

Jimmy Vesey, who began his NHL career with the Rangers, returned to the team in 2022-23 after playing three seasons with Buffalo, Toronto, Vancouver, and New Jersey. He recorded 25 points (11G, 14A) in 81 games during the 2022-23 campaign and has totaled 160 points (83G, 77A) in 503 career NHL contests. Prior to turning pro, Vesey played four seasons of collegiate hockey at Harvard from 2012-16, collecting 144 points (80G, 64A) in 128 career NCAA outings. He served as team captain his senior year and won the Hobey Baker Award as college hockey's best player. The Boston, Massachusetts, native has represented his country at the IIHF World Junior Championship in 2013 and the IIHF World hampionship in 2015, helping the U.S. capture a gold medal and bronze medal, respectively.
