- Ranked tied for fourth among NHL defensemen in game-winning goals (5) and tied for first in takeaways (88).

- Reached 20 career playoff assists. He required the fewest games (24 GP) in Rangers history to reach 20 career postseason assists, besting the previous mark set by Brian Leetch (26 GP) and required the second-fewest games by a defenseman in NHL history to record 20 career playoff assists, trailing only Gary Suter (23 GP).

- Had six points through two games of postseason, tying John Carlson (w/ WSH in 2018) and Gary Suter (w/ CGY in 1988) for the most through the first two playoff games by a defenseman in NHL history. Became the sixth defenseman in NHL history with six points through his first two games in a playoff year, joining Gary Suter in 1988, John Carlson in 2018, Al MacInnis in 1999, Bobby Orr in 1971 and Pierre Pilote in 1964.

- With 31 points in 29 playoff games, became the fifth-fastest defenseman in NHL history to reach 30 career postseason points, trailing Brian Leetch (26 GP), Al MacInnis (27 GP), Denis Potvin (28 GP) and Bobby Orr (28 GP).

2021-22

- Ranked third among NHL defensemen in assists (63) and fourth in points (74).

- Point total was the ninth most in franchise history by a defenseman and his assist total was the fifth most in a single season by a Rangers defenseman.

- Ranked tied for second in the NHL in power play assists with 33.

- First Rangers defenseman to record 50 assists since Brian Leetch in 2000-01.

- Named to 2022 All-Star Game in Vegas but did not participate due to injury.

- Tied for the team-lead in goals with 11, which were also tied for the 16th most by a defenseman in the NHL.

- Among defensemen who played 20 or more games, he ranked fourth with 0.95 points per game.

- Led the Blueshirts blueline with 23:54 of average time on ice - the 20th highest among NHL defensemen.

- Recorded his sixth career three-point game on Oct. 29 vs. CBJ.

- Recorded his 100th career point in his 135th career game on Nov. 2 at VAN; became the 22nd defenseman in NHL history and third in Rangers history (Sergei Zubov, Brian Leetch) to notch 100 points in 135 or fewer games.

- With 12 points through 11 games, became the first Rangers defenseman since Brian Leetch in 2000-01 to record 10 or more assists/12 or more points through the first 11 games of a season.

- On Nov. 13 at CBJ, passed Brad Park for the fifth most assists by a Rangers defenseman within their first three career seasons (87). Those with more were Reijo Ruotsalainen (130), Sergei Zubov (126), Brian Leetch (125) & Ron Greschner (94).

- On Dec. 10 at BUF, recorded his 100th career assist in his 151st game. Fox tied Quinn Hughes (151 GP) and Brian Leetch (151 GP) as the sixth-fastest defensemen in NHL history to reach the milestone. The only blueliners to require fewer games: Sergei Zubov (127 GP), Mark Howe (135 GP), Stefan Persson (135 GP), Al MacInnis (144 GP) and Larry Murphy (150 GP) ... With the milestone, Fox tied Brian Leetch (151 GP) for the second-fewest games to reach 100 assists by a Rangers defenseman in franchise history, behind only Sergei Zubov (127 GP).

- On Jan. 19 vs. TOR, became the first Rangers defenseman since Brian Leetch in 2000-01 to reach the 40-point mark in 40 games played or fewer. Also became the third different defenseman in franchise history with 35 or more assists through 40 games played in a season, joining Brian Leetch and Sergei Zubov.

- Notched his 50th point of the season in his 50th game of the season (7G-43A) on Feb. 27 vs. VAN, requiring the fewest games to do so by a Rangers blueliner since Brian Leetch (44 GP in 2000-01). Fox became the third Ranger to reach the 50-point mark.

- Scored the shootout winner on his first career shootout attempt on Jan. 24 at LAK.
 - Signed a seven-year extension on Nov. 1.
 - Scored his first career overtime goal to cap off his three-point night (1G-2A) on Mar. 15 vs. ANA.
 - Collected his 58th assist of the season on Apr. 16 vs. DET, tying Brian Leetch (2000-01, 1996-97) for the fifth most assists by a Rangers defenseman in a single season.
 - On Apr. 21 at NYI, finished his first 200 games with 137 assists, the sixth most by a defenseman through their first 200 games in NHL history.
 - Finished with five goals and 18 assists for 23 points in 20 playoff games, the second most points in a single playoff year by a Rangers defenseman (Brian Leetch – 34 in 1994).
 - In G1 of the First Round against Pittsburgh, opened the scoring for New York with his first career playoff goal/point. It marked the ninth time in franchise history that a defenseman scored the team's first goal of the postseason and the first since Matt Gilroy in Game 1 of the 2011 Conference Quarterfinals.
 - Became the fourth New York-born player in franchise history to score a playoff goal for the Rangers, following Ryan Callahan (14G), Brian Mullen (2G) and Matt Gilroy (1G)
 - In G6 of First Round, tallied four assists, becoming the fifth player in Rangers history to record four-plus assists in a playoff game, joining Jaromir Jagr (April 17, 2007), Dave Maloney (April 9, 1983), Mikko Leinonen (April 8, 1982) and Jean Ratelle (April 22, 1971). The last NHL defenseman to notch four or more assists in a playoff game before him was Kris Letang on May 22, 2013.
 - Became the first Rangers defenseman to record four points in a potential elimination game in G6, besting the previous mark shared by four others: Brian Leetch (1G-2A in Game 7 of 1992 DSF), James Patrick (3A in Game 7 of 1992 DSF), Willie Huber (1G-2A in Game 5 of DSF) and Reijo Ruotsalainen (1G-2A in Game 6 of 1982 DF).
 - Became the first Rangers defenseman to record 10 assists in a single playoff year since Ryan McDonagh (13A) in 2014.
 - Became the fourth defenseman in NHL history with at least one point in all seven games of a series, joining Miro Heiskanen (DAL - 2020 – R2), Larry Murphy (PIT - 1995 – CQF), and Paul Reinhart (CGY - 1984 – Div. Finals). Fox is the first skater (defenseman or forward) in Rangers history to accomplish the feat.
 - In G4 of Second Round, became the sixth player in franchise history with a postseason-opening home point streak of six or more games, joining Mark Messier (7 GP in 1994), Wayne Gretzky (6 GP in 1997), Luc Robitaille (6 GP in 1997), Pierre Larouche (6 GP in 1986) and Brad Park (6 GP in 1974).
 - Had a home point streak of nine playoff games. Only two defensemen in NHL history have recorded a longer such run in a playoff year: Ray Bourque (10 GP in 1991) and Paul Coffey (10 GP in 1985).
 - Recorded his fourth-straight multi-point game in G2 of the ECF, surpassing Brian Leetch (1992 & 1995) for the longest multi-point streak by a defenseman in Rangers playoff history.
 - With 23 points, recorded the most points by a defenseman in NHL history through 20 career playoff games, surpassing Brian Leetch (22 points in 20 GP).
- 2020-21
- Won the Norris Trophy, which is awarded annually "to the defense player who demonstrates throughout the season the greatest all-round ability in the position"; became the fourth Ranger in franchise history to win the award (Harvey - 1961-62; Howell - 1966-67; Leetch - 1991-92 and 1996-97).
 - Became the second defenseman in NHL history to win the Norris Trophy in one of his first two seasons in the league (Bobby Orr - won the award in his second NHL season in 1967-68).
 - Became the fourth American defenseman in NHL history to win the Norris Trophy (Langway, Chelios, and Leetch).
 - Was named to the NHL's First All-Star Team.
 - Established career-highs in several categories, including points (47), assists (42), and average ice time (24:42).

- Led NHL defensemen in assists, ranked second in points and power play assists (21), tied for second in power play points (23), ranked third in takeaways (38), and tied for 16th in plus/minus rating (plus-19).
- Became the first NHL defenseman to lead all NHL defensemen in assists in one of his first two seasons in the league since Zubov in 1993-94 and only the third defenseman to do so since 1925-26 (Zubov - 1993-94; Roger Leger - 1946-47).
- Ranked third in the NHL in power play assists, tied for sixth in assists, tied for seventh in power play points, and ranked 11th in average ice time.
- Was the only NHL player who logged at least 200:00 of power play ice time and 140:00 of shorthanded ice time.
- Led the Rangers in assists, average ice time, power play assists, power play points, and blocked shots (102), ranked second in takeaways and plus/minus rating, and ranked fifth in points.
- Became the fourth defenseman in franchise history to average at least 0.75 assists per game in a season (min. 10 games played), joining Leetch (four times), Park, and Zubov; became the first Rangers defenseman to do so since Leetch in 1995-96.
- Became the eighth defenseman in franchise history to average at least 0.85 points per game in a season (min. 10 games played), joining Leetch (nine times), Park (four times), Greschner (four times), Zubov (twice), Ruotsalainen (twice), J. Patrick (twice), and Beck; became the first Rangers defenseman to do so since Leetch in 2000-01.
- Led the Rangers in ice time in 46 of the team's 56 games (including 46 of the 55 games he played).
- His 24:42 average ice time was the most a Ranger averaged in one season since McDonagh (24:49 in 2013-14).
- Named the Rangers' MVP and the winner of the Steven McDonald Extra Effort Award; became the seventh Ranger to be named the Team's MVP (as chosen by the media) and to receive the Steven McDonald Extra Effort Award (as chosen by the fans) since 1987-88, which was the first year the Steven McDonald Extra Award was presented, joining Graves (1992-93 and 1993-94), Messier (1994-95 and 1995-96), Leetch (1996-97), Gretzky (1997-98), Lundqvist (2017-18), and Zibanejad (2018-19) as the only players to win both awards in the same season.
- Became the second defenseman to be named the winner of the Steven McDonald Extra Effort Award (Leetch - 1996-97).



- Registered 20 points (3G-17A) in March; became the third Rangers defenseman to record at least 20 points in a calendar month in franchise history (Leetch – five times; Park – once).

- Led the NHL in assists in March; led NHL defensemen in assists and points during the month. Posted a career-high 12-game point streak from Mar. 17 vs. PHI to Apr. 8 vs. PIT (3G-19A), including a career-high seven-game assist streak from Mar. 17 vs. PHI to Mar. 28 at WSH (13 assists over the seven games); the 12-game point streak was tied for the fifth-longest by a defenseman in franchise history.

- Tallied 63 points (11G-52A) through his first 100 career NHL games; the only Rangers defensemen who registered more points than him within their first 100 career NHL games are Leetch (99), Zubov (91), and Ruotsalainen (72), and the only defensemen who tallied more assists than Fox within their first 100 career NHL games are Zubov (75) and Leetch (69).

- Became the first Ranger to be named the team's MVP in one of his first two seasons in the NHL since Lundqvist in 2006-07 and the first Rangers skater since Leetch in 1988-89.

- Recorded an assist, which was his 35th assist and 40th point of the season, and posted a plus-two rating on Apr. 15 vs. NJD; became the first Rangers defenseman 23 years old or younger to tally at least 35 assists in a season since Zubov in 1993-94, and became the second defenseman in franchise history to tally 40 or more points in each of his first two NHL seasons (Ruotsalainen – 1981-82 and 1982-83).

- Established single-game career-highs with five assists and five points, recorded three power play assists and one shorthanded assist, and logged a team-high 21:55 of ice time on Mar. 25 at PHI; tied the single-game franchise record for assists, and tied single-game franchise records for assists and points by a defenseman.

- Led the Rangers in takeaways, ranked second in plus/minus rating and tied for fourth in assists.
- Led Rangers defensemen in plus/minus rating and game-winning goals, ranked second in assists and points, and tied for second in goals.
- The Rangers posted a 22-8-2 record in games which he registered a point, including an 8-0-0 record in games which he tallied a goal.
- Won the Lars-Erik Sjoberg Award as the top rookie in Training Camp.
- Made his NHL and Rangers debut on Oct. 3 vs. WPG.
- Tallied his first career NHL assist and point on Oct. 24 vs. BUF.
- Registered his first career NHL goal and posted a plus-two rating on Oct. 29 vs. TBL.
- Posted a five-game point streak from Nov. 4 vs. OTT to Nov. 12 vs. PIT (2G-4A).
- Recorded two points (1G-1A), including his first career NHL game-winning goal, on Nov. 27 vs. CAR.
- Skated in three playoff games.
- Ranked second among NHL defensemen in takeaways and tied for seventh among NHL defensemen in plus/minus rating.
- Posted a plus-two rating while making his playoff debut in Game 1 of the Qualifying Round at CAR on Aug. 1.

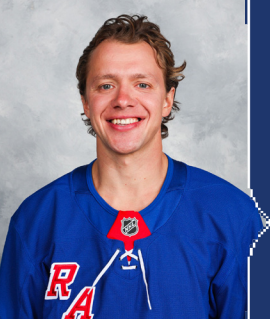

- In 75 games, Panarin registered 96 points (22G-74A), setting a career high at the time in assists and points.

- Established a career high of 37 power play points (5G-32A).

- Was the first Rangers forward to ever notch 74 assists in a season.

- Became the sixth Ranger to record multiple 90-point seasons with the team and fifth Ranger to record 60+ assists in multiple seasons with team.

- Played in his 450th career game on Nov. 18 vs. TOR; Since 1967, was the 35th player in the NHL to notch 320 or more assists in 450 or fewer games. Panarin and Connor McDavid are the only two players who made their debut in 2015-16 or later to record 489 or more points in 450 games or less.

- Earned his 500th career NHL point in his 457th career game on Dec. 7 vs. CHI; was the 49th player in NHL history to record 500 points in 457 or fewer games and the fifth active player to do so (Connor McDavid – 369 GP, Sidney Crosby – 369 GP, Alex Ovechkin – 373 GP, Evgeni Malkin – 413 GP). Since the 2015-16 season, was one of five players to notch 500 points in that span (McDavid, Kane, Draisaitl, Marchand). He required the sixth-fewest games among undrafted players to reach 500 career points (for those who debuted in 1963-64 onward, following the first NHL Draft). He trailed only Wayne Gretzky (234 GP), Peter Stastny (322 GP), Bobby Orr (396 GP), Joe Mullen (446 GP) and Adam Oates (456 GP).

- His assist total was third most in a single season by a Ranger, behind Brian Leetch (1991-92 - 80) and Sergei Zubov (1993-94 - 77).

- Ranked fourth in the NHL in assists and tied for fourth in PPA.

- His 96 points were tied for the 11th most in team history.

- Reached the 50-point mark on Feb. 1 vs. FLA (52 pts) and became the fourth undrafted player to begin his career with at least seven consecutive 50-point seasons, joining Wayne Gretzky (15: 1979-80 – 1993-94), Peter Stastny (12: 1980-81 – 1991-92) and Mike Ridley (9: 1985-86 – 1993-94).

- Reached the 50-assist plateau, in his 54th game. The last Rangers skater to reach the 50-assist mark in fewer contests was Wayne Gretzky (51 GP) in 1996-97.
