GAME NOTES

THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Tonight marks the Stars' 421st postseason game in franchise history. Dallas has a 213-207 all-time postseason record.

- o The Stars rank eighth all-time in playoff wins with 213.
- The Stars have a 27-38 all-time record in Game 3s including a 14-21 record at home, while Winnipeg is 3-8 in Game 3s with a 1-6 record on the road.
- Dallas has a 3-0 record in games after a loss this postseason.
- Esa Lindell and Cody Ceci have played 134:36 together at 5-on-5, which was the second-highest total of any defensive pair this postseason entering play Saturday according to Natural Stat Trick. The pairing of Thomas Harley and Ilya Lyubushkin ranked third with 134:07 of 5-on-5 ice time together.
- Roope Hintz has 15 points (5-10—15) in his last 16 Stanley Cup Playoff games dating back to May 9, 2024 against the Colorado Avalanche. This includes tying the NHL record for points in a period with four (2-2—4) in the second period against Colorado in Game 6.
 - Hintz has gone 75-for-145 at the face-off dot this postseason which tops all Stars skaters in both total face-offs taken and face-off wins.
- Tyler Seguin enters tonight's game two assists shy of totaling 50 career playoff assists. When he reaches the milestone, he will become the 29th active NHL player to have at least 50 career assists in the Stanley Cup Playoffs.
- 2025 marks the first trip to the Stanley Cup Playoffs for rookies Oskar Bäck and Lian Bichsel. Mavrik Bourque appeared
 in one game for the Stars during the 2024 postseason.
- The Stars' American Hockey League (AHL) affiliate the Texas Stars also qualified for the postseason after finishing the 2024-25 regular season with a 42-25-3 record. Dallas is one of nine organizations this season to have both its NHL and AHL clubs qualify for their respective postseasons, with the others being Carolina, Colorado, Florida, Los Angeles, Montreal, St. Louis, Tampa Bay and Washington.

GROUNDING THE JETS

- In the postseason, Dallas is 1-1 all-time vs. Winnipeg. Tonight's contest will be the first time the two teams will face each other in the playoffs at American Airlines Center.
 - o In the regular season, Dallas is 33-22-5 all-time vs. Winnipeg, including a 19-9-2 mark on home ice.

- Mikko Rantanen has registered 12 points (5-7—12) in seven playoff games against the Jets, averaging better than a
 point per game against them (1.71). His 12 postseason points against Winnipeg are tied for the most among active NHL
 skaters.
 - Rantanen has recorded at least one point in all but one playoff game against the Jets, including putting up a hat trick in Game 1 on May 7 in Winnipeg.
 - o In the regular season, Rantanen has 28 points (10-18—28) in 31 career games played vs. Winnipeg.
 - o Rantanen's 28 regular-season points against the Jets since the 2016-17 season are tied for the 10th most in the NHL.
- Tyler Seguin has registered 54 points (29-25—54) in 51 career regular-season games against Winnipeg, averaging more than a point per game against them (1.06). His 54 regular-season points rank fifth among active NHL skaters.
 - During his playoff career, Seguin has tallied 75 points (27-48-75) in 142 games. His 142 games played in the playoffs are the most played among active Stars skaters.
- Mikael Granlund has three points (1-2-3) in seven career postseason games played against Winnipeg.
 - o In the regular season, Granlund has 25 points (8-17–25) in 40 career games against the Jets.
- Matt Duchene has tallied 36 points (17-19—36) in 47 career regular-season games vs. Winnipeg. His 36 regular-season points vs. Winnipeg rank third among active Stars skaters.
 - Duchene tallied his first playoff point against the Jets with a primary assist on Mikko Rantanen's third goal in Game 1 on May 7.
- **Jamie Benn** has recorded 43 points (19-24—43) in 49 career regular-season games vs. Winnipeg. His 43 regular-season points rank second among active Stars skaters while tying for 10th in the league.
 - o During his playoff career, **Benn** has earned 79 points (28-51—79), which ranks second among active Stars skaters behind **Mikko Rantanen** (42-74—116).
- Matt Dumba has put up two points (1-1—2) in five career playoff games against Winnipeg. His two points came from a
 multi-point performance against them on April 15, 2018 (with MIN).
- Jason Robertson has recorded 13 points (9-4—13) in 15 regular-season games vs. Winnipeg.
- Mason Marchment has nine points (5-4-9) in 14 career regular-season games against the Jets.
- **Jake Oettinger** has a 6-4-1 record in 11 career regular-season games against the Jets, posting a 2.57 goals-against average and a .905 save percentage in those contests.
 - Oettinger is 1-1 in the postseason against Winnipeg, posting a 2.54 goals-against average and a .909 save percentage.

THE MOOSE IS LOOSE

- Mikko Rantanen was tied with Toronto's Willian Nylander for the league lead in scoring entering play Saturday, totaling 15 points (8-7—15) in nine games. Rantanen's eight goals were also the most in the league entering play Saturday and his seven assists were tied for 10th.
- With three goals in Game 1 against the Jets, **Rantanen** became the third player in NHL history to score a hat trick in consecutive Stanley Cup Playoff games according to NHL Stats, joining Jari Kurri who did so in 1985 and Doug Bentley who did so in 1944.
- All three of Rantanen's goals came in the second period, making him the first player in Stanley Cup Playoffs history with multiple three-goal periods in the same postseason and fourth to do so at any point during their career according to NHL Stats, joining Wayne Gretzky (3x), Maurice Richard (3x) and Tim Kerr (2x).
 - According to NHL Stats, Rantanen is the first player in franchise history to score a natural hat trick in the playoffs.
- Rantanen is the third player in franchise history to score multiple postseason hat tricks with the team, joining Joe
 Pavelski and Dino Ciccarelli. Rantanen and Pavelski are the only players to do so while the team was located in Dallas.
- Rantanen became the second player in NHL history to have at least three points in four consecutive games, doing so in Games 5, 6 and 7 of the First Round and Game 1 of the Second Round. He joined Leon Draisaitl who had five-consecutive three-point games from May 18 to 26, 2022.
- Rantanen enters tonight's game having factored in on each of the last 12 goals that the Stars have scored dating back
 to Game 5 of the First Round. According to NHL Stats, he is the first player in NHL history to factor in on that many of
 his team's goals consecutively in the Stanley Cup Playoffs.
- Rantanen has tied the league record for points in a period in a playoff game twice this postseason, totaling four points in the second period of Game 6 (1-3-4) and again in the third period of Game 7 (3-1-4).
 - He is the first player in NHL history to have multiple four-point periods in a single postseason according to NHL Stats
 - o Rantanen is the first player in NHL history (regular season or playoffs) to record a four-point period in consecutive games according to NHL Stats.
 - He also became just the second player in NHL history to have a four-point period in a Game 7, joining Kevin Labanc who did so in 2019 according to NHL Stats.
- Rantanen recorded the first-ever hat trick in the third period of a Game 7 and the second Game 7 hat trick in franchise history (last: Joel Kiviranta in the Second Round in 2020 against Colorado).
 - According to Opta Stats, **Rantanen** is the second player in NHL history to score a playoff hat trick in one period when facing his former team, joining Reggie Leach who did so against the Boston Bruins on May 6, 1976.

- Eleven (5-6—11) of Rantanen's 12 points in the First Round were scored in Games 5, 6 and 7, making him the first player in NHL history to have 10 or more points in Games 5 through 7 of a series according to Sportsnet Stats.
- Rantanen's 12 points against Colorado were the most by a Stars skater in a single series since Roope Hintz also had 12 points (5-7—12) in the Stars First Round matchup against the Minnesota Wild in 2022-23.
 - His 12 points are his most-ever in a single series, surpassing the 11 points (4-7-11) he had against Dallas in 2020.
- Rantanen is over a point-per-game player in the postseason in his career, totaling 116 points (42-74—116) in 90 Stanley
 Cup Playoff games. His 1.29 career points per game are the seventh-most in NHL history among players that have played
 in at least eight Stanley Cup Playoff games.
 - His 116 career playoff points rank 12th among all active skaters and rank third in NHL history among Finnish players.
 - His 116 points are also the eighth-most by a player in NHL history through his first 90 career playoff games played according to TSN Stats.

JAKE AND BAKE

- Jake Oettinger has logged a .910 save percentage and 2.78 goals-against average this postseason. Among netminders
 to play in at least two games this postseason, Oettinger's save percentage was the sixth-best mark in the league
 entering play Saturday.
 - The 2025 postseason marks the first time in Oettinger's career that he has played a playoff series without defenseman Miro Heiskanen.

- Oettinger has made a league-leading 254 saves this postseason, which was 64 more than the second-ranked netminder entering play Saturday (Logan Thompson, 190).
- According to MoneyPuck.com, **Oettinger** has saved 4.0 goals above expected against this postseason, which was the fourth-best mark in the NHL entering play Saturday, trailing only Washington's Logan Thompson (10.5), Carolina's Frederik Andersen (6.6) and New Jersey's Jacob Markstrom (5.7).
- Since the start of the 2022 Stanley Cup Playoffs, Oettinger has posted a 28-26 postseason record with a .915 save percentage, 2.55 goals-against average and two shutouts. His 28 wins rank second to only Florida's Sergei Bobrovsky (37) during that span.
 - o Among netminders to play in at least 10 postseason games since the 2012-22 season, **Oettinger's** save percentage ranked ninth in the NHL and his goals-against average ranked 11th.
- With the Stars win over the Avalanche, **Oettinger** now has a 3-1 record in Game 7s, posting a .950 save percentage and a 1.75 goals-against average in those games.
- Oettinger made 204 saves against Colorado in the First Round, which was the second-highest total of his career in a series, trailing only the 272 saves he made in Dallas' 2022 First Round series against the Flames.

HOME COOKING

- The Stars enter today's game looking to win their fourth consecutive game at home this postseason after posting a 3-1 record at the American Airlines Center during the First Round.
- If the Stars were to win today, it would give the team four consecutive playoff wins at home for the first time since the team won six straight Stanley Cup Playoff Games at the American Airlines Center from April 12 to May 7, 2000.
- Mikko Rantanen (4-3—7), Wyatt Johnston (3-3—6) and Thomas Harley (2-2—4) are all averaging a point per game or better this postseason when playing at home.
 - o Rantanen's seven home points were tied for the fourth-most in NHL this postseason entering play Saturday.
- Dallas logged a 28-10-3 record in home games this season, which includes 40 games played at the American Airlines Center and one game played at Nokia Arena in Finland as part as the NHL's Global Series.
- The team's 28 home wins were just one shy of matching the franchise record set in 1998-99, and their 59 home points and .720 home points percentage were tied for the fourth- and fifth-best marks in franchise history.

KILLING IT

- The Stars have gone 27-for-31 on the penalty kill this postseason for an 87.1 percent success rate, which was the second-best mark in the league entering play Saturday.
- Entering play Saturday, no team had been shorthanded more times than the Stars (31) this postseason.

- The Stars have been shorthanded at least three times in a game without allowing a power-play goal against this postseason four times: Games 3 (6-for-6), 5 (3-for-3) and 7 (3-for-3) of the First Round and in Game 1 (4-for-4) of the Second Round. Entering play Saturday, the Stars were the only team this postseason to be shorthanded at least three times without allowing a power-play goal against in four or more games.
- In Games 3 through 7 of the First Round, the Stars went 14-for-15 on the penalty kill, not allowing a power-play goal against in Games 3, 5, 6 or 7.
- Colorado's 13.6 percent success rate on the power play ranked 14th out of 16 playoff teams in the First Round. They
 finished the regular season having converted on 24.8 percent of their power-play opportunities, which was tied for the
 eighth-best mark in the NHL.
 - Since the Four Nations break (Feb. 22) through the end of the regular season, Colorado's power-play topped the NHL with a 33.9 percent conversion rate.
- Dallas went a perfect 6-for-6 on the penalty kill in Game 3 against Colorado (10:17 of shorthanded ice time in total),
 which includes killing off 3:20 of a penalty kill to begin overtime.
- Since the NHL began tracking penalty kills in 1977-78, Dallas' Game 3 performance in the First Round marked the 13th time that the Stars have been shorthanded for at least 10 minutes without allowing a power-play goal against in a Stanley Cup Playoff game.
 - o The Stars last accomplished this feat on Sept. 2, 2020 against the Avalanche, going 5-for-5 on the penalty kill.
- Game 3 against the Avalanche also marked the 17th time since 1977-78 that the Avalanche have not scored a power play goal in a postseason game while having at least 10 minutes of power-play time.
- Esa Lindell played 8:09 of Dallas' 10:17 of shorthanded time in Game 3 against Colorado, the highest single-game total by a Stars skater in a Stanley Cup Playoff game since the NHL began tracking penalty killing in 1977-78.
 - o He also played all four minutes of Dallas' penalty kill in Game 6 against the Avalanche.
- Lindell's 42:19 of total shorthanded ice time and 4:42 of shorthanded ice time per game led all NHL skaters entering
 play Saturday.
 - Lindell also led the NHL in total shorthanded ice time (287:02) and shorthanded ice time per game (3:35) during the regular season. His 287:02 of shorthanded ice time was nearly 10 more minutes than the second ranked played (Mike Matheson; 277:22).
- Sam Steel totaled 28:17 of shorthanded ice time this postseason, which was the most of any NHL forward entering play
 Saturday. His 3:09 of shorthanded ice time per game during the playoffs was the second-most among NHL forwards
 entering play Saturday.
- Oskar Bäck leads all NHL rookies in total shorthanded ice time (24:32) and shorthanded ice time per game (3:04) this postseason. No other rookie played more than 1:35 of total shorthanded ice time.
 - o Bāck's 24:32 of shorthanded ice time ranked third among all NHL forwards entering play Saturday.
 - o Since the NHL began tracking penalty killing in 1997-98, **Bāck's** 24:32 of shorthanded ice time is already the most by a Stars rookie in postseason franchise history, surpassing the 17:43 of shorthanded ice time Radek Faksa had in 13 Stanley Cup Playoff games his rookie season in 2015-16.

BASH BROS

- Lian Bichsel and Alexander Petrovic have played 19:12 at 5-on-5 together this series against the Jets. During that time, the Stars have outscored the Jets 1-0, outshot them 10-2 and have had 14 scoring chances to Winnipeg's eight.
- Among defensive pairs that have played at least 50 minutes of 5-on-5 together this postseason, the Bichsel/Petrovic
 pairing ranked sixth in the NHL entering play Saturday with a 58.4 percent on-ice Corsi rating according to Natural Stat
 Trick.
- Additionally, Bichsel and Petrovic own a 62.5 expected goals for percentage, which was the fifth-best mark in the NHL
 among defensive pairs that have played at least 50 minutes together entering play Saturday according to
 MoneyPuck.com.
- Bichsel has recorded 32 hits through the first nine games of the postseason, which led all rookies entering play Saturday
 - Bichsel has recorded six hits twice in a game this season in Game 4 against Colorado and in Game 2 against Winnipeg.
- Petrovic had a playoff career-high nine hits in Game 2, the highest total by a Stars skater in a single game since Denis Gurianov also had nine hits on Sept. 8, 2020 against the Vegas Golden Knights. It marked just the sixth instance in franchise history in which a skater has had at least nine hits in a Stanley Cup Playoff game.

JOHNNY B. GOODE

- Wyatt Johnston scored the game-winning goal in Game 7 to secure Dallas' series victory over the Avalanche. His goal came on the power-play with 3:56 remaining in regulation, which is the 11th-latest go-ahead goal in Game 7 history according to NHL Stats.
- With the goal, **Johnston** has now scored in each of the three Game 7s that he has played in in his career, which includes also notching the game-winner in 2023 against Seattle.
- Johnston is the first player in franchise history to score multiple series-clinching goals in a Game 7 according to NHL Stats.
- Johnston has now scored three series-clinching goals in his career, making him the second player in NHL history (Jeremy Roenick, 4) to have at least three series-clinching goals at age 22 or younger according to NHL Stats. He also

became the first player in NHL history to score multiple series-clinching goals in Game 7s at age 22 or younger according to NHL Stats.

- **Johnston** has totaled seven points (3-4—7) in nine games this postseason, which is already the second-highest scoring postseason of his career, trailing only the 16 points (10-6—16) he had in 19 games during the 2024 Stanley Cup Playoffs.
- His 29 career playoff points (17-12—29) are the most of any player selected in the 2021 NHL Draft and are tied for third
 on Dallas' roster since he made his postseason debut in 2023. Johnston trails only Brian Bellows (34) and Miro
 Heiskanen (30) for the most playoff points by a skater in Stars franchise history before turning 22 according to NHL
 Stats.
- Johnston's 17 career playoff goals are the fourth-most in NHL history by a player age 21 or younger according to NHL Stats, trailing only Sidney Crosby (24), Patrick Kane (19) and Jaromir Jagr (19).
- Johnston tallied an assist in Game 6 against Colorado to pass Mike Modano (27) for the third-most career playoff points by a Stars/North Stars player before age 22 according to NHL Stats.
- Johnston scored two goals and added an assist in Game 5 against the Avalanche, marking the third three-point game
 of his postseason career.
- Jonston's first goal of the night came just nine seconds into regulation, which set the franchise record for fastest goal to begin a playoff game and was tied for the fifth-fastest goal to begin a game in Stanley Cup Playoff history according to NHL Stats.
 - His goal was the fastest to begin a playoff game since Derek Roy also scored nine seconds into regulation in Game 4 of the 2007 Conference Finals.
- Johnston's second goal of the night marked the third time in his playoff career that he has scored two goals in a game. According to NHL Stats, Johnston is tied for the third-most multi-goal playoff games by a player age 21 or younger in Stanley Cup Playoff history according to NHL Stats. The only players with more were Sidney Crosby (4) and Pierre Turgeon (4).
- **Johnston** also went 9-for-13 at the faceoff dot in Game 5, setting a single-game career high for faceoffs won in a Stanley Cup Playoff game.
- In Game 2 against the Avalanche, Johnston earned his 10th playoff assist in his career on Evgenii Dadonov's goal, making him the sixth player in Stars/North Stars history with at least 10 playoff helpers before age 22 according to NHL Stats. The others: Miro Heiskanen (22), Brian Bellows (20), Mike Modano (15), Craig Hartsburg (13) and Tom McCarthy (11).

BIKER GANG

- Thomas Harley tallied an assist in Game 1 against the Jets and now has six points (2-4—6) in nine games this postseason, which ranked fourth on the Stars and was tied for fourth among all NHL defensemen entering play Saturday.
- Harley's six points this postseason are already the second-most in his playoff career, trailing only the nine points (1-8—9) he had in 2023 with Dallas.
- Between the regular season and postseason, **Harley** has scored 18 goals, which is the third most in a single season by a Stars defenseman in franchise history according to TSN Stats. He trails only Brad Maxwell (21 in 1983-84) and Phillipp Boucher (19 in 2006-07).
- Harley has totaled 247:15 of ice time this postseason, which led all NHL skaters this postseason entering play Saturday
 and was more than 20 minutes more than the second-ranked player (Dylan Samberg, 224:51). His 27:28 of average ice
 time per game topped all players still playing this postseason entering play Saturday and ranked second to only New
 Jersey's Brian Dumoulin (29:21) during this year's playoffs.
 - Harley set a playoff single-game career high with 35:54 in Game 2 against Colorado, which was also the highest time on ice by an NHL skater in a single game this postseason.
 - He also had 27:34 of ice time in Game 1 against the Avalanche, which was the most he's ever played in a Stanley
 Cup Playoff game that ended in regulation and topped all skaters from either team.
- Harley's six points this postseason brings his playoff career total to 19 (3-16—19). He currently leads all players drafted in 2019 in playoff career goals, assists, points and games played (46).
- Harley was tied for third in the NHL with 25 blocked shots this postseason entering play Saturday, trailing only teammate Esa Lindell and Toronto's Simon Benoit (27 each) for the league lead.
- Harley had a career year in 2024-25, finishing the regular season with 50 points (15-34—50), setting career highs in goals, assists, points, even-strength goals (15), power-play points (15), plus/minus (plus-32) and time on ice per game played (23:23).
 - o His 50 points ranked 15th among all NHL defensemen this season.
- Harley became the third Stars defenseman in the last 10 years to reach the 50-poing plateau (Miro Heiskanen, John Klingberg), and his 16 goals were tied for the sixth-most by a Stars defenseman in a single season in franchise history.
- The Stars outscored their opponents 93-59 when **Harley** was on the ice during even-strength play during the regular-season season, which topped the Stars and was tied for the sixth-best mark in the NHL.

POWER UP

- The Stars have gone 8-for-28 on the power play this postseason for a 28.6 percent success rate, which was the fourthbest mark in the NHL entering play Saturday.
 - o The Stars scored at least one power-play goal in seven of the nine games they played this postseason.

- The Stars eight power-play goals were tied with Los Angeles, Toronto and Vegas for the most in the NHL this postseason
 entering play Saturday.
- Dallas' eight power-play goals were scored by five different skaters: Roope Hintz (2), Wyatt Johnston (2), Mikko Rantanen (2), Jamie Benn and Tyler Seguin.
- The Stars finished their series against Colorado going 7-for 23 on the power play for a 30.4 percent success rate. Their performance against the Avalanche was their best on the power play in a series since 2023 when the team when 9-for-24 for a 37.5 percent success rate against the Minnesota Wild.

FOR PETE'S SAKE

- Head Coach Pete DeBoer has a 93-75 all-time playoff record. His 93 wins are the eighth-most in NHL history and top all active coaches.
 - o He is one postseason win shy of tying Derryl Sutter and Patt Quinn for sixth.
- Those 93 wins have amounted to 18 series wins, which is tied for sixth in NHL history and is also tied with Tampa Bay's Jon Cooper for the most among active head coaches.
- No coach in NHL history has a better record in Game 7s than **DeBoer**, who is a perfect 9-0 in his career. His nine Game 7 victories are the most of any head coach or skater in NHL history.
- The 2025 postseason marks the 10th consecutive year in which a DeBoer-coached team has reached the playoffs, which trails only Paul Maurice (12) and Cooper (11) for the longest active run among head coaches.
- **DeBoer** is looking to reach the Conference Finals for the seventh time in his career after previously doing so with New Jersey (2011-12), San Jose (2015-16, 2018-19), Vegas (2019-20) and Dallas (2022-23, 2023-24).
- Entering this postseason, DeBoer and Cooper are the only active coaches to reach the Conference Finals six separate
 times, with DeBoer being the only coach to achieve that feat with multiple teams.

LUCKY NO. 7

- The Stars defeated the Avalanche 4-2 in Game 7 to advance to the Second Round with goals coming from **Mikko Rantanen** (3) and **Wyatt Johnston**. With the win, the Stars became the first team in NHL history to trail by multiple goals in the third period of a Game 7 and win in regulation according to Opta Stats.
- The Stars also become the fourth team to rally from a multi-goal deficit in the third period to win a Game 7 in NHL history according to Sportsnet Stats. They were joined by the Winnipeg Jets the following day.
- The Stars final tilt with the Avalanche marked the fourth time in franchise history that Dallas has faced Colorado in a Game 7, going a perfect 4-0 in those games.
- The team's victory over the Avalanche marked the fourth time in franchise history that the Stars have overcome a deficit to win a Game 7 according to NHL Stats, also doing so in 2020, 1984 and 1980.
- The Stars trailed entering the third period in three of their eventual four wins in the series, down 3-2 in Game 2 (a 4-3 overtime win), 1-0 in Game 3 (a 2-1 overtime win) and 1-0 in Game 7 (a 4-2 regulation win). According to NHL Stats, the Stars are the first team to win three games in a series after trailing to begin the third period since the Anaheim Ducks did so in the First Round of the 2015 Stanley Cup Playoffs against the Winnipeg Jets.
 - o The Ducks won the first three games of the series after trailing each contest entering the third period.
- With the win, Head Coach **Pete DeBoer** is now a perfect 9-0 in Game 7s in his career. His nine Game 7 wins are the most by any skater or coach in NHL history.
- The Stars have now won at least one series in each of the last three seasons and have improved to a 5-2 record in seven playoff rounds over that span.
- Dallas' streak of three consecutive postseasons with a series win is tied for its second-longest in franchise history according to NHL Stats behind a stretch of four straight from 1998 to 2001 (also 3 from 1983 to 1985).
- The Stars improved to 3-0 in their last three series against the Avalanche and 5-2 in seven all-time postseason rounds versus Colorado dating to the 1999 Conference Finals according to NHL Stats. The Stars' five series wins against the Avalanche are tied for their most versus one opponent since relocating to Texas in 1993-94 (also 5 vs. EDM).

PARTY LIKE IT'S 1999

- The Stars enter the 2025 Stanley Cup Playoffs looking to win their second Stanley Cup in franchise history after defeating the Buffalo Sabres in six games to bring the team's first championship to Dallas in 1999.
- At the time of the Stars' first Stanley Cup win, eight players on the team's current roster had yet to be born: Oskar Bäck, Mavrik Bourque, Lian Bichsel, Thomas Harley, Miro Heiskanen, Wyatt Johnston, Nils Lundkvist and Jason Robertson had not been born yet.
 - Heiskanen (July 18, 1999) and Robertson (July 22, 1999) were both born about a month after the Stars hoisted the Stanley Cup.
- The Stars defeated the Sabres 2-1 on June 19, 1999 to secure the franchise's first-ever championship. On that day...
 - o The number one song in the United States was "If You Had My Love" by Jennifer Lopez.
 - o The number one movie was Disney's "Tarzan."
 - The 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup began. The United States would ultimately go on to win the tournament, led by superstars Mia Hamm and Brandi Chastain.

- Tyler Seguin and Mikko Rantanen are the two players on Dallas' roster who have previously won the Stanley Cup.
- Seguin was a part of Boston's 2011 championship run, winning the Stanley Cup in his rookie season. He recorded seven points (3-4—7) in 13 postseason games.
- Seguin has reached the Finals on two additional occasions: in 2013 with Boston (vs. Chicago) and in 2020 with Dallas (vs. Tampa Bay).
- Rantanen hoisted the Cup in 2022 with the Avalanche, finishing the postseason with 25 points (5-20—25) in 20 games, which was good for fifth in the NHL in scoring that year.

REGULAR SEASON RECAP

- The Stars finished the 2024-25 regular season with a 50-26-6 record, ranking in the top five in the NHL this year in wins (tied fourth), points (fifth), goals for (275, tied third), goals for per game (3.35, tied third) and penalty kill (82.0 percent, tied fourth).
- The 2024-25 campaign marks the second straight year that Dallas has finished the regular season with at least 50 wins and the third consecutive year that the team concluded the regular season with a points percentage above .640.
- This season also sits near the top in the franchise record book in terms of single-season success with the team's 50 wins tying for the fourth-most in franchise history.
- The team's regular-season success this year came in spite of logging 190 man games lost to injury, which includes significant stretches playing without Tyler Seguin (62 games), Miro Heiskanen (32 games), Nils Lundkvist (40 games), Mason Marchment (20 games) and others.

- Stars Player Development Coordinator Ben Bishop played under Jets assistant coach Davis Payne, when Payne was
 the head coach of the St. Louis Blues in 2010-11. They met again when Bishop played in Los Angeles in 2016-17 where
 Payne was an assistant coach for the Kings.
