

**FLAMES LAST GAME RECAP****March 5, 2026 – CALGARY FLAMES [1] vs. OTTAWA SENATORS [4]**[Game Summary](#) | [Event Summary](#)

The Calgary Flames dropped a 4–1 decision to the Ottawa Senators on Thursday night at the Scotiabank Saddledome. Martin Pospisil opened the scoring late in the first period with his first goal of the year, finishing a setup from Matvei Gridin and Yegor Sharangovich to give Calgary an early lead, but Ottawa responded with four unanswered goals across the final two periods, including a pair of late empty-net tallies. Devin Cooley turned aside 33 of 35 shots and earned First Star honours for his effort.

First, the Calgary Flames acquired forward Victor Olofsson, prospect centre Max Curran, a conditional 2028 first-round pick, and a conditional 2027 second-round pick from Colorado in exchange for centre Nazem Kadri and Calgary's 2027 fourth-round pick.

Olofsson, a native of Ornskoldsvik, SWE, has skated in 60 games for the Avalanche this season, netting 11 goals and adding 14 assists for 25 points. The 30-year-old winger is a veteran of 430 NHL games split between Buffalo, Vegas and Colorado, amassing 236 points from 116 goals and 120 assists.

Prospect centre Max Curran is in his third WHL season, appearing in 31 games, scoring 14 goals and 27 assists for 41 points along with 23 penalty minutes for the Edmonton Oil Kings. He represented Czechia at the 2026 IIHF World Junior Championship, helping his nation earn a silver medal while recording five points in seven tournament games.

Next, the Flames acquired centre Ryan Strome from Anaheim in exchange for a 2027 seventh-round pick. Strome, a native of Mississauga, ON, has skated in 33 games for the Ducks this season, scoring three goals and six assists for nine points. The 32-year-old has 897 games of NHL experience to his credit, scoring 489 points from 169 goals and 320 assists, playing for the New York Islanders, Edmonton Oilers, New York Rangers, and Anaheim Ducks. He is three contests away from becoming the ninth skater from the 2011 draft class to reach 900 NHL games.

Strome played four seasons of junior in the Ontario Hockey League, beginning in 2009-10 with the Barrie Colts before traded to the Niagara IceDogs where he would spend the remainder of his junior career. He captained Niagara in his final campaign with the club in 2012-13 while also representing Canada at the 2013 IIHF World Junior Championship.

Finally, the Flames acquired forward Brennan Othmann from the New York Rangers in exchange for forward Jacob Battaglia. Othmann, a native of Scarborough, ON, has played in 17 games for the Rangers this season, scoring his first NHL goal. He has also played 26 games with their AHL affiliate Hartford Wolf Pack, netting eight goals and adding eight assists for 16 points and 49 penalty minutes. The 23-year-old winger and former first round pick has won two gold medals with Canada's World Junior Team in 2022 and 2023 and an OHL championship with Peterborough in 2023.

On Wednesday evening, the Calgary Flames acquired defenceman Olli Määttä, prospect centre Jonathan Castagna and three 2026 second-round picks from Utah in exchange for defenceman MacKenzie Weegar. Määttä, a native of Jyväskylä, FIN, has skated in 22 games for the Mammoth this season. The 31-year-old rearguard is a veteran with 783 games of NHL experience, having played for Pittsburgh, Chicago, Los Angeles, Detroit and Utah. He has amassed 196 points from 42 goals and 154 assists and is a two-time Stanley Cup champion with the Pittsburgh Penguins in 2016 and 2017. He has also represented Finland at three best-on-best international events, including the 2016 World Cup of Hockey and is a two-time Olympic bronze medalist in 2014 and 2026.

Prospect centre Jonathan Castagna is in his third season at Cornell University, appearing in 29 contests, leading his team in scoring with 14 goals and 18 assists for 32 points along with 27 penalty minutes. In 2023-24, Jonathan helped Cornell win the ECAC Championship, was named ECAC Tournament MVP, and earned a spot on both the ECAC All-Rookie Team and the All-Ivy League Second Team. Last season, he helped Cornell repeat as ECAC Champions while being named to the ECAC All-Tournament Team.

MARTY PARTY:

Martin Pospisil scored his first goal of the season on Thursday night against Ottawa. Pospisil missed the first 45 games of the season with an injury but was able to return and represented Slovakia at the 2026 Winter Olympics, helping his nation finish in fourth place. Through 154 NHL contests, Pospisil has registered 50 points from 13 goals and 37 assists.



LOOK BACKS AT IT:

Mikael Backlund enters play tonight with 598-career points, sitting two shy of becoming the 25th skater of Swedish descent in NHL history to reach 600 points. He also can become the sixth player in Flames franchise history to record 600 points with the club:

Backlund's 228 career goals sit one shy of tying Kent Nilsson (229) for the fifth-most in Flames franchise history. With one more tally, he would also tie Nilsson for the most goals by a Swedish-born player in Flames history, with the pair ranking as the only two Swedes to eclipse 200 goals with the club.

INDIGENOUS CELEBRATION GAME:

The Calgary Flames are set to host their Indigenous Celebration Game tonight against Carolina. This celebration of Indigenous culture and tradition is a recognition of the peoples of the Treaty 7 Region of Southern Alberta.

This year's game will feature Calgary Flames fans and representatives from the Blackfoot First Nation tribes of Siksika, the Piikani, the Kainai; the Stoney Nakoda First Nation tribes of Chiniki, Bearspaw, and Goodstoney; the Tsuut'ina First Nation as well as members from Otipemisiwak Metis Government, Districts 5 & 6.

The Calgary Flames will be led onto the ice by youth skaters carrying the flags of each of the seven nations. The pre-game show will feature ceremonies involving Ceremonial Drummers from the Treaty 7 Nations along with a land acknowledgement. The Canadian anthem will be performed by Dilayna Blackhorse of the Siksika Nation.

The evening of Indigenous celebration will spotlight representatives from Treaty 7 Nations members taking part in the game presentation as well as feature traditional Indigenous Hand Games being played on the concourse pregame. The first and second intermissions will include a live performance by Canadian Singer-Songwriter and Juno Award nominee Armond Duck Chief.

Indigenous Celebration merchandise will be available in CGY Team Stores with proceeds directed to local youth programming in each of the Treaty 7 First Nation Communities. Funds raised through the Calgary Flames Foundation RE/MAX 50/50 will also be directed to charitable and youth programming among Treaty 7 First Nation Communities. Calgary Flames Foundation 50/50 funds from the Calgary Flames Indigenous Celebration Game last season supported track and field events and the creation of a youth baseball program in the Kainai Nation, minor hockey programming in Siksika Nation, sport programs in Tsuut'ina Nation and much more.
