HASSO PLATTNER

OWNER

Hasso Plattner serves as the owner of Sharks Sports & Entertainment (SSE). A charter member of the local ownership group that purchased the San Jose Sharks from original owner George Gund III in 2002, Plattner became the organization's majority owner in 2010 and is currently the sole owner of the franchise.

A lifelong hockey fan, Plattner intently followed the game at the international level while growing up in his native Germany. An avid spectator of hockey's World Championships each year, he marveled at the exploits of the Soviet Union's powerhouse hockey teams in the late 1970's and early 1980's.

On a trip to the Bay Area as co-founder of SAP SE, the world's largest business software company, he distinctly recalls the moment his past and future collided while watching the Sharks play in 1993.

"The announcer says (Sergei) Makarov...(Igor) Larionov...(Johan) Garpenlov," Plattner recalled. "Not possible - I see two of the top players I watched for more than 10 years. And here they are."

And so began Plattner's affinity for the San Jose Sharks and hockey in the Bay Area.

His passion for the game of hockey and desire to win have been evident during his tenure as the Sharks majority owner. Under his stewardship, the team earned its first trip to the Stanley Cup Final (2016), made four appearances in the Western Conference Final (2010, 2011, 2016, 2019), and posted four 100+ point seasons.

Plattner affords General Manager Mike Grier the financial autonomy to spend to the NHL's upper limit of the salary cap and ensure the team has the resources it requires to scout, draft, and develop younger players while maintaining the financial stability to ensure the team can build a foundation to returning as a perennial playoff contender.

In addition, Plattner has provided resources for the organization's player development system to take major steps forward in several areas. Over the last several seasons since naming Grier as General Manager, the hockey staff has been significantly built out in several key areas, including analytics, scouting, development, and coaching, providing players the opportunity to learn from alumni who played the game at a high level to hone their craft and development.

Because of this, the Sharks have developed one of the most envious pool of prospects in just a few short seasons, collected several future first and second-round selections to continue the opportunity to add high-end players to the pipeline, and have several exciting younger players competing for roster spots.

Previously in 2014, he committed the financial backing to re-locate the team's American Hockey League (AHL) development affiliate to California in order to enhance the organization's ability to oversee and develop prospects. Along with that relocation came a large-scale, facility expansion at Sharks Ice at San Jose to house the AHL's San Jose Barracuda where the franchise opened the 2022-23 season at Tech CU, along with a major cosmetic modernization and renovation to the Sharks existing practice facilities. The expansion created two additional public ice sheets, making it the largest ice facility under one roof in North America.

Off the ice, Plattner has paid for many major upgrades to SAP Center, ensuring the venue remains a world-class facility despite being one of the oldest in U.S. sports. On Aug. 26, 2025, the City of San Jose and Sharks Sports & Entertainment reached a landmark agreement to fund several major large-scale updates and renovations to the city-owned building, totaling over half a billion dollars of future investment.

With the agreement that was unanimously approved by the City of San Jose, the Sharks will remain in San Jose for another 25 years, extending the lease agreement to the 2050-51 season. After investing over \$100 million of his own money in the arena in the previous 10 years, Hasso and the Sharks are committing at least \$100 million in the venue moving forward ensuring that SAP Center remains modern, world-class sports and entertainment facility for present and future residents throughout Silicon Valley and Northern California.

Some of the large-scale projects previously completed included the installation of a permanent dehumidification system to ensure SAP Center is capable of maintaining the best ice conditions possible in the Bay Area's temperate climate, a brand-new center hung scoreboard which improves the venue's game presentation production prior to and during Sharks games, and a premium seating experience known as the Penthouse Lounge, which provides an exclusive, elevated viewing experience for all SAP Center events. These, and many other SAP Center improvements, were made without public subsidy.

Following the agreement, the future improvements will include deferred maintenance and infrastructure updates to SAP Center's elevators, restrooms, plumbing, Wi-Fi network, sound system, electrical, fire protection system, and emergency generators. Additionally, modernization plans for the main concourse, penthouse, and club levels will enhance the guest in-arena experience while changes at the arena level will update the sports and entertainment locker rooms providing a modernized experience for visiting entertainers, sports teams, and Sharks hockey.

Plattner's passions in life are sports, business and science. After co-founding SAP in 1972, he served as CEO until 2003 and served as Chairman of the Supervisory Board and as Chief Software Advisor until 2024, where he concentrated on defining the medium and long-term technology strategy of SAP. Plattner also was the head of the Technology Committee of the SAP Supervisory Board for over two decades.

Well known for his philanthropic efforts, Plattner is a leading private patron of education and research in science and technology. Following his retirement from day-to-day involvement in SAP, Plattner has devoted his time to the promotion of science, innovation and entrepreneurship, as well as to social and cultural projects.

Under the umbrella of the Hasso Plattner Foundation, which primarily focuses on supporting several transformative projects in education, science, environmental conservation, and art, he founded the Hasso Plattner Institute for Software Systems Engineering (HPI) in 1998 at the University of Potsdam in Germany, and expanded the HPI with a School of Design Thinking in 2007. The Foundation fully funds the HPI, which helped launch the Global Design Thinking Alliance with 10 other institutions to teach, research, and further develop the methods of Design Thinking. The HPI celebrated 20 years of Excellence in 2019, and has grown to over 1,000 alum and continues to expand to this day.

A few years later 2005, Plattner established the Hasso Plattner Institute of Design at Stanford University, informally called the Stanford d.School, which champions methods from the field of design to help people in every function across every industry become more innovative. The Stanford School has helped champion the world-wide adoption of Design Thinking, a formal methodology for tackling complex problems that goes beyond traditional brainstorming by re-framing the problem in human-centric ways.

In 2015, Plattner's desire to make a significant and meaningful impact in the global community led to him signing the Giving Pledge, which further established the Hasso Plattner Foundation.

The following year in 2016, Plattner joined forces with art dealer Guy Wildenstein to form the Wildenstein Plattner Institute, a foundation dedicated to advancing art historical scholarship by fostering the accessibility, cataloguing, and digitization of primary sources. Plattner also helped in the establishment of the Museum

Barberini, devoted to his holdings of modern and Impressionist art, as well as artists active in the former German Democratic Republic (GDR). Several of the masterpieces from the Hasso Plattner Collection have been on permanent loan since 2020.

In 2022, he opened Das Minsk, another private museum in Potsdam, which focuses on East German artists who were active after the fall of the Berlin wall, and in 2024, a nonprofit called Navigating.art joined the Foundation's philanthropic Art and Culture initiatives. The nonprofit has been instrumental in organizing, cataloguing, and publishing education materials to support art researchers in the digital landscape.

In addition to his work in the art and sciences, Plattner has long been active in the fight against AIDS in South Africa.

Plattner has received a number of honors recognizing not only his accomplishments in the business world but his significant track record in giving back to the community.

In 2002, the University of Potsdam appointed him an Honorary Doctor, and in 2004, an Honorary Professor. In 1998, he was inducted into the German Hall of Fame, which honors those who promote economic and social development in Germany. In 1997, he received the Information Technology Leadership Award for Global Integration as part of the Computerworld Smithsonian Awards Program.

In 2016, he was awarded the Prize for Understanding and Tolerance presented by the Jewish Museum Berlin, awarded to "individuals to honor their exceptional contribution to understanding and tolerance, the promotion of human dignity, the integration of minorities and the coexistence of different religions and cultures." In 2015, he was awarded the GABA Lifetime Achievement Award and in 2014 received the Leonardo European Corporate Learning Award in the Thought Leadership category.

Plattner received his master's degree in communications engineering from the University of Karlsruhe. In 1990, the University of Saarbruecken awarded him an honorary doctorate and in 1994 he was granted an honorary full professorship.

Along with being a life-long hockey enthusiast, Plattner is an avid competitive sailor who has participated in numerous 505 World Championships, a race for high-performance two-person sailboats, as well as many offshore races. His top sports hero is Jesse Owens, the track and field star who captured four gold medals at the 1936 Berlin Olympics, and his top personal hero as Nelson Mandela for his ability to guide South Africa out of apartheid.



JONATHAN BECHER

PRESIDENT

Jonathan Becher is president of Sharks Sports & Entertainment, the parent organization for the San Jose Sharks (NHL), the San Jose Barracuda (AHL), three Sharks Ice recreational facilities, and the non-profit Sharks Foundation. A long-time Sharks fan and season ticket holder, Becher is responsible for the organization's overall strategy with a particular focus on the end-to-end experience. He serves as the organization's Alternative Governor for the NHL Board of Governors.

Behind Hasso's leadership and direction, Becher has been instrumental in fostering relationships within the Bay Area community, while also solidifying a positive relationship with the City of San Jose and the people who call San Jose home. On Aug. 26, 2025, after multiple years of negotiations led by Becher, the San Jose City Council unanimously voted to extend the Sharks lease agreement through the 2050-51 season, further entrenching the Sharks brand and identity in San Jose. This new agreement includes City and Sharks financing for several, large-scale updates and renovations to SAP Center, helping ensure the city-owned arena remains a modern, world-class sports and entertainment venue.

Prior to joining Sharks Sports & Entertainment, Becher spent a decade at SAP in a variety of senior executive roles, including Chief Marketing Officer and Chief Digital Officer. While at SAP, he created the Digital Commerce business unit, which allows anyone to buy and use SAP third-party offerings without human intervention, and the Center for Digital Leadership, which empowers C-level executives and their organizations to be successful digital leaders. He also oversaw many large-scale sports and entertainment partnerships, including the National Basketball Association (NBA), the San Francisco 49ers, the Women's Tennis Association (WTA), and the naming rights agreement for the SAP Center at San José.

Prior to SAP, Becher was a three-time software company CEO, focused on analytics and machine learning technology. Becher continues to be an advisor to early-stage companies and is on the Board of Directors of multiple organizations, including Trintech, Catch & Release, and the Bay Area Host Committee. He is the co-chair of NHL Fan Inclusion Council and a member of the Knight San Jose Community Advisory Council.

Becher is a frequent speaker at events and a published author on a variety of topics – including his own popular blog, Manage By Walking Around (http://jonathanbecher.com). He holds a master's degree in computer science from Duke University in North Carolina and a bachelor's degree in computer engineering from the University of Virginia.



GENERAL MANAGER

MIKE GRIER

In his fourth season as general manager of the San Jose Sharks, Mike Grier continues to reshape the franchise from a struggling, once-perennial Stanley Cup Playoff contender into one of the most enviable up-and-coming teams in the National Hockey League.

Grier, 50, has overall authority regarding all aspects of the Sharks hockey-related operations, including overseeing all player personnel decisions, leading the club's player evaluation process at all professional, minor, and junior levels, negotiating player contracts, directing the club's on-ice coaching and off-ice support staffs, and managing the efforts of the team's scouting department.

Since being named the fifth general manager in Sharks franchise history on July 5, 2022, and becoming the first Black general manager in the history of the National Hockey League, Grier has strategically reshaped the Sharks organization in nearly every conceivable area: administration, coaching, player development, and the team's NHL roster and prospect pool.

Shortly after taking over the role, Grier began the difficult but necessary process of re-stocking the organization's pipeline of talent, acquiring young player assets and draft picks in exchange for many of the team's existing veteran players, many of whom were playing on long-term and high dollar contracts. In his first two seasons, Grier made a series of high-profile trades to shed contract term and salary, parting ways with players such as Brent Burns, Timo Meier, Erik Karlsson and Tomas Hertl.

Those transactions, while difficult, brought in several different assets from young players such as Shakir Mukhamadullin and, perhaps most importantly, multiple first-round draft selections which has been used to reinvigorate the team's pipeline into the most enviable prospect pool in the NHL.

Over his last three drafts, Grier added 2023 first-round selection Will Smith and 26th overall Quentin Musty, 2024 first-overall and 2024-25 Calder Finalist Macklin Celebrini and 11th overall Sam Dickinson, who was the OHL and CHL Defenseman of the Year in 2024-25, and 2025 second-overall Michael Misa and 30th overall Joshua Ravensbergen, the top-ranked North American goaltender in the draft by NHL Central Scouting and the earliest goalie ever selected by San Jose, and has selected at least nine players via the draft in each year he has overseen the Sharks operations, adding 36 players to the system.

Just prior to the start of the 2024-25 season, Grier packaged the return from the Hertl trade - forward prospect David Edstrom and Vegas' first round 2025 selection - to the Nashville Predators in exchange for hockey's top-rated goaltending prospect, Yaroslav Askarov, further enhancing the team's pipeline of players, which has been widely claimed to be the top-ranked prospect pool in the NHL.

Additionally, Grier has continued to alter the roster by utilizing players or assets acquired to be traded for additional future assets or young players without giving up significant future assets. In the moves that involved Fabian Zetterlund, Mikael Granlund, and Jake Walman being traded prior to the 2025 deadline, the Sharks collected two first-round draft picks, one in the second round, and one in the fourth, and forward Zach Ostapchuk. Walman originally joined the Sharks via trade from Detroit which netted an additional second-round selection.

While overseeing the team's four drafts, the Sharks have selected a total of 14 players in the first two rounds (seven first-round selections and seven second-round selections), which is behind only Chicago (16) for the most players selected in the opening two rounds since 2022.

Additionally, entering the 2025-26 season, Grier owns four picks (two in the first, two in the second) in the upcoming 2026 NHL Draft to have an additional opportunity to add another set of high-end prospects to arguably the best pipeline in the National Hockey League.

Prior to joining the San Jose organization in his current role, he was hand-picked by New York Rangers President and General Manager and former teammate Chris Drury to serve as a hockey operations advisor. In that role, Grier assisted Drury in hockey-related decisions and off-ice player development, and assisted prospects in the Rangers organization, including players with the Rangers' American Hockey League (AHL) affiliate, the Hartford Wolf Pack.

During the 2021-22 season, a rebuilding Rangers team experienced a 50-point improvement over their 2020-21 campaign, finishing with a 52-24-6 record and 110 points, a second-place finish in the Metropolitan Division (seventh overall in the NHL) and advanced to the Eastern Conference Final, before succumbing to the Tampa Bay Lightning in six games.

Grier also served on USA Hockey's selection committee for the 2022 World Championships, where he assisted in scouting, evaluating and selecting players for the U.S. team.

Grier served as an assistant coach with the New Jersey Devils for two seasons (2018-20). As a member of Head Coach John Hynes' staff, Grier worked directly with the forwards and assisted with the Devils special teams. During his two seasons with the Devils, New Jersey's penalty killing ranked third in the NHL (83.4%) and their net penalty killing percentage was second overall (87.4%). He was also responsible for pre-scouting the Devils opponents.

From 2014-18, Grier served as a scout with the Chicago Blackhawks, including their 2015 Stanley Cup Championship season. Grier focused on scouting amateur and professional players, including the team's prospects and prospective player acquisitions both at the NHL level and via the NHL Draft.

From 2013-17, Grier served as an assistant coach at St. Sebastian's Prep School in Needham, Mass. He has also been active in working on skill development with collegiate and high school hockey players in the Boston area (2011-2017).

As a player, Grier spent 14 seasons in the National Hockey League as one of the game's top defensive forwards and leaders. He amassed 1,060 NHL games with the Edmonton Oilers, Washington Capitals, Buffalo Sabres, and the Sharks, collecting 383 points (162 goals, 221 assists) along with 510 penalty minutes. He served as an alternate captain and as a member of the leadership group with each of his NHL teams. As a physical, penalty-killing forward annually in the conversation for the Frank J. Selke award, Grier helped establish a top unit on multiple teams, including a League-best penalty kill efficiency on San Jose in 2007-08 (85.8%), fifth-best in 2008-09 and he helped Buffalo achieve the second-best efficiency in 2009-10 (86.6%).

During his NHL tenure between 1996-2011, Grier tied for 11th amongst all NHL players with 20 short-handed goals. Despite the NHL not tracking advanced statistics until the 2005-06 season, Grier ranks 10th amongst all NHL forwards in blocked shots (315) and 33rd in hits (705) over the course of his career.

He initially joined the Sharks organization as a free agent on July 3, 2006 and over the next three seasons, appeared in 221 NHL games, recording 78 points (35 goals, 43 assists). As an alternate captain, Grier helped the Sharks reach the Stanley Cup Conference Semifinals in 2006-07 and 2007-08. He was also a member of the Sharks 2008-09 Presidents' Trophy-winning club that won 53 games and earned 117 points.

His best season with the franchise was in 2006-07 where he registered 33 points (16 goals, 17 assists) in 81 games and led the club in short-handed goals (three). He then added four points (two goals, two assists) in the 2007 postseason in 11 games, which included a two-point game where he scored a goal and assisted

on the game-winning goal by Patrick Rissmiller in the second overtime of Game One of the Western Conference Quarter Final against the Nashville Predators, en-route to a 4-1 series victory for the Sharks.

Originally selected by the St. Louis Blues in the 1993 NHL Draft (ninth round, 219th overall), Grier's rights were later traded to the Edmonton Oilers, along with goaltender Curtis Joseph, for St. Louis' first-round selections in the 1996 and 1997 NHL Drafts. Grier earned a spot on the Oilers roster directly after his collegiate career and never played a game in the minor leagues. Upon his NHL debut on Oct. 4, 1996, Grier became the first African American born and trained in the U.S. to play in the NHL

Grier's teams appeared in the Stanley Cup Playoffs in 12 of his 14 NHL seasons, including advancing to the 2006 Eastern Conference Final, where Buffalo narrowly lost a seven-game series to Carolina. In 101 Stanley Cup Playoff games, Grier tallied 28 points (14 goals, 14 assists) and 72 penalty minutes.

Grier has also had a long-standing relationship as a player and a coach with USA Hockey, beginning with being selected to the 1995 World Junior Championship team. He was a member of the 1996 U-21 National team and captured a bronze medal at the 2003 World Championships, where he was named an assistant captain. Off the ice, Grier served as coach at the USA Hockey 17s Festival and the CCM All-American Prospects Game in 2014, was an assistant coach for the U.S.

women's national team for the Winter Series vs. Canada (2016) and was a coach and a member of the selection committee for the U.S. women's national team Olympic evaluation camps (2015-2017) ahead of the 2018 Winter Games.


Prior to his NHL career, Grier played for Boston University over three seasons, compiling 120 points (59 goals, 61 assists) in 114 games. He helped lead the team to an NCAA Championship in 1995 and captured a Hockey East Championship in two consecutive seasons (1993-95). Following the 1994-95 season, he was named to the All-Hockey East First Team, selected to the Division I AHCA All-American Team, won the Walter Brown Award as the best U.S.-born collegiate player in New England, and was a finalist for the Hobey Baker Award, awarded to the top collegiate hockey player. Grier was selected as the BU's captain for the 1995-96 season but withdrew from the university to begin his NHL career.

Grier comes from a family embedded in the fabric of leadership, scouting and development in professional sports. His father, Bobby, is a long-time executive in the National Football League, with stints in scouting, player personnel and as an advisor with the New England Patriots and Houston Texans. He currently serves as a consultant with the Miami Dolphins. His brother, Chris, has served as general manager of the Miami Dolphins since 2016. Chris worked as a scout for Miami dating back to 2000, and previously worked in scouting with the Patriots beginning in 1995.

In 2022, Grier was named to the EBONY Power 100 List in the Business Disruptors category, recognizing the groundbreaking achievements and societal contributions of industry leaders championing for change across industries.

Grier, a native of Detroit, MI, and his wife, Anne, have three children: sons Jayden and Tristan, and daughter Brooklyn.

JOE WILL

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER, SAN JOSE SHARKS / GENERAL MANAGER, SAN JOSE BARRACUDA

Joe Will enters his 15th season as assistant general manager for the San Jose Sharks and his 13th as general manager of the Sharks' American Hockey League affiliate (Worcester Sharks and San Jose Barracuda).

In San Jose, Will works closely with General Manager Mike Grier on all daily departmental functions and his primary responsibilities include contract research and negotiations, scouting operations, fiscal planning, salary cap analysis and hockey administration.

In addition, as general manager of the San Jose Barracuda, he oversees all of the hockey operations for the Sharks AHL affiliate, including player evaluation, player contracts, and player recall and reassignments.

Will has been instrumental in the Barracuda's success and focusing his efforts to help strengthen the organization's player development system and program.

Beginning in the 2015-16 season, the Sharks relocated their American Hockey League affiliate to San Jose and the Barracuda became a part of the AHL's new Pacific Division and play in Tech CU Arena, which was established as the 'Cuda's permanent home building in 2022. The move west eliminated the need to fly players across the United States in the event of recalls and reassignments, adding valuable rest and practice time. It also allowed for greater interaction and observation from San Jose's development coaches and upper management hockey staff.

The relocation paid immediate dividends, and continues to do so to this day. In the 2024-25 season, the Barracuda witnessed 17 different players appear for both the Sharks and Barracuda, with Luca Cagnoni and Ethan Cardwell making their respective NHL Debuts. Additionally, the Sharks added several quality veterans to not only provide veteran experience to the young players in the professional ranks, but to also have stable leadership, improved on-ice play, and a more wholistic blend of young and veteran players.

The additions to the Barracuda helped the team qualify for the AHL postseason for the first time since 2021 (play-in rounds). The team defeated the Ontario Reign on the road in the opening series (2-0), but ultimately fell to Colorado in the Division Semifinals. Several young players made their professional debuts in the AHL postseason, including Collin Graf (five points), Filip Bystedt (three goals), Luca Cagnoni (three assists), and Yaroslav Askarov who finished with a 1.68 goals-against average and .935 save percentage, ranking in the Top-5 among all qualified AHL goalies.

Since the team's inception to the Pacific Division after relocating for the 2015-16 season, the Barracuda have qualified for the playoffs five times, and in the 2016-17 season, won the Pacific Division title with a 43-16-4-5 record (95 points) and made an appearance in the Western Conference Final against the Grand Rapids Griffins.

That season, team finished with the second-best winning percentage in the AHL (0.699%), winning the Bud Poile Trophy as the Western Conference regular season champions and the John Chick Trophy as Pacific Division champions. In addition, the Barracuda held an AHL season-long winning streak of 14 games, paced the AHL in goals per game (3.44), ranked second on the power play (23.8%), eighth ranked penalty kill (83.3%) and had nine different players spend time on the Sharks roster, all while having the fifth youngest team in the league. The season marked one of the most successful campaigns in San Jose Sharks minor league affiliate history.

All of these accomplishments occurred following a concerted effort by the front office to reinvigorate the organization's top-ranked prospect pool, largely spearheaded, at the AHL level, by Joe Will.

One of Will's most important duties involves the tracking, analyzing and projecting of the team's player payroll relative to the current and future National Hockey League salary cap to give the team the financial flexibility to ice a championship-caliber team each season.

Will, 59, also works with the organization's professional scouts and management team in player research for expansion, waivers, free agency and trades. His expert analysis of economic trends in the NHL has led to the Sharks acquisition and retention of several key veteran players over his time with the club.

Additionally, Will was named as the interim general manager for the Sharks on Apr. 7, 2022, and handled the day-to-day duties as general manager in addition to his role as the assistant general manager until the hire of the current Sharks General Manager Mike Grier on July 5, 2022.

Prior to his current roles, Will served as the team's director of hockey operations from 2004-2011. A member of the Sharks organization since the franchise's inception in July 1990, he has also previously served as assistant to the general manager and scouting coordinator.

The Bloomington, Minn. native also works with director of scouting Tim Burke in the development and implementation of draft prospect testing, draft table operations and computer scouting analysis. Will is an integral part of the team's draft-day strategy. Without his coordinating efforts, the team would not have drafted 2001 Calder Memorial Trophy winner Evgeni Nabokov in 1994. In addition, he developed the Sharks computer scouting program that pioneered the advent of scouting programs now used throughout the NHL.

Prior to joining San Jose, Will spent six years in the Minnesota North Stars organization in various capacities.

TOM HOLY

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Tom Holy enters his fourth year as Assistant General Manager, and will oversee the analytics department, staff budgeting and contracts. He will be the liaison between the Sharks Hockey Operations and Business departments, along with the NHL scheduling for the team.

He primarily has served in various roles in Media Relations and Public Relations with the Dallas Stars, Sharks and Cleveland Barons. He served as the Stars Vice President, Communications and Broadcasting from 2013-2022, and was the Sharks Media Relations Manager

from 2005-2013. In his role as VP with the Stars, he led the organization's efforts in hockey communications, corporate communications and player relations, and served as the organization's spokesman for all news.

Holy also helped earn six separate Dick Dillman Awards, including four straight seasons with San Jose from 2007-10, presented annually by the Professional Hockey Writer's Association to honor the work of the NHL's top public relations team.

In addition, Holy Served as a Development Coach for Seiler FEC working with the 2020 and 2021 rookie classes of the Cleveland Browns and Indianapolis Colts centering around financial education and budgeting.



TIM BURKE

SENIOR ADVISOR/PRO SCOUT

Tim Burke enters his fourth season as senior advisor/pro scout and his 32nd season overall with the Sharks, after four seasons as assistant general manager alongside Joe Will. Burke previously worked as the director of scouting with San Jose for 21 years.

Burke assists the Sharks efforts in the National Hockey League's annual draft while working closely with General Manager Mike Grier and his staff, and the development of the Sharks prospects.

Burke's hard work and keen decision making, coupled with the talents of his competent staff at evaluating players, produced admired results during the franchise's perennial Stanley Cup run from 2003-2019. Burke's selection process helped the Sharks create a solid foundation of talented players from which to build the franchise around – including Joe Pavelski (2003), Marc-Edouard Vlasic (2005), Justin Braun (2007), Logan Couture (2007), Dylan DeMelo (2011), Tomas Hertl and Chris Tierney (2012), and Timo Meier (2015).

Beginning with the 2003 NHL Draft, and through the 2017 draft, Sharks draft selections played the fifth-most games of any NHL team's draft picks (10,411) and posted the fifth-most goals (1,693) in that span, despite the organization having the lowest average draft position of any NHL team during that span (129.75).

A member of the Sharks scouting department since the 1992-93 campaign, Burke was promoted to director of scouting on June 4, 1996. Before his promotion, Burke served as director of professional scouting from 1992-96 and evaluated talent throughout all North American professional leagues and assisted with amateur scouting.

From 1987-92, he spent five seasons in the New Jersey Devils organization, serving in several capacities, including as a Devils assistant coach, head coach for the American Hockey League's Utica Devils and as a pro scout. Burke was also an assistant coach at Princeton University from 1984-86.

A former defenseman, Burke was selected by the Montreal Canadiens in the seventh round (124th overall) of the 1975 NHL Entry Draft and by the Chicago Cougars in the second round (25th overall) of the 1974 World Hockey Association Entry Draft. He was a four-year letterman in both hockey and baseball at the University of New Hampshire, where he was named to the NCAA's All-America hockey team after his senior campaign.

He played seven years of professional hockey following his outstanding collegiate career, including three seasons (1977-80) with the Nova Scotia Voyageurs, the Canadiens AHL affiliate, and one season with Jokerit Helsinki in the Finnish Elite League.



SCOTT FITZGERALD

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Entering his fourth season as Director of Player Personnel, Fitzgerald will focus on pro and amateur scouting, including potential top-two round selections at the NHL Draft and college free agents.

Fitzgerald, in tandem with Director of Amateur Scouting Chris Morehouse, have strategically helped the Sharks franchise select several high-level prospects with the picks accumulated by General Manager Mike Grier.

In the 2025 Draft, with four picks in the first two rounds of the draft, Fitzgerald helped select second-overall Michael Misa, 30th overall Joshua Ravensbergen, 33rd overall Haoxi (Simon) Wang, and 53rd overall Cole McKinney.

Under his guidance and expertise, the Sharks have accumulated several high quality players from the first two rounds of the draft from 2023, including Cam Lund, Will Smith, Quentin Musty, Kasper Halttunen, and in 2024, added first-overall and 2024-25 Calder Finalist Macklin Celebrini along with 11th overall choice Sam Dickinson, who was the OHL's and CHL's Top Defenseman of the Season in 2024-25. Each of these players signed with the organization, and currently two of these players made their NHL debuts last season.

He previously was with the Boston Bruins for 16 seasons, joining the franchise in 2006. He worked in various roles, including Chief College Scout, Director of Amateur Scouting, Scouting Coordinator and Scout. He also worked with the Columbus Blue Jackets as a scout from 1999-2006. His brother Tom is the current general manager for the New Jersey Devils.



TODD MARCHANT

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT, SENIOR ADVISOR

Todd Marchant begins his fourth season as the team's director of player development, senior advisor. Marchant will oversee the player development department.

Under the direction of Marchant, along with the organization's development coaches, the Sharks have witnessed several players make their NHL debut in the last couple seasons with the organization while also developing with the San Jose Barracuda, including Shakir

Mukhamadullin, Luca Cagnoni, and Ethan Cardwell.

Previously, he worked with the Anaheim Ducks organization for 11 seasons as Director of Player Personnel (2021-22), and Director of Player Development (2011-21), overseeing the Anaheim prospects and their development in professional hockey. As a player, he amassed 1,195 career NHL games with the New York Rangers, Edmonton Oilers, Columbus Blue Jackets, and Ducks, scoring 498 points (186 goals, 312 assists). He won his first Stanley Cup with the Ducks in 2007, appearing in 11 playoff games and collecting three assists. Originally selected by the Rangers in the 1993 NHL draft (seventh round, 164th overall), Marchant retired from the NHL on June 29, 2011.



RYAN STEWART

PRO PERSONNEL, SENIOR ADVISOR

Ryan Stewart, in his fourth season as pro personnel, senior advisor, will oversee the Sharks professional staff in North American and Europe.

Before joining the Sharks, Stewart worked in the Chicago Blackhawks organization in various roles, most recently as the Assistant General Manager, Pro Evaluation for two seasons. He earned the roles of Vice President, Pro Scouting (2014-20), Director, Pro Scouting (2012-14),

and served as both a professional scout (2010-12) and amateur scout (2008-10). While with the Chicago organization, the team won the Stanley Cup three times (2010, 2013, and 2015).

Prior to his scouting assignments, Stewart oversaw power play systems as an assistant coach in the 2007-08 season and was tasked with video coach duties in 2006-07. Before joining the Blackhawks, he served as the ECHL's Greenville Grrrowl General Manager in 2005-06 and was the assistant coach and assistant general manager in 2004-05.

As a professional hockey player, Stewart primarily played with Greenville in the ECHL, appearing in 325 career games recording 157 points (69 goals, 88 assists) and helped Greenville capture the ECHL Championship in 2002, scoring six points in 17 games. In his final season in 2003-04, Stewart served as the team's captain. He also appeared in one AHL game with the Providence Bruins and had a stint with the British Ice Hockey Super League.

DOUG WEIGHT

HOCKEY OPS ADVISOR

Weight begins his fourth season as Hockey Operations Advisor for the Sharks. In this role, Weight will report directly to General Manager Mike Grier, collaborating with Grier on player personnel, player acquisitions, drafting and development.

Prior to joining the Sharks, Weight served in a variety of hockey operations roles with the New York Islanders. At the conclusion of his playing career in 2011, Weight was named senior advisor to the general manager and assistant coach. In 2014, he was promoted to assistant general manager while retaining his role behind the bench.

On Jan. 17, 2017, the Islanders promoted Weight to interim head coach, and he was officially named head coach on April 12, 2017 after he leading the team to a 24-12-4 record after taking over the coaching duties. He served as the team's head coach for the entire 2017-18 season, until Barry Trotz was named as his replacement.

In 122 games as a head coach with the Islanders, the team posted a 59-49-14 record.

Weight played in 1,238 NHL games with the New York Rangers, Edmonton Oilers (where he was a teammate of Grier's from 1996-2001), St. Louis Blues, Carolina Hurricanes, Anaheim Ducks, and New York Islanders. His 1,033 points (278 goals, 755 assists) ranks T-79th all-time and his assist total ranks 43rd all-time in NHL history. Amongst U.S.-born players, he ranks 5th in assists, 6th in power play points (438), 13th in games played, and T-28th in goals.

In 97 Stanley Cup Playoff games, Weight posted 72 points (23 goals, 49 assists) and was a member of the 2006 Stanley Cup-winning Carolina Hurricanes.

A four-time NHL All-Star, Weight was selected to the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame on July 25, 2013 and inducted into the Oilers Hall of Fame on Oct. 26, 2023. He was also named the recipient of the 2011 King Clancy Memorial Trophy.

Internationally, Weight has represented the United States on multiple occasions. He was named to the 1998, 2002 and 2006 Winter Olympics men's hockey teams, capturing a silver medal in 2002. He was also selected to the 1996 and 2004 World Cup of Hockey teams, helping Team USA win the championship in 1996. A member of the 1991 World Junior Championship squad, he led the tournament in scoring with 14 points. He also represented the U.S. in the 1993, 1994 and 2005 World Championships.



THOMAS VANEK

HOCKEY OPS ADVISOR

Vanek enters his third season with San Jose Sharks organization, serving as Hockey Operations advisor after two seasons as a scout in the Minnesota region. He was named to his new role prior to the start of the 2025-26 season.

In a decorated 14-year playing career, the forward totaled 789 points (373 goals, 416 points) over 1,029 NHL games, splitting 14 seasons between the Buffalo Sabres, New York Islanders, Montreal Canadiens, Detroit Red Wings, Florida Panthers, Vancouver Canucks and Columbus Blue Jackets. A two-time 40-goal scorer with the Sabres, Vanek led the NHL in power play goals in 2008-09 and was named to the NHL's Second All-Star Team in 2006-07 in addition to playing in the 2009 NHL All-Star Game. He ranks fifth all-time in Sabres history with 254 goals, was a member of the AHL's All-Rookie Team in 2004-05 and won a NCAA national championship with Minnesota in 2003, earning a spot on the NCAA All-Tournament Team. Vanek, who has served as an assistant for Stillwater High (USHS) following his retirement after the 2018-19 season, resides in Stillwater, Minnesota with his wife, Ashley, and their three sons Blake (17), Luka (13) and Kade (13).



CHRIS MOREHOUSE

DIRECTOR OF AMATEUR SCOUTING

Chris Morehouse will begin his fourth season in the Sharks organization as director of amateur scouting. In his role, Morehouse will oversee the Sharks amateur staff and run the draft.

Starting with his first draft with the team in 2023, Morehouse has managed the selection of 27 players, including six first-round selections in first-overall Macklin Celebrini, 2nd overall Michael Misa, 4th overall Will Smith, 11th overall Sam Dickinson, 26th overall Quentin Musty, and 30th overall Joshua Ravensbergen. Four of those players are signed on an entry-level contract with the organization.

Following the conclusion of the 2024-25 season, several of these players earned or were considered for several top-tier accolades. Celebrini was a 2024-25 Calder Finalist, Dickinson was the CHL and OHL's Top defenseman, Michael Misa was the OHL's Top scorer and was named the league's Most Outstanding Player.

Additionally, several players drafted by the Sharks have shown promise at both the professional and junior levels. Luca Cagnoni, a fourth-round selection, made his pro debut with the Barracuda and led all AHL rookie defensemen in points. He also appeared in a brief stint with the Sharks, playing in six games and collecting two assists.

Kasper Halttunen returned to juniors after a brief stint with the Barracuda, recording four points in six games. He proceeded to help lead the OHL's London Knights to back-to-back OHL Championships, along with a Memorial Cup victory. Igor Chernyshov, after returning from injury halfway in the 2024-25 season, put up 55 points in 23 regular season games, averaging over two points-per-game.

Prior to joining the Sharks, he worked with the New York Rangers as Director of North American Scouting for three seasons. Morehouse also worked with the Columbus Blue Jackets for seven seasons, serving as the Assistant Director of Amateur Scouting for three years and joined the club initially as an amateur scout.

As a player, Morehouse played two seasons at St. Thomas University after two years in professional hockey with the Alaska Aces, Cincinnati Cyclones, Greenville Road Warriors (ECHL), and Tulsa Oilers (Central Hockey League). He also appeared with Saint Mary's University in 2008-09 and played junior hockey in the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League with the Moncton Wildcats, where he served as captain in his final season with the team.

STEPHANE LeBLANC

DIRECTOR OF CHL SCOUTING

Stephane begins his fourth season with the Sharks organization as director of CHL scouting. Leblanc spent the previous eight years as an amateur scout with the Columbus Blue Jackets. In Columbus, Leblanc was part of a scouting staff that selected 21 players who have gone on to reach the NHL since the 2015 draft.

Prior to his stint with the Blue Jackets, LeBlanc began his scouting career with the QMJHL Saint John Sea Dogs', drawing responsibility as a New Brunswick regional scout for six seasons.

Originally from Memramcook, New Brunswick, Stephane now resides in Dieppe, New Brunswick with his wife, Megan, and three children; Janelle, Jasmine and Felix.

HEAD COACH

RYAN WARSOFSKY

Warsofsky is one of the NHL's brightest up-and-coming head coaches and has been successful at nearly every level of hockey he has coached at in his career, which includes an IIHF World Championship Gold Medal as Head Coach with Team USA (2025), a Calder Cup Championship with the Chicago Wolves (Head Coach, 2021-22) and Charlotte Checkers (Assistant Coach, 2018-19) in the American Hockey League (AHL), and owns a career 105-47-11-7 regular season record (.671%) in the AHL.

The 37-year-old, who remains the youngest active head coach in the NHL, begins his second season behind the bench as the 11th full time Sharks Head Coach after being named to the role on June 13, 2024. This is his fourth season overall with the team, previously serving as Assistant Coach.

Warsofsky has been tasked with the development of the team's young players at the highest level and setting the foundation for future success to help return the team to perennial playoff success.

Despite the on-ice results in his first season, Warsofsky's direction showed improvement in the team's play, and several of the franchise's U-22 players had experienced successful seasons. San Jose led the NHL in scoring from players 22 and younger, finishing the year with 192 such points, second-most in club history behind only 2006-07 (197). Additionally, Macklin Celebrini, the organization's first-overall selection in 2025, set several franchise rookie records and by the end of the season was named a Calder Finalist. Will Smith, despite having a slow start to the year, catapulted himself into the conversation, finishing top-5 among rookies in nearly every offensive category. Fabian Zetterlund, prior to his trade to Ottawa, was on track for a second consecutive 20-goal season, and William Eklund, Collin Graf, and Shakir Mukhamadullin all experienced significant improvements in their game, with Eklund setting career bests in goals, assists, and points.

Warsofsky earned his first NHL victory in the position on Oct. 28, 2024 at Utah, capping a come-from-behind win after trailing 4-1 in the third period, becoming the 100th-youngest coach (37 years, two days) in NHL history to record his first win, the fourth-youngest since 2000 and 22nd-youngest of his lifetime.

Warsofsky owns a career 20-50-12 record as Head Coach with the Sharks.

After the conclusion of the 2024-25 season, Warsofsky was named as Head Coach to Team USA for the first time, marking his second position with the team where he previously served as Assistant Coach for the 2023 IIHF World Championship team and helped USA to a fourth-place finish.

Warsofsky guided the youngest roster in the tournament, an average of 24 years old, to a Gold Medal finish, the first time since 1933 the country has won gold in the tournament and is the country's second ever gold medal finish in the tournament. Team USA won nine of its 10 games (7-2-0-1), capping off the World Championship win in a dramatic 1-0 overtime win over Team Switzerland.

Prior to being named head coach of the franchise, Warsofsky served as an assistant from 2022-24, where he was responsible for overseeing the team's defense and penalty kill. Working with one of the younger rosters in the NHL, the Sharks penalty kill ranked 18th in the NHL at 78.8%.

As a first year Assistant Coach in 2022-23, Erik Karlsson collected a franchise-record 101 points by a defenseman, helping the blueliner win his second Norris Trophy, and becoming the Sharks second player to win the award. Karlsson became the sixth NHL defenseman at the time to ever eclipse the 100-point threshold, and his 1.23 points-per-game was the third-best in the past three decades among defenseman who appeared in at least five or more games in any given season.

In the same season, the Sharks defensive unit scored the eighth-most points (tied) by defensemen, collecting 191 points, and held the third-most (tied) assists among team blueliners in the league. San Jose's defensive core accounted for 30.0% of the team's points, the highest rating among all NHL teams. The Sharks also held the eight-best penalty kill unit, earning an 82.4% efficiency while the team was a man down.

Warsofsky joined the Sharks following two seasons (2020-22) as head coach of the Chicago Wolves (AHL). He led the Wolves to the AHL's best regular-season record with a 50-16-5-5 record (.724%) in 2021-22 and captured the 2022 Calder Cup, his second Calder Cup Championship, earning a 14-4 record over four different series during the playoffs. The year prior in his first stint with Chicago, Warsofsky guided the team to the third-best record in the league (21-9-1-2), but the AHL did not hold a formal playoffs due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In his two seasons, the Wolves amassed a 71-25-6-7 record and the team's penalty kill ranked in the Top-10 twice (2021-22, fifth; 2020-21, ninth) and the power-play ranked fourth in 2020-21.

Prior to his time with Chicago, Warsofsky worked with the Charlotte Checkers (AHL) for two seasons. He started as an assistant coach in 2017-18 and helped the team capture the Calder Cup 2017-18, overseeing the top penalty killing unit in the League (86.6%). The following year in the abbreviated season, he was named as the League's youngest head coach (31) on July 10, 2019 and guided the team to a 34-22-5-0 and ranked third in both power-play and penalty kill percentage.

As head coach in the AHL with Chicago and Charlotte, Warsofsky earned a 105-47-11-7 record (.671%).

Warsofsky also worked with the ECHL's South Carolina Stingrays for five seasons, including two seasons as head coach/director of hockey operations (2016-2018) after starting as an assistant coach. In his two seasons at the helm, South Carolina posted an 88-44-10-2 record and the team advanced to the Kelly Cup Final in 2017. Warsofsky has also worked as an assistant coach in the NCAA with Curry College for one season (2012-13).

Ryan resides in Massachusetts in the offseason with his wife Caroline, son Cal and daughter Lucy.



BRIAN WISEMAN

ASSISTANT COACH

Wiseman, 54, enters his fourth season as assistant coach. His primary responsibilities will be coaching the power play and working with the team's forwards.

He previously served as assistant coach for the Edmonton Oilers from 2019-22, focusing on the team's offensive strategies, working with the team's forwards with an additional focus on face-offs, and collaborating with the coaching staff on general game preparation and

pre-scouting their opponents.

Prior to working in Edmonton, Wiseman spent eight seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Michigan, including an appearance in the 2018 Frozen Four. Wiseman also served as an assistant coach with the Houston Aeros of the American Hockey League in 2010-11, Princeton University in 2003-04, and served as the video coach in 2002-03 with the Dallas Stars.

As a professional player, Wiseman appeared in three games for the Toronto Maple Leafs in 1996-97, and primarily played in the International Hockey League with the Chicago Wolves and Houston Aeros, appearing in 375 games. He won the Turner Cup in the IHL in the 1998-99 season with Houston where he led the league in points and was named the IHL's Most Valuable Player in the regular season. He also played one season for the St. John's Maple Leafs (AHL), scoring 95 points (33 goals, 62 assists) in 71 games.

He spent his collegiate career with the University of Michigan over four years, named as captain for his senior season and collected 249 points (84 goals, 165 assists) in 166 NCAA games. He was named the NCAA Rookie of the Year in 1990-91, and was a Hobey Baker Finalist in 1993-94.

Wiseman was inducted into the Chatham Sports Hall of Fame in 2007.

Brian and his wife, Brandee, have two daughters; Chloe and Cameron.

DOUG HOUDA

ASSISTANT COACH

Houda, 59, enters his second season with the San Jose Sharks as an assistant coach, and oversees the team's defensemen and penalty kill.

Prior to joining the staff in 2024-25, he spent the previous two seasons with the New York Islanders as assistant coach, where he oversaw the team's defensemen. While Houda was with the club, the Islanders improved 13 slots from 2022-23 to 2023-24 in goals against during the season, and the team's defensemen combined for seven game-winning goals last year, which was tied for seventh among NHL teams. The club finished ranked ninth on the penalty kill in his first season on Long Island, and the penalty kill unit scored the 11th-most shorthanded goals (16) across his two years.

Houda guided four Islanders defensemen to set or match their career-high in scoring last season, spearheaded by a 70-point effort from 24-year-old blueliner Noah Dobson. Alexander Romanov, also 24, logged a career-best plus-23 rating in 2023-24 while matching his personal best in scoring of 22 points, previously set in 2022-23.

Prior to joining the Islanders, Houda served six seasons as an assistant coach with the Detroit Red Wings and 10 years in the same role with the Boston Bruins, where he won the Stanley Cup in 2011. He also spent three seasons as an assistant coach with the Rochester Americans of the American Hockey League (AHL) from 2003-06.

The Blairmore, Alberta native enjoyed a 17-year professional playing career in which he skated in 561 NHL games, split between the Red Wings, Islanders, Hartford Whalers, Los Angeles Kings, Buffalo Sabres and Anaheim Mighty Ducks, logging 82 points (19 goals, 63 assists). He also appeared in 550 career AHL games as a member of the Rochester Americans, Adirondack Red Wings and Utah Grizzlies, tallying 238 points (55 goals, 183 assists) and won a Calder Cup with Rochester in 1995-96.



JEFF ULMER

ASSISTANT COACH

Ulmer, 48, enters his second season as assistant coach with the Sharks.

Prior to joining in his current role, he served as an assistant coach with the Abbotsford Canucks of the American Hockey League for the previous three seasons, where he oversaw the team's power play and forwards. Ulmer oversaw the development of seven forwards who appeared on the 2023-24 NHL Pacific Division champion Vancouver Canucks over the course of the season, including AHL All-Star

Classic participant, 23-year-old Arshdeep Bains, who finished second in scoring on the AHL Canucks with 55 points (16 goals, 39 assists) on the year.

The club finished second in the AHL's Pacific Division in scoring in 2023-24, tied for third in the Western Conference and sixth in the AHL with 234 markers in 72 games. In his first year with Abbotsford, the Canucks finished second in the Pacific Division on the man-advantage as the special teams unit clicked at a 23.0-percent clip.

Prior to his post in Abbotsford, Ulmer spent two years as Director of Player Development and as a Skills Coordinator with the Arizona Coyotes.

In his playing career, the Regina, Saskatchewan native played in 21 games in the NHL as a member of the New York Rangers as part of a professional career that saw him log competition in 12 countries over 19 seasons. He totaled in 258 AHL games, tallying 122 points (50 goals, 72 assists) as a member of the Hartford Wolf Pack, Grand Rapids Griffins, Binghamton Senators and Hershey Bears.

EVGENI NABOKOV

DIRECTOR, GOALTENDING Evgeni Nabokov enters his fourth season as Director, Goaltending and 11th year in the Sharks Hockey Operations. He previously served

as the goaltending coach for seven seasons (2015-2022). In his role with San Jose, Nabokov oversees the organization's efforts to assist goaltenders in the development of their skills and technique.

After an illustrious career, Nabokov retired as a member of the San Jose Sharks on Feb. 11, 2015. Nabokov, 43, holds nearly every major San Jose Sharks franchise goaltending record, including: games played (563), wins (293) and shutouts (50).

Nabokov finished his remarkable career ranked 18th on the NHL's all-time wins list (353), 17th in shutouts (59) and 25th in games played by a goaltender (697). He appeared in 86 career Stanley Cup Playoff games (23rd all-time), and ranks 26th all-time in postseason wins (42) and T-21st in postseason shutouts (7). He helped lead the Sharks to two of their three franchise Western Conference Final appearances (2004, 2010). In 697 career NHL games with San Jose, the New York Islanders and Tampa Bay Lightning, Nabokov posted a 353-227-29-71 record, with a 2.44 goals-against average, a .911 save percentage and 59 shutouts.

Originally drafted by San Jose in the ninth round (219th overall) of the 1994 NHL Draft - the 22nd goaltender taken that year - Nabokov leads all goalies selected in that draft in NHL career wins and shutouts, and ranks second in games played. He made his NHL debut on Jan. 1, 2000 at Nashville, and in his first NHL start on Jan. 19, 2000, he dueled future Hall-of-Famer Patrick Roy to a 0-0 tie in Colorado, making 39 saves.

In 2001, his first full NHL season, Nabokov was the recipient of the Calder Memorial Trophy as the League's Rookie of the Year, was named as the goaltender for the 2000-01 NHL All-Rookie Team and selected to play in the NHL All-Star Game.

Nabokov finished as the runner-up for the Vezina Trophy as the NHL's top goaltender during the 2007-08 season, was named to the 2007-08 NHL First All-Star Team and was selected to play in the NHL All-Star Game. His 46 wins that season were the fourth-most in a single-season in NHL history and his 77 appearances was the third-most in NHL history.

On March 10, 2002 in Vancouver, he became just the seventh goaltender (first of European descent) to score a goal. He was the first NHL goalie to score while his team was on a power play.

Internationally, the native of Ust-kamenogorsk, Kazakhstan, represented Russia on the international stage several times in his career. He served as Russia's starting goaltender in the 2006 (1.34 goals-against average) and 2010 Winter Olympics and also played for Russia in two World Championships (2008, 2011). In the 2008 World Championships, he led Russia to a gold medal, posting a 1.78 goals-against average while being voted to the Media All-Star Team, named Russia's top player and voted "Best Goalkeeper" in the tournament. He also was named to Russia's roster for the 2004 World Cup of Hockey.

Nabokov also played in his native Russia in 2004-05 with Metallurg and with SKA St. Petersburg of the KHL in 2010-11.

THOMAS SPEER

NHL GOALTENDING COACH

Speer, 38, enters his fourth season as NHL Goaltending Coach for the Sharks. He works with Evgeni Nabokov and the Sharks goaltenders.

Internationally, he has served as the goaltending coach for Team USA twice in 2023 and 2025, and the USA World Junior Championship U-18 team in 2017-18. In 2025, he helped Team USA achieve a gold-medal finish, the first gold in the tournament since 1933. Across 10 games in Worlds, Speer helped the USA goalies to a .920 save percentage and a 1.78 goals-against average with three shutouts, following

a similar performance in 2023 as the team's goalies combined for a 1.57 GAA and .926 SV% along with an additional three shutouts.

Speer was named to Team USA's 2023 World Championship coaching staff as goaltending coach, helping USA to a fourth-place finish at the tournament. The team's goaltenders combined to post a 1.57 goals-against average and a .926 save percentage along with three shutouts.

Speer previously served as the Stockton Heat's goaltending coach for three seasons. Under his watch in the prior two seasons, Dustin Wolf finished eighth in goals against average among AHL qualified goalies, and in 2020-21, Garret Sparks ranked ninth in the category. He has also worked with the Allen American in the ECHL over four years as goaltending coach and with the Wichita Falls Wildcats of the North American Hockey League (NAHL) as a goaltending coach and scout.

As a player, he played over four seasons in the NCAA Division III program with the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point and UMass-Boston. He also appeared in three ECHL games with the Idaho Steelheads and Las Vegas Wranglers.



NICK GIALDINI

VIDEO COACH

Gialdini, 35, is a San Jose, CA native entering his fourth season as Sharks Video Coach. Gialdini has been with the Sharks organization for 18 years, initially working for Sharks Ice at San Jose in a variety of capacities including coaching for the house league and Jr. Sharks program and served as the High School Hockey Coordinator. Most recently before becoming Video Coach, he had been serving as the Barracuda's Video Coach and Hockey Operations Manager for six seasons.

Internationally, Gialdini has been a part of the 2023 and 2025 Team USA World Championship teams, where he helped the team achieve its first gold medal finish at the tournament in 92 years. Team USA has combined for a 17-3 record in both tournaments Gialdini served as Video Coach, finishing fourth in 2023,

Gialdini graduated from San Jose State University in 2016 where he played for their club team and qualified for the 2014 ACHA National Championship. He resides full-time in San Jose over the summer with his wife, Melissa, and their young son Joshua.



CODY WARD

ASSISTANT VIDEO COACH

Ward enters his fourth season as Assistant Video Coach. Wards primary responsibilities are assisting Head Coach Ryan Warsofsky and Video Coach Nick Gialdini in statistical analysis and operating the replay system for reviews and challenges during the game.

Previously, Ward served as the video coach for the Chicago Wolves in the American Hockey League, where he helped the team win the 2022 Calder Cup. He also worked for the Canisius College Men's Hockey Team from 2017-2021 as the video coordinator and student

manager.

Ward has also spent time internationally as the video coordinator for Die Adler Mannheim in the DEL German league during the 2014-15 season where the team won the DEL championship.

Ward graduated from Canisius College in 2021, where he studied sports management. In the offseason, he primarily resides in San Jose.



SHIN LARSSON

SUPERVISOR, EUROPEAN SCOUTING

Enters his 19th season as a Sharks European scout, with the title and responsibility as Supervisor of European Scouting...his scouting area is all of Europe searching for both amateur and pro players...previously worked as a European pro scout for the Atlanta Thrashers from 2006-08...As a player, represented Japan at several international tournaments including the 1998 Olympic Games, where he posted five points (two goals, three assists) in four games...scored the game-winning shootout goal for Japan's victory over Austria in Olympic play...played hockey professionally in Sweden, Japan, France and England...played for the Japanese national team from 1995-02...won

five league championships in the Japan Ice Hockey League with Kokudo...led the JIHL in scoring in 1997-98...played one season with Verdun in the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League in 1993-94 and one season with Leksand in the Swedish Elite League in 1992-93...he and his wife, Linda, have two sons; Nils and Erik.

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CHARLIE TOWNSEND

DIRECTOR OF HOCKEY PROJECTS AND ANALYTICS

Charlie Townsend enters his first season as Director of Hockey Operations and 13th season with Sharks Sports & Entertainment. Prior to his current role, Charlie has worked in numerous capacities throughout the Sharks hockey operations department including roles within scouting, coaching, player development and analytics at both the NHL and AHL level.

His primary responsibility is to oversee the high level strategy components of hockey operations through acquiring, developing and integrating multiple information streams into the decision making process. These different domains include player evaluation, player acquisition, salary cap management and coaching.

Townsend, born in Watertown, Connecticut, joined the Sharks after a brief professional playing career in both North America and Europe. He is a 2006 graduate of The Taft School and 2010 graduate of Middlebury College where he was an assistant captain for the 2010 NESCAC championship team and was a member of the NESCAC All-Sportsmanship Team.

Charlie resides in Campbell with his wife Carly, daughters Kit and Scottie and dog Bronco.



A.J. BERNSTEIN

ANALYST, HOCKEY PROJECTS AND ANALYTICS

Bernstein enters his fourth season with the Sharks, first as Hockey Operations, Strategy and Data Analyst. He will be primarily tasked with acquiring, analyzing and refining the team's analytics data.

Previously, he worked with Middlebury College as an assistant coach and director of hockey operations until his graduation in 2021. He has also consulted with the Chicago Steel (USHL) and Metropolitan Riveters (NWHL), leading both teams' analytic efforts. Prior to joining

the Sharks, he worked as a strategy consultant for Accenture Federal Services.



DYLAN FINAN

SCOUTING COORDINATOR

Finan enters his fifth season with the Sharks and third within the hockey operations staff, serving as Scouting Coordinator. Enters his seventh season with the San Jose Sharks, first as Head USA Amateur Scout...served as the President of Hockey Operations/ General Manager for the Lincoln Stars of the United States Hockey League from 2014-2019... selected as the 15-16 USHL General Manager of the Year... acted as Asst. General Manger/ Director of Player Personnel for the Muskegon Lumberjacks of the USHL for the 2013-2014 season... Resides in Illinois with his wife, Stefanie, their three children, Carter, Kendall, and Kamryn, and their dog, Kane.



AMATEUR SCOUT

PAT FUNK

DIRK GRAHAM

PRO SCOUT

The Regina (Saskatchewan) Sports Hall of Fame honoree and 1991 Selke Trophy winner enters his 18th season as a professional scout with San Jose...served as professional scout for the Tampa Bay Lightning from 2006-08...was the head coach of the American Hockey League's Springfield Falcons in 2004-06...spent several years in the hockey department of the Chicago Blackhawks, including being head coach (1998-99), a scout (1997-98) and an assistant coach (1995-96)...played 12 National Hockey League seasons and 772 games, primarily with Chicago, but began his career with the Minnesota North Stars in 1983-84...scored at least 20 goals six times, helped

Chicago reach the 1992 Stanley Cup Final and served as the team's captain from 1989-95...posted a career-high 78 points (33 goals, 45 assists) in 80 games in 1988-89...played in 90 Stanley Cup Playoff games, posting 44 points (17 goals, 27 assists)...an inspirational leader on-and-off the ice and was an exemplary worker on both specialty teams...Regina, Saskatchewan native originally selected by Vancouver in the fifth round (89th overall) of the 1979 NHL Entry Draft.



JIMMY BONNEAU

PRO SCOUT

Enters his sixth season as pro scout for the Sharks and his 10th year in the organization... Previously served as an assistant coach and cocoach for the Barracuda for four seasons...The 40-year-old initially joined the Sharks as a scout for two seasons, covering the National Hockey League and American Hockey League Eastern Conferences before joining the Barracuda.

Bonneau, along with Chiasson, guided the Barracuda through the final 33 games of the season in 2019-20, going 12-16-5, including a season-long, eight-game point streak (6-0-2) before the year was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Bonneau played 11 seasons with various clubs in the AHL and ECHL. For four seasons, he played with the Worcester Sharks, serving as an alternate captain for the duration. Bonneau scored five goals, added nine assists and tallied 435 penalty minutes in 155 games. He finished his AHL career with 30 points (11g, 19a) and 988 penalty minutes in 350 career games.

The native of Baie-Comeau, Quebec, now resides in Boston, Massachusetts.



RYAN HAMILTON

PRO SCOUT

Enters his seventh season with the San Jose Sharks...served as an AHL captain for over six years, most recently with the Bakersfield Condors for three straight seasons from 2015-2018...played for the Edmonton Oilers and Toronto Maple Leafs, compiling five points in 30 games...the 35-year-old veteran appeared in 644 AHL contests for various teams, registering 376 points (197 goals, 179 assists)...helped lead the Toronto Marlies to the 2012 Calder Cup Finals, earning five points in 17 contests...was named to the AHL All-Star team twice and earned AHL All-Star MVP in 2013...Resides in Arizona with his wife, Alexa, two children, Owen and Madeline, and their dog, Allie.



NED COLLETTI

PRO SCOUT

Long-time sports executive and former Los Angeles Dodgers General Manager Ned Colletti is entering his seventh season as a professional scout with the Sharks with his primary focuses on scouting at the National Hockey League and the American Hockey League levels and assisting in development ... A native of Chicago, Colletti worked in Major League Baseball for 40 years and became one of the winningest executives during his last 25-plus years... He led the Dodgers as General Manager for nine seasons, leading the team to five post-season appearances including three appearances in the League Championship Series... The five post-season appearances during

his tenure equaled the then-best nine-year period in the history of the franchise...Teams he built or helped build went to 4 World Series. Players drafted or signed during his tenure won 3 Cy Young Awards (plus 3 runners-up), 2 league MVP Awards (plus 1 runner/up), two NLCS MVPs and one World Series MVP award. Prior to working in Los Angeles, he began his career with the Chicago Cubs, where he worked for 13 seasons. He left Chicago in 1994 and spent 11 years with the San Francisco Giants, where he helped change and build a winning culture, serving as their assistant general manager. A four-time Emmy Award winner for his work on Dodgers SportsNetLA, Colletti was presented with an Honorary Doctorate Degree from Pepperdine University in April, 2023.



PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH

MIKE RICCI

One of the most beloved players to ever don a Sharks sweater, Mike Ricci enters his sixth season as NHL Development Coach and 18th overall in the organization. Previously Ricci served as an Assistant Coach for the final 37 games in 2019-20 under Bob Boughner and 12 seasons as Scout and Development Coach working closely with the forwards on the Sharks and the Barracuda rosters, following one season as an advisor to San Jose's hockey operations department.

In this role, Ricci, 52, has areas of focus including face-off techniques, individual skill development and team systems integration.

Ricci finished his stellar, 16-year National Hockey League career in 2007 after notching 605 points (243 goals, 362 assists) and 979 penalty minutes in 1,099 games with Philadelphia, Quebec/Colorado, San Jose and Phoenix. He also added 66 points (23 goals, 43 assists) in 110 Stanley Cup Playoff games. Ricci won a Stanley Cup with Colorado in 1996.

His 263 points (101 goals, 162 assists) with San Jose ranks 14th on the Sharks all-time list and his 529 games place him 10th all-time. In 59 Stanley Cup Playoff games with San Jose, Ricci ranks 10th on the franchise's all-time list with 33 points (14 goals, 19 assists).

Ricci was originally selected by the Philadelphia Flyers in the first round (fourth overall) of the 1990 NHL Entry Draft. In June 1992, he was part of the blockbuster trade between Philadelphia and the Quebec Nordiques that saw the Flyers trade Ricci, Ron Hextall, Peter Forsberg, Steve Duchesne, Kerry Huffman, Chris Simon, first round selections in the 1993 and 1994 NHL Entry Drafts and \$15 million to the Nordiques in exchange for Eric Lindros.

Ricci was acquired by the Sharks on Nov. 21, 1997, along with a second-round selection in the 1998 NHL Entry Draft, in exchange for Shean Donovan and a first round selection in the 1998 NHL Entry Draft.



TOMMY WINGELS

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH

Wingels begins his third season as a player development coach with San Jose. As a player, he appeared in 448 NHL games during his playing career from 2010-11 through the 2017-18 season with San Jose, Ottawa Senators, Chicago Blackhawks and Boston Bruins. A sixth-round selection by the Sharks (177th overall) in the 2008 NHL Draft, Wingels appeared in 337 games with San Jose and totaled 122 points (51 goals, 71 assists), finishing seventh among Sharks skaters in goals scored, eighth in games played and ninth in scoring total during his seven-season run with the club. The Sharks qualified for postseason play in five of his six seasons before being traded

to the Ottawa Senators in 2016-17, including a Western Conference championship and Stanley Cup Final berth in 2016. He also played in 98 AHL contests with the Worcester Sharks and spent three seasons at Miami (Ohio) in NCAA play. Internationally, Wingels represented the United States at the 2014 IIHF World Championship, where he appeared in seven games.



LUCA SBISA

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH

Sbisa enters his fourth season with the Sharks, joining the organization ahead of the 2022-23 season, following a year in the same role with the Anaheim Ducks. In his 13-season playing career, Sbisa skated in 549 NHL games, totaling 113 points (20 goals, 93 assists) and 385 penalty minutes. A first-round pick (19th overall) of the Philadelphia Flyers in the 2008 NHL Draft, Sbisa split his tenure between the Flyers, Ducks, Vancouver Canucks, Vegas Golden Knights, New York Islanders, Winnipeg Jets and Nashville Predators. He was part of six playoff teams in his career, including a trip to the Stanley Cup Final in 2018. Internationally, Sbisa represented Switzerland in numerous

tournaments, including the 2008 and 2009 World Junior Championships, 2010 Olympics and the 2011 and 2012 IIHF World Championships.



PATRICK MARLEAU

DEVELOPMENT COACH & HOCKEY OPERATIONS ADVISOR

Marleau enters his third season with the Sharks Hockey Operations department. Based in San Jose, Marleau will collaborate with the Sharks development staff to work with Sharks and San Jose Barracuda prospects with on-ice skill development. In addition, he serves as an advisor to Grier and the Sharks hockey operations staff.

As a player, Marleau achieved a remarkable 23-season NHL career, culminating on April 19, 2021 when he became the NHL's all-time regular season games played leader, eclipsing hockey icon Gordie Howe's longstanding record of 1,767 games. He finished his career with 1,779 regular season games and sits amongst the game's top offensive players with 566 goals (23rd all-time), 631 assists (83rd), 1,197 points (52nd), 172 power-play goals (34th) and 109 game-winning goals (tied-seventh). His 195 Stanley Cup Playoff games are the 24th most in NHL history, and his appearance in the playoffs in 20 different seasons is tied for the third most. In the postseason, Marleau has recorded 127 points (72 goals, 55 assists) and ranks tied for 15th all-time in playoff goals and tied for 53rd in playoff points.

He ranks first in nearly in nearly every offensive category in Sharks franchise history, including games played (1,607), goals (522), points (1,111), power-play goals (163), shorthanded goals (17), game-winning goals (101), multi-goal games (67) and shots (3,953). He also ranks second in assists (589), eighth in penalty minutes (481), and eighth in points-per-game (0.69 - min. 200 games).

Internationally, Marleau captured gold medals with Team Canada in the 2010 and 2014 Winter Olympics, 2004 World Cup and 2003 World Championships.

Originally selected by the Sharks with the second overall selection in the 1997 NHL Draft, Marleau announced his retirement as a player on May 10, 2022, and on Feb. 25, 2023, became the first person in franchise history to have his number permanently retired. Marleau is set to be inducted into the San Jose Sports Hall of Fame in 2023.



JOE THORNTON

DEVELOPMENT COACH & HOCKEY OPERATIONS ADVISOR

Joe Thornton joins the Sharks staff as a Development Coach and Hockey Operations Advisor ahead of the 2025-26 season, his first year as a member of a NHL staff. Thornton became the second player to have his number retired by the San Jose Sharks, with his No. 19 raised to the SAP Center rafters in a pregame ceremony on Nov. 23, 2024. He was selected for enshrinement in the Hockey Hall of Fame on June 24, 2025, with the official induction to take place Nov. 7-9.

Thornton authored one of the most prolific playing careers in NHL history, starting with being selected first overall by the Boston Bruins in the 1997 NHL Draft and proceeding to play for the franchise until a blockbuster trade to San Jose on Nov. 30, 2005, a move that set in motion the most successful era in Sharks franchise history. From his first game with the Sharks on Dec. 2, 2005 through the end of the 2019-20 season when he departed the team, no NHL team accumulated more standings points than San Jose (1,443) and only Pittsburgh won more regular season games (660) than the Sharks (659). In that span, the Sharks won 80 Stanley Cup Playoff games and appeared in four Western Conference Finals (2010, 2011, 2016, 2019).

From the time Thornton entered the league in 1997-98 through his final game, no player in the league scored more points (1,539) or collected more assists (1,109) than 'Jumbo Joe.' Only Patrick Marleau played in more games (1,779) than Thornton (1,714). Among all-time NHL skaters, Thornton ranks 14th in points, seventh in assists and sixth in games played. He is one of only 14 players in league history to reach the 1,000-assist mark and was the seventh to reach 1,500 games, 1,000 assists and 400 goals.

As a Shark, Thornton is the team's all-time leader in assists (804), power-play points (402) and plus-minus (+161), is second in franchise history in points (1,055), third in games played (1,104) and power-play goals (87) and is fourth with 40 game-winning goals.

Thornton won the Art Ross Trophy and the Hart Memorial Trophy in 2006, was selected to six NHL All-Star Games (2002, 2003, 2004, 2007, 2008 and 2009) and was named a NHL First-Team All-Star in 2006 as well as earning Second-Team nods in 2003, 2008 and 2016. He was named Sharks Player of the Year three times (2006, 2007, 2016) and was the team's Player of the Month 13 times.

In international competition, Thornton represented Canada at the 2006 and 2010 Winter Olympics, winning a goal in the latter appearance, won Gold at the World Cup of Hockey in both 2004 and 2016, skated at the IIHF World Championship in 2001 and 2005 (Silver), and competed at the 1997 World Junior Championship (Gold).



RYAN MILLER

GOALIE SCOUT/GOALTENDING DEVELOPMENT

Miller enters his third season with the Sharks, serving as a draft-eligible goaltender scout and assisting Director, Goaltending Evgeni Nabokov in the organization's development of goaltending prospects and players. In Miller's distinguished, 18-season playing career, the netminder logged a 391-289-88 record with a .914 save percentage and 2.64 goals against average over 796 games, split between the Buffalo Sabres, St. Louis Blues, Vancouver Canucks and Anaheim Ducks. He remains the all-time wins leader among U.S.-born players and is second among the group in both shutouts (44) and games played. Originally drafted in the fifth round by the Buffalo Sabres in

the 1999 NHL Draft, Miller remains the franchise's all-time leader in games played and wins and is second in shutouts. A 2022 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame inductee, Miller represented Team USA in both the 2010 and 2014 Olympics, earning MVP honors and a Silver Medal in 2010. He also represented the United States in the 2001, 2002 and 2003 World Championships.



MIKE POTENZA

DIRECTOR OF HIGH PERFORMANCE

Potenza is entering his second season as the team's Director of High Performance. This is his second stint with the organization, following 16 seasons with the Sharks from 2006-2022.

Potenza oversees the strength & conditioning and nutrition staffs and serves as a liaison to the Sharks medical training staff to ensure a streamlined collaboration between the two departments, focusing on the Sharks player's health, training, fitness, and rehabilitation

programs.

Potenza joined the Golden State Warriors in 2022 as their director of performance. In that role, he was responsible for the player's training schedules, management of performance testing, implementation of player specific training programs, and served as a liaison to the coaching staff to maximize the efficiency of performance and management for team workout schedules.

Between 2006-2022, Potenza served as the Sharks strength and conditioning coach. He was directly responsible for the team's overall strength and conditioning programs, which included the physical testing and evaluation at training camp, creation of individualized workout programs, and assistance in the rehabilitation programs for all injured players. Through his time in San Jose, Potenza worked directly with several notable and legendary veteran players, including Patrick Marleau, Joe Thornton, Logan Couture, Joe Pavelski, Brent Burns, Erik Karlsson and Marc-Edouard Vlasic.

Prior to joining the Sharks organization, Potenza served as the strength and conditioning coach for the University of Wisconsin Men and Women hockey teams, both who captured the 2006 NCAA National Championship. Potenza also had responsibilities with the wrestling and softball programs at Wisconsin.

A 2000 Springfield College graduate, Potenza earned his Bachelor of Science degree in applied exercise science. From there, the Providence, R.I., native went to Boston University where he was a graduate assistant until 2002, earning his master's degree in human movement science.

Potenza was part of the evaluation staff for the U.S. World Junior hockey team that competed at the 2008 World Junior Championships in the Czech Republic. His responsibilities included offering presentations on nutrition and recovery, administering physical testing and designing performance evaluations for each prospect.

Away from the rink, Potenza was a consultant with United States Air Force Pararescue teams based in California (131st RQS) and Alaska (212th RQS) on the implementation and design of their Human Performance Program. The USAF Pararescue career-field provides medical and tactical support to tier-1 Special Ops assets during missions abroad. They are also a local asset state-side for rescue needs in conjunction with the United States Coast Guard.

Potenza, and his wife, Bonnie, have three children (Griffin, Natalie and Luca).

WILL LEONARD, ATC

HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Will Leonard enters his fourth season with the San Jose Sharks, second as Head Athletic Trainer. He previously was the Assistant Athletic Trainer for two years, and served as the Head Athletic Trainer for the San Jose Barracuda (2018-2022). This is Leonard's second stint with the Sharks organization, after serving as an intern athletic trainer during the 2009-10 season.

Prior to being hired full time by San Jose, Leonard spent four years working with San Jose State's Men's Ice Hockey team. He also worked with Bay Area high schools by providing athletic training coverage and coordinating rehabilitation programs.

Leonard began his career in athletic training, as a student athletic trainer at San Diego State University. He earned his Bachelor's degree in Kinesiology, with an emphasis in Athletic Training, in 2010. He then went on to earn his Master's degree from California University of Pennsylvania in Exercise Science.

Leonard is a member of the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers Society (PHATS) and BOC Certified Athletic Trainer.

He and his family currently reside in San Jose, CA.



RYAN LEDWON

ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER

Ryan Ledwon is entering his second season as Assistant Athletic Trainer. Previously, he worked for the San Diego Gulls for six seasons as Head Athletic Trainer, and Assistant Athletic Trainer. He oversaw the team's injury prevention and rehabilitation programs while working closely with the team's medical and strength and conditioning staff to ensure the safety and well-being of the club's players.

Ledwon also worked with the NHL's Department of Player Health and Safety from 2016-18, and served as the Head Athletic Trainer with Dubuque Fighting Saints in the United States Hockey League (2015-16).

A native of Chicago, Ledwon earned a master's degree in Athletic Training from Western Michigan University and a bachelor's degree in Athletic Training from Illinois State University.



STEPHEN DILUSTRO

DIRECTOR, STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Stephen DiLustro begins his fourth season as Director of Strength & Conditioning for the Sharks, previously serving five years as the Sharks assistant strength and conditioning coach for the organization. He oversees the team's strength and conditioning programs -- including the physical testing and evaluation at training camp, creation of individualized workout programs and assistance in the rehabilitation efforts for all injured players.

Before joining the Sharks, DiLustro served as the director of strength and conditioning at Saint Mary's College of California, overseeing all aspects of athletic development for the entire athletic department.

Prior to Saint Mary's College, DiLustro was an assistant sports performance coach at Stanford University. DiLustro oversaw all aspects of performance training for the baseball, men's water polo, and women's crew teams. He also worked with the men's crew, women's water polo and softball programs. While at Stanford, he worked with a handful of Olympians who participated in both the 2012 and 2016 Summer Games.

From 2007-09, DiLustro was an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Brown University. DiLustro designed and supervised in-season, off-season, and summer strength and conditioning programs for the baseball, men's and women's basketball, gymnastics, women's ice hockey, women's lacrosse, women's soccer, men's tennis, volleyball, and men's water polo teams. He also assisted with the rest of the 37 varsity athletic teams at Brown.

Stephen earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Exercise Physiology from the University of Massachusetts Lowell in 2000. He went on to earn a Master's Degree in Education from the University of Arizona in December of 2003. While studying at Arizona from 2002-2003, DiLustro worked as a graduate assistant strength coach, staying on until June 2006 as an assistant strength and conditioning coach after receiving his degree.

DiLustro holds a variety of certifications, including by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS), Postural Restoration Trained by the Postural Restoration Institute, Corrective Exercise Specialist by National Academy of Sports Medicine, and Level One Nutrition coach by Precision Nutrition.

DiLustro, his wife, Krissy, and their two children, Luca and Luci, reside in Campbell.



PATRICK DUGAN

ASSISTANT STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH

Patrick Dugan enters his second season as Assistant Strength & Conditioning coach, assisting Mike Potenza and Stephen DiLustro in the team's strength and conditioning programs, assistance in player rehabilitation, and helping formulate the team's workout programs.

Previously Dugan served as the Head Performance Coach for the Providence Bruins for three years. In Providence, he was directly responsible for all aspects of player performance, development, and injury rehabilitation. He also assisted the P-Bruins' NHL club, the

Boston Bruins, as a member of the overarching Bruin's performance department.

He also worked with Clarkson University for two years as Assistant Strength and Conditioning coach, and worked with Mike Boyle Strength and Conditioning for one year.

Dugan holds an undergraduate degree from University of New England and a Master's degree in Exercise & Sports Science from Merrimack College.



ARNULFO AGUIRRE, ART, CMT

MASSAGE THERAPIST

Arnulfo Aguirre enters his 19th season as the Sharks full-time massage therapist, surpassing 1,000 games worked in teal. He had worked with the Sharks training staff on a part-time basis since the 2000-01 season.

In his role, Aguirre works with the team's players to facilitate and improve injuries and increase their range of motion.

Previously, Aguirre worked with the San Jose Earthquakes, providing sports massage therapy, from 2000 to 2002, including during their 2001 Major League Soccer Championship season.

In addition, he served in a similar position with the University of California-Berkeley men's swim team in 1999.

Aguirre received his certification from the National Holistic Institute in Emeryville, Calif., where he also assisted in managing the massage clinic.



MIKE ALDRICH

EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Mike Aldrich enters his 30th season as Head Equipment Manager for the San Jose Sharks. Aldrich previously served in the same capacity for the International Hockey League's Kansas City Blades for the three seasons (1993-95) when the Blades were the Sharks top development affiliate. Before joining Kansas City, he worked at Michigan Tech University as the school's equipment manager and athletic purchasing agent from 1989-93.

In January 2023, Aldrich worked his 2,000th NHL game, all as Equipment Manager of the Sharks.

Aldrich served as equipment manager for the U.S. Olympic Team that won the silver medal at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver. He also worked for Team USA at the 2003 and 2005 World Championships, and the 2004 World Cup of Hockey.

Aldrich, was the Equipment Manager for the 1997 and 2019 National Hockey League All-Star Games, which were both hosted by San Jose. During the 1995-96 season, he was selected as the Western Conference's equipment manager for the IHL All-Star Game.

Besides overseeing the entire operation of the equipment staff, Aldrich handles the intricate requests of all Sharks players with regards to equipment, skate sharpening needs as well as all the purchasing, inventory control and distribution for all equipment throughout the season.

He's an active member of the Society of Professional Hockey Equipment Managers (SPHEM).

TIM LEROY

ASSISTANT EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Leroy is entering his first season as Sharks Assistant Equipment Manager, his second within the Sharks organization after serving as Barracuda Head Equipment Manager in 2024-25. Prior to joining San Jose, Leroy most recently served as the equipment manager for the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team during the 2023-24 season. Before his time with USA Hockey, Leroy spent 22 years as the head equipment manager for the NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets, a position he held from the franchise's inception in 2000 until his departure in 2022.

Prior to his tenure in Columbus, Leroy worked on the Florida Panthers' equipment staff from 1993 to 1999 and served as the head equipment manager for the IHL's Kansas City Blades from 1990 to 1993. The Blades, the top affiliate of the San Jose Sharks during his final two years with the team, won the Turner Cup as IHL Champions in the 1991-1992 season.

While working for the Blades, Leroy notably served as the team's backup goaltender for a game in Salt Lake City, while still performing his equipment duties, after Arturs Irbe was called up to the Sharks last minute and the team had no alternative solution.

Leroy began his equipment journey as a stick boy for the Western Michigan hockey team during junior high and later attended college at Western Michigan, where he volunteered with the IHL's Kalamazoo Wings.

ASSISTANT EQUIPMENT MANAGER AND TRANSPORTATION

Roy Sneesby enters his 26th season with the San Jose Sharks Equipment Staff.

Roy splits his duties between assisting the Sharks Equipment Staff with day to day equipment needs for players and coaches and the visiting teams. Roy also coordinates the efficient arrival and departure of both the Sharks and visiting teams equipment and supplies.

MARK DAVIES, M.D.

TEAM PHYSICIAN

Mark Davies, MD, enters his 12th season as the Sharks team physician. Dr. Davies is a native of the Bay Area, having been born in Santa Clara and raised in Los Gatos. He attended Stanford University, where he played rugby and majored in Biology. Dr. Davies attended UCLA Medical School, and he subsequently completed his residency in Orthopaedic Surgery, also at UCLA, including a dedicated research year. He has published articles in a number of orthopedic journals as well as presented at national meetings.

Following his time at UCLA, Dr. Davies completed a yearlong fellowship with Dr. James Andrews in Birmingham, AL, before returning to the Bay Area and joining Kaiser Permanente, where he serves as a sports medicine specialist.
