## 2022-23

\*Split the season between the Montreal Canadiens and Laval Rocket of the American Hockey League (AHL).

\* Was the Canadiens' nominee for the Bill Masterton Memorial Trophy for 2022-23, awarded to "the NHL player who best exemplifies the qualities of perseverance, sportsmanship, and dedication to hockey."

\* Skated in 31 games for the Canadiens, notching a career-high six goals and eight assists for 14 points.

\* Scored first career NHL goal on February 12, 2023 against Edmonton. At age 31, he was the oldest player to score their first career goal for the Canadiens since 35-year-old Herb Gardiner in 1926.

\* As captain of Laval, he notched 26 points (14G-12A) in 31 games.

\* Notched a season-high and career-high two points on March 7, 2023 vs. CAR (1G-1A) and January 26, 2023 vs. DET (2A).

\* Played in 11 games for Montreal.

\* As assistant captain for Laval, recorded 10 goals and 12 assists for 22 points in 32 regular season games.

Miller (22 in 2015-16), Chris Kreider (21 in 2014-15), Derek Stepan (21 in 2010-11), Brandon Dubinsky (20 in 2009-10) and Petr Prucha (30 in 2005 06).

\* Had points in a career-long six games (7G-2A) from Jan. 23-Feb. 10.

\* Played in his 300th career game on Feb. 17, 2023 against the Oilers.



\* Joined Mark Messier and Jean Ratelle as the only Rangers skaters to record three or more 90-point seasons with the team.

\* 8th undrafted skater to reach seven 70-point seasons.

\* Reached the 60-assist mark for the third time with the Rangers (also 74 in 2021-22 & 63 in 2019-20). He joined Brian Leetch (70 in 1995-96, 80 in 1991-92 & 72 in 1990-91) as the second player in franchise history with three such campaigns.



## **KRIS KNOBLAUCH**

Head Coach | Kris Knoblauch enters his fifth season with the Hartford Wolf Pack as the team's Head Coach after being named the seventh Head Coach in the franchise's history on July 29, 2019.

Knoblauch led the Wolf Pack to the Division Finals of the Calder Cup Playoffs in 2022-23, after finishing sixth in the AHL's Eastern Conference with 81 points and 35 wins.

In his first season with the Wolf Pack in 2019-20, Knoblauch guided the team to a 31-20-65 record, including a 21-61-2 record at home. He was named the Head Coach of the Atlantic Division All-Stars for the 2020 AHL All-Star Classic. In 2020-21, Knobaluch helped the Wolf Pack

post a 14-9-1 record in 24 regular season games (604 points percentage), and he also served as the Rangers' acting Head Coach for several games in March of 2021. In 2021-22, the Wolf Pack posted a 32-32-6 record. Once again, Knoblauch was called in to coach the Rangers on the west coast trip in January of 2022 after Gerard Gallant tested positive for Covid-19.

Prior to being named Hartford's Head Coach, Knoblauch served as an Assistant Coach with the Philadelphia Flyers for two seasons (2017-18 and 2018-19). He also served as a Head Coach for seven consecutive seasons (2010-11 – 2016-17), first with the Kootenay Ice of the Western Hockey League (WHI) in 2010-11 and 2011-12, and then with the Erie Otters of the Ontario Hockey League (OHL) for parts of five seasons from 2012-13 – 2016-17. Over Knoblauch's seven seasons as a head coach with Kootenay and Erie, his teams posted a 298-130-16-13 record in 457 regular season games (684 points percentage). In his first season with Kootenay in 2010-11, Knoblauch helped the team win the WHL Championship. In Knoblauch's four full seasons with Erie (2013-14 – 2016-17), the Otters posted a 204-58-7-3 record (768 points percentage). Erie won at least 50 games in all four seasons, becoming the first team in the history of the Canadian Hockey League (CHL; comprised of the Ontario Hockey League, Quebec Major Junior Hockey League, and Western Hockey League to post four consecutive 50-win seasons. During Knoblauch's tenure with Erie, etc. Wester-Mockey League, 2016-17 and won the Hamilton Spectator Trophy for having the OHL's Coach of the Year in 2015-16.

Prior to becoming being named Kootenay's Head Coach, the Imperial, Saskatchewan native served as an Assistant Coach with Kootenay for three seasons (2007-08 – 2009-10). He began his coaching career as an Assistant Coach with the Prince Albert Raiders of the WHL for one season (2006-07). Knoblauch served as an Assistant Coach with Canada at the 2017 IIHF World Junior Championship, helping Canada earn a silver medal.

Knoblauch was selected by the New York Islanders in the seventh round, 166th overall, of the 1997 NHL Entry Draft. He played parts of four seasons of junior hockey in the WHL (1995-96 - 1998-99), followed by five seasons (1999-00 - 2003-04) at the University of Alberta.



Assistant Coach | Steve Smith begins his third season with the Hartford Wolf Pack as the team's Assistant Coach.

Smith joined the Rangers organization after spending parts of the 11 seasons as an Assistant Coach in the NHL. He most recently served as an Assistant Coach with the Buffalo Sabres for parts of three seasons (2018-19 – 2020-21). Smith has also served as an Assistant Coach with the Carolina Hurricanes (2014-15 – 2017-18), Edmonton Oilers (2010-11 – 2013-14), and Calgary Flames (1997-98), and he spent two seasons as a scout with the Chicago Blackhawks (2008-09 – 2009-10).



Smith, who is a native of Glasgow, Scotland and grew up in Cobourg, Ontario, played parts of 16

seasons in the NHL (1984-85 – 1996-97; 1998-99 – 2000-01). A defenseman, Smith skated in 804 career NHL games with the Edmonton Oilers, Chicago Blackhawks, and Calgary Flames, registering 72 goals and 303 assists for 375 points, along with a plus-139 rating and 2,139 penalty minutes. He is a three-time Stanley Cup Champion, as he helped the Oilers win the Stanley Cup in 1986-87, 1987-88, and 1989-90. Smith played in the 1991 NHL All-Star Game, and he also helped Canada win the 1991 Canada Cup. He was inducted into the Cobourg and District Sports Hall of Fame in 2019.



## **JAMIE TARDIFF**

Assistant Coach | Jamie Tardiff begins his second season with the Hartford Wolf Pack as the team's Assistant Coach.

Tardif was previosuly an Assistant Coach with the Soo Greyhounds of the OHL, starting with the club prior to the 2018-19 campaign. During his time with the organization, the Greyhounds won 112 games and advanced to the playoffs in both the 2018-19 and 2021-22 seasons.

Prior to joining the Greyhounds, Tardif spent the 2017-18 season as a Player/Assistant Coach with the Quad City Mallards of the ECHL, where he completed his lengthy playing career.



As a player, Tardif played 12 professional seasons, including eight in the American Hockey

League. Over the course of 487 AHL games with the Manitoba Moose, Iowa Stars, Grand Rapids Griffins, Providence Bruins, and Rochester Americans, Tardif scored 267 career points (142 g, 125 a). He served as the captain of the Griffins during the 200940 and 201041 seasons and was named an AHL All-Star during the 201243 season as a member of the Bruins. Tardif appeared in two career NHL games, both coming with the Boston Bruins during the 201243 campaign.

In addition to his time in the AHL, Tardif played three seasons for Adler Mannheim in the German DEL. He helped guide the club to a Championship during the 2014-15 season, his first year overseas.

## JEFF MALCOLM

Goaltending Coach | Jeff Malcolm begins his third season with the Hartford Wolf Pack as the team's Goaltending Coach.

Prior to becoming Hartford's Goaltending Coach, Malcolm served three seasons as the Rangers Goaltending Consultant. In his role as Goaltending Consultant, he assisted in the on-ice and off-ice development of goaltenders throughout the Rangers organization, including goaltenders with the Wolf Pack, and he also worked with the Rangers front office in evaluating goaltenders at both the amateur level and professional level.



Malcolm played four seasons of professional hockey (2013-14 – 2016-17) with the Wolf Pack and the Greenville Road Warriors/ Swamp Rabbits (ECHL). In 94 career appearances in the ECHL, he posted a 51-30-11 record, along with a 2.96 GAA, and a .910 SV% and was selected to participate in the 2015 CCM ECHL All-Star Classic. Prior to beginning his professional career. Malcolm played four seasons of collegiate hockey at Yale University (2009-10 – 2012-13). He helped Yale win the National Championship in his final season at the school in 2012-13, and he stopped all 36 shots he faced to earn a win and a shutout in the National Championship Game against Quinnipiac University on April 13, 2013. Malcolm was named to the Frozen Four All-Tournament Team, as well as the NCAA All-Ivy League Second Team, in 2012-13.



Video Coach | Chris Hoeler begins his fifth season with the Hartford Wolf Pack as the team's Video Coach.

Hoeler joined the Rangers organization after spending the 2018-19 season as the Director of Hockey Operations for the Chicago Steel of the United States Hockey League (USHL). Prior to working with the Steel, he worked one season with Harvard University's women's hockey team as the team's Video & Analytics Coordinator. Hoeler has also worked with the Danbury Titans in the Federal Hockey League in his career.

#### SAM ROSEN

TV PLAY-BY-PLAY | Sam Rosen has been calling play-by-play for the New York Rangers on MSG Network since 1984 and the words he uttered on June 14, 1994 – "This one will last a lifetime!" – will be celebrated forever by the nearly two million Rangers fans that tuned in that evening to watch the Rangers clinch the Stanley Cup for the first time in 54 years.

One of the most knowledgeable and thorough play-by-play personalities in sports, Rosen has called games alongside some of hockey's greatest minds, including Hall-of-Famer Phil Esposito and current partner Joe Micheletti. Rosen has won four New York Emmy Awards for MSG Networks' Rang-

ers coverage and has been nominated eight times for achievement in play-by-play. Rosen also called football games for the NFL on FOX for 23 seasons (1997 – 2019) and games for NHL Radio for 13 years (1996 – 2008), including 12 Stanley Cup Finals. He was inducted into the Jewish Sports Hall of Fame in 2008. Rosen was also the recipient of the 2016 Foster Hewitt Memorial Award from the Hockey Hall of Fame.



#### **JOE MICHELETTI**

TV ANALYST | Joe Micheletti was named MSG Network's New York Rangers television analyst in September 2006 after spending eight years serving in the same capacity for the New York Islanders on MSG+. Micheletti also previously served as an analyst for NBC's coverage of the NHL.

Micheletti broke into broadcasting in 1985 as part of the St. Louis Blues radio team after a sevenyear professional hockey career. He held the position for two years before joining the Blues in 1987 as an assistant coach. After spending three years behind the bench, Micheletti returned to broadcasting in 1991 as the color analyst for the Minnesota North Stars. He then returned to St.

Louis, this time as the television analyst for the Blues. He has been a part of the broadcast team for five Winter Olympics with CBS, TNT and NBC, 21 Stanley Cup Finals, 15 NHL All-Star games, and the World Cup of Hockey. Micheletti can also be heard doing national radio for NBC/Westwood One. Micheletti has earned numerous New York Emmy nominations for his work with MSG Networks, most recently in 2016.



#### **JOHN GIANNONE**

TV HOST/REPORTER | John Giannone currently serves as studio host for Rangers games on MSG Networks, providing coverage during intermission and the network's pre- and post-game shows. Prior to this season, Giannone also worked as an in-game reporter during Rangers telecasts, where he delivered analysis and commentary from between the benches, while conducting player interviews during intermission and pre- and post-game shows. Giannone joined MSG Networks in 2002 and has worked in many roles, including play-by-play, host, anchor and reporter for a variety of games and programs on the network. Giannone has received five Emmy Awards for his role in Rangers coverage between 2008 and 2015.

Prior to joining MSG Networks, Giannone was a field reporter for CNNSI and spent nine years as a writer covering the Islanders, Jets, Giants, and Mets for the NY Post and the Mets, Rangers and Yankees for The Daily News.



#### **STEVE VALIQUETTE**

STUDIO ANALYST Steve Valiquette joined MSG Networks in 2014 and returns this season as a studio analyst for coverage of the New York Rangers. Valiquette won a New York Emmy Award for best sports analyst in 2019 for his work on MSG Network and received a nomination in 2021 as well.

Valiquette played in the NHL for parts of six seasons with three teams, including the New York Rangers and New York Islanders. Valiquette made his first NHL start with the Islanders on March 16, 2000 in a 4-2 win against the Atlanta Thrashers. The popular goaltender made his NHL playoff debut with the Rangers in 2009 against the Washington Capitals. After a 15-year playing career

Valiquette joined the Quinnipiac Bobcats NCAA Division 1 coaching staff in 2011. In 2012-2013 he worked for the New York Islanders as a goalie consultant developing goalies within the Islanders system as well as scouting. Additionally, Valiquette has a hockey analytics business (Clear Sight Analytics), which rates scoring chances in the NHL as well as year-round (Clear Sight Development), which is a coaching platform that mentors young goalies across Connecticut and Tri State area 12 months a year.

#### **MICHELLE GINGRAS**

TV HOST/REPORTER | Michelle Gingras currently serves as in-game host and reporter for Rangers games on MSG Networks. She also works as a studio host and reporter on MSG Networks' coverage of the New York Red Bulls. Before joining MSG Networks, Gingras was a host and reporter for Yahoo Sports. She was also a college football reporter on BeIn Sports Network and a ringside reporter for the Tampa Bay Lightning and Fox Sports Florida. Gingras began her career in San Diego, where she worked as a multimedia reporter at the San Diego Union-Tribune, as well as for their cable affiliate, UT-TV, covering the San Diego Padres and San Diego State athletics. #### **KENNY ALBERT**

RADIO PLAY-BY-PLAY Kenny Albert, a three-time finalist for a National Sports Emmy Award in the play-by-play category, returns for his 28th season as the radio voice of the Rangers (his 19th season in the booth with broadcast partner Dave Maloney). Albert is in his third season as the NHL's lead play-by-play voice on Turner Sports, and has called the Stanley Cup Final on national television in 2021 (NBC) and 2023 (TNT). His autobiography, "A Mic for All Seasons", was released in October 2023. The only play-by-play broadcaster to currently call all four major sports, Albert has called hockey at the last six Winter Olympics (including the men's and women's gold medal hockey games in 2018 and 2022), as well as Track and Field, Volleyball and Baseball at the 2016 and 2020 Summer Olympics for NBC. Albert is calling the NFL on FOX for a 30th consecutive season, and has called

Major League Baseball games on various FOX networks since 1997. He has been at the mic for five NFC Divisional playoff games, five MLB Division series, the 2007 and 2009 Sugar Bowls, 2008 Orange Bowl, 2008 Pro Bowl, 2011 Cotton Bowl, and 2023 World Baseball Classic for FOX; the "world feed" of Super Bowl XUVI in February 2012; Knicks games on MSG Networks since 2008; and Premier Boxing Champions on both NBC and FOX. Albert called NHL games on NBC/NBCSN from 2012-2021; the Stanley Cup Final on NHL Radio/Westwood One seven times (1994, 1995, and 2016-2020), and the 2014 Stanley Cup Final on NBC (Game 1) and MSG Radio (Games 2-5); two NHL All-Star Games on Westwood One; and five seasons of the NHL on FOX (1995-1999). He has also called NHL games on ESPN2, OLN and Versus. From 1992-95, Albert was the television voice of the Washington Capitals following two seasons as radio voice of the American Hockey League's Baltimore Skipiacks. A 1990 graduate of New York University, Albert lives in New Jersey with wife Barbara and daughters Amanda and Sydney.
