He's got good speed, but he's not really creative." said a scout. "He's not an offensive threat. It's not a bad thing, but everything points to him being a third-line guy. He's high energy, and he's a two-way guy who works really hard.'






one scout. "He's calm in net and seems to rise to the occasion. He plays well in big games."
