



DONALD H. PARSONS Chairman of the Board



Donald H. Parsons heads the group of investors who entered the Pittsburgh professional sports scene in the spring of 1968. He and eight associates purchased controlling interest in the Penguins from the original 20-man syndicate. Eighteen of the 20 still retain a share of ownership in the Club.

Mr. Parsons has quickly and effectively plunged into his newest venture. As a member of the Board of Governors, the governing body of the National Hockey League, he has assumed an active administrative role in the business affairs of the League. He is serving on the Board's Finance Committee and the Owner-Player Council.

A dynamic, aggressive individual, Mr. Parsons is making his initial venture into the sports world. If he is as successful in hockey as he has been in law, banking and numerous undertakings, the sports fans of the Pittsburgh area will enjoy winning hockey teams for many years.

As a native of Philadelphia, Mr. Parsons attended The Haverford School outside of Philadelphia before entering Yale University where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1952. He continued his higher education at the University of Michigan, earning degrees in law and business administration.

Since 1956 he has been a member of the Michigan Bar Association. He is currently the senior partner in a law firm with offices in Detroit, Birmingham, Michigan and Washington, D. C.

Mr. Parsons is Chairman of the Board of the Bank of the Commonwealth of Detroit and of the Industrial State Bank and Trust Company of Kalamazoo. He is now a Director of the Bank of Lansing and the Muskegon Bank and Trust Company and is a former Board Chairman of both banks as well as the Birmingham Bloomfield Bank. He is Chairman of the Board of Creative Capital Corporation, a licensed small business investment company, and Chairman of the Board of COMAC Company, a management consulting firm.

Mr. Parsons was the recipient of the Distinguished Service Award of the Birmingham Junior Chamber of Commerce, being named "Young Man of the Year of 1964", and is a board member of the Ecconomic Club of Detroit. He is an honorary member of Alpha Kappa Psi business fraternity. He is also a Director of the Neighborhood Service Organization and ACCORD, Inc.

A resident of Birmingham, Michigan, Mr. Parsons married the former Sarah Caswell Angell of Ann Arbor in 1954. They have three children, two sons and a daughter.

JACK E. McGREGOR President



Two things amaze people about Jack E. McGregor, the Penguins' president. The first is how he has accomplished so much in such a short time and at such a young age (34). The second is how he finds time to do everything his hectic schedule demands.

The Penguins share Jack McGregor with the Pennsylvania Senate and numerous other interests and endeavors. He is now in his second term as a Senator, winning his initial try at public office in 1962. At age 28 he became the second youngest man in the history of the Commonwealth to be elected a member of that body. This was accomplished in spite of a great registration deficit. He was easily re-elected in 1966.

No single individual did more to bring big league hockey to Pittsburgh than Senator McGregor. A law school classmate, Peter H. Block, rekindled the senator's boyhood interest in the sport when it was learned the National Hockey League planned to expand. Between the two attorneys, they sold the NHL's Board of Governors and League President Clarence Campbell on Pittsburgh and engineered the financing of the multi-million dollar project. Through all of these involved negotiations, Senator McGregor's resourcefulness was of immeasurable help.

When the Senate is not in session, the Senator is always in his Pittsburgh office at the Civic Arena where he conducts both hockey and state business with remarkable efficiency and no conflict whatsoever. As the executive head of the hockey team, he coordinates all phases of the operation, doing more than his share of groundwork in getting new projects underway.

His honors have been many, both on a local and national level. The Pittsburgh Junior Chamber of Commerce tapped him as the "Man of the Year in Business" in 1966. In 1964 the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce selected him as one of the Outstanding Young Men in America, and two years later the Eagleton Institute of Politics at Rutgers University named him one of the 36 outstanding state legislators in the country.

A native of the Pittsburgh district, Senator McGregor attended Wilkinsburg High School prior to entering Yale University where he obtained his B.S. degree. He is a graduate of the Pitt Law School where he ranked first in the class of 1962.

The Senator spent three years in the Marine Corps and received his honorable discharge as Captain in the Marine Corps Reserve.

He is married to the former Carol Dangerfield of Edgewood. They have four children, three daughters and a son, and live in Edgewood.

THOMAS H. WAGNER Vice Chairman of the Board and Managing Partner

Thomas H. Wagner has had a varied and distinguished career in the world of business and industry. Presently he is the president of the COMAC Company, a Birmingham, Michigan consulting organization. He is also an officer and director of many successful Michigan enterprises.

A native of Marquette, Michigan, the 53-year old Mr. Wagner attended the University of Michigan and graduated with high honors in 1937. While at the University, he was elected to four national scholastic honorary societies in recognition of his outstanding classroom work.

The father of a son and daughter who are both active in collegiate hockey, Tim the ice version at Ithaca and Dorothy Ann on the field at Manhattan, Mr. Wagner lives with his wife, Ruth, in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan.



GEORGE B. KILBORNE Vice Chairman of the Board and Managing Partner

George B. Kilborne, 38, is a native of Bedford Village, New York. He was educated at the Choate and received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Yale University.

After leaving the Navy as Lieutenant J. G., he entered the textile field in New York City. In 1961 he moved to Birmingham, Michigan, and founded the Business Research Corporation which specializes in financial consulting and investment analysis. In 1967 Mr. Kilborne combined many of Business Research Corporation's operations with the COMAC Company.

As President of several companies and Chairman of two Michigan banks, Kilborne is also Director of the Central Business District Association of Detroit and a member of the Board of Governors of the National Association of Small Business Investment Companies.

Mr. Kilborne is married to the former Lucie Wheeler Peck of Palm Beach, Florida. The Kilbornes live in Birmingham and have three children.



GERALD H. DAUGHERTY Member of the Board of Directors and Executive Vice President

Gerald H. Daugherty is a certified public accountant who began his business career with the international CPA firm of Touche, Ross, Bailey and Smart after graduating with honors from his hometown University of Detroit. He was associated with American Motors for five years where he was the Company's Chief Accountant. In 1965 Mr. Daugherty joined Business Research Corporation, the forerunner of the COMAC Company, and is now a Vice President with that firm. An active sportsman, in addition to his interest in hockey, Mr. Daugherty participates in tennis, skiing and sailing. He and his wife, Ruth, have five children and they live in Beverly Hills, Michigan.



JACK RILEY General Manager



In his first season as a general manager in the National Hockey League, Jack Riley showed he was not afraid to make a move. As a result, he has quickly gained a reputation among his NHL colleagues as a master trader and one to be dealt with cautiously.

Although the Penguins barely missed the playoffs last season, it scares one to think where they might have finished if their 49-year old GM had relied on just the players obtained in the expansion draft. When Pittsburgh played its final game of the 1967-68 campaign, there were eight players in the lineup who were not involved in the draft.

Most of these players were key performers and leaders in the late, but futile bid for a playoff berth. Binkley, McCallum, Ubriaco, Andrea, Hicks, etc. were acquired by means other than the expansion grab-bag. Undoubtedly, Riley's best move was the one which brought Les Binkley to Pittsburgh. Along with three defensemen, all of whom saw service with the Penguins, the veteran hockey executive purchased the unheralded netminder from Cleveland for a total cash outlay of barely more than a single player commanded in the draft. Binkley blossomed into the equal of any goalie in the West Division.

During the summer, Riley was again very active in his quest to bolster the Penguins. Center was Pittsburgh's weak spot last season and he picked up three veteran NHL pivotmen in Lou Angotti, Wally Boyer and Charley Burns. Youth was injected when Jean Pronovost and John Arbour were bought from Boston.

Unlike some of his West Division counterparts, all of Jack's bartering has been accomplished without giving up any future amateur draft choices. This will bear fruit in the first universal draft set for 1970.

Jack Riley's long career in hockey has not been an easy one. From his playing days to his present high administrative rank, he has made all the stops along the way.

Dedicated, efficient and realistic properly describe Jack Riley. These attributes have served him well and led to success in all of his hockey endeavors.

Next on the agenda is a playoff team. Jack is confident that this season's Penguins are greatly improved over the initial Pittsburgh entry and should accomplish this modest desire.

Jack and his wife, Jeanne, have three children. Sons John and Tom are college graduates and Barbara attends elementary school in Mt. Lebanon.

GEORGE JAMES (RED) SULLIVAN Coach



Every coach has trouble accepting defeat. Red Sullivan is no exception, but seems to take it harder than most. And last season may have hurt the most since Sully hung up his skates and went behind the bench.

It was a frustrating season, as all losing ones are, and ended on a bitter note. Apparently out of contention for a playoff berth with two weeks remaining in the regular season, Red saw his Penguins rally dramatically by going unbeaten in their final five games only to taste elimination the night before the season ended. Just six points separated Pittsburgh from the first place team, yet there was no consolation as they missed Stanley Cup play by two points.

A little hungrier than he was last season and certainly more determined, Sullivan is back for another chance at leading an NHL team into the playoffs for the first time.

Red Sullivan coaches the way he played — hard. As a player, Red called on every bit of talent he possessed and worked as hard as he could to stay in the NHL for nine seasons.

He expects the same from his players and, even though he realizes that not every hockey player is cut from the same mold he was, his teams are known for their spirited, agressive play.

Sullivan played 14 years of professional hockey and performed for Boston, Chicago and New York in the NHL. He still holds the American League record of 119 points in a single season.

Kitchener of the Eastern Professional Hockey League was Red's first coaching stop. Another half season with Baltimore of the AHL and he was tapped to replace Doug Harvey with the New York Rangers.

Although many of the current Ranger stars broke into the NHL under Sullivan, he could not produce a winner in New York and was replaced after approximately three years. He remained with the Ranger organization as a super scout until named to the Pittsburgh post.

A native of Peterborough, Ontario, Red and his charming wife, Marion, have established a permanent home in surburban Mt. Lebanon, Pa. They have three daughters and a son.

Like his boss Jack Riley, Red is confident that this season's team is better than the first one iced by the Penguins. He feels a playoff berth is probable. It is safe to say, that Red Sullivan will do more than his share in accomplishing this modest goal.

"CHIRP" BRENCHLEY Chief Scouts

When Rudy Migay was named the coach of the Penguins' Amarillo farm club, Edgar "Chirp" Brencley doubled his scouting area and will be responsible for all of Canada instead of just the Eastern sector. Of course, he will have a staff of assistants and "bird dogs" to aid him in compiling a complete book on Canada's promising amateurs. With the universal draft going into effect in 1970, his task becomes all the more important. "Chirp" is a former British Olympic star and scored the winning goal in the final game of the 1936 games. On this side of the Atlantic, he has made his mark in the amateur ranks as a topflight coach and scout. General Manager Jack Riley frequently uses Brenchley on special assignments.



KEN CARSON Head Trainer

The best judges of a trainer's value are the coach and players with whom he works. To a man, the Penguins have nothing but praise for Ken Carson and feel he is as good as any trainer in hockey. Although still a very young man at the age of 26 and now is in his second year with Pittsburgh, Ken has seven seasons of experience in his highly specialized field. Four years of Junior "A" and two campaigns in the pro ranks prepared him for the NHL. In the off-season, he manages a golf club in Niagara Falls, Ontario where he lives with his wife, Jean, and their four children.



RON JUNKIN Assistant Trainer

The man who makes it possible for Ken Carson to do his job well is assistant trainer, Ron Junkin. "Junk" is 24 years old, single and a native of Bobcaygeon, Ontario. As a youngster, he was a goaltender and reached the level of Junior "B". During the summers he works in his hometown as a clerk in a liquor store.

Right Wing Shoots Left 5'10" 174 lbs.

Last Amateur Club: Guelph Royals (Jrs.)

Handsome Paul Andrea is a specialist in an age of specialization. He sees most of his game action when the Penguins have a manpower advantage. Almost half of his 11 goals last season came on the power play. Five times he connected, which made him the team's number two man in this department.

Scoring is no novelty to Andrea. He does this better than anything else. His minor league record proves it. Twice in his career he has registered 37 goals and in both of those seasons added better than 40 assists.


A hockey oddity in that he is a right wing who shoots left handed, Paul knows what to do with the puck around the net. He also is a good playmaker who has the knack of spotting the open man and getting the puck to him.

Andrea came to the Penguins from the New York Rangers in the trade which sent third draft choice, Larry Jeffrey, to the Broadway Blues. Most of his career in the Ranger organization was spent in the Central League and in his last four seasons there scored 126 goals.

A handy man to have around, Andrea must improve his skating and checking to take a regular turn.

Paul is married and lives in North Sydney, Nova Scotia. He and his wife, Paula, a registered nurse, have two boys and a girl.

Center Shoots Right

5'9" 170 lbs.

Last Amateur Club: Michigan Tech. University

One of the most welcome additions to the Penguins is Center Lou Angotti who was obtained from Philadelphia during the off-season.

Center was Pittsburgh's weakest position last year, but Angotti brings talent, experience and a winning spirit to the Penguins. He produced 47 points while helping the Flyers take the Western Division crown.


The Penguins acquired Angotti in a three-team deal which sent Ab McDonald to St. Louis. Philadelphia picked him in the fourth round of the expansion draft from Chicago. He was a member of the Black Hawks' 1966-67 regular season championship club.

Angotti is fast and a superior playmaker who should strenghten the Pittsburgh attack. It is obvious the Penguins are expecting a big season from Lou because they parted with McDonald, a 22-goal scorer last year, to get him.

Although most professional hockey players begin their careers at an early age, Angotti did not start until he attended a Toronto high school. He earned All-American recognition at Michigan Tech University where he graduated in 1962. After less than two seasons with Rochester of the American Hockey League, he broke into the NHL with New York in 1964-65.

Lou, his wife, Ann and two boys make their home in Toronto. His hobbies are golf and tennis.

Defense Shoots Left

5'11" 194 lbs.

Last Amateur Club: Niagara Falls, Ont. (Jrs.)

The Penguins added two youngsters to help them in their bid for a Stanley Cup playoff berth this season. One of them is John Arbour, who brings a winning history to Pittsburgh.

Boston, realizing it could not protect its large pool of outstanding prospects at the draft last summer, sold Arbour and Right Wing Jean Pronovost to Pittsburgh for a price that exceeded the \$30,000 draft price for each player.

Arbour, only 23, is the rugged type of defenseman who is willing to get tough on the ice. The Penguins, who had their shortcomings on defense, are relying on him to make opposing players more cautious around the Pittsburgh net.


While with Oklahoma City in the Central Professional Hockey League the past two years, he accounted for 35 penalty minutes and helped the club gain two regular season titles and a playoff championship. He was named to the CPHL All-Star squad last season.

As an amateur, John played on the 1964-65 Niagara Falls club which captured the Memorial Cup, symbolic of junior amateur supremacy in Canada.

Arbour, 5'11" and 195 pounds, stays fit by farming during the summer. He also enjoys fishing and boating. He and his wife, Jean Marie, have one daughter. They reside in Chippawa, Ontario.



"The game he played in Boston when we beat them, 1-0, was the best performance I ever saw by a goalkeeper," Sully has repeatedly said.

Binkley, who started out in pro hockey as a trainer, played five years with Cleveland in the American League before being purchased by the Penguins shortly before the start of the 1966-67 season. While waiting for the Penguins to go into action, he played at San Diego and was a Second Team Western League All Star selection despite playing with a last place club. It was the third time during his minor league career that he received such recognition.

Cool and confident in the net, "Bink" was the first pro goaltender to wear contact lenses on the ice. He is strong on fundamentals with quick reflexes and a standup style of goaltending.

Les and his wife, Eleanor, make their off-season home in Walkerton, Ontario. They have two children, a boy and a girl.

One of the last of the "old school" defensemen, Leo Boivin is in his 16th NHL season.


In an age when the accent is on speed in hockey, he continues to be prominent as one of the game's most punishing checkers. Boivin, the mainstay of the Penguin defense, led the club in penalty minutes with 74 while playing 73 games and topped the 1,000 game mark last season. His nine goals were his second highest NHL total.

He is small, only 5-7, but carries 185 pounds on his sturdy frame. A good rusher, Leo even played part of a season as a left wing when he was with the Boston Bruins. He did a good job, producing 10 goals and 14 assists. With 282 career points, he could pass the 300 mark sometime during the present campaign.

A solid team player who always places the club's best interests before his own, Leo is still waiting to play on his first Stanley Cup champion. Three years ago, he reached the final round while with Detroit, but Montreal ruined a great series for him by capturing the title. However, he does have at least one pro playoff championship to his credit. That came in his first and only minor league season when he was a member of the old Pittsburgh Hornets and the team won its first Calder Cup in 1951.

Boivin, his wife, Patricia, and three boys make their off-season home in Prescott, Ontario where he operates a hockey school.

Jack Riley's main project during the off-season was to fill the gap at center ice. One of the men acquired is Wally Boyer, a verteran of 11 pro campaigns.




After an absence of ten years, Billy Dea returned to the National League last season and his play was almost an exact duplication of his entire pro career. He was the same consistent, durable player who earlier had performed with New York, Detroit and Chicago in the NHL. His string of nine straight 20-goal season was snapped, but the 35 year old vet was more a victim of the Penguins' center ice problems than the superior play in the NHL. Despite the handicap of not playing regularly with the same pair of linemates and often on a makeshift forward unit, Dea produced 16 goals, including three game-winning scores.

A freak accident prevented him from taking part in all 74 games. Billy severely cut his left arm on a piece of loose plexi-glass in a skirmish along the Civic Arena Boards. The accident resulted in a one game layoff. It was only the second game he has missed in ten seasons. The American League consecutive game mark of 548 belongs to the effecient Penguin left wing.

Not a flashy player, Dea does the job game after game, making equal contributions at both ends of the ice. Because of his unspectacular style, he often does not get the credit other more colorful, but less deserving players receive.

A native of Edmonton, Billy now lives with his wife, Sally, and son in Crystal Beach, Ontario.

A product of the Detroit organization, Bob has played with the Red Wings and Boston Bruins in addition to the Penguins during his pro career which now spans eight season.






As a penalty killer, there are none better in the NHL. He is a tireless skater and hustles all the time.

But things did not work out and Wayne never came close to matching his American League production. In an attempt to help him find his scoring touch, the Flyers returned him to Quebec for a short spell.




Keith should benefit from last season's experience. He has no short-comings and is a consistent hockey player. He is a very strong skater who plays a sound game at both ends of the ice.
