

#### 50/50 Raffle

The 50/50 raffle was conducted at all Islanders home games as well as select arena events during the 22-23 season. The program raised more than \$600,000 for partnering non-profit organizations, as well as the ICF.





This season fans were able to purchase a commemorative warm-up puck during every home game. The pucks were customized to reflect the date of the game and the opponent. This program raised more than \$50,000 for the ICF.

#### Halloween Player Baskets

The Islanders significant others supported the Islanders Children's Foundation by putting together players "favorite things" baskets. Each New York Islanders player had a one-of-a-kind basket containing a few of their favorite things and autographed items. These baskets were raffled off in-arena and raised more than \$7,500 for the ICF.

### Alumni Mystery Bags

In coordination with Alumni Weekend, mystery bags containing a variety of autographed items were sold grab bag style to fans that were in attendance for the January 21st game. This initiative raised more than \$8,000 for the ICF.

#### **Jersey Auctions**

The 22-23 season saw five special jersey auctions take place. Specialty warmup jerseys raised awareness for Hockey Fights Cancer, Military Appreciation and Green initiatives while the game worn jerseys celebrated the Reverse Retro and Traditional Islanders jerseys worn throughout the course of the season by the team. More than \$125,000 was raised through these initiatives.

#### First Game Certificates

Islanders fans attending their first game at UBS Arena had the opportunity to pick up their "First Game Certificate" to commemorate the occasion. As an extra incentive, fans who completed a short survey went home with an exclusive "First Game Pin." Over 5,000 certificates were distributed and 1,100 pins throughout the season.

During the intermission of every home game the Islanders acknowledged first responders, community members and organizations who make a positive impact on the community through the "Honorary Flag Captain" program. Each flag captain received in-game and social media recognition for their impact.

The Islanders partnered with Stop & Shop throughout the course of the 2022-23 season. For every "home" assist the Islanders had a meal was donated through Island Harvest to those in need in the community. More than \$10,000 was raised, equating to more than 20,000 distributed meals.


#### Community Corner Spotlight

# Appreciation Night

#### November 10, 2022

The New York Islanders honored over 500 active and veteran status military personnel, and their families, during the military appreciation theme night at UBS Arena. The night consisted of various fundraising initiatives, giveaways, and honorary moments to showcase gratitude for all they do.

- **Opening Ceremony:** Fans looked to the rafters as members from the New York Army National Guard, Alpha Company, Recruiting and Retention Battalion under the 106th Rescue Wing rappelled with the nation's colors to deliver the game puck to center ice.
- Mystery Pucks: Limited edition military themed autographed mystery pucks were sold on the concourse throughout the game. Over \$9,500 was raised through the mystery puck program and donated back to military related programs.
- Jersey Auction: The players took the ice in military themed jerseys during warm-ups. The jerseys were later auctioned off through an online platform and raised over \$23,000 for the ICF and military related causes.
- Placards: Fans arrived to their seats with an "I Salute" placard to hold in-arena during a special tv-timeout recognition. Customizable placards were available at the community relations table on the concourse.
- Homefront Videos: The New York Islanders partnered with fans currently deployed to honor them throughout the game. Deployed service members were able to send positive messages to family and players in New York, the videos were showcased throughout the game.
- **Over 500 complimentary tickets** were distributed to active military members, veterans and their families to attend the game.
- **Giveaway Hat:** Ford distributed camouflage hats to the first 10,000 fans in attendance.
- **HWAH Charities:** The New York Islanders raised awareness and funds for the USO of Metro NY and United Heroes League through a series of activations throughout the game.
- UBS Arena external lanterns recolored to green.



### Activations

- American Cancer Society Hope Lodge: The New York Islanders in conjunction with the National Hockey League kicked off the league wide Hockey Fights Cancer month by visiting New York Hope Lodge quests. Guests were greeted by Sparky and received a Love Your Melon branded hat.
- Flag Captain: Levy Mealing, a local breast cancer survivor, was recognized as Honorary Flag Captain at the HFC game. Lexy credits her mammogram for saving her life as her cancer was caught early. She now dedicates her free time to educate the community about the importance of cancer screening and how it saves lives.
- Military Hero: Maurice St. Pierre, a Vietnam War veteran was recognized as the Military Hero of the Game. St. Pierre is a lifelong Islanders fan and is currently battling pancreatic cancer.
- Placards: Fans arrived at their seats with an "I Fight For" placard to hold in-arena during a special tv-timeout recognition. Customizable placards were available at the community relations table on the concourse.
- **Mystery Pucks:** Limited edition Hockey Fights Cancer themed autographed mystery pucks were sold on the concourse throughout the game. Over \$9,500 was raised through the mystery puck program and donated back to the ICF and Northwell Health Foundation.
- Jersey Auction: The players took the ice in lavender-colored jerseys in support of the Hockey Fights Cancer during warm-ups. The jerseys were later auctioned off through an online platform and raised over \$18,000 for the ICF and Northwell Cancer Institute.
- **Giveaway Rally Towel:** Northwell Health provided rally towels to the first 10,000 fans in attendance of the HFC game. Fans were encouraged to "rally" against cancer by showing their support during the game.
- HWAH Charities: Throughout the months of October and November the Islanders partnered with a variety of organizations with cancer related causes leading up to the Hockey Fights Cancer themed night. During the game, Stand Up to Cancer and American Cancer Society were the charities of the night.
- UBS Arena external lanterns recolored to lavender, the official HFC awareness color.
- The New York Islanders coaching staff shared their support of the Hockey Fights Cancer initiative by wearing lavender-colored ribbons during the game.

- Therapy Dogs on concourse: Northwell Health and Save a Pet USA brought in positive reinforcement to fans during the annual Mental Health Awareness game. Puppies and therapy dogs were located around the concourse and were interacting with fans.
- **Digital Dashers:** Fans at home were able to partake in the games awareness with positive sayings that showed through the digital dasher board elements throughout the game. The positive sayings were recommendations from Northwell Health and Project Healthy Minds.
- Player video: Fans turned to the scoreboard during the game to watch a brief video of players discussing the importance of mental health awareness.
- Fidget Spinner: 22-23 season giveaway was a fidget spinner.
- **HWAH Charities:** The New York Islanders partnered with Project Healthy Minds and NAMI Queens/Nassau to spread the importance of mental health awareness. Both groups received a table on the concourse and opportunities to share its mission with fans. Fans interacted with the groups and learned about the variety of services both groups provide throughout the area. Two additional groups—Nassau County & Beyond the Badge—joined the HWAH Charities on the concourse. Focusing on additional mental health services for select individuals.
- Splash of Hope painting to Northwell Hospital: Splashes of Hope, a local group that is dedicated to brightening the world with art, set up on the concourse and asked fans to partake in an Islanders themed mural. Throughout the game fans were able to paint the mural that will later be hung at South Oaks Hospital, one of Northwell Health's mental wellness hospitals.
- Lanterns outside of arena were recolored to green in awareness of the night.



- Complimentary Tickets: Around 100 tickets were distributed to LGBTQ+ organizations to attend the game. Tickets were allocated to a variety of volunteers and individuals that might benefit from the organization's services.
- Group Ticket Package: A traditional group ticket package was available for the game. Members from local groups and community members were able to purchase a special ticket and received a pride scarf as part of the package.




# Go Green Night

- Reducing greenhouse gas emissions due to proximity to local transit services
- Shaded trees and site landscape to provide multiple benefits that promote healthy ecosystem habits

#### Rock N' Wrap It Up Food Recovery

Partnering with Rock N' Wrap It Up, more than 4,200 pounds of food was collected and distributed to local food pantries and soup kitchens throughout the season providing more than 3,500 meals to community members in need.


### **Recycle The Game**

### Amateur Hockey Development

Amateur hockey development has been a major focus of the Islanders since the club's inception in 1972. The Islanders are committed to fostering and expanding youth involvement in the local, national and international arenas. The primary goal has been to grow the game of hockey on Long Island and in the Metropolitan area. At the same time, our efforts include helping grow the individual hockey player to reach his or her full potential. To make both of those things possible, the Islanders offer programs that have grown exponentially throughout the years. Today, programs are in place to show new fans what hockey is all about, year-round clinics to teach kids of all ages the essential skills needed to play the game of hockey at their highest level, and we continue to assist and grow the area's largest youth hockey organization, the PAL Jr. Islanders.

The Islanders also help to develop youth hockey on an international level by hosting foreign teams for a tournament at Northwell Health Ice Center every January, by sending Elite Pee-Wee players to a world-renowned tournament in Quebec City, and by sending Premier Junior players to Calgary for the Mac Tournament in an effort to be seen by scouts across the west coast. The Islanders are committed to growing the sport of hockey on Long Island, in the Metropolitan area and around the world. These programs are the building blocks of that growth.

### Future Islanders Learn To Play

As part of the league-wide Learn to Play initiative, the Future Islanders program ran at 15 locations, providing boys and girls ages 5–9 with an introduction to the game of hockey and serving as a transition program for first-time players interested in playing in a house league. The 2022-2023 season saw over 800 children signed up for the program.

### Warrior Hockey Program

The New York Islanders are proud partners of the Long Island Warriors Hockey Club, a recreational hockey team for military veterans, active military, and reserve members. The Long Island Warriors Hockey Club was created to strengthen community engagement and provide veteran camaraderie supporting a return to civilian life. The program educates, trains, and encourages individuals who have served in any branch of the Armed Forces, including those with physical or mental disabilities incurred during service to the United States, to participate in the sport of ice hockey in an environment that is adapted to the level of ability of the participating athlete. The program also assists veterans and their families to promote awareness of challenges our veterans face and to encourage team building. In addition, it assists veterans in developing self-confidence and assist in helping participants back into a lifestyle that will help the individual to be more successful both within and outside a hockey environment.



### 430ak Partnership

The Islanders and UBS continued to team up in the 22-23 season to increase diversity in hockey through its \$1 million commitment and 5-year partnership with the 430ak Foundation, a non-profit serving minorities and underprivileged youth hockey players, of all ages, in the New York Metropolitan Area. In 2013, the New York Islanders partnered with Pride in Athletics for Life (P.A.L.) Hockey, a non-profit, amateur hockey organization. The affiliation marked the inauguration of the P.A.L. Junior Islanders Hockey Club. The organization operates teams at six different levels: mite, squirt, pee-wee, bantam, midget, and junior. This past season, more than 450 hockey players participated in the program.
