

**FLAMES LAST GAME RECAP****January 7, 2025 – CALGARY FLAMES [3] vs. ANAHEIM DUCKS [2] (OT)**[Game Summary](#) | [Event Summary](#)

The Calgary Flames began a brief back-to-back set last night in Anaheim. In the first, it would be the birthday boy MacKenzie Weegar who gave the Flames the lead with under a minute remaining by deflecting a Blake Coleman shot as the visitors skated into the intermission up 1-0. Anaheim would tie things up just before the midway point in the second, but Nazem Kadri would tap home a slick backdoor pass from MacKenzie Weegar to help Calgary retake their lead and that is where things stood through 40. Anaheim would level things in the third after Mason McTavish deflected home a point shot, and this game required overtime. In the extra frame, Jonathan Huberdeau redirected a wild bounce off the end boards into the net to lift the Flames over the Ducks 3-2.

TONIGHTS STORYLINES & STATS

This is the second of three meetings this season between the Flames and Kings. Calgary won their first matchup against Los Angeles 3-1 on November 11th.

This is a Pacific Division matchup; the Flames have a record of 6-4-1 against Pacific Division teams and a record of 11-9-2 against Western Conference opponents.

FIRST MEETING WITH LA:

The Calgary Flames welcomed the Los Angeles Kings to the Scotiabank Saddledome for their first meeting back on November 11th. The Flames would outshoot the Kings 10-7 in the opening 20, but both goalies stood tall to keep the contest scoreless through 20. Midway through the second, Mikael Backlund would bury his then fourth of the season to give the Flames a 1-0 lead. 40 seconds later, Andrei Kuzmenko would spring Jonathan Huberdeau on a partial break, and the Saint-Jerome, QC native would slide home his sixth of the season to double the Flames advantage through 40. In the third, the Kings would draw within one late, but an empty netter from Kevin Rooney would seal it as the Flames knocked off the Kings 3-1.

BACK-TO-BACKS:

The Flames are set to finish their fifth back-to-back set tonight in Los Angeles following last night's 3-2 overtime triumph in Anaheim. Calgary has a record of 4-1-0 in game one of back-to-back scenarios, and a record of 1-3-0 in game two of back-to-back scenarios. The Flames next back-to-back set will come next week when they face Chicago at the United Center on January 13th before travelling to St. Louis to face the Blues on January 14th.

HOWLIN' FOR YOU:

With his 26 save effort last night in Anaheim, Dustin Wolf improved to 21-13-3 in 39 career games. He has tied Dan Vladar and Brian Elliott for the second most wins in Flames history before 40 games with the franchise. Miikka Kiprusoff (24) paces the list. Wolf's 21 wins in 2024-25 lead all rookie goaltenders.

RAZZLE DAZZLE:

Entering play tonight, Rasmus Andersson has recorded 42 goals in his career and with one more can surpass Dougie Hamilton and Noah Hanifin for the ninth most goals by a defenseman in franchise history. Andersson already ranks as the highest-scoring Swedish-born rearguard in Flames franchise history. Andersson's 495 games played also put him six away from becoming the eighth defenceman to skate in 500 games with the Flames.

FAMILY TIES:

Kings forward Samuel Helenius's father Sami Helenius was part of the Flames organization for five seasons from 1994-95 until 1998-99. Sami played in 272 games for the Flames AHL affiliate the Saint John Flames and skated in his first seven NHL games in a Calgary Flames sweater.

FUTURE WATCH:

Flames goaltending prospect Arsenii Sergeev was named the Big Ten Hockey's First Star of the Week on Tuesday morning. Sergeev helped Penn State earn its first Big Ten series win of the season, claiming 4-of-6 points from Notre Dame over the weekend. Sergeev registered a season-high 43 saves in a 3-3 tie at Wrigley Field on Friday night to match his career-high before registering a 34-save shutout on Sunday during a 3-0 victory. The 22-year-old was the Flames seventh-round pick (205th overall) in the 2021 NHL Draft.

HARVARD ALUMNI:

Tonight's matchup features two of the nine active Harvard alumni in the NHL with Los Angeles's Alex Laferriere and Calgary's Matt Coronato set to faceoff. The pair spent the 2021-22 and 2022-23 campaigns together with the Crimson before both going on to make their pro hockey debuts following the conclusion of the collegiate season. Coronato would total 38 goals and 34 assists for 72 points in 68 contests, while Laferriere posted 73 points in their two seasons together at Harvard.



INTERIM COACH:

Due to family reasons, on December 8th, Brad Larsen was granted an indefinite leave of absence from his duties as assistant coach with the Flames. Wranglers Head Coach Trent Cull will join the Flames as an assistant coach for the unforeseeable future. Cull is in his second season as bench boss with the Wranglers. Having coached in the AHL for 15 years, Cull was also an assistant coach with the Vancouver Canucks during the 2022-23 campaign.

Jonathan Huberdeau scored his 200th NHL goal against the Los Angeles Kings on November 14th, 2022.

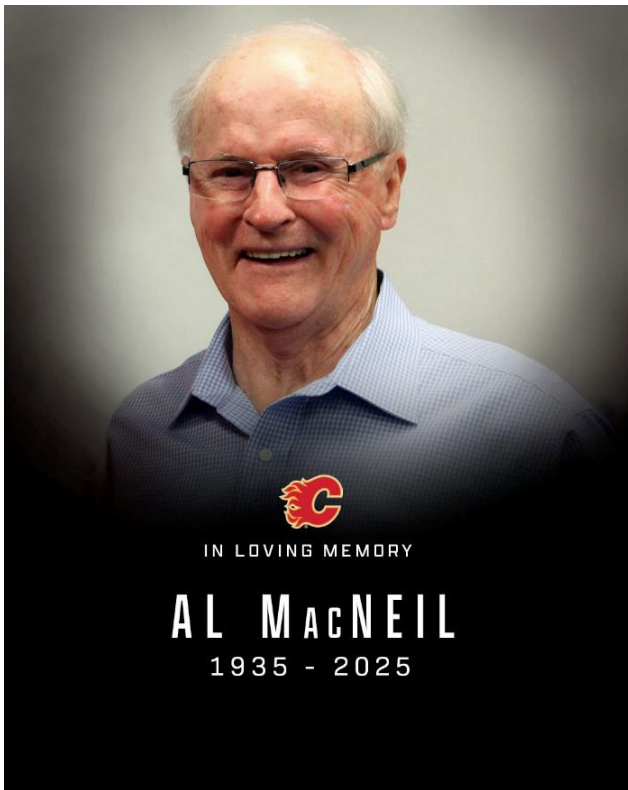

The Calgary Flames sadly announce the passing of long-time Flames executive and former head coach Al MacNeil.

Al, a Stanley Cup winning Head Coach, National Hockey League player and Calgary Flames executive and consultant whose name is engraved on the Stanley Cup four times, including the Flames 1989 championship, passed away at the age of 89 years, on January 5, 2025, surrounded by his family in Calgary.

An Original Six player, Al was a rugged defenceman and open-ice hitter who played 524 NHL games for the Toronto Maple Leafs, Montreal Canadiens, Chicago Blackhawks, New York Rangers, later concluding his NHL playing career as a Pittsburgh Penguin following his selection in the 1967 expansion draft.

Recognizing Al's potential as a Head Coach, legendary Montreal Canadiens General Manager Sam Pollock acquired his rights from the Penguins and Al subsequently spent the last two seasons of his professional hockey career mentoring young players as a Player Coach, first for the Houston Apollos of the CHL in 1968-69 and in his final year for the Canadiens then top farm team, the Montreal Voyageurs of the AHL in 1969-70.

Al won his first Stanley Cup as the rookie Head Coach of the Montreal Canadiens in 1971, his second and third Cups as the Director of Player Personnel for the Canadiens' in their 1978 and 1979 Stanley Cup victories, and his fourth as the Assistant General Manager of the Calgary Flames' 1989 Stanley Cup winning team.

As a long-time NHL player, coach and executive, Al took tremendous pride in developing and coaching hundreds of NHL hockey players over many decades.

As the General Manager and Head Coach of the Montreal Canadiens' farm team, the Nova Scotia Voyageurs, he guided the team to three Calder Cup Championships in 1972, 1976 and 1977. He was named American Hockey League Coach of the Year two times, in 1972 and 1977 and was inducted into the American Hockey League Hall of Fame in 2014.

Al was an Assistant Coach of Team Canada winning the 1976 Canada Cup, and was also an Assistant Coach of the 1981 Canada Cup team.

As a junior player with the Toronto Marlboros, he won two Memorial Cups in 1955 and as team captain in 1956. Al was the last Head Coach of the NHL's Atlanta Flames and the first Head Coach of the Calgary Flames for their first two seasons in our city.

Committed to the team and the City of Calgary, Al was a part of the Flames' hockey operations for many years. He returned to the NHL bench as an Interim Head Coach for the Flames for 13 games in the 2002-2003 season.

Al is survived by his wife of 58 years, Norma, son Allister, a scout for the Flames, and his daughter Allison and son-in-law Paul Sparkes. He has two grandsons Jack Sparkes, a 2022 draft pick of the Los Angeles Kings, and Ben Sparkes, a university student in Nova Scotia who plays Junior B hockey. Al has a large extended family based in Nova Scotia, and across Canada and the United States.
